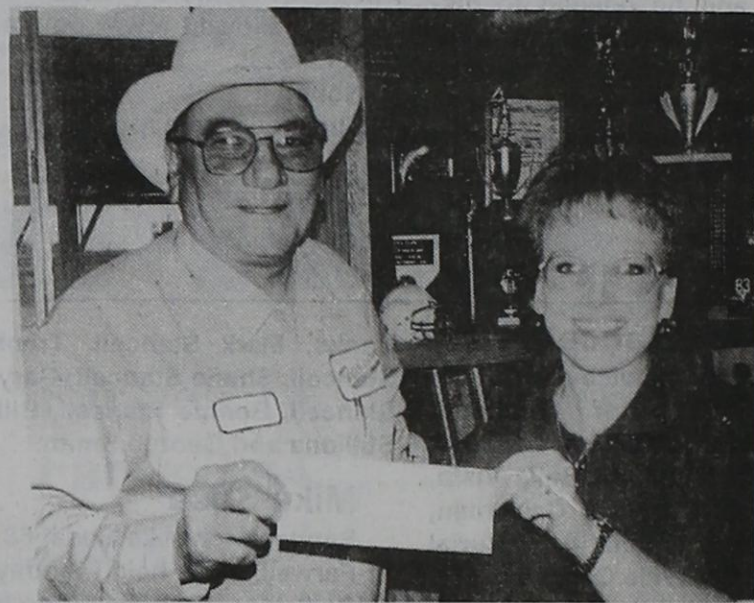
If Kress had won, Mrs. Gregory would have moved up into a tie with Miss Brown for first place.

Plans go forward for new cotton gin

The response was very positive following the meeting about the proposed, farmer-owned cotton gin last month.

Kendall Devault, of Farwell, is part of a team of local farmers that have been diligently working to establish a local, state-of-the-art cotton gin. He reported that the planned building and operating of the gin is nearing reality.

"Following the meeting last month, we got a really good feel for the actual number of acres that could be committed for the gin," Devault stated. "Due to the commitments, we've now settled on the equipment and narrowed the location of the gin down to two possible sites."

The meeting last month was not the only chance for area cotton farmers to become involved in the cooperative gin. There will another meeting date and time announced in the next few weeks for farmers to attend and learn more about the gin plans and membership.

Membership in this proposed local co-op gin is not based on initial investment or out-of-pocket fees for membership. This gin will be a total co-op gin where membership is gained upon ginning the first bale of cotton.

"The moment that first bale of a farmer's cotton goes through the gin, they're a member of the co-op," Dick Cooper, with Plains Cotton Co-op Association explained. "No extra out of pocket money is required."

"This gin will gin cotton as it is called in," said Devault. "Whether one is an initial investor or not, makes no difference to the order of ginning."

He said this gin will be like no other gin in the region. The setup and the equipment within it will make it a state-of-the-art operation where there will be very few problems with trash or dust blowing off of the gin grounds.

"This gin will truly be an asset to the community in the way that it looks, operates and provides a profitable place of business for the member farmers," he said. "It's going to gin cotton upfront and put more money in farmers' pockets up front. Then dividends will be paid on top of that."

One thing that the new gin will feature is three stage drying. This feature will increase farmers' profits because of the decrease in grades and possible total loss of their cotton modules due to wetness. Co-op team research shows no other gins in this area provide three stage full-drying.

Col. Phillip Breedlove, from Cannon Air Force Base, was the main speaker.

