An organization holding a raffle can offer any prize except money.

If the organizers are offering a prize they have bought, the value of the prize may not exceed \$50,000. If the prize was donated to the organization, there's no value limit.

Lazbuddie tax situation improves

*The Lazbuddie School Board went over its tax situation on Tuesday and the news is looking better. However, Supt. Hardy Carlyle remains cautious and doesn't want to be too optimis-

But it's evident that Lazbuddie officials have worked at its budget problem -- and have been successful at maintaining its program strength.

Last December, the school board learned that about \$70,000 needed to be cut from its budget for the 1999-2000 school year. This is a hefty sum for a small school like Lazbuddie. What made this especially difficult was that the school tax rate was at the state maximum -- \$1.50. Thus, the board couldn't raise taxes to help with the upcoming problem.

This week, the board was told by Parmer County Appraisal District officials that since valuations were up, about \$3 million, it appears the tax rate will be down a couple of cents, putting it below the state maximum.

Thus, the board will have the option at leaving it at the new total, or even going back to \$1.50, generating more funds. The

budget hearing will be Aug. 26 (see legal ad elsewhere in today's Tribune for details).

Where has Lazbuddie been able to make the necessary cutbacks to eliminate that \$70,000 problem? The main reason is there are four less school personnel this year. One real plus is having the new industrial arts teacher double as band director. Also, the home economics program was cut to half-days.

The bottom line is that it appears that Lazbuddie will be "in the black", all things being equal.

Carlyle stressed that no program was eliminated although some were reduced. For example, band is still offered although beginning band isn't.

"We are still on a fine line so I prefer to put a 'positive attitude' on hold," he explained. "Our fiscal year ends Aug. 31 and the auditors will be here in September. Then we will know exactly where we stand."

Much has to do with student enrollment. It appears the enrollment has gone well and more students will be arriving the first day of school than the number who left in May. But you never know. Some students who sign up may move by the time school opens.

Carlyle emphasized that, even in facing that deficit last year, there was never any threat that Lazbuddie School would have to close its doors. But what the board and school officials have tried to do is to maintain the programs currently in

place, and the superintendent feels they have done that job. In other business at the Tuesday meeting, the board:

- -- Changed a policy for teachers using school-provided housing. Teachers who leave or are discharged will have to pay a rent of \$10 a day if they stay in the housing after July 1. This would amount to about a \$300 a month rent.
 - -- Approved the transfer of a student from Muleshoe.
- -- Received two bids for health insurance coverage. They will be looked into before one is accepted. The cost is going
- -- Approved Code of Student Conduct changes, which clarifies actions to be taken about students who break it.
- -- Accepted the resignation of elementary music teacher Nancy Welker.
- -- Sold "weighted ADA" to Sudan Schools. This is a transaction done annually under the state formula to get funds spread from richer school districts to others. Lazbuddie will receive about \$35,000 or more for technology programs through this process.

From Judy Pomper:

Have you noticed the dead trees in our area this year? Last year's drought is one of the causes of this problem. Trees that were not watered or fertilized enough last year could die this year because insects and disease attack stressed plants more than unstressed ones.

This year, the elm trees are bothered by European bark beetles. Ash trees are being attacked by borers, according to Cherinell Riley, the Parmer County extension service entomologist.

She said prevention is far better than trying to right a problem once it has attacked the trunk of the tree.

Pick a tree that will grow well in this climate. Fertilize it. Water it regularly. Ms. Riley estimated that some local trees might have lived another 5 to 10 years if they had properly been cared for.

Once a tree dies, the thing to do is to remove it and its dead limbs, and dispose of it.

Several trees in our area need iron. They include Bradford pear, silver maple, weeping willow, globe willow, catalpa and sweet gum. Using a fertilizer that includes this common mineral can help your trees to live longer.

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
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Combest reports on 1999 agricultural bill

H.R. 2559, "The Agriculture Risk Protection Act of 1999" meets the commitment of Agriculture Chairman Combest to affordable, flexible coverage based more closely on productive capability than the financially harsh APH (Actual Production History) formula. Instead, the committee bill allows farm-



ers to exclude the recorded yield in any crop year when such yields are below 60 percent of the transitional yield and to replace it with a yield equal to 60 percent of the applicable transition yield. Combest said improved coverage and increased federal premium assistance provide incentives for producers to reach out to a strengthened farm safety net.

"Too many producers are forced into the financially risky decision to work without a crop insurance safety net, judging that policies are not effective in coverage nor cost," said Combest. "Unpredictable weather damage and fluctuating world markets threaten farm families with a financial free-fall. This bill's insurance against crop, livestock and revenue losses offers more secure anchors for a stronger safety net that producers need and want."

Premium assistance levels would increase as follows: for 50/100 coverage from the current 55% to 67%; for 55/100 up from 37.8% to 64%; while 65/100 assistance increases from the current 41.7% to 59%; for 70/100 assistance rises from 31.9% to 59%; for 75/100 assistance goes from the current 23.5% to 54%; for 80/100 the assistance rises from 17.3% to 40.6%; and for 85/100 coverage the premium assistance increases from 13% to 30.6% under the legislation approved by the Agriculture Committee. (As an example, a 65/100 policy is shorthand for 65 percent yield coverage that sets a 35 percent deductible for the farmer, that will pay 100 percent of the USDA-set price for the yield.)

Included provisions of the "Agricultural Risk Protection

-- Affordable coverage at every level, with strong incentives to purchase higher levels of protection and new flexibility for producers to choose the level of coverage that best meets their needs.

-- More affordable policies to protect farmers against price and income loss, in addition to production loss.

-- Encouragement of greater flexibility and diversity of coverage by expanding policy development and providing incentives for the creation of new policies.

-- Introduction of a livestock pilot program to test the effectiveness of risk management tools to protect livestock producers.

-- Strong compliance and enforcement provisions against fraud, waste and abuse through substantial sanctions for violations and monitoring by the Farm Service Agency.

Texaco Oil & Gas business goes back a bunch of years

If you had to stop and think about it, what would you say is the oldest business still running in Farwell? I'll give you a hint; it isn't the newspaper. The oldest running business in Farwell is the Texaco Oil and Gas Co. Otherwise known as the former Lovelace Oil.

Texaco Oil and Gas has been around since 1910, when it was originally owned by the Texas Company. J.L. Walling was the company's first manager back in 1910. Following him was a Mr. Williams. No one knows what his first name was; they just know him as Mr. Williams.

After Mr. Williams, Richard Hunter became the manager. Hunter ended his job as manager in 1942, a suicide. Pat Howard, the current manager, says that there was still a bullet hole in the corner of the office from when Hunter tested to make sure his gun shot.

Bill Moss was the last manager at the business before Woodrow Lovelace bought it and changed the name to Lovelace Oil. A few years later Lovelace's nephew, David Snider, bought it from him and kept the name. The business last changed hands in April of 1996 when Helton Oil Company bought it and changed the name to Texaco Oil and Gas Company.

Just recently, Howard noticed the outlines of some of the old signs that were painted on the side of the building and talked to Hal Helton about restoring them. Helton had his son, Kyle, and Val Vause restore the signs. The restored signs can now be seen on the side of the office and the old horse barn.

Howard and Helton showed me around the place and you could just see the history that runs through it. From the bite marks in the wood beams in the horse barn to the building that was raised to the height of a horse wagon you could see that this business has been around awhile.



Eric Smith is also going to be a key player for the team at the running back position.


Overall the team is looking good on offense.
