On Sept. 26, a public hearing was held in Lubbock on the Llano Estacado Regional water plan. The planning area includes Parmer County and the graphics above show projected water needs and water management strategy for Parmer County and its three cities. Under the proposed project, ground water rights would be purchased in Hartley and/or Roberts counties, and pipelines would carry the water south. One pipeline would be built to transport water to Vega, then south to Hereford, Friona and Muleshoe. Lateral pipelines could be extended from the main feeder line to serve other towns, such as Bovina and Farwell, along with feedlots, dairies and other industries along the way. The volume of ground water anticipated to be purchased is expected to be adequate to supply the area's demand for 100 years.

Job description, salary proposed for Texico paid fire chief position

The proposed job description for a paid fire chief for Texico was unveiled on Tuesday night at the City Council meeting, with several persons attending to object to having the paid position.

According to the job description presented, "the Fire Chief and all the benefits will be paid fully out of the Fire Rescue fund; at no time will the general budget be responsible for any of the chief's wages or benefits. The Fire Chief will be paid at a rate of \$500 a month, plus city insurance to be paid out of the Fire Rescue fund, also."

The suggestion to have a paid fire chief first came up at the council's Aug. 22 meeting. At that time, councilman Doug Scioli gave a rough estimate of paying a fire chief at \$15,000 a year -- with the cost to be split between the fire department and the city.

The topic was not addressed at either of the council's September meetings because councilman Jeff Queener, who had raised it, was absent from those meetings. But the council held a study session on Sept. 28 and Queener said he would present a full job description at Tuesday's meeting. Also, the city placed an ad in last week's Tribune urging residents to attend the Tuesday meeting and give their views on whether to have a paid fire chief's position.

The responses given at the Tuesday's meeting opposed the fire chief being paid.

Mayor Marie Christian said 24 persons had contacted her in opposition. The consensus was "we don't need it," she said.

Vonnie McIntosh opposed it, also, and complained that "people don't know a lot about it. All was done privately." She said some elderly folks who are just trying to make ends meet are worrying about it causing higher taxes.

Mrs. McIntosh asked that the council send out a questionnaire to residents first to get their opinions before the council acts. Fire Dept. Chief Lewis Cooper will prepare a position paper and the city will send it to residents. There will be a space on it for folks to give their views, and they will be urged to re-

turn it to City Hall.

Mrs. McIntosh also brought up the suggestion of putting the question on the next city ballot, which would be in March 2002. It's the best way to give folks a chance to decide, she

pointed out.

Gladys Fitz stressed that the fire department is a volunteer group and should stay that way.

Roy Snodgrass said he had called several folks, and virtually all opposed a paid position. "They don't think we need it. We're not a big town."

Supporting the paid position, Scioli noted the great number of hours put in by firemen on paperwork. It was noted how tis has greatly increased over the years, especially after the state

Here's a look back at the good, ol' days in the Twin Cities

A copy of the May 16, 1924, issue of the State Line Tribune was sent to the paper this week by Howard Graham, 120 E. 28th Ave., Pampa, TX 79065.

In a covering letter, Graham said:

"I hope you find this issue of interest. It came from the B.N. Graham estate. In the third column, under "Old Timer Makes...", he writes of B.N. Graham and his insurance business. Mr. Graham was my father, who at one time had the oldest insurance agency in Parmer County.

"Mr. and Mrs. B.N. Graham came to Farwell in November 1916, after he was elected county/district clerk. He was the first c/d clerk to office in the 'new' courthouse. The family dates in Farwell are 1916-1977.

"My parents had five children, two of whom were born in Farwell. And all five were educated in the Farwell public schools. For 23 years, there was a Graham child in the school

"My parents moved to Bovina in 1914 where B.N. Graham was the principal of the school. It was while living in Bovina that they first subscribed to the State Line Tribune. This is according to an interview of mother, in 1967, by the Tribune. Her picture and the article appeared in July/August 1967."

The 1924 issue featured 8 pages and had two large ads on Page 1, one for the Kemp Lumber Company, of Farwell, and the other for the Blackwater Valley State Bank, in Muleshoe.

