## 'The Overpass' still years away

Steve Perez, Texas district state highway engineer, told the State Line Tribune on June 29 that the long-discussed overpass between Farwell and Texico has been approved by the state highway department for design and planning.

That's the easy part. Now come the more difficult aspects. These include coordinating the project with New Mexico highway department personnel (meetings are being set up), decisions on funding, and dealing with the multitude of problems associated with a major building project.

Perez said that Texas is willing to handle the design, construction and maintenance of the overpass, so he expects approvals with the New Mexico officials should go well.

Agreeing on how much each state will pay will be an issue, although most of the funds for the project will come from the federal government, he said.

"Right now, we are still in the drawing stage," he added.

The plans will call for the overpass to have a loop in the triangular area adjacent to the Santa Fe Railroad tracks on the Texas side. In other words, the overpass will not be a straight shot from Farwell's Avenue A to Texico's Wheeler Avenue.

This is because U.S. Highway 60 (the Amarillo highway) must be integrated into the plan. By having a loop, traffic from U.S. 84 (the Lubbock highway) and U.S. 60 can coverage into Texico easily.

Perez said Texas officials want this project to be state-of-the-art and appealing to motorists, especially since it's a gateway into both states.

Another problem that will need to be dealt with before construction can begin involve property acquisition. It appears the Town & Country and Allsup's convenience stores would be involved, among others.

Also, the situation with endangered species must be dealt with before any highway department projects can proceed. In this case, the horned toad's habitats must be looked at.

And if a building is more than 50 years old, the historical preservation society gets involved.

Thus, plans will not move speedily. In fact, Perez stresses that "if all goes well, we're looking at 12 to 15 years away."

Perez said he has served as district engineer for about 15 years "and I won't be around to see this overpass project finished."

As an example of the time needed for major highway projects, he pointed to the

upgrade of U.S. Highway 60 from two lanes to four lanes. He said the project was started in 1959 -- and completed in 1994.

To those who didn't: I understand.

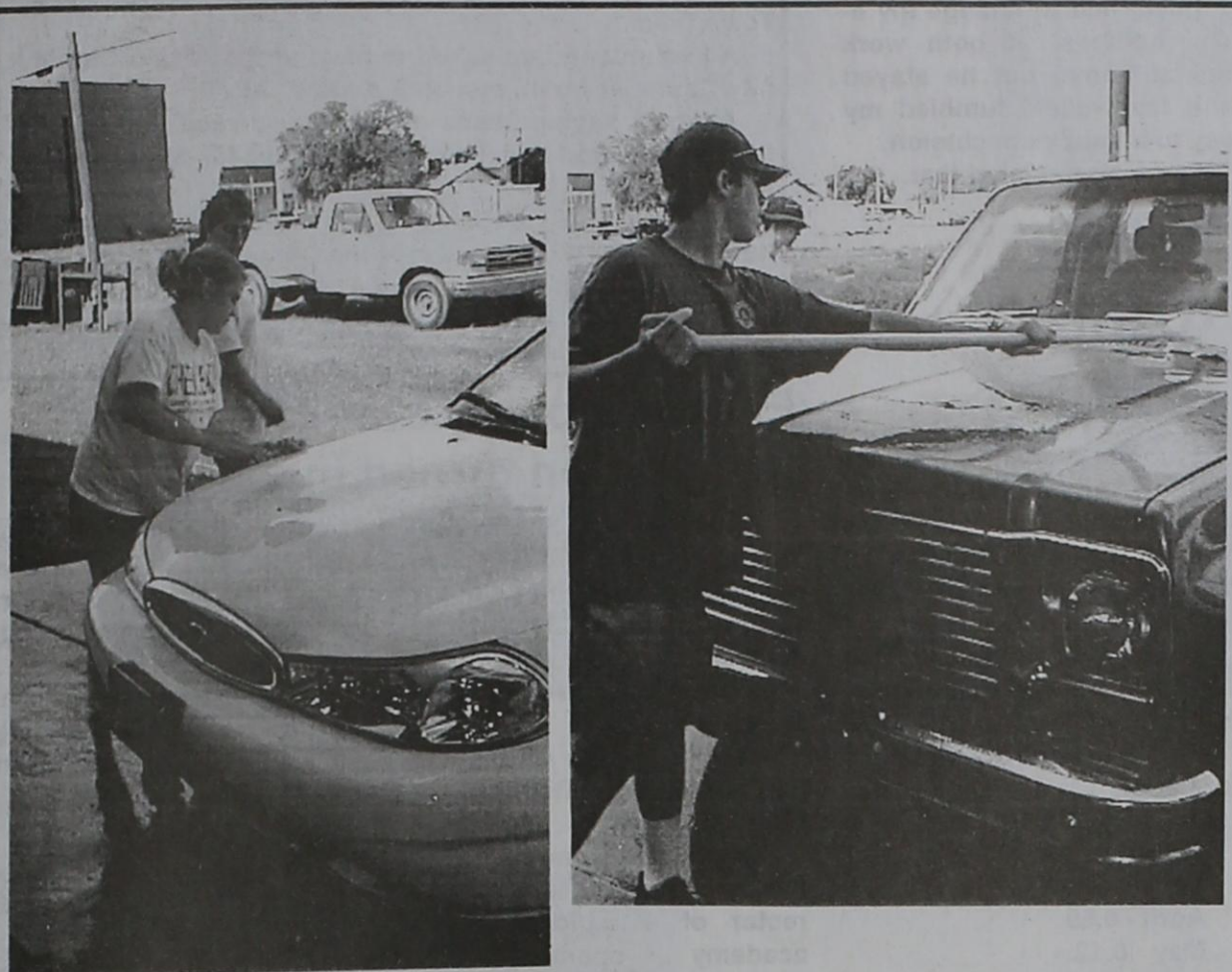
And I hope that all of you join me in prayers that the surgery is successful.

