## Why did

 assessments go higher?Have you wondered why tax assessments are higher in Parmer County this year? Here's the explanation from Curby Brantley, of the Parmer County Appraisal Office. The county office uses "net to land" to determine assessments. "Net to land" refers to "what the land is making.

To sum up, you take the yield of the crop and get average prices from Texas A\&M, then deduct typical expenses. how it works: exact, here is how it works:
You take

You take the crop yield and multiply it by the price (gotten from Texas A\&M statistics). This equals the "gross."
You then multiply the rent) to get the "gross dollars to land."

Then you deduct the "typical expenses" multipled by 25 percent (typical rent) to get "net to land."
That is how you get the as sessment for a given year. But when the Appraisal District calculates assessments they use a 5 -year average.
Each year, they drop the oldest year and add the newest one.
For example, for this year, they dropped 1992 and used 1993 through 1997
Next year, they will drop 1993, and add 1998

And this brings us to why this year's assessments are higher than last year
It's because in 1992 the Parmer County cotton yield ton yield was high.
So the higher 1997 figure was used in the mix this year replacing the lower 1992 statistics.

## Here's a look at county precipitation

 Precipitation is the largest reoccurring/renewable wate supply for the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Area.It provides about 60 percent of urban landscape wate demands and irrigation water demands. It provides all the water for surface water resevoirs and ant water for range vides weryon wild life production. Precipitation also pro-

Members of the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Group are now evaluating the total water resources for the 11-county region as required by Senate Bill and Texas Water Development Board rules.

Precipitation records for the years 1945 to 1997 were ob ained by the High Plains Water District staff from the Na tional Weather Service reporting stations within the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning region.

The average annual volume of water received from pre cipitation from 1945 through 1997 in the 12,988,090 acre area of the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning area was $19,940,077$ acre-feet. Of this amount, less than one percen streams, draws recomes runoff that escer remaining runoff is trapped in playa basins or surface water reservoirs used for public water supply and/or recreation. The approximately 14,000 playa basisn in the region are the focal point for natural recharge to the aquifer.

These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

Lillie Powell of Farwell has been making quilts since she was 13 years old. She says that she started making them for necessity, but now she makes them just for fun for her kids and her grand-kids.
Mrs. Powell was born and raised in Coalhill, Ark., but she says that she is no kin to Bill Clinton. She is the oldest of her five sisters and has two older brothers, and she was the only one that could sew in her family.
Her dad worked in a saw mill and made roads during the Depression. In Mrs. Powell's own words. "We were as poor as Job's turkey." Everything they needed they made or raised, from their goose feather beds to their clothes. They raised all types of birds, except ducks.
Mrs. Powell married in 1934 and the couple had six kids three boys and three girls. They moved to Texico 50 years ago to work for a pump company and have been living her When th