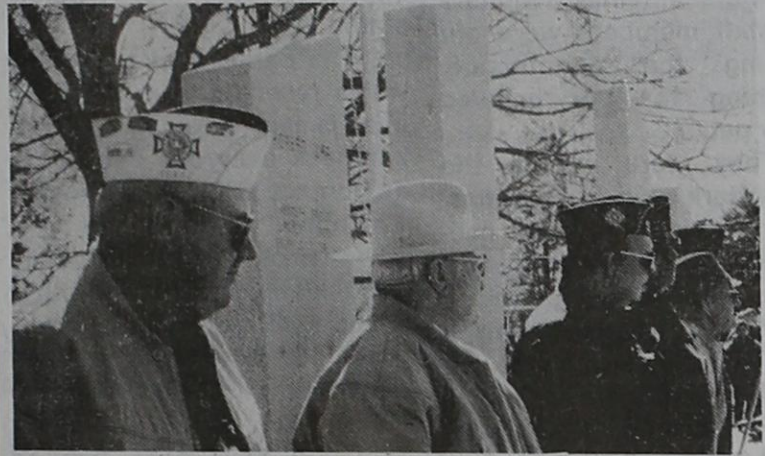
Leslie Cargile placed a wreath at the memorial.

uled approved last year by the commissioners calls for:

First and 2nd years, 100 percent; 3rd year, 75 percent; 4th year, 50 percent, and 5th year, 25 percent.

To be considered for an abatement by Parmer County, a project must have a capital investment of no less than \$300,000 and/or create no less than five new permanent full-time jobs.

Excel received an abatement last summer for a \$407,000 improvement project -- buying land for water well purposes.

In other business, the

commissioners:

-- Was told that all four county ambulance services qualified for some state trauma care funds.

A total of \$4,643 will be divided up this way -- 40 percent of it for Friona; and 20 percent each for Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie.

-- Raised the pay for election judges from \$5 an hour to \$6 an hour.

-- Approved a request by a resident for rental financial help from the ENTERP fund.

-- Considered buying some caliche; it will be looked into.

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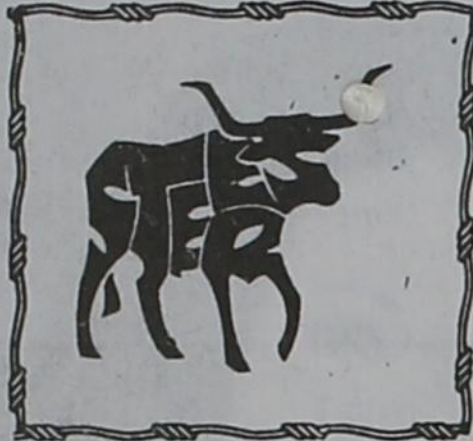

