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The Bobby Winegeart story There's hope

In January, I wrote a story about a young man in our Twin Cities, Bobby Winegeart, who had been injured in a vehicle accident and was paralyzed from the waist down.

In April 1998, he was on his way to work in Farmington when he veered off the road, over-corrected, flipping his welding truck and severing his spine. Bobby is a 1994 Texico High graduate who graduated with honors, was a student council representative and was named Outstanding Athlete of the Year.

After that article, Linda Thompson, Bobby's mother, received a call from a man who lives in East Texas who had read my article and who knew the name of a doctor who specializes in spinal surgery and who might possibly could help. He called Mrs. Thompson with the information.

So Mrs. Thompson wrote Dr. Carl Kao, who practices in Washington, D.C., telling him about Bobby but hadn't heard anything until a couple of weeks ago. On Tuesday, Dr. Kao came from Denver to see Bobby in Texico.

Dr. Kao assured Mrs. Thompson that Bobby could walk again with surgery. He brought a videotape of a similar procedure and explained everything to Bobby.

According to what Mrs. Thompson told me, all together, the surgery will cost around \$30,000, and will be performed in Ecuador.

If all goes to plan, Bobby will have surgery done in November of this year. He will stay in Ecuador for two weeks and three days, then come back to the States and go through more rounds of physical therapy.

Mrs. Thompson said that Dr. Kao is licensed to practice this surgery here in the States, in Ecuador and Taiwan. But since it's a lot less expensive to do this outside of the U.S. and the least expensive place is Ecuador, that's what plans call for.


Dr. Kao assured Bobby that at first he will be walking with a walker, then he will gradually make his way to crutches.

When I asked Mrs. Thompson how Bobby was after he spoke with Dr. Kao, she told me that neither she nor Bobby have "come out of the clouds."

Unfortunately, Mrs. Thompson and her husband are moving to Virginia later this month and will be doing all of their preparations long-distance.

After the first article I wrote came out, the community started helping and offering their support in any way they could. Now, these wonderful people need your help again.

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Last Sunday, I enjoyed hearing about the mission trip that some of the youths and adults at Hamlin Memorial **United Methodist Church took** recently.

Finally -- rain!

A lengthy drought period was broken in our area the past few days with some folks getting a lot of moisture, but, unfortunately, some others got little to none.

Shirley Steinbock, at the Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lazbuddie reported over 2 inches of rain in her area, although none fell on Monday night.

While the areas south of Lazbuddie had more than 3 inches, areas west of Clay's Corner received none or little.

At the Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat, Yolanda and Lonnie McFarland reported about an inch of rain.

But to show how the rains fell, there were areas of Oklahoma Lane that received absolutely no moisture over the

The first load of wheat arrived at the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator in Farwell on June 1.

It was brought in by Eldon Embry. The wheat contained 11.5 moisture and had a test weight of 57.1.

Heathington Farms brought in the first load of wheat on May 30 at the Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat. The moisture content was (Continued on Page 2) 8.6, and the test weight was weekend. But an area just four miles away got 3 inches.

Even though Farwell is a small community, the rainfall totals varied, almost from street to street.

All told, Fred Chandler, at the Sherley-Anderson elevator here, reported over an inch of moisture. Totals elsewhere in town were closer to 1 1/2 inches.

The western part of Parmer County was fortunate on Tuesday night as a storm came litterally down the state line.

Over the weekend, the Muleshoe area got a lot of rain, with some estimates as high as 5 inches.

And the preceding week saw the Friona area get more than an inch of moisture.

lined, including global warming and nitrogen oxide.

Other points were stressed such as the fact that Texico cannot handle the amount of water used by a dairy.

There are many factors that determine how much water a cow needs a day such as temperature, body weight, the amount of milk produce and so forth. The council estimated that 100 gallons of water a minute is not that far off a figure and could be even more.

As it is now, Texico says that the dairy would hurt Farwell more than it would Texico because of the way they are going to sett up.

Apparently, the dairy will be drawing water directly out of the reservoir that Farwell

sits on. Texico has only a branch coming from this line.

"In essence, this dairy will affect everyone around us," said Councilman Oran Jay Autrey.

Many other questions and points were brought up during the meeting such as how far away they plan to release the waste water, how do we compare feedlots with dairies, and if perhaps this dairy stop economical could growth towards the west.

Also, the council suggested that folks who have not sent their letter to the state or have not turned in their letter to city hall do so and put a request stating that you would like to have a public hearing to oppose this dairy directly.

The council wants someone from Santa Fe to come here so that they can hear for themselves the opposition to a dairy close to the city limits.

Those who attended the meeting were very opposed to the proposed Martin Grain Dairy near the Texico cemetery.

I decided that I was too busy to constantly be in Town Hall rehearsing, learning my lines, perfecting my dance steps and in general developing a premature ulcer for my efforts.


Don't get me wrong -- I would love all of the above ... if I had enough time.

When asked what she attributes her longevity to, she said, "The golden rule -- do unto others as you would have them do unto you."





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Crime Stoppers confab held

The Parmer County Crime Stoppers were well represented last month at the 12th Annual State Conference of Crime Stoppers. The conference was held May 15-17 in Corpus Christi.

Representing the local Crime Stopper organization were Frances Kube, president; Murlene Smith, secretarytreasurer; Darrell Crook, board member and Parmer Co. Deputy Sheriff Michael St. Clair. They were among the over 500 members of Texas Crime Stopper organizations attending the state conference.


The group attended different sessions aimed at helping Crime Stopper boards improve their programs. These sessions included promoting your Crime Stopper program, telephone interview techniques, legal issues, fundraising, child exploitation on the internet and developing a school campus Crime Stoppers program. Deputy St. Clair also attended a session that dealt with the problem of and handling of prison gangs.

"The state conference is extremely helpful to us as a local organization, in that there is a great exchange of ideas with other Crime Stopper groups across the state. We all learn a lot and come back more motivated to work harder in our community to make our program even more successful," Frances Kube stated.

One of the main issues that the local Crime Stopper's would like to stress to our community is the fact that if you have any information about a crime you retain total anonymity when calling into Crime Stopper's.

"The caller is not known to even the deputy taking the call," said Frances. "The caller is immediately given a code number and all conversation is completely anonymous. If the criminal or criminals are caught and the case goes to trial, the anonymous caller never has to testify in court. Any and all cash rewards are also collected anonymously through the use of the code numbers assigned."

Frances also wanted to stress that all calls are handled directly and that no Caller ID technology or traces are used
