**Farwell JV Steers wallop Olton**

The Farwell JV Steers ran their record to 5-0 for the season with a 38-6 victory over Olton on Oct. 5.

Farwell's first score came on a safety, with Cale Stevenson tackling the Olton punter in the end zone.

On the Steers' next possession, Carlos Garcia scored on a 38-yard run. The kick was wide and it was 8-0.

In the second quarter, Jason Johnson completed a 10-yard TD pass to Stevenson. Juan Sanchez added the point after kick and it was 15-0 at the half.

In the 3rd quarter, Stevenson scored from 30 yards out. The Sanchez kick made it 22-0.

On defense, Grant Gregory made a great tackle in the end zone when Olton tried a reverse -- for Farwell's second safety of the game.

On Farwell's next possession, Lonnie McFarland found Gregory in the end zone for a 5-yard TD throw. The Sanchez kick made it 31-0.

In the final quarter, Stevenson tallied again, this time from 36 yards out. The Sanchez kick was good again.

Olton's only score came with less than two minutes to play when they picked up a Farwell fumble and returned it for a TD, to make the final score 36-6.

This was the first score made against Farwell this season. They have outscored their opponents 99-6 during this streak.

Offensive stats for the game showed Garcia rushing 20 times for 217 yards. Stevenson ran for 118 yards on 13 carries.

**Longhorns slip past Ropes, 54-52**

The Lazbuddie Longhorns finished pre-district action with a 54-52 tightrope win over Ropes last Friday at home.

Lazbuddie, 4-1, opens district action at 7:30 tonight (Friday) at home against Amherst.

It looked like the Longhorns would run away with a big victory over Ropes, after taking a 38-16 lead into the final quarter.

But the Eagles put 36 points on the board in the 4th

quarter to make it really close. In fact, both teams scored 7 touchdowns. But once again, it was the outstanding extra point kicks by Fabian Guzman that made the difference between a loss and a win.

So far this season, Guzman has been successful on 29 of 35 extra point kick attempts, said Coach Mark Scisson.

The first quarter saw Ropes take an 8-0 lead on a short run.

In the second quarter, Lazbuddie outscored the Eagles, 24-8. The Longhorns' scores came on runs of 6 and 7 yards by Cole St. Clair, and a 37-yard run by Landon Parham. All three Guzman kicks were good.

In the third quarter, Lazbuddie had two more TDs, holding Ropes scoreless. The Longhorns' scores came on a 40-yard run by St. Clair and a

20-yard pass to Garcia from Lucas DeLeon. One of Guzman's two kick attempts was good.

Early in the final quarter, Lazbuddie added another TD on a 70-yard kickoff return by Parham, with the Guzman kick good.

Then Ropes ran off three straight Tds, closing to 2 points.

Lazbuddie answered with a 6-yard TD run by St. Clair, followed by a Guzman kick. Ropes scored once more, but the 2-point margin for Lazbuddie held up.

Team stats were: first downs, Lazbuddie 11, Ropes 11; rushing yards, Lazbuddie, 42 for 411, Ropes, 30 for 230; passing yards, Lazbuddie, 3 of 7 for 55, Ropes, 13 of 36 for 197; punting average, Lazbuddie, 2 for 33, Ropes, 3 for 27; and penalties, Lazbuddie, 2 for 10 yards, Ropes, 3 for 35.

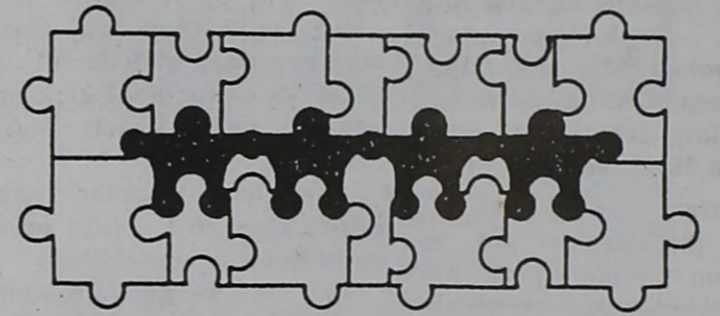

# Dairy opposition discussed

The controversy over the proposed Martin Dairy being built just outside Texico's city limits came up at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Pete Jesko said he and others had talked with Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley and learned of a law that restricts activity outside cities.

