That was the chant by the more than 300 Farwell fans on Saturday when the Lady Blue sped past Canadian in the regional championship game at Abilene Christian University's moody Coliseum, 51-38.

Canadian's Lady Wildcats ended their season at 23-6. The victory improved the Lady Blue's record to 28-4.

Once again, the Lady Blue used its patented defensive strategy, and ball-hawking abilities, plus its teamwork to put away yet another strong team.

Farwell varsity girls win semi-final

The Farwell Lady Blue used its poise, outstanding defense and great guard play (with an emphasis on assists) to defeat the Panhandle Pantherettes, 57-42, in the regional semi-final game last Friday at Abilene Christian University's Moody Coliseum.

Panhandle's season ended at 26-7. Farwell's record climbed to 27-4.

Scoring for Farwell were Ashley Crawford, 10; Megan Miller, 4; Nicole Stout, 5; Chelsi Kaltwasser, 16; Kinzi Woods, 3; Lisa Herington, 4, and Marni Lunsford, 15.

Farwell opened on a positive note when Lunsford hit a a3pointer for a 3-0 lead. Panhandle came back and led 4-3 before Farwell took the lead for good at 5-4 on a Kaltwasser bucket at 6:00.

Farwell caused four Panhandle turnovers early to help boost the Lady Blue lead.

The Lady Blue were rebounding well, and with good assists from the guards, Farwell began pulling away in the first quarter. The lead climbed to 15-6 when Kaltwasser hit a free throw at 2:18. But Panhandle canned a 3-pointer a minute before the end of the guarter to close the lead to 17-11.

The 2nd quarter was nip and tuck, as both teams committed three turnovers each early, and they traded baskets, too. The Farwell lead was cut to 4 points with 2 minutes to go. Then Farwell had a key flurry to put Panhandle on the ropes.

With 1:32 left, Herington scored a basket. Forty seconds later, She scored on a layup. And Stout hit a layup just before the buzzer as Farwell went into the halftime ahead, 27-19.

The 3rd quarter saw Farwell build up a lead -- which was good because it was needed when Panhandle staged a late comeback.

The Farwell scoring was spread around in the 3rd quarter, with Stout, Kaltwasser, Crawford, Megan and Lunsford contributing points. The Farwell lead blossomed to 14 points, 42-28, with 2:30 left when Kaltwasser knocked down two free throws.

Panhandle committed three turnovers, caused by the ballhawking Lady Blue, late in this quarter as they went into the final period, 42-29.

Early in the final period, a drive by Lunsford at the 5 minute mark put Farwell ahead, 46-31. Then Panhandle staged a run of its own. Within 60 seconds, the Pantherettes hit a 3-pointer, scored on a steal and breakaway, and added a free throw.

All of a sudden, Farwell's safe lead had melted away, and the Lady Blue led only by 9, 46-37.

But at 3:40, Lunsford came up big with a 3-pointer that seemed to dash Panhandle's hopes of a comeback.

After that, it was all Farwell. Crawford scored on a layup,

Lazbuddie woman dies


I loved watching the Lady Blue at Abilene last weekend. Just loved it. Because I saw team basketball at its finest. The folks who were there know exactly what I am talking about.



Head Start extends its serves to handicapped children.

Texas schools are required to provide pre-kindergarten if 15 or more students are identified.

The boys are now 20-4 overall.




