
end of the play -- and at the Lion 1. Following a called a personal foul on Garrison TD and Meza extra point, the score was 14-10 Lions.

Ministers and priests on Sunday do a lot better job of that than I could ever do.




Ryan Alvarez kicked things off for Bovina, racing down the right sideline for 65 yards and a TD.