A highly successful car wash to raise funds for the Bobby Winegeart surgery was held on Saturday.

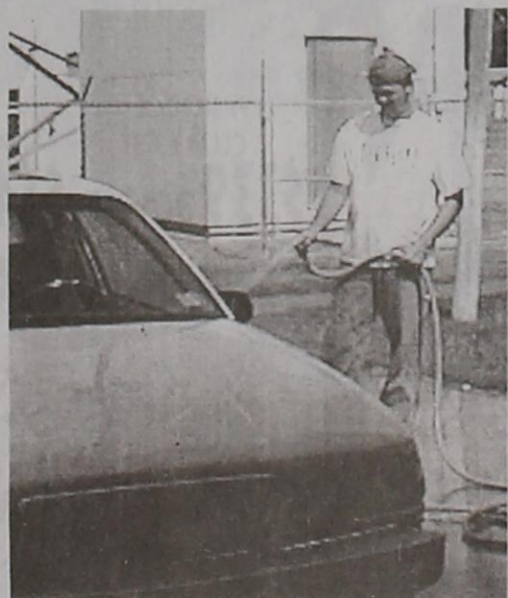
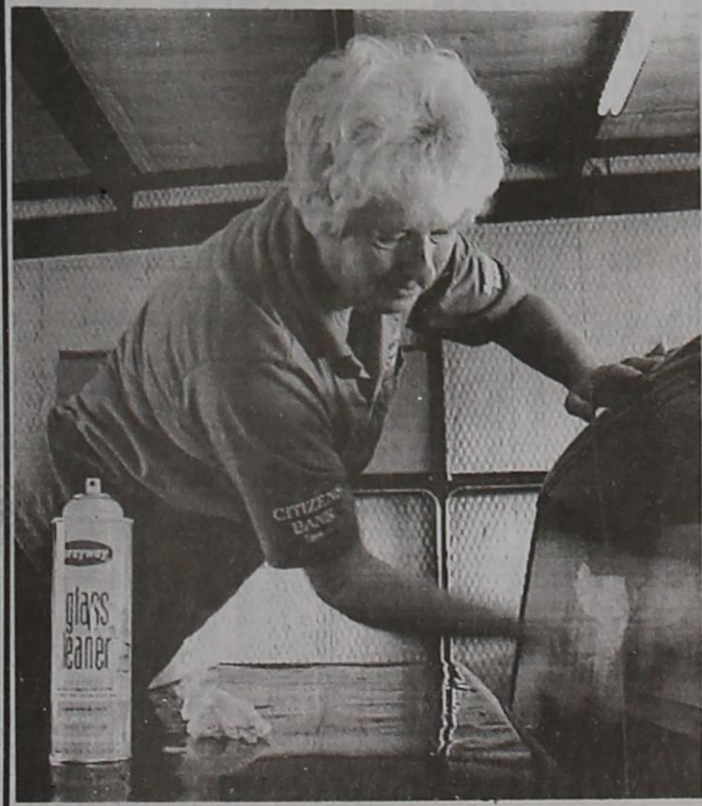
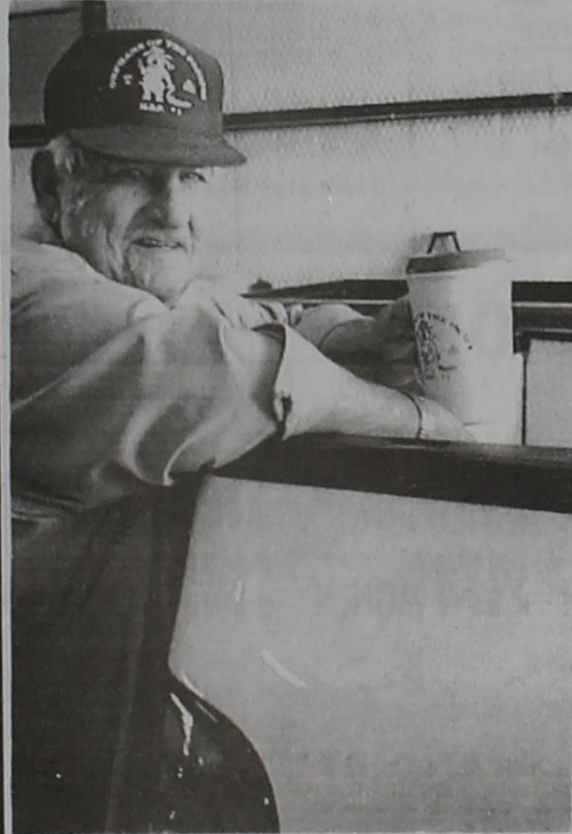