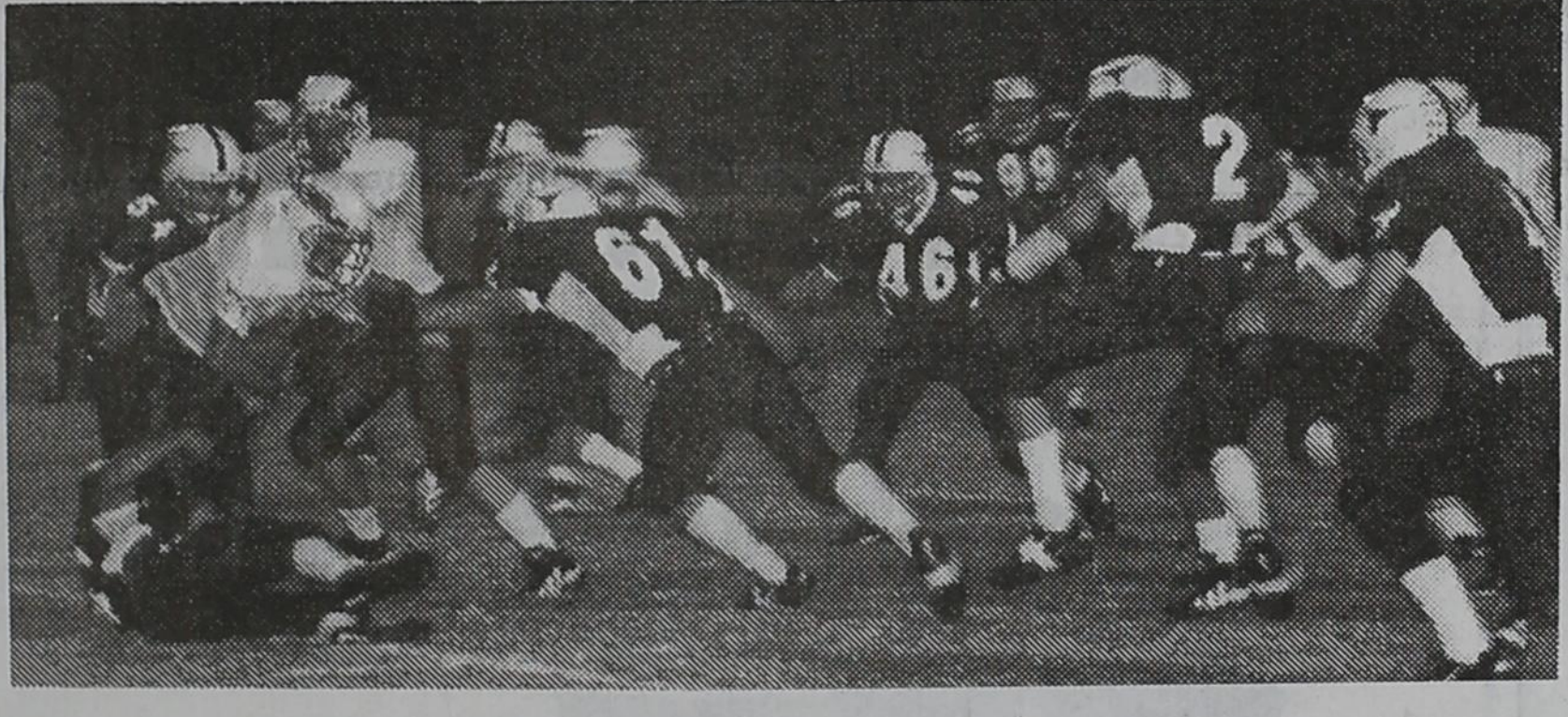

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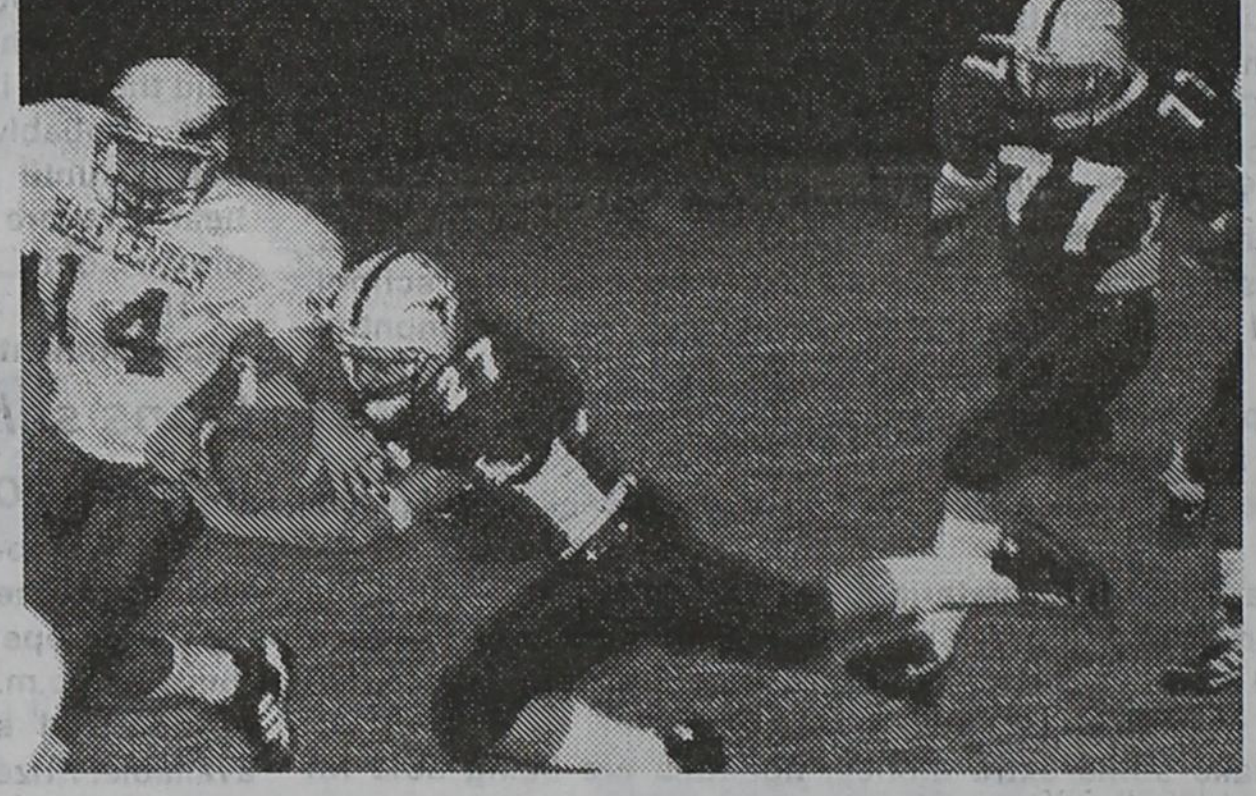

