

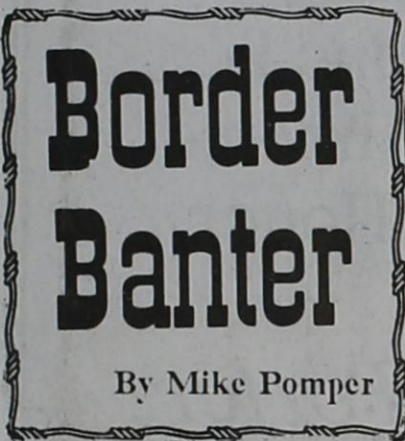

Notes from Lazbuddie

On Feb. 2, folks living in the Texico School District will go to the polls for two purposes -- to elect three persons to the Texico School Board and to vote on a 2-mill levy.

We wholeheartedly endorse the 2-mill levy and want to stress to all residents its importance.

The amount of tax money involved is very, very slight, yet the benefits are very, very large.

Funds raised through the levy do NOT go to salaries. They must be used for capital improvements, equipment, technology, vehicles and/or repairs to buildings and grounds.

The levy allows Texico Schools to receive an extra \$2 for every \$1,000 taxed. And the state matches it with another \$1.63.

Thus, Texico children receive \$3.63 for education and

Farm supply to open soon in Farwell

A new business in Farwell will be opening in mid-February.

Jerry and Colleen Stover, of Farwell, will open Farwell Manufacturing & Farm Supply, inc.

The new building is at 1300 Ave. A in Farwell -- just west of Lunsford Auto Parts on the east edge of Farwell. The telephone number is 481-FARM.

The store will be open on weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Saturdays from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

There will be three fulltime personnel at the farm supply store: Stover, plus a welder and a repairman.

"We also will be on call 24 hours a day for service or parts," said Stover.

The business will feature a full line of farm equipment -- bearings, seals, hydraulic hose, etc.

Stover has been involved in farm parts all his working life.

More information on the opening will be announced later.

School Board candidates respond to questionnaire

Here are their responses:

Question 1: Can you tell voters something about your background and/or qualifications for being a board member?

Deborah Autrey: I was raised in Texico and have lived here most of my life. I graduated from Texico High School in 1977, and have three children, two of whom are still students at Texico School. One graduated in 1998 and attends New Mexico State University. I have served on the Texico School Board for the past 4 years. I ran for the school board four years ago with the intentions of making Texico School a more conclusive learning environment. I feel as though I have listened to my constituents concerns and made the other board members aware of these concerns.

Richard Hadley: I am a lifetime Texico area resident and graduated from Texico High. I attended Clarendon College and received an associate degree in ranch and feedlot business management, then worked at Far-Tex Feed Yard. I then went to work at Citizens Bank of Clovis' Texico branch, where I have been for the past 17 years. My wife, Shawn, and I have two daughters, Brette, 12, and Braeden, 7. I have been a 4-H leader and have served as an officer on the Curry County Fair Board and Curry County Mounted Patrol.

Janet Hagler: I grew up in Clovis and graduated from Clovis High. My husband is Phillip Hagler. We have two children -- our daughter is 10 years old and our son is 3 years old. As for qualifications, I am a parent who wants to be involved in the education of my children as well as others. I would like to see that our school board continues to care for the education and

Recommendation to raise animal license fees draws questioning

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed raising animal license fees.

The dog warden suggested higher fees to pay for newer equipment, such as brass tags.

He said there were about 250 dogs in the city -- with about one-quarter of them licensed.

Councilman Rick Queener said that, instead of raising fees, if more animals would be licensed, than the extra funds needed would be raised. That would be better than penalizing those already paying by making them pay higher fees, he added.

The matter was tabled, and city officials will look into having a flier made on the

Texico school election nears

Residents of the Texico School District go to the polls on Tuesday.

Voting will take place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. mt at the Texico Community Center.

Three persons will be elected to the school board, and a vote will be taken on a 2-mill levy.

The levy will increase school taxes \$2 per \$1,000 taxed. And the state would give Texico Schools an extra \$3.63 per \$1,000 if the levy is approved.

Funds raised from the levy must be used for capital im-

provements, equipment, technology, vehicles and/or repairs to buildings and grounds.

