

Will awaits volcanic eruption

Farwell's very own Will Anderson, a Naval commander, is also the State Line Tribune's South American correspondent.

Currently, he is stationed in Quito, Ecuador, with the U.S. Embassy.

The following column arrived on Monday:

Did you hear the joke about the Texas Aggie who took four snow shovels with him when he moved to the equator?

He wanted to be ready in case the volcano exploded and filled his front walk with volcanic ash!

That joke would be funnier if I hadn't given my neighbors the four snow shovels I bought in Washington D.C., last winter, instead of bringing them here, because I wish I had them now!

So far in her eruptions, Guagua Pichincha has blown her stack on the western side and the rockfall and lava are going west, away from the city. However, if she really blows her stack, and unless the winds are just perfect in the upper atmosphere, Quito is going to be covered with a few feet of volcanic ash.


They tell me that this stuff weighs about 10 pounds per cubic foot, so if it happens, I'll be on the roof shoveling it off as quickly as I can. (Note to the Editor: Please tell mom and dad to Fed-Ex a snowblower to me as soon as possible!) The vulcanologists say that if the ash comes, it will fall for about 8 to 10 hours, and then things will really get nasty. Guagua has been venting a lot of fumes and steam out, and all the heat and moisture seed the clouds, so it is raining here almost all the time (anything from a drizzle to lightning storms with sheets of rain). The rains that follow a major eruption will turn the ash into seas of hot mud running down the volcano's slopes walls and through the streets of this city, and this beautiful city will look like something from one of the moons of Jupiter, I'm told.



If that sequence of events starts, our attaché office will be part of the Embassy team that remains, but our families will be evacuated to the coast.




The Wolverines' final warm-up before district is next Friday when they host Questa at 7 p.m. mt.

Financial **Focus** by Glen O'Rear **Rising Interest Rates**

To understand the effect that rate increases have on investing, you'll need a little background on why the Federal Reserve raises rates at all. Basically, the Fed uses interest rates as a tool to regulate the economy. When the Fed thinks the economy is growing too slowly, it will cut interest rates to encourage businesses to borrow more to expand their operations. Conversly, if the economy is too "hot," then the Fed will raise rates to slow things down and head off inflation.

That's what happened this So what's next? summer. Traditional thinking holds higher that higher interest rates are bad news for stocks; if it costs more for companies to borrow, they won't grow as fast and won't earn as much. However, studies are proving that the stock market, on average, has historically moved higher after one or two rate hikes. A greater threat to the market actually occurs after the Feds wait too long to curb inflation and is forced to boost rates several times. While rate increases are possibly unsettling in the short term, they could actually help investors over the long haul. Of course, even if the market is not hurt by one or two rate increases, it doesn't necesarily mean the individual stocks you invest in will be unaffected. If you're investing in an industry, such as financial services, you might notice an impact right away. If you own bonds, you will see their prices drop in a rising-rate environment, because investors can buy new issues at higher interest rates - meaning your lower-rate bonds are worth less. But don't let interest rate movements overly influence your investment decisions. It is a long term business, so you don't want to be side-tracked by short term news. Don't change goals or abandon basic strategies. If you like to own stocks, look for those with solid fundamentals and good prospects. If you own bonds, consider purchasing several with different maturities, so you'll always have money coming available to take advantage of rising interest rates.



Wheat producers can improve their crop's yield and grain quality potential by controlling weeds that rob plants of nutrients, water and light, said a Texas A&M agronomist.

"The best defense against weeds is to grow a vigorous, competitive crop by using a combination of good cultural practices, crop rotation and approved herbicides," said Todd Baughman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service agronomist based in Vernon. "Plant good, clean seed in a well-prepared, fertile seedbed. Using the right planting date, seeding rate and fertilizer will also help produce a healthy stand that can outcompete weeds.

"Scout your fields early for any sign of weed competition, and be prepared to make a timely herbicide application according to label directions if a treatment is necessary."

Treating fencelines and the edges of fields also is a good idea, the agronomist said. Left untreated, these areas can soon harbor enough weeds to become a 'weed nursery.'

"You will achieve the best control when weeds are young,"

Recipe of Week

Basil Biscuits

Helpful Tip: When measuring biscuit and baking mix, gently spoon mix into nested (dry) measuring cup/s. Using a metal spatula or straight-edged knife, level off the top.

he said. "Letting the weeds go and relying on a pre-harvest herbicide treatment is not a good idea. By then, the weeds have already cost you some yield, they are harder to kill, and they are a source of seed for future infestations."


"At harvest, it is a good idea to cut your cleanest fields first and to clean the combine thoroughly between fields. This will help keep weeds from spreading, and it will help you keep the grain clean and avoid dockage at the elevator."

Removing small infestations by hand, treating fence rows and ditches, rotating with summer crops, grazing the crop, and seeding later in the fall are other ways to keep grassy and broadleaf weeds in check. Waiting for a fall flush of weeds, plowing and then seeding wheat is a good option, but it can reduce the crop's grazing potential, the agronomist said.

"When a herbicide treatment is necessary, your choices will depend on the type of weeds present, their stage of growth, your crop rotation plans and whether you are growing wheat for grain, grazing or both," Baughman said. "Some products cannot be used at all on wheat that will be grazed, while others may not be compatible with your summer rotation crop.

Clayton turns back Wolverines




The defense played very well and it seemed like every tackle the Wolverines made were by a group and not a lone headhunter.



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