Texico approves on-board computer system for police

The Texico City Council on Tuesday approved spending about \$33,000 for an on-board computer system for its police department.

By using the computers, police will be able to check rapidly on vehicles that are pulled over for outstanding warrants on drivers, "hot cars", stolen license tags, etc.

Texico also plans, once the computers are in place, to hook up with the Curry County Sheriff's dispatcher. There is no cost involved in this, said Texico Marshal Kelley Brophy. And Texico will be able to connect with the county's computers.

Currently, Texico has paying Clovis about \$5,300 a year to use its dispatch service. Brophy said there have been a lot of

problems with this "and we are not getting service." Brophy said non-Clovis agencies, like the Texico police and Texico fire department, get low priority from the Clovis dispatchers.

Texico Mayor Marie Christian added, "Curry County has always treated Texico better than Clovis."

Brophy said Texico will be one of the first cities in the state getting the computer system, which ties into national police data banks. Others with it are Albuquerque, Gallup, Hobbs and Las Cruces, he said.

Brophy said the system will be paid for in about two years, using funds already in police accounts and the savings from not paying Clovis, for the most part.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved a request by Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper to spend about \$45,000 over five years to buy newer SCBA (self contained breathing apparatus) and bunker gear. They must be updated to meet newer federal guidelines.

Cooper also received the go-ahead to seek an \$80,000 state grant to buy a new ambulance to replace the current 1985 model. And Cooper will seek a grant to get better vehicle radios, to increase the distance to about 60 miles.

-- Still is part of the almost-defunct High Plains Waste Management Association, that was trying to start a landfill to the north. The only reason Texico is still a member is that it's trying to recoup some of the money spent on this project. So far, all Texico has gotten back is a broken pickup truck.

-- Discussed the deteriorating alleys and the need to get bottom ash to improve the situation. Officials will check with SPS on getting ash, and with Duncan Disposal about hauling it. It will be discussed more at the next council meeting.

It appears the work will be done in increments, over several years. About \$7,000 is available now, which will cover problems in the worst alley portions.

City employee Darrell Hampton listed the worst alley portions as: Rose and Florence, north of the new fire station; Florence and State, entrance from Avenue E; between State and Stateline Road, off of Eunice; between Turner and State, off of Eunice; Garwood and Anderson, south of Kathrine; and between Turner and Garwood (three blocks).

