## Jesse Abarca's spread keeps growing

# Goat dairy puts Rhea on the map

Last year, we brought you a story on a Jesse Abarca's goat dairy in the Rhea community. I decided to go back for a little follow-up to see how it is going. All I can tell you is that it is growing ... growing .... and growing.

This one-time small operation has become one of the largest goat dairies in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Abarca started his business in 1991 with his wife Dyan after he retired from the U.S. Air Force. When he started, he only had two goats; now he has close to 800 goats at his dairy.

When he first started off, he used the goat's milk to feed his baby calves. Over time, he, "kept the best and sold the rest." It got to the point that he had so many goats that he had to decide between the goats or his cattle.

Abarca started building his dairy in January of last year. Every part of his dairy has been built by family. Abarca, his brother Miguel, and his son Aaron have been doing all of the past and present construction on the dairy. The only outside help they have had on the dairy is for the electrical work.

Speaking of construction, Abarca has been busy since I last talked to him. He is now in the middle of building a cheese factory. When it is done, it will have 3,000 square feet and a 10'x16' freezer. Abarca will be able to pasteurize and

make his own cheese, then freeze it. Goat cheese is different from cow cheese in that it can be frozen for long periods of time and when it thaws out it will as soft or pliable as when it first made.

Also this last year, Abarca and family made a maternity barn so his goats would have shelter while they were having their babies. The barn is 80'x46' and can hold up to 28 does.

Abarca is also in the process of making a 20'x210' baby barn. This barn will be able hold up to 320 babies. Only problem is that it won't be big enough. Last winter, Abarca had 350 goats on milk at one time.

If that isn't enough, Abarca also has been working on enlarging his waste disposal system. He is enlarging it by four times. This is so all the water used to cleaned out of the milk stalls won't be wasted but can be recycled to water trees and grass.

One of his largest projects is the shelter for his goats. Right now he has a 30'x100' shelter. Abarca is adding on four more and plans to have seven total when he is done. He will then have a shelter 30'x840' for his goats. That is over 25,000 square feet of shelter.

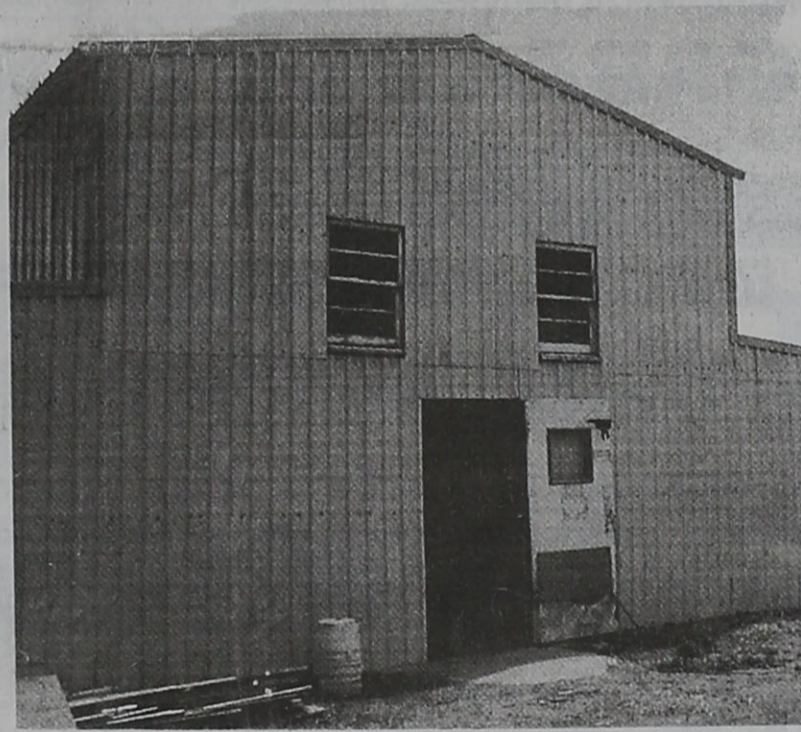
Overall, Abarca's long range goal is to have 750 to 800 good milkers and 300 to 400 replacements. But this is still a ways off.



