# Lazbuddie School Board to face cutback problem

Board is about to face a difficult time.

It will have a tackle a subject that all governmental boards try to avoid -- making cutbacks.

The tough decisions are being forced by the lower school enrollment this year.

A lower student population translates into fewer state dollars.

If nothing changes, school Supt. Hardy Carlyle told the school board on Dec. 9, about \$70,000 needs to be cut from the school budget.

But, hopefully, this total will decrease if one or two things occur:

-- The state legislature, which meets in 1999, adjusts school finances to include more dollars per student.

-- Lazbuddie's enrollment

Last September's first day total was 199, down from 229 for the similar statistic the year before.

What helps put Lazbuddie in a bind is that the school's tax rate is the highest allowed by the state. So the tax rate won't climb, unless the state legislature amends the top rate a school can charge.

And the school cannot look toward a higher appraised valuation for more

The appraised valuation of land within the school district fell from \$47,929,198 in 1997 to \$47,357,597 in 1998.

This decrease was strictly due to depletion of irrigation water resources.

And since the school is at the maximum tax rate allowable, this decrease in appraised valuation means the school will get less money,

What Supt. Carlyle has made his goal is to make the necessary budget changes without sacrificing school programs.

He is justifiably proud of the large academic areas offered at the small school, and the successes at the state level that have been achieved.

If the state doesn't allow more funds per pupil, and if enrollment does not climb, then the board will look to make adjustments in its school personnel.

No changes are expected to be made this year. The board has begun to study the 1999-2000 fiscal year budget to ensure the budget will be sound.

What makes it especially hard on the school board is the fact that this will be second time in three years that they have had to make cut-

In July 1997, the board attacked a shortfall of \$90,000 caused by lesser school enrollment.

Here's what they did at that

Reduced the fulltime

her request. -- Eliminated a secretarial position.

-- Didn't replace the special education teacher's position after a retirement. Current staff was used.

-- Team teaching approaches was used in some elementary grades.

In other business at its December meeting, the board:

-- Was shown a demonstration by teacher Debbie Weir and the Lazbuddie robotics team, which took 3rd place

-- Reviewed delinquent taxes, many of which involve vehicles.

-- Agreed to attend a "team

building" training session for board members and school superintendents in Friona in January.

-- Renewed its contract with auditors Sudduth & Fields, of Muleshoe, for 2000 and 2001.

-- Reviewed evaluation forms for the board and superintendent. The forms will be used to draw up goals for

## Boll weevil referendum draws pro and con

A public hearing was held in Muleshoe on Dec. 14 by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture for comments from cotton producers on the proposed Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone referendum.

The hearing was attended by approximately 30 producers that voiced comments both, in favor and against, the pro-

Curtis Preston, Bailey County Extension Agent, feels that the opinions expressed and questions asked were all very important to the decision process.

"We all know that there is an awful lot of information that needs to be dispersed to cotton producers and that this program has had a lot of problems in the past," said Preston. "This hearing was just one of many public meetings that we'll need to have in the coming weeks. We need to have more gin meetings, public meetings and such in order to educate the producers about the imminent problems with the boll weevil."

The problems caused by the boll weevil range ultimately end in total crop devastation and loss. Eradication programs in the past sometimes were ineffectively run and, thus, the numbers of boll weevils increased over the past

"The producers that spoke against the program were voicing concern over the actual administration of the eradication program," said Preston. "They all know that there is a huge problem, but the red tape of running the program is what concerns them the most."

As of the current information, the Northwest Zone will need a budget of \$31 million for the four to six year eradication period. This budget will be made up of monies assessed from the producers and possible state and federal grant money. The assessment rate is now set at \$12 per irrigated acre and \$5 per dryland acre. This rate will never be raised past these amounts and is currently the cheapest assessment rate among already established eradication zones. Most zones are operating on a budget of \$70 to \$90 million.

The vote to accept or deny the eradication program will be voted on as of March 15, 1999. Ballots will be mailed out on Feb. 19, 1999 and must be postmarked by March 15.

Voting will also take place for accepting the proposed fivecounty zone, and to accepting or denying the proposed assessment rate.


The eradication of the boll weevil is estimated to take between four to six years with a manpower team of 185 people for the proposed Northwest zone.

"Most producers against the program don't truly realize the size and scope of the process of eliminating the boll weevil," stated Preston. "It's going to take 185 people, vehicles to cover the crop land in the five-county zone, computers, office space, traps, chemicals, airplanes and the list goes on!"

The boll weevil eradication process is somewhat interesting in the fact that it involves actually trapping the pests.