Sponsoring it was the Texico Community Activities Organization.

The first prize will be a Holland grill, valued at \$1,300, plus a half side of beef.

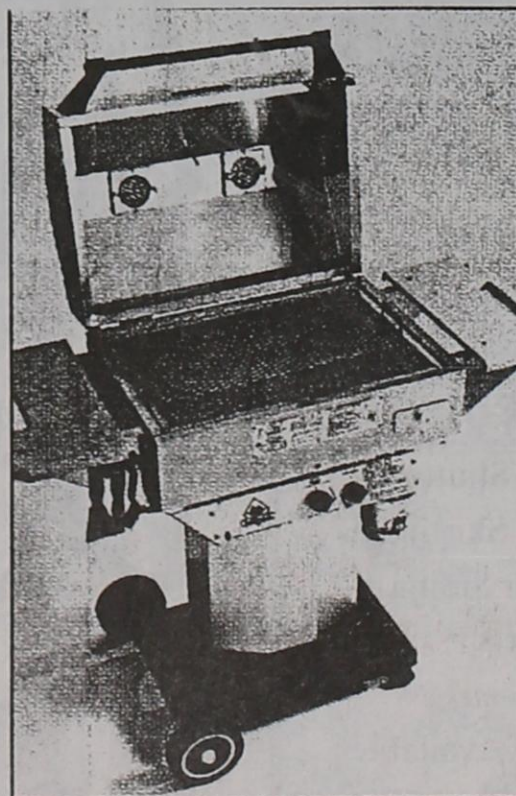
The second prize will be half side of beef.