-- After the meeting councilman Rick Queener said he is working diligently on getting the work done so a contract can be signed by the end of this month to pave Avenue F -- or the city will lose its grant money. Lydick Engineering is doing the engineering and the county will do the work, he said. But the contract still must be signed.

Survey shows large support for Texico Schools' 2-mill levy

The Texico School Board on Monday heard a good report on the parent/teacher survey it took regarding the planned 2 mill levy on next year's election ballot.

Survey results showed 77 in favor, 9 opposed and 2 "don't know."

Folks also were asked to comment on campus improvements (extra funds raised must go to those purposes). The most support came for computer with updated programs (8), a new gym (6), better playground (3) and science lab equipment (3).

Other suggestions included better outdoor lights, larger band hall, new books, more secure locker rooms, new restrooms in gym 2, and larger grass area for playing.

Supt. R.L. Richards reported that networking of the junior high computer lab with the Internet will be finished this week. Also, grants have been received to place 7 computers in Mrs. Bass' classroom, 7 computers in Mrs. Peabody's classroom, and 7 computers in the elementary library (for accelerated reading program).

Richards also had mainly good news to report on statewide test scores from last year. On these tests, Texico's 4th grade finished 7th in the state (among all New Mexico schools), Texico's 6th grade was 19th and Texico's 8th grade was 7th.

Richards said his goal is for Texico to finish in the top 20 and called those results "delicious!"

But ... Texico's ACT scores were only 62nd of 89 state schools, and Richards was not happy about that.

Taking a look at Texico's "cluster" -- schools about the same size: Of 11 schools, Texico's 4th grade scores ranked 1st, 6th grade scores ranked 5th, 8th grade scores ranked 1st, and ACT scores ranked 4th.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard that Texico's FFA parliamentary procedure team was at the nationals in Kansas City this week -- Phil Peabody, Trace Lockmiller, Dustin Whitener, Tim Peabody, Marshall Baker and Kristen Lovelace. Last summer, the board was told that this event might conflict with the Wolverines football team in the playoffs, so it was agreed that football team members would be flown back for the playoff game on Saturday.

Roxanne Mayfield is the sponsor who took the youths to Kansas City. Also there is 4-H'er Eric Denton.

-- Received a request from teacher Dayla Bass to extend the time needed for her to get a master's degree. Board policy is that teachers must get a master's within six years. Mrs. Bass has been active as a cheerleader sponsor after school, and had a baby. The matter was placed on next month's agenda.

-- Approved having the school band concert on Dec. 13, a Sunday, at 2 p.m. mt.

-- Hired Terri Baca to work two days a week with speech therapy.

-- Heard that the cafeteria is still struggling to get into the black. An extra \$40 a day is needed. School officials stressed they will maintain the quality of the food, plus the service, but plans to shut down on some food costs.