The races for school board candidates are: Position 1 -- Bruce Mayfield, Janet Hagler and Lynn Hughes. Position 2 -- Richard Hadley and Tim Peterson. Position 3 -- Deborah Autrey and Shashawn Hagler. Mayfield and Mrs. Autrey are incumbents. Mayfield has served 8 years on the board and Mrs. Autrey 4.

In other business: -- Marshal Kelley Brophy suggested selling a 4-wheel vehicle confiscated last year during a drug seizure. Funds raised go to Texico. Also, he said about \$6,000 has come back to Texico through other drug arrests.

-- Texico Supt. Supt. R.L. Richards presented a program on the upcoming 2 mill levy election.

If approved, he said the money could be used for proposed purchases such as roof work, new chalkboards, improved playground facilities, a bus, floor tiles and carpet, etc.

Farwell home raided; 2 charged

Two Farwell residents were arrested on Saturday night at home.

Charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, and possession of marijuana under 2 oz. were Robert Greer Thurman, 35, and Melissa Suzanne Thurman, 33.

The search warrant was executed at 100 San Andres St. at 10:15 p.m. and was issued based on information provided by the Farwell Police Department, Texico Marshal's Office and Parmer County Sheriff's Office.

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa said a small amount of narcotics, narcotics paraphernalia and several firearms were confiscated.

Involved in the raid were members of the Farwell, Texico and Friona police departments, and Curry County and Parmer County sheriff's offices.

The charge involving marijuana will be held in county court while the charge involving a controlled substance with intent to distribute goes to the grand jury.

The future is now!

Now some notes from the Parmer County Stock Show:

First, a big thank you to Donna Schueler, of Rhea Community, for the excellent photos on our picture page featuring the show's champions.

Ty Vandiver won a \$200 drawing at the show.

Here's how the numbers at the show have compared to recent years.

This time, there were 146 animals in the sale, compared to 141 last year and 140 in 1997. Farwell youths had a record 55 animals make the sale.

The sale brought about \$65,600, compared to \$65,100

last year and \$59,424 in 1997. These totals don't include any add-ons.

No animal sold for under \$300 this year; last year, the "floor" was \$400.

Robert White, who heads the Farwell Buyers Club, reported that \$25,000 (plus add-ons) was spent on Farwell -- Oklahoma Lane animals. This averaged out to be \$454 per animal, plus any add-ons.

The top price went for the grand champion lamb. Lowe's Supermarket bought it for \$1,400.

Normally, I enjoy the sale, watching our communities' "buyer's clubs" making sure all our county kids get decent prices at the sale. They are great!

And I very much appreciate how the Sherley Anderson grain elevators do their share in their respect, also.

I am proud of them. But there was a downer this year.

Two first place lambs from

a Friona 4-H girl only brought \$300 and \$310, respectively.

These prices were lower than what 7th place animals got. Far lower. In fact, they were the lowest paid for any animal at the sale. An 8th place barrow exhibited by a Lazbuddie youth brought \$525, for example.

It was very disappointing. Friona has an active and enthusiastic Chamber of Commerce.

I strongly recommend that the Chamber take a look at this year's problem (are you reading this, John?) and do what it can to ensure that the Friona kids get decent prices, too.

I felt very badly for that young Friona girl who had worked so hard to have two of her lambs finish 1st in two categories.

I talked with a Friona man this week, who was also at the county stock show and had noticed the problem -- so he put an add-on of \$50 to help out on one of those first place lambs.



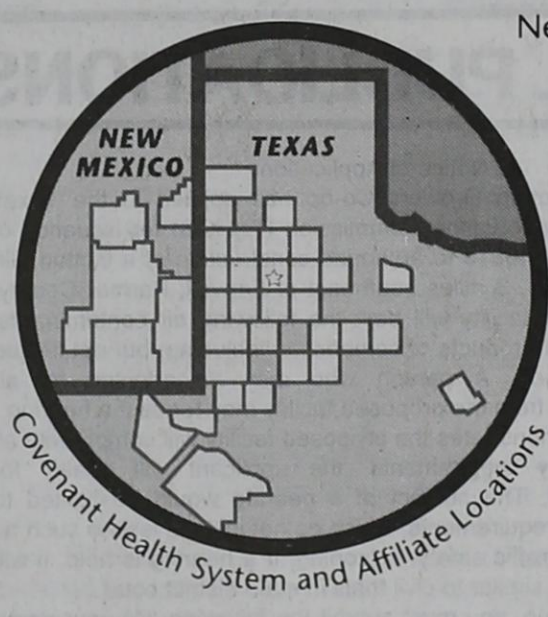

well-being of our children. The future of our children is very important.