But Mayor Marie Christian said this has been investigated by the city in the past (it's called "extra territorial zoning"), and it was found that cities the size of Texico don't qualify for the law's statutes.

Mrs. Christian said the city will try to get the state's air quality control personnel to address the problem, but she was not optimistic about positive feedback from the state agency.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he has been calling state personnel involved in drinking water and ground water permits.

Texico City Councilman Oran Jay Autrey has asked Texico residents to contact officials who might be able to prevent the proposed Martin Dairy from being built near the city.

The idea of filing a lawsuit against the dairy was brought up. City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter explained that there was a recent case in Roosevelt County where landowners who felt they were adversely affected by a proposed dairy did get an injunction against it. Rutter said the city cannot seek an in-

junction, but individuals who feel they would be adversely affected could.

A hearing on the proposed dairy was conducted last week by the state Environment Department. The state's ground water pollution prevention section is recommending that the dairy's discharge plan be approved once certain conditions are met.

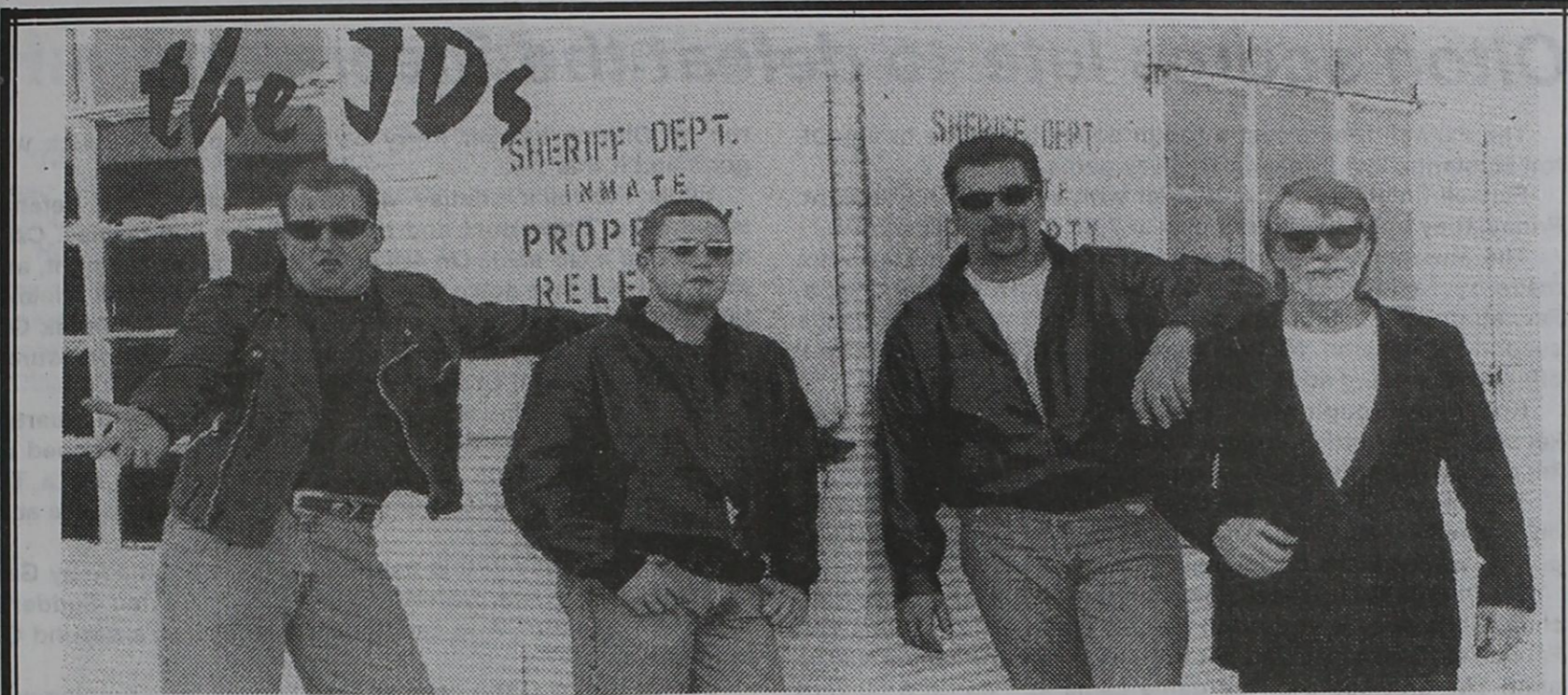

**New Mexico education evaluated**

"Think New Mexico," a solution-oriented think tank located in Santa Fe has published a booklet regarding the state's educational system.