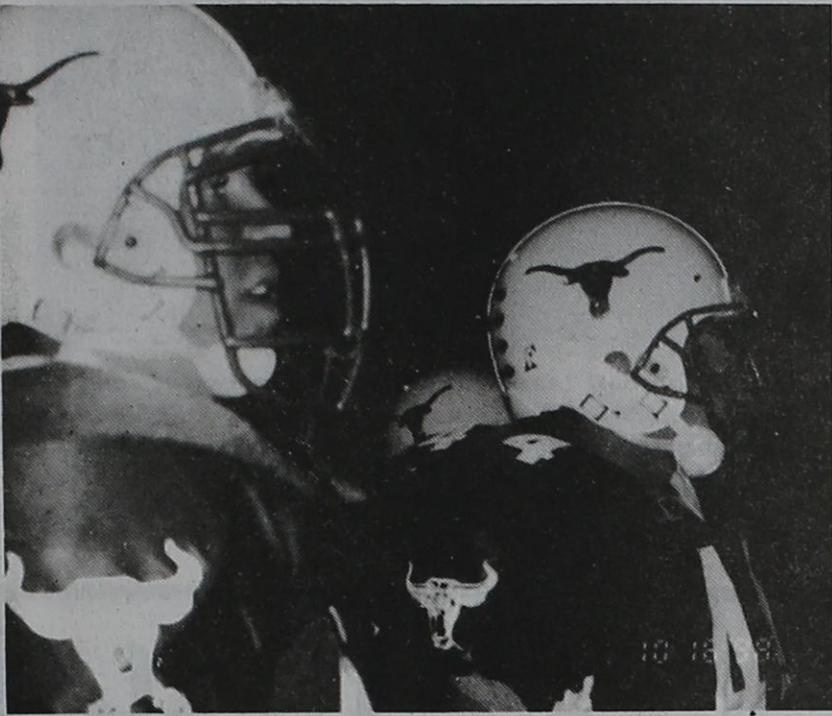


Steers top Bovina, head into state playoffs

wick threw a 5-yard pass to Jourdan Nichols. Ancira ran for 9. Corn caught a 13-yard TD pass from Chadwick at 8:57. The kick was wide and it was 34-8.

from the 12 as Lazbuddie improved to 40-19. Three Way came back, closing the gap to

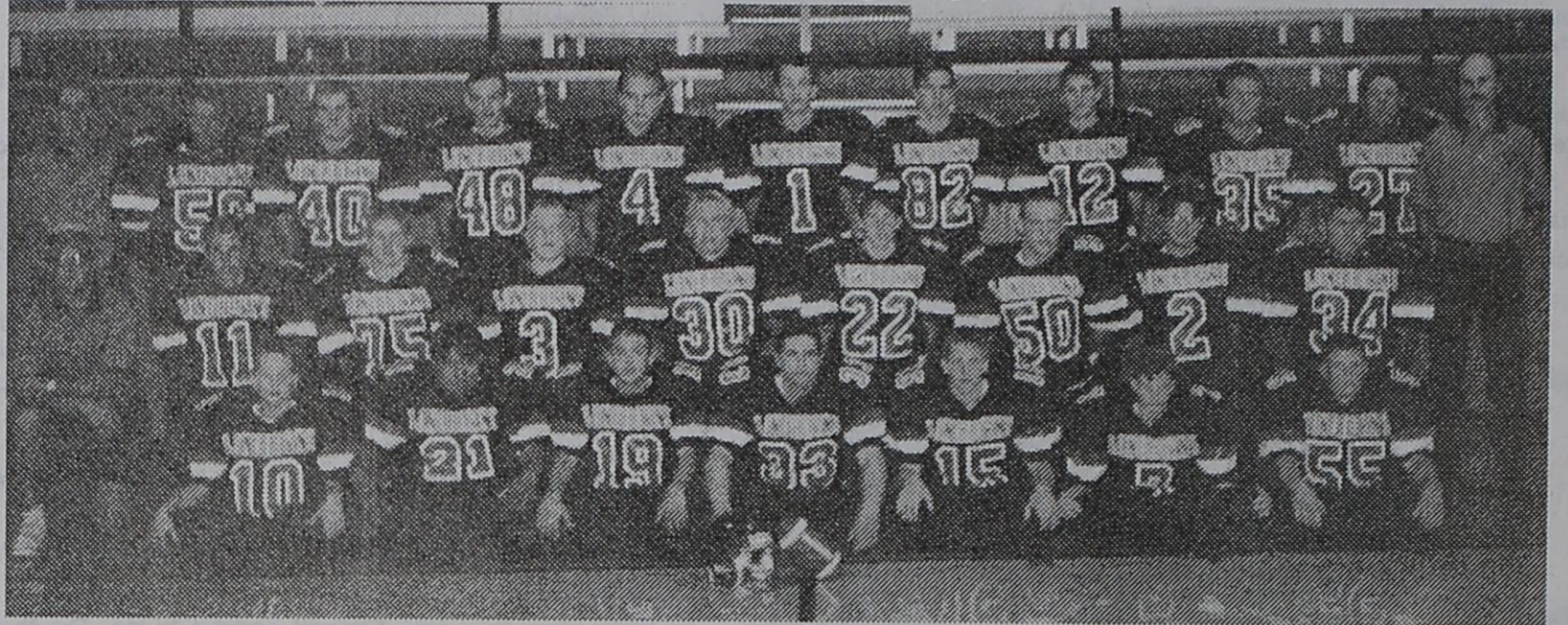
40-35.

