'You're from Texas ... don't you have cows?'

Oi (hello) from Brazil! First, I just want to thank everyone who took the time to write me. You will never know how much I appreciate it and how much it means to me. Every day after school, I rush home and ask my sister if I have any mail. When I have mail, I am really excited and happy all day. And when I don't, I am a little disappointed.

Secondly, I hope things in Farwell are going as well as things here in Pompeu. We are entering the summer months here so it is a lot hotter than I had ever expected it to be. I am not sure what it is in Fahrenheit, but in Celsius it's 32 degrees. On hot days, it is 35-37 degrees and I was told that in January it would be 38 or more.

I hope that I don't fry. I am getting a pretty good tan, though. I guess you could say I'm going to come home a different color.

Last of all, sorry if my English is not that good. I really don't use it that much, and when I do use it, I speak really slow and incorrectly. I miss speaking fast and using that good, old Texas twang. If you ask my mom about when I talk to her on the telephone, she will tell you I have to think for a minute about what I am going to say. My brain has to register which language is going to come out of my moth. Anyway, if you're an English pro, please forgive my writing skills.

Now, on to business: Since I last wrote, many things have happened. I had orientation in Belo Horizonte with all the other Rotary Exchange students in this region. There are 30 from the USA and a total of, plus or minus, 70. We toured the city of Belo Horizonte and then had a dance that night. I didn't want to leave afterwards because I loved talking with the other exchange students. It's like we are one big family. We all have the same problems, such as language differences, food differences and family differences. It was weird how alike all of us were. Now, we telephone each other and make sure everyone is doing well. We also have counselors, now. This is a person who was an exchange student in another country and helps us with the problems we have here. My counselor is Raissa. She lived in South Carolina last year.

I am pretty much into a schedule now. I love it here. The people here love me, too. I guess you could say that this town is kind of like Farwell -- everyone knows everyone and when someone new moves into town, everyone wants to know who they are. I try to run every night (because I'm afraid of getting fat) and all the kids that play in the park where I run, run along side of me and yell out, "Hello, Americana ... we love Amer-

They are so cute because they try to speak English but it comes out of their mouths with a Portuguese accent. The language seems to be getting better for me. My family is shocked at how quickly I learned it. But when I think about it, I had to learn quickly. When you're isolated from your language, what else are you supposed to do -- talk to yourself in English?

My city is made of farmers and ranchers. Most of the farmers have sugar cane. In my city, we have a factory that produces sugar from the cane. It's kind of like the feedlots in Farwell -- it stinks after rainy days, literally. Cane grows everywhere and those who have cattle also distribute milk. The milk in the supermarkets here is hot and when you bring it home, you boil it. I have gotten used to it now but my first time to drink it, I thought I was going to be sick.

Most of the time we buy our milk directly from the man who produces it. It's pretty good. The other day I went to one of my friend's farms. It was exciting. I learned how to milk a cow by hand. He has machines that milk the cows but he wanted me to learn by hand. He told me I wasn't very good and then he said, "You're from Texas. Don't you have cows?"

That brings me to another subject -- odd questions. So far I have been asked such questions as "Have you ever seen snow?" ... "What is it like?" ... "Is it really cold or is that just a



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Wolverines host Foxes for state championship

The Texico Wolverines have done it again -- made it to the Class 1A state championship game!

The Wolverines ran their record to 8-3 with a 21-0 shutout of Loving on Saturday at the Field of Hopes and Dreams.

Texico had defeated Loving, 22-20, in the second game of the season. The wider margin this time shows the continuing improvement of the Wolverines since the season began. In the past five games, Texico has only allowed 12 points.

Texico hosts Fort Sumner at 1:30 p.m. mt on Saturday for the state title. Three weeks ago, Texico upset the Foxes, 13-6, for the district championship.

Loving's offense was completely eradicated by Texico, managing only 3 first downs for the entire game.

The Falcons started the game on their 25 and promptly lost a fumble to Phil Peabody. Jake Boazman ran twice for a first down, then Eric Stanley and Eric Smith combined for another. Smith scored from the 3 at 8:56. The kick was wide and it was 6-0 in Texico's favor.

Loving started its next series at its 20. Shay Norvell and Jake Williams had good tackles. Jake Boazman sacked the QB for a 9-yard loss and the Falcons punted to midfield.

Mattison Cross ran for 7, then for 8 more. A pass to Josh Boazman gained a first down. The drive culminated when Eric Stanley ran to paydirt from the 8 at 2:14 of the first quarter. A pass to Albert Esparza was good for 2 extra points and Texico now led 14-zip.

In the second quarter, Norvell had a big tackle and Esparza defensed a pass well. Texico got the ball but lost a fumble. Then Loving got some luck. The Falcons QB was stopped, fumbled, and a Loving running back picked up the ball and got his team's first 1st down. Loving punted.