**Parmer County sheriff's resignation turned in**

Parmer County Sheriff Walt Yerger turned in his written resignation to Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton on June 28.

It was effective immediately.

Now in charge of the department is Chief Deputy Gary Blair.

Yerger had announced he has accepted the post of director of a regional police academy operating at Weatherford College.

Yerger became sheriff in May 1998 after the resignation of Rex Williams. That November, he was elected to the post.

But he was defeated in his bid for re-election in the Republican primary last spring by Friona Police Chief Randy Gerles.

The county commissioners will name a replacement for Yerger.

They had planned to meet with Gerles at their June 26 meeting but Gerles was unable to attend due to some pressing Friona responsibilities.

That meeting will be rescheduled, as Gerles is the likely candidate to be offered the sheriff's post.

Gerles is unopposed in the sheriff's race in the November general election.

## McDonald to celebrate his 90th birthday

A birthday reception will be held for Texico's A.D. McDonald on his 90th birthday.

Everyone is invited to the reception from 2 to 4 p.m. mst on July 16 at the Texico School educational complex.

He was born July 14, 1910, in Coleman, Texas. At 11 years of age, his family moved to a farm six miles northwest of Clovis. He graduated from Ranchvale School in 1928. He worked for several farmers and saved his money until 1931 when he enrolled in college at Las Vegas, N.M.

Later, he moved to Portales and attended Eastern New Mexico Junior College, where he played on the college basketball team. In 1935, he graduated with the first graduating class at Eastern with an associate of arts degree. That summer, he worked in the Stone elevator.

In the fall of 1935, he came to Texico where he served as elementary school principal until 1942. He married Gladys

Singleterry, of Pleasant Hill, in December 1935.

In 1942, he went to Pleasant Hill, where he was the school superintendent, plus the basketball, softball and track coaches, until 1945. He then left the education field and became parts manager for Roy Williams at the Old, Cadillac and GMC truck dealership until 1958, when he went into business for himself.

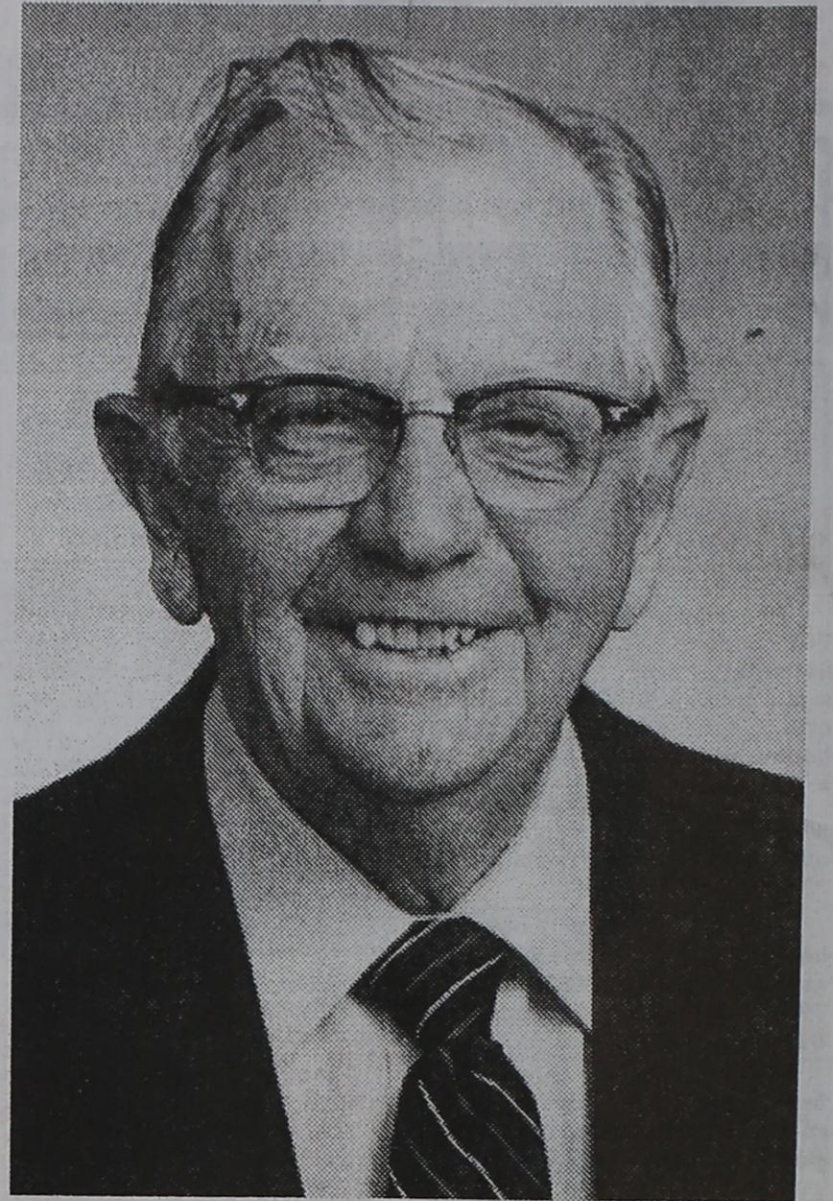
In 1960, he returned to Texico, where he taught English in the high school. He became the high school principal in 1962, then superintendent in 1963, where he served until he retired in 1975.