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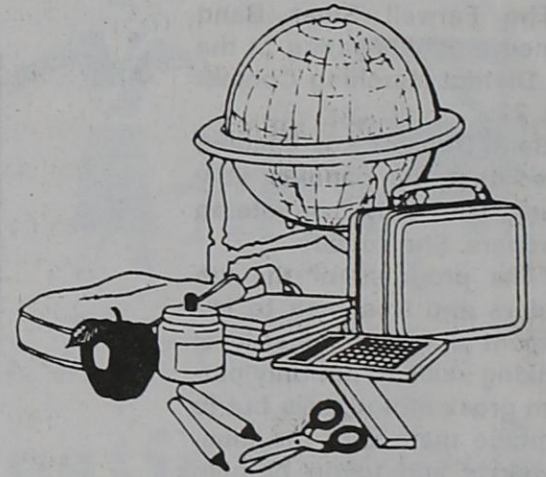

Dear Mr. Pomper,
I am a regular reader of your newspaper and have been for many years. I appreciate all you do for the Texico and Farwell communities. Even more, I greatly appreciate the support you give the children and students of our communities by praising the accomplishments they achieve each week in the form of stories and photographs in the State Line Tribune. I also consider you a friend.

However, I was so distraught by your comments recently about the coaching staffs at our area schools. Yes, our area teams are accomplishing great things and the coaching staffs are to be commended as well. What disturbed me was your statement to the effect of "Those of you who know me know who I am talking about."

Please do not make personal judgments publicly without knowing the whole story. After all, I know you and I do not have a clue as to who you are talking about which leads to conclusions and gossip!

Coaches have one of the hardest jobs for the extremely low amount of compensation they receive. Do you know how many hundreds of after school hours, late nights away from their families and weekend's coaches spend for these students? Just estimating, the average high school football season lasts approximately 15 weeks from the start of two a days to the final game.

On average, a coach will spend at least a minimum of 35 hours per week beyond his/her 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. teaching schedule at practice, games, watching films, scouting, etc., etc. So at 15 weeks at a minimum of 35 hours per week that would be about 525 hours. At one area high school an offensive or defensive coordinator receives around a \$700.00 increment for football. You do the math; doesn't that mean a coach is paid about \$1.33 per hour for football?

Would you in turn be able to look anyone of these coaches in the face and say "You aren't in it for the kids, you just want that increment." PLEASE!!! Finally after all the hours you put to have a winning season, because after all, your job depends somewhat on your record, you lose your job because "little Johnny's" parents don't think he gets enough playing time because after all, he is the next Deion Sanders and his parents have great influence with the administration. Hey, aren't all of our kid's stars? I know mine are. Just like any other profession, you and I like some people more than others and some a lot less than others.

Please keep in mind that there is so much that goes on off the playing field, behind the scenes that you will never know about because you are only told what someone wants you to know. Before you make judgments, follow a coach around for just one week if you can. Listen to the kids and observe the respect that the majority of kids have for their coach.

If you doubt me, recall this, how many former starting Texico football players showed up sporting green and white during the Texico vs Clayton football game? And how many former Texico football players showed up wearing Clayton's

Weather causes county cotton crop to diminish

The rain and damp weather that the area experienced last week caused some major decreases in the grades of cotton being ginned around the region.

Area growers that had modules in the field are seeing about 3 to 4 cents of a price difference per pound of cotton due to staining and loss of grade from the moisture in their modules. Some growers are also seeing their turnout of cotton stripped from the stalk decreased due to the moisture, as well.