Shashawn Hagler: I have lived in the Texico area for almost 12 years and am a member of the First Baptist Church of Texico. My husband and I have three children. The oldest is in grade school now and I want to be active in her education.

Lynn Hughes: I am a lifetime resident of Curry County, attended Texico Schools from 3rd grade through graduation. I also attended Eastern New Mexico University for one year, then served three years in the Army. After completing my service, I graduated from T.S.T.I. in Amarillo. Having operated my own farming and ranch business for 25 years, I feel my maturity would enable me to make sound decisions based on available information for the Texico School District. I have a strong desire to see that Texico School offer the best education for the students.

Bruce Mayfield: I have served on the Texico School Board for the past 8 years. My wife, Roxanne, and I have three children at Texico: Kyle, a senior; Shane, a freshman, and Cherry, an 8th grader.

Timothy Peterson: I've been a resident of the Texico area for 12 years. I have a beautiful wife (Kim Pearce, Texico graduate of '73) and three lovely children, Katie, 14, Mollie, 11, and Ethan, 5. I met my wife while attending Wayland Baptist University where I earned my Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management. I have been a firefighter/EMT for the Clovis Fire Department for 10 years and also serve as Worship Leader at First Baptist Church here in Texico. One of the main reasons I brought my family here to Texico was for my kids to have the privilege to be involved in the Texico School program. As a member of the Board of Education I would like to help uphold the fine history Texico has achieved. I will strive to improve public education for all children for I believe in our children who must be our priority.

Question 2: What view do you hold on the emphases concerning academics and athletics in Texico Schools?

Deborah Autrey: Academics is the top priority at Texico Schools, as it should be. The test scores of Texico Schools show that we hold a great deal of emphasis on academics. Athletics is something available to those students who are interested in that type of extracurricular activity. As in all extracurricular activities, a certain grade point average is required by each student to continue to have the privilege of participating. Although I feel athletics should not be prioritized over academics, athletics can teach the students some important lessons in life. Among some of those lessons are teamwork, competition, and how to lose gracefully and win with respect.

Richard Hadley: Academics has to be the No. 1 priority of our school district. It's important we help our youths obtain the highest quality of academic education that we can. Athletics also can play an important part of the educational process by teaching our students leadership, sportsmanship, discipline, work ethic, etc. -- but it should never take precedence over academics.

Janet Hagler: I am a firm believer that academics come first. Athletics is great and fun for all, but should always come second to the schooling and grades.

Shashawn Hagler: Academics should come first, and then athletics. The children are our future and they need to be prepared and qualified for whatever achievements they aim for.

Lynn Hughes: Academics are number one and foremost. We should be concerned about offering the strongest academic program possible. Sports and all other extracurricular activities have a part in the total school program. I think there are lots of values received from participation in extracurricular activities, but they are extracurricular activities.

Bruce Mayfield: I think both are important parts of our school, but academics are where we need to put our emphases. One of the school board goals is to continue to stress academics over athletics. Where the State Department of Education holds us to be accountable is academics. However, I believe that athletics help keep many kids in school, receiving an education and teaching them many other things that will help them in the future.

Timothy Peterson: I believe there should be a balance between academics and athletics in our school system. I do actively support activities like athletics, band, and our agricultural education programs, for through these, kids learn vital lessons in self-control, self-discipline, and leadership. But our priority in education should be academics. Our students need to be motivated not only to do their best in reading and writing but to strive for academic excellence in all their classes. The foundation of academics that a young child is taught plays such a vital part in how that child functions as an adult. But again I emphasize that education in a child's life needs to be well-rounded and balanced.

Question 3: What is your position on the proposed 2-mill levy?

Deborah Autrey: The 2-mill levy is a great asset to Texico Schools. At this point Texico has the lowest tax rate in the county and will remain so even with a 2-mill levy. The 2-mill can only be used for technology, upkeep, and improvement of the grounds and CANNOT be used for teacher or administrative salaries. I would hope that the voters would vote for the 2-mill levy in order to keep the top notch facilities Texico students, staff, and parents are accustomed to having.