The not-for-profit group has a board of directors that includes Garrey Carruthers, former state governor; Paul Bardacke, former state attorney general, and Stewart Udall, former U.S. Secretary of the Interior.

The group has given a "report card" for the state's public schools. It says that New Mexico ranks first in the nation in accountability and standards. New Mexico was the only one of the 50 states to receive both an "A" and a perfect score of 100 in this category.

The results of those student achievement tests, the National Assessment of Educational Progress, however, ranked New Mexico more than 20 percent below the national average in all six of the reported categories. In math, only 13 percent of 4th graders and 14 percent of 8th graders tested at or above "proficient" in math.

New Mexico, itself, recently graded New Mexico public schools in four categories ranging from probationary to exemplary. While 172 public schools, or about 29 percent of those ranked, received the lowest grade of probationary, only 37 schools, or about 6 percent of those ranked, qualified as exemplary.

The state board lowered the minimum score needed to avoid the probationary status which allowed 160 public schools to escape that poor rating. Probationary schools will now need to show improvement or risk take over of their operations by the state.

The think tank gave recommendations to improve the state's public schools which involved decentralization, competition and choice.

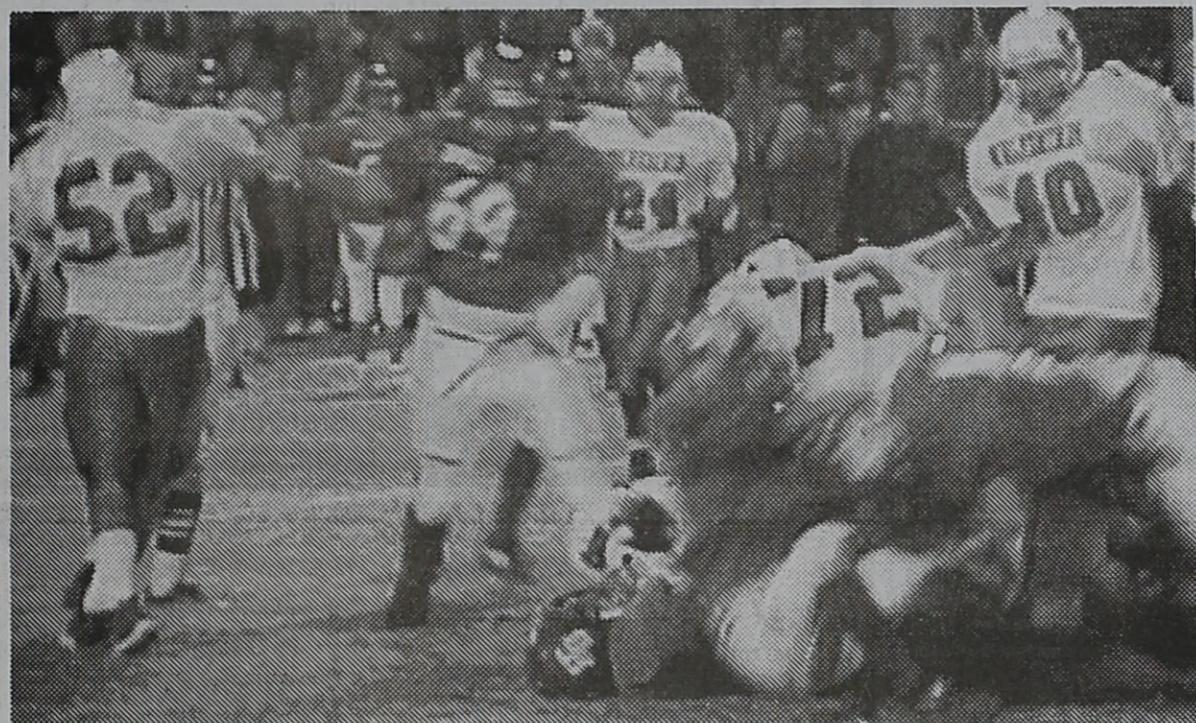