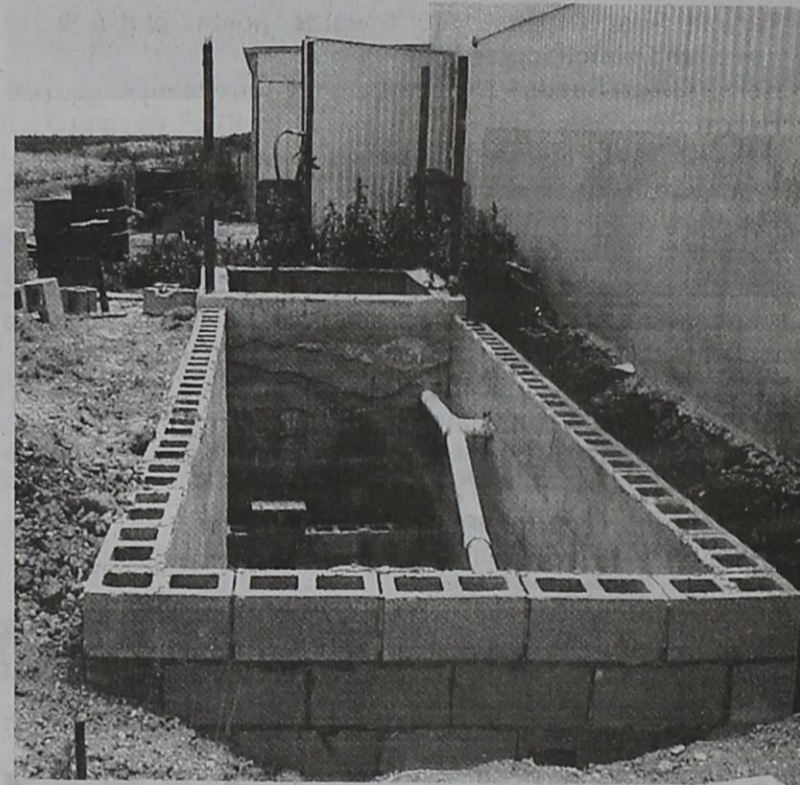

## Farwell council okays street projects

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday went over the proposed budget, which includes 3% pay raises for all city employees except Police Chief Roy McGaa. McGaa will not get a raise this year. He was given an 18.5% pay hike two years ago.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said the council is looking at increasing the city tax rate about 4 cents, from 41 cents to 45 cents.

The council approved a bid

from Eastwood Construction for the annual street work, about \$31,000, and to redo the intersection of Avenue I and 7th Street (and pave half a block) at about \$25,000.

Since the city only has about \$35,000 budgeted for street work this year, construction firm owner Johnny Eastwood said he wouldn't bill for the intersection work until the city has funds available in next year's budget. No interest will be charged.

The contest is judged by Clovis residents.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes in each category.

Plus, every participant will receive a free train ride on the Border Town Days Express.

In charge of the contest are Linda Moss and Joy Stanton.

Mrs. Moss said that youths planning to enter the decorated bike contest in the parade need to register, giving their name and age, to be eligible for the cash prizes.

The contest will be held an hour before the Border Town Days parade on July 31. After the bicycle contest, all entrants will ride in the parade to the Farwell city park. Prizes will be announced at the beginning of the Day in the Park festivities, at 1 p.m.

at the Farwell city park gazebo.

No motorized bikes are allowed in the contest. All riders must bring their decorated bikes to Anderson Street (between Citizen's Bank and Phillip's 66) by 9:45 a.m. Texas time (that's 8:45 New Mexico time) and line up for the judging there.

The portion of Anderson Street where the judging will take place will be closed to vehicular traffic during this period.

"You must be on time or you will not be judged," advised Mrs. Moss.

She added, "Contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme -- "Reflections of the 1900's" if they are going to be counted. The judges will be looking for adherence to the theme."

The contest is open to youths who live in the Texico and Farwell school districts.

Other rules are:

-- All participants ride in the parade (their folks can go along too if they wish) and must continue to Farwell city

park. There they can park their bikes in a bicycle rack across the street from the park and in back of the First Baptist Church of Farwell. Riding bikes in the park during BTD is not allowed. -- You must be present at the park to receive your cash

prizes when the announcements are made during the 1 p.m. ceremonies.

-- There will be two judging categories:

- 1) Division A: Best decorated bike, ages 7-12.
- 2) Division B: Best decorated bike, ages 6 and under.

**Pest Management Update**

**Curly top virus found**

Reports of curly top virus are rolling into my office. Curly top virus is the most important disease of tomatoes in our area. During the first indication of the virus, the plant will appear dull green or pale yellow and the main stem will become abnormally erect. In just a few hours, the leaflets will begin curving downward and the leaflet edges will roll upward, producing a stiff leathery appearance, thus the name "curly top." Plant growth is completely stopped and premature reddening of the fruit occurs, resulting in poor quality, size and flavor.

This virus is transmitted by the feeding of the beet leafhopper, insect populations built in weed hosts such as Russian thistle, mustard, among others, then the insects migrate to cultivated plants in the spring. The leafhopper picks up the virus while feeding and carries it to the next plant, injecting the virus as it feeds on a healthy plant. After the leafhopper acquires the virus it carries it indefinitely. The level of plant infection depends upon the number of virus-carrying insects, the straining of the virus and the stage of the tomato plant.

There is no single practice that eliminates this virus. However, combining several cultural practices will lessen its spread.

At the virus' first sign, remove the infected plants asap. Diseased plants will not provide salvable fruit and keeping it among other plants will only help the virus spread.

Remove all weeds from in and around your garden. Insects are attracted to weed hosts. I know that some folks plant gardens on field edges and this may be difficult if there are a lot of weeds present in the adjacent field.

Fertilize and irrigate to encourage young plants to grow a heavy foliage that might discourage leafhopper migration.

Plant tomato plants in partial shade, or plant them close together. A thick canopy will produce shade to ward off leafhoppers. But excessive shading could prevent the proper development of the plant.

It's not recommended to target the insect itself because the leafhopper is not a permanent resident of tomatoes. The virus is transmitted after leafhopper feeding, and the insect is probably long gone, feeding on other hosts, before symptoms appear on the tomato plant.

Plant resistant varieties, such as Saladmaster, Rowpac, Roza and Columbia. For more information, holler at me at the county extension office.
