Will watches the volcano erupt

(Editor's note: Farwell's very own Naval Commander Will Anderson, son of Bob and Carrie Anderson, is attached to the U.S. Embassy in Quito, Ecuador. As has been his custom over the years, he submits articles and photos from his postings around the world.)

The twin ranges of the Andes Mountains, which run north and south the length of the country, make up the veritable spine of Ecuador, and they are filled with volcanoes. Every morning, we have a spectacular view of Cotopaxi, the tallest active volcano in the world, about 40 miles away, but she is not much of a threat these days, and covered with snow, she is really kind of pretty.

When we arrived in Quito in May, the Embassy provided us with a volcano survival handbook. Some of the information in there is the same that I got for tornadoes in Farwell when I was a kid, in regard to laying up supplies of canned food and bottled water (although the info on how to identify and avoid lava flow paths is kind of unique here). On the front page of the morning newspaper every day, a section advises that we are in "Alerta Amarilla" (yellow alert) for Pichincha.

The western wall of the valley in which Quito is located is made up of the twin volcanoes of Pichincha, with the biggest of the two being called Guagua-pichincha (which, oddly enough, in the Quechua language, means "baby pichincha"). It is this one that has been most active since we've been here, with tremors and the occasional fall of ash. Our house is on the lower slopes of her sister volcano, on the far side, fortunately, not in line for blast damage or lava flows, so volcanic ashfall is our only real concern. (With that assurance, I went ahead and planted some roses).

About 80 miles to the south is Tungurahua, which is really showing a nasty attitude recently. The laser-optic devices they have trained on her for every direction indicate that she is growing at a rate to cause concern for the city at her feet, Baños, and if she goes, she has a projected radius of ashfall of 300 miles. The Embassy information on volcanic ashfall states that it may be "harsh, acid, gritty, glassy, smelly, and thoroughly unpleasant" but I shared locker rooms for years with guys like Eddie Meeks and Brett Hargrove, so how much worse could it be than that?

The Embassy evacuates families back to the USA if the volcano alert elevates to the final stage (orange), and that level is declared as soon as anything indicates an eruption might be imminent in any volcano in this region. If one of these things lights off in my time here, I'll be part of the Embassy team that remains here in country, and I'll send photos and a story if it looks interesting enough.





Water well screening offered

The Parmer County extension office is sponsoring a water well screening day for area residents on Dec. 14 at the office in the courthouse.

This well screening day is designed to inform private water well owners and users on the condidtion of their well water of possible contamination from two common contaminants. These contaminants are fecal coliform and nitrate.

The presence of fecal coliforms in water indicates that feces (bodily waste from humans or animals) may have contaminated the water. Water contaminated with feces have microorganisms present that can cause a number of "waterborne" diseases such as choler, typoid, and dysentery.

Nitrates in ground water at levels of 10 miligrams per liter (parts per million) is considered unsafe for human consumption. Nitrate levels above 10 mg/L can disrupt the blood's ability to carry oxygen throughout the body.

Nitrate is converted to nitrite which combines with hemoglobin, the chemical that carries oxygen in the blood, to form methemoglobin. Oxygen cannot bind with methemoglobin, therefore oxygen is not carried throughout the body. As a result, oxygen starvation occurs.

This condition is called methemoglobinemia. If left untreated, death may result. Infants less than 6 months of age and young livestock are most susceptible.

The cost of screening is \$3 per sample and you should call the extension office at 481-3619 to receive an approved water sampling bag and instructions for taking your well water

It is very important that only sampling bags from the extension office be used and all instructions for proper sampling followed to insure accurate results.





"Much of our distribution system is mechanical and is less sensitive to Y2K problems because there are few digital controls and relatively few embedded chips in our equipment,"

F) Persons desiring to register to vote at the regular municipal election, must register with the County Clerk of Curry County not later than Tuesday, February 8, 2000, at 5:00 p.m., the date on which the County Clerk will close registration books.

G) All Declarations of Candidacy shall be filed with the Municipal Clerk on Tuesday, January 11, 2000 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

H) The casting of votes by qualified municipal electors shall be recorded on voting machines.

I) The casting of votes by qualified municipal electors who are voting early shall be recorded on voting machines.

Deaf Smith crews faced the storm

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative and the Texas Panhandle received the full flurry from last weekend's storm. Wires, normally the size of a little finger, expanded with wet snow until they were almost 2 inches in diameter.


The combination of a heavy ice/snow load and gusts of wind over 40 mph caused power lines to buck, bounce and sway. As electric wires bounded together, they instantly burned down, resulting in widespread outages. Ten of 21 Deaf Smith substations were out of service at one time.

Deaf Smith crews, with help from others, worked long hours to restore power. One major problem was getting crews down roads obstructed with snow drifts of 5 to 6 feet tall. On one occasion, a large bucket truck rolled over into a ditch as the crew was trying to restore power to a house. Luckily, no one was hurt in the roll-over although the truck was damaged.

Employees spent long hours answering phones as consumer called in. In many cases, people were not able to contact the office because all four incoming phone lines were busy as employees took outage reports, then dispatched them to the line crews.

The storm severely impacted 4,000 miles of electric line and many roads in the affected area were closed, halting travel.

Deaf Smith wanted to thank those consumers who struggled through snow to their tractors and pulled DSEC trucks through snow drifts to the downed poles and wires. And DSEC also thanked consumers for their patience while the crews worked hard to restore power during and after the storm.


