
holidays? I soon saw that each calendar came with a sticky strip, magnet combination that promised to hold your calendar in place wherever you needed it.

## National Angus group comes to Lazbuddie

Lust-Dodd Cattle Co. of Lazbuddie was the noon tour stop of the National Angus Conference Tour on Sept. 9. The national conference and tour is an annual event which brings Angus enthusiasts together from around the country.

Attending were registered and commercial cattlemen from 25 states and four countries. It was a 4-day event which included two days of ranch tours and two days of business meetings in Amarillo. The last time the tour visited Texas was 10 years ago, and it has never toured operations in the Texas Panhandle.

Lust-Dodd Cattle Co., owned and operated by Tim Lust, of Abernathy, and Troy Dodd, of Muleshoe, had over 350 tour participants review their Lazbuddie operation. They operate a registered Angus cowherd and custom heifer development facility.

Lust-Dodd partners with Gardiner Angus Ranch of Ashland, Kan., on the Angus cows. Lust-Dodd has been able to combine cutting edge Kansas genetics with their Texas environment to develop a strong functional Angus cow base, said

Lust-Dodd was established in 1996 and has grown to 400 registered and commercial Angus cows, and is the fifth largest registered Angus breeder in Texas. "To have a tour of this magnitude visit our operation at such an early state of our development is a stroke of good fortune few operations have the chance to enjoy," said Lust, the son of Glenn and Barbara Lust of Lazbuddie.

The tour participants were given brief comments about the

each owner's respective philosophy. Then, visitors reviewed the cattle on display, were told about the latest technology in determining cow pregnancy and had a certified Angus microwavable pot roast with trimmings.


Lust-Dodd also operates a custom heifer development facility. Commercial heifers from across the Panhandle and area states are placed in the yard, explained Dodd. Heifers are placed on feed and then grown in such a manner where each heifer will reach their reproductive maturity quickly and efficiently, artificially inseminated and then returned to the ranches as bred females.


Determining pregnancy by ultrasound can be accomplished in as little as 25 days after breeding. Learning the sex of the embryo can be done between 60 and 90 days of the pregnancy. This technology has existed for several years, said Dodd, but is not widely used. Tour participants watched an ultrasound demonstration at Lust-Dodd. The technology is used in the everyday operations of the facility to determine heifer pregnancy sooner and get the heifers back home to reduce commercial ranchers' expense, he added.


"Our cows have to be moderate sized, efficient producers and have calves which exhibit rapid growth to a desired endpoint," said Dodd. "Our No. 1 goal is to produce bulls that represent an outstanding economic value and will go out and perform for our commercial bull customers."