Richard Hadley: I favor the 2-mill levy and hope the voters in the Texico School District will think of it as an investment in the future of our students, and support the levy as they have in the past.

Janet Hagler: The 2-mill levy is important to our school funding. I believe that it is needed to help improve our schools in every way possible.

Shashawn Hagler: This question has to be the hardest to answer. I understand the schools can always use funding for buildings and programs. But as a taxpayer, I feel that I am taxed too much as it is.

Lynn Hughes: Like all property owners I hate to see our taxes raised, but the 2-mill money generated by the District plus the matching money from the state enables the District to be able to afford equipment, repairs, and maintain school property without dipping into the operational budget.

Bruce Mayfield: I believe the 2-mill levy is good for our school because it allows needed funds for the maintenance of our school facilities, vehicles, etc. I also feel that it is not a major tax burden for our property owners. With a home worth

\$60,000, the rate which is taxed is \$20,000 -- this is \$40 a year. Also, the state matches every \$2 per \$1,000 with about \$1.60. So it is very good for the school.

Timothy Peterson: I support the proposed 2-mill levy. Some people believe that this tax increase would be very substantial, that's not the case. For example: A person who owns a home in the \$60,000 range, their yearly tax would only increase about \$40.00. In order for our school district to be able to receive extra funds from the state, the state needs to see that our school district residents are willing to help to. Monies that the school receives are vitally needed. These funds are used for items such as building maintenance, new roofs, new computers and computer software, playground equipment and other items needed like these.

Question 4: Is there an area where you see a need for Texico Schools to show improvement?

Deborah Autrey: There seems to always be room for improvement in every situation, but Texico Schools is one of the top schools in the state. It is obvious from our enrollment that several other people from other districts think the same thing. We have calls on a regular basis from people from the surrounding districts wanting to attend our school.

Richard Hadley: I feel Texico School District is one of the finest in the state. But I believe we should always strive to achieve excellence in all the different areas of our schools.

Janet Hagler: I don't see anything that really draws my attention. The board has done a great job for our schools. I would like to see an expanded library and maybe a program to get the children more involved in the accelerated reading program. Some children who have reading problems are not as excited about the program, mostly for self-esteem reasons. I would like to see these children excited as the rest.

Shashawn Hagler: All day kindergarten would be more useful to the children instead of cramming what they need to learn into 2 1/2 hours a day.

Lynn Hughes: Regardless of how good a school system is, there is always room for improvement.

Bruce Mayfield: As our test scores have shown, Texico Schools is doing very well in most areas. Of course, they is always room for improvement I think parental involvement has improved, therefore, our kids are doing better. One area that we have tried to address is youths "falling through the cracks." The program that we have going with the Clovis Community College has been good in that the kids who are not planning to pursue a college education can learn many valuable skills in a trade of some kind.

Timothy Peterson: As I have stated, I am very proud of the job Texico Schools have been doing. If I had to choose some areas of improvement it would be in the area of technology and computer skills. Our world is rapidly moving ahead in the area of computer technology. I would like to see Texico "keep up with the times." Keep ahead of this new technology age by offering new classes, training and updating computers and software. Also a good preventive maintenance program needs to be in effect for our physical properties. I am a firm believer that if something needs to be fixed it needs to be fixed right even if it costs a little more money. In the area of safety for our kids, gangs, drugs and violence needs to be continually monitored. I hear there is a possibility that Texico may be getting a public safety liaison on campus that would be federally funded. If that's the case "way to go guys."

Question 5: Are there any other school-related comments you would like to make?

Deborah Autrey: I have served on the school board for the last 4 years and have seen some very positive things done by our staff and administration. Texico is very fortunate to have such a fine staff and such fine students that attend their schools. It has been a privilege to be involved in the decision making our school for the past 4 years and I would be honored to continue to be able to serve as a board member of Texico Schools.

Richard Hadley: I would like to encourage our school district's voters to make every effort to get out and vote on Tuesday, Feb. 2.

Janet Hagler: I believe that Texico is a great school and am glad my child is attending this school. For the future of our children, I would like to see that our school board continues to care. That the little things, as well as the big things, are considered equally to continue to give our children the best education possible.

Shashawn Hagler: Texico school system is a great school and with more involvement from parents it can only get better.