The main article was headlined "Old timer makes visit to Twin City" and included the observations of "Uncle Hez Hankin" about local businesses, such as Graham's insurance agency, Judge Hamlin's Capital Reservation Land Company, the Plains Buying and Selling Association, the Texico Hat Shop, and the Kemp Lumber Company.

There was a Page 1 editorial from publisher Stanley Sigler, about the end of the school term. He estimated that not over 60 percent of the students who enter school graduate from high school. And not over 85 percent get past the 10th grade.

Another Page 1 article featured the Texico home economics girls being entertained at Mrs. Conlee's home. The girls' last names were Waltman, Francis, Plaster, Hankins, Ross, Peters, Clingan, Doose, Nicewarner, Riggins and Engram.

Meanwhile, the Baptist Church of Texico-Farwell bought the Arthur Jenkins house in Farwell, now occupied by J.B. Lunsford, for a parsonage. Rev. Strickland his family would move in as soon as Lunsford could move out.

It also was a time for baccalaureate services for our schools. Although the newspaper copy is a bit shredded, it appears the Texico graduates were Waltman, Langston, Xander and Tidwell. Farwell graduates were Lawrence, Miller, Davis, Clark, Presley, Marney, Butcher, Lovelace, Megs, Crump, Lunsford, Kyker, and Hawkins.

Page 2 of the paper featured "wire news" -- stories about the Republican party, President Coolidge and governmental agencies. But there also was an advertisement entitled "If you need a medicine, you should have the best -- Dr. Kilmer's Swamp Root." Another ad featured "St. Joseph's Liver Regulator for blood - liver - kidneys; the big 25 cent can". And yet one more ad featured Bell-ans -- "Sure relief for indigestion."

Page 3 featured Chapters 3 and 4 of a novel, called "The Lord of Thunder Gate" with illustrations. That took half the page.

The ads on this page also were health oriented. Pe-Ru-Na "builds strength. Just the remedy to aid the system in throwing off catarrhal wastes, help the functional organs, restore digestion and bring back the perfect balance." And "Nature's Remedy" was "better than pills, for liver ills."

Page 4 carried mostly legal ads, sheriff's sales. The ads on this page were for Bob's Shoe Shop, G.F. Green (knife attachments for tractors), and Calotabs -- for the liver. It seems that the majority of ads in this issue were to help folks' liver

Page 5 featured a huge ad, over half a page, for "Mandell's Gigantic May White Goods and Economy Sale." Ladies' silk, wool and crepe dresses wee \$8.65 (while they last). You could also buy bleached muslins for 12 1/2 and 15 cents; underwear for 21 cents (greenfield longcloth) and for 29 cents (nursery batiste); Talk of City dresses for \$15.75 and \$24.75; ladies' handkerchiefs for 6 cents; bleached sheeting for 52 cents and for 59 cents; lace for 3 1/2 cents, and undermuslin night gowns ranging from 79 cents to \$1.98.

This page also featured the continuation of Uncle Hez Hankins' story from Page 1. He cited the C.W. Hill & Son's Store, Texico Tailer and Pressing Shop, Pastime Confectionary, and Triplett Bros. Store. A small article said that the Farwell Motor Company had received a shipment of new Ford cars, trucks and tractors this week.

Page 6 was a catch-all page. Ads promoted Castoria -- "a harmless substitute for castor oil, paregoric, drops and soothing syrups"; Zonite, which kills poison ivy; Carter's Little Liver Pills, which "can regulate your bowels"; W.H. Bull's Herbs and Iron, which puts iron in your blood "to restore the worn-out cells of your body"; Gold Medal capsules which "correct internal troubles, stimulate vital organs, comes in three sizes."; and Radium treatment which banishes rose fever and hay fever.

Page 7 had comics -- "No Brains", "This Sounds Reasonable" and "Ether Waves." Again, ads dominated the page. One large ad was placed by the Texas Sugar Refining Co. of Texas City, Texas. Then there was Shinola shoe polish. And W.L. Douglas shoes for \$7 and \$8.

Three large ads were on Page 8, the last page of the issue. One was for "Ford -- the Universal Car." You could buy a Ford Touring Car for \$295. Another ad was the the First State Bank and Trust Co. of Hereford. And the Triplett Brothers ad said "we stand behind every yard of Ever-fast."