The cotton cannot be adequately dried for the ginning process, so the turnout of the area gins is drastically decreased in addition to lowering the farmers profit.

The modules of cotton that had already been stripped are also suffering damage. Many modules have burned completely to the ground due to overheating and spontaneous combustion. Others experience severe staining and rotting.

While it has been hard to see their cotton crops diminished in size and quality, most area farmers are somewhat happy to see the rain and moisture. This moisture will give their spring and summer crops a boost in growth because of the soil moisture content staying in the ground over the winter and early spring.

Our thanks to each one of the many friends whose loving expressions of sympathy helped us so much during our recent sorrow. We are especially grateful.

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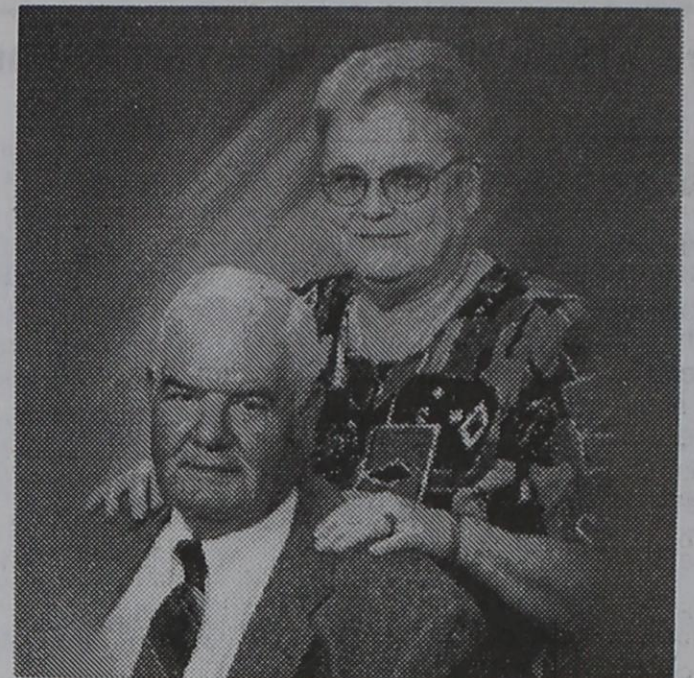

The Texico Wolverines rolled to a very easy win over an outmanned Navajo Prep team at Wolverine Field on Saturday, 48-0, to open state playoff action.

The NP team only suited up 18 players, and had 5 injuries during the game, including one player getting a fractured arm and another suffering a concussion. The game was stopped with 5 minutes left in the first half for halftime to start; then the clock ran the entire second half to shorten the one-sided match.

Schilling scores 16 points in win

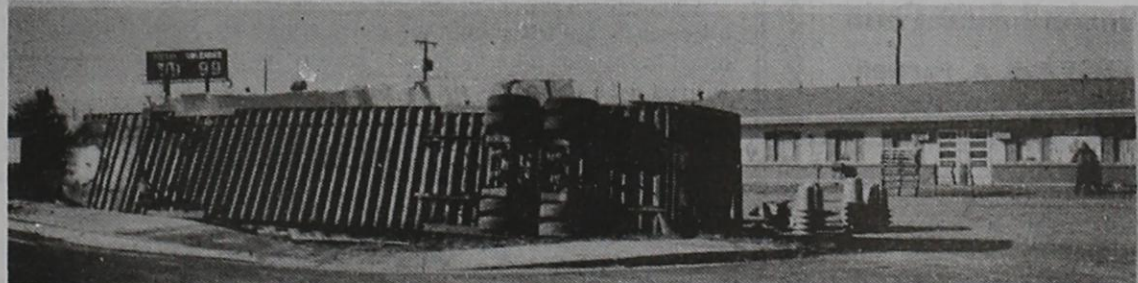
The Farwell Junior High gridders finished their seasons with a tie and a win at Bovina.





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