During his superintendency, a new cafeteria was built, replacing the army barracks that served as the cafeteria. The new gym was built, as well as the west wing of the elementary school building. And plans were made for the new junior high school building.

McDonald has served the community for many years. He has been a Sunday School teacher for over 30 years at Central Christian Church in Clovis; president of the Texico Chamber of Commerce; and a member of the Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens Club and Texico-Farwell Rotary Club. He also is a member of Phi Delta Kapp at ENMU.

He has received many awards over the years, too. In 1999, the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club presented him with the Paul Harris Fellow Award. In 1975, he was one of 10 New Mexicans to receive the New Mexico Distinguished Public Service Award. Gov. Jerry Apodaca proclaimed May 29, 1975, as A.D. McDonald Day in New Mexico. Also in 1975, he was named Man of the Year by the Texico Chamber of Commerce. And in 1992, he was honored as Pioneer Man of the Year by the Border Town Days Committee.

During his retirement, he has enjoyed traveling with Trailway Tours. He has taken 25 trips with them and has escorted several trips. He enjoys attending basketball games and other special events at Texico.

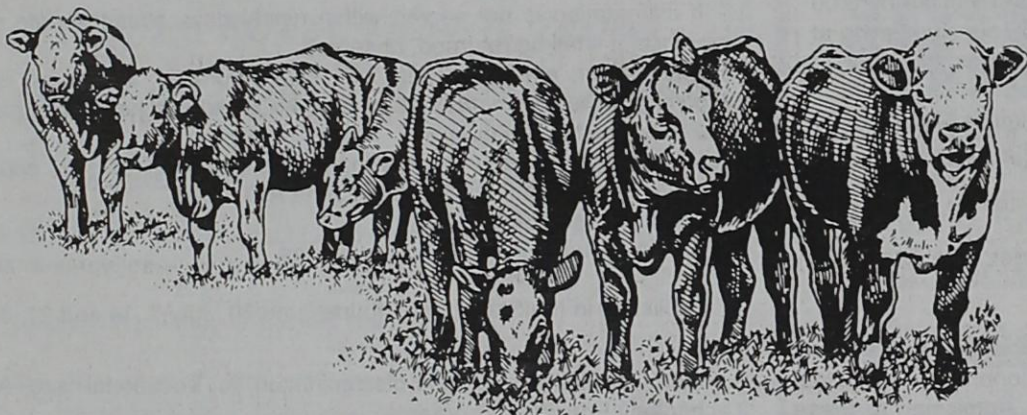