On this page also were lots of "shorts", such as a born being born to Mr. and Mrs. Gene Houston; the baby of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Moore had pneumonia; Don Hill, a Texico boy, was promoted by his company in Fort Worth; Margaret Tarr, a teacher at Bovina schools, spent the weekend with Mrs. W.B. Hill; and Mrs. Lee Moore chaperoned the Farwell High seniors at a picnic at Soda Lake, about 30 miles east of town.

Letter To The Editor

Being a student at Texico High, I feel very fortunate to be able to attend a school with an excellent band program. By participating in band, doors are opened to scholarships, marching contests and, above all, it represents the school in a very positive way. It is sad to see how so many schools have dropped their band programs due to lack of interest. Many people don't realize the importance of music in schools.

Research conducted by MENC has found that students with experience in music performance and music appreciation scored higher on the SAT's and considerably much higher in math for music appreciation than that of students with no arts participation. Other research exploring the link between music and intelligence reported that music training is superior to computer instruction in enhancing children's abstract reasoning skills; those skills being vitally important for learning math and science.

In one case, two Rhode Island elementary schools were given an enriched skill-building music program and the students showed marked improvement in reading and math skills. Students in the music program who had started out behind the main group caught up, resulting in equal statistics in reading and math.

It has been proven that music is a beneficial class. It is awesome to see how Texico Band is improving every day. The students that participate in band need to strive to keep the program's foundation solid so we don't end up like schools who have no band at all. Our advice to students is to take hold of a musical talent, practice, and don't give up -because it will only benefit you in the future.





New Mexico education evaluated

"Think New Mexico," a solution-oriented think tank located in Santa Fe has published a booklet regarding the state's educational system.

The not-for-profit group has a board of directors that includes Garrey Carruthers, former state governor; Paul Bardacke, former state attorney general, and Stewart Udall, former U.S. Secretary of the Interior.

The group has given a "report card" for the state's public schools. It says that New Mexico ranks first in the nation in accountability and standards. New Mexico was the only one of the 50 states to receive both an "A" and a perfect score of 100 in this category.

The results of those student achievement tests, the National Assessment of Educational Progress, however, ranked New Mexico more than 20 percent below the national average in all six of the reported categories. In math, only 13 percent of 4th graders and 14 percent of 8th graders tested at or above "proficient" in math.

New Mexico, itself, recently graded New Mexico public schools in four categories ranging from probationary to exemplary. While 172 public schools, or about 29 percent of those ranked, received the lowest grade of probationary, only 37 schools, or about 6 percent of those ranked, qualified as exemplary.

The state board lowered the minimum score needed to avoid the probationary status which allowed 160 public schools to escape that poor rating. Probationary schools will now need to show improvement or risk take over of their operations by the state.

The think tank gave recommenations to improve the state's public schools which involved decentralization, competition and choice.


In the final period, McFarland scored again, behing excellent blocking by guard Fabian Reyes.

mandated EMS crews to charge for their runs.

It was said that the standard ambulance cost in Texico was \$350, while, as an example, the first call in Clovis was at \$835. And the cost to use the helicopter to send someone to Lubbock was \$9,000. It was was stated that state law mandates ambulances to take their patients to the closest hospital -- in Texico's case, that means the Clovis hospital.

"Federal mandates and all these rules have changed things," said Queener, responding to earlier comments about how the department used to never charge for its ambulance In addition to the suggestion of how much to pay a fire

chief in the job description, the fire department would be required to have his next year's salary on hand each year, it was Qualifications for a paid fire chief would include a working knowledge of the city and fire department and their policies

management. During the discussion, Scioli stressed that although he is a member of the fire department, he has an open mind on whether to have a paid chief's position. This came after Mrs. McIntosh virtually called voting for the paid position a given since the three votes needed to approve it were on hand.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard Queener report he is still working on getting estimates for a new city hall.

-- Asked city attorney Marion Ty Rutter to contact the electrician to discuss the smoke detectors at the Texico Community Center, which apparently don't work.

-- Okayed firemen Cooper and Scioli attending a fire chief's conference in Albuquerque.

-- Allowed Cooper to go after funds from the state legislature toward buying a new pumper to replace the 1969 pumper on hand. If all goes well, it would take two years for delivery. The department keeps two pumpers at its north station and one at its south station.