"It's an intensive trapping system that lures the boll weevil into a pherenome-baited trap. A person must then set the traps and keep track of the number of weevils trapped. When enough have been trapped per acre, the person then calls in the aerial applicators," Preston explained. "The aerial spraying is done by GPS-Global Positioning System coordinates."


The trapping system is set up on a plan of one trap per five acres of cotton. "That means a lot of traps set up across the five counties," said Preston. The five are Bailey, Parmer, Castro, Deaf Smith and Lamb counties and encompasses 500,000 acres of cotton.





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## Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike.

As the parent of children with diverse talents, I must say I thoroughly appreciated your editorial in last week's Tribune regarding academic achievement and school athletic programs. So much so, in fact, that I wanted to share with you a true little "story" I was able to get a copy of during a recent adolescent psychology class.

It's called "The Palcuzzi Ploy" and here is how it goes:

Mr. Palcuzzi, principal of an elementary school, once got tired of hearing objections to special provisions for gifted children so he decided to spice an otherwise mild PTA meeting with his proposal for the gifted. The elements of the Palcuzzi program were as follows:

1. Children should be grouped by ability.

2. Part of the school day should be given over to special instruction.

3. Talented children should be allowed time to share their talents with children of other schools in the area or even of other schools throughout the state (the shool, that is, the taxpayers, will pay the transportation costs).

4. A child should be advanced according to his talents, rather than according to his age.

5. These children should have special teachers, specially trained and highly salaried.

As might be expected, the "Palcuzzi program" was subjected to a barrage of criticism:

"What about the youngster who isn't able to fit into the special group; won't his ego be damaged?"

"How about the special cost; how could we justify transportation costs that would have to be paid by moving a special group of students from one school to another?"

"Mightn't we be endangering the child by having him interact with children who are much more mature than he is?"


"Wouldn't the other teachers complain if we gave more

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
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
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## Don't be a couch potato -- go to the games!

teach children to fight their own battles. I didn't go to school in Texas. I went to school a long, long time ago. Maybe, it's time to take a look at the past and learn from it.

I went to high school in IIlinois during the late 1950s and early 1960s. The emphasis in those days was on academics, not athletics. Athletics was primarily a tool to keep your body in shape. We were told to learn to enjoy sports for health and recreation. Girls' athletics were not about winning, losing, keeping score or learning to fight battles. We had gentlemen to fight our battles for us.

The school I attended had one gymnasium for 2,500 students. All students took gym all four years. That means we didn't spend much time in the one gym. Boys played football, baseball, hockey, soccer and track. That kept them outside a whole lot of the year. Boys were taught competition. Boys were supposed to worry about winning and losing. They kept score.

The girls' athletic program was different. We did have about six weeks of competitive sport each year: basketball, volleyball or softball. years were more aerobic than Some years we had track. We were taught the rules and the method of scoring. Few of us were expected to make a team and compete for the school.

The rest of the year was different. Each six weeks period we would change from one type of activity to another. We would spend one six weeks period of the year in a classroom learning health, safety, first aid or driver's education (we spent some time driving around town during driver's ed). The emphasis of the classroom work was to learn what the reational sport. human body needed and find an enjoyable way to give the body what it needed to sur-

Another six weeks each year was devoted to dance.

The idea was to learn to be graceful and flexible. Girls were supposed to be charming hostesses in those days. Dance was considered a social grace as well as a recreational sport. One year we learned modern dance; another it was square dancing; another it was social dancing. The class was taught in a classroom empty large, equipped with mirrors.

Our school included a six weeks period of gymnasium each year, taught in the balcony of the gym. I'm not sure if it was taught to build muscles and improve flexibility or to teach us to be unafraid. Imagine bouncing six feet above a trampoline that sat 20 feet above a gym floor. There was only a small metal balustrade separating the balcony from lights for the gym. If you can envision that, you might have passed my gym class, too. We did more than bounce on the trampoline. The class included tumbling, parallel bars, vaulting and rings.

Each year, we had six weeks of calisthenics. Most years, it was the old fashion -bend over and touch your toes variety of exercise. Some others. The teachers repeated again and again that they wanted us to learn the things that would help our bodies stay strong and healthy.

The goal of life-long recreational sports is to provide healthful exercise for the human body. Each year we had six weeks of recreational activities. One year it was archery; another, it was fencing.

In our senior year, the gym class and lunch period were back to back, so we were able to leave school to bowl at the town's bowling alley as a rec-

We learned about badminton, deck tennis and shuffle board during our recreational sports period.

We learned that sports were supposed to be fun.