Cross and Stanley ran for 5 yards apiece. Stanley then gained 14 but Texico punted. Kyle Cain defensed a pass well. Loving had a bad snap on its next punt try and the Wolverines got the ball at the Loving 5, but then lost a fumble. Loving was held and punted, with Smith having a big return to the Loving 25.

Texico was held. Justin Minshew had a QB ack, then Jake

Boazman intercepted as the half ended. The Wolverines started on their own 20 to open the 3rd quarter. Stanley ripped off a big gainer. A pass to Norvell

They will continue to look into different proposals to see how much improvement can be made.











rumor?" ... "Can you eat it like ice or will it hurt you?" .. "Does everyone in Texas ride horses?" ... "Do you really have wild Indians?" ... "Do you know how to shoot a gun, too?"

They watch too much TV. I guess they think we are all cowboys. The only thing they knew about Texas before I got here was what they saw in John Wayne films. My sister asked me, "Why does he talk with a different accent in all his films, and why does he ride horses and shoot at Indians? Is that not how Texas is?"

They love films here. I don't see how they can stand to sit there and read every word that a person says. "Titanic" just arrived here. My family and I watched it. I was fascinated at how interested they were. For three hours, they read the bottom of the screen as if it were the most important thing in the world. After it was over, everyone had cried, laughed and sang along with the movie. I guess we are not so different after all.

The fruits here grow wild. Any time I want a mango, coconut, banana, pineapple, orange or lemon, I just step outside, look for the right tree, pick and eat whatever I want. Did you know pineapples grow in the ground like carrots? Yesterday, I was at one of my friend's houses when I saw a monkey. I was shocked and then she told me she had seven of them in her tree. She made a funny noise with her tongue and then we waited for a minute. Out came six monkeys and a baby on the back of one of them. I had never seen a monkey outside of a zoo before. It was truly amazing!

I am getting used to going to church here. It is very difficult. First, because I am not familiar with the Catholic religion and second because I don't understand a word the priest says. I guess you could say I have a lot of time to pray. If you can't beat em, join em! And that is exactly what I did. Every Sunday night, my family goes to church. The first two weeks, I watched as they prayed. I have no idea what got into me but from then on I joined in and prayed in English. After all, we all pay to the same God. He doesn't care what religion we are or what language we speak, just as long as we believe in Him and His holy begotten son.

I am also amazed at how poor this country is. Not to be rude because I love it here, but the people are a lot poorer than the people in America are. For example, in school you buy the books. If you don't' think you need a history book, you don't buy one. Many of the kids share books and at night they get together to study. It makes it difficult for the teachers because not all the kids have books so the teacher has to write a lot on the chalkboard.

Another example is the youth here. Many of them help support their families by working in the day and going to school at night. One of my friends works from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and then goes to school from 6 to 10:30 p.m. It makes me thank the Lord for what I have. I feel sorry for many of the kids here. They have no time to be kids. No time for friends. I asked him the other day how he did it and he simply responded, "What other choice do I have?"

Thank you, Lord, for the clothes on my back, the food in my stomach, families that love me in two countries and for never having to go without any of these things.

Well, I had better close now. I have a million things to do today. Everyone remember to keep the letters coming. I have written everybody back that has written me so far. I promise to keep it up with all the news you can fine. Love always,



Texico Schools started competitive sports in the 1930s (exact year unknown). The first mention of a mascot was the 1936 yearbook titled the Wolverine. We can assume that sometime in the 1930s the Wolverine was adopted as the school mascot and the colors emerald green and white.

Texico Schools originally started in a one-room wooden structure. In 1917, the school moved into a new brick twostory schoolhouse. In 1927, the first gym was built, then in 1950 the second gym (the existing old gym). The elementary building was constructed in 1955. The current high school was built in 1962, with two classrooms added in 1965. Also in 1965, the east-west wing of the elementary building was added. In 1967, the original two-story school building used for junior high was torn down and in 1968 the cafeteria and ag shop were built. In 1972, the newest gym was built and in 1976 the junior high moved into its current facility.

Through all these years and changes in the school, the colors have been green and white with no other colors used until recently.

Texico Schools has the oldest history in Curry County, one the students, staff and community should be proud of. Part of showing pride in the school is to use the school colors that were adopted in the 1930s and not incorporate additional colors in our school colors.

The Texico Volunteer Fire Department, one of the most highly applauded volunteer departments in the entire state,

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proudly supports the colors of the Texico school system.

The traditional color of most fire departments is red. In 1992, the Fire Department wore traditional colors to the ball game. We were playing Tatum. A school administrator mentioned the fact that the department looked as if they were supporting the other team. In 1992, Chief Lewis Cooper ordered our first green and white fire truck as well as starting a program to paint all of the department's trucks and equipment green and white.

Today, all the Texico fire department vehicles are green and white with the exception of one that is soon to be replaced. This color scheme has cost the Fire Department \$20,000, but it is worth it to show the pride we feel in our children, school system and community.

I would like to see the school and community show the same pride by proudly displaying the school colors GREEN and WHITE, and no other colors on all school uniforms, letter jackets and other items representing the Texico Schools.
