

Thus, a book intended to uplift Mr. Buchanan's presi-



They say that necessity is the mother of all invention and with this in mind, two local men have invented a product that will put them on the cutting edge of technology.

Literally, the chore of slicing hay will become a whole lot easier thanks to the ingenuity of Bob Grumbles and Jerry Stover of Farwell Manufacturing, Inc.

Bob Grumbles has over twenty years experience in the custom hay business working with area feed lots, dairies and ranchers around the region on custom cutting and processing of hay for bulk feeding. He has observed over the years that the grinding and slicing implements that have been on the market weren't performing safely and easily enough for his clients. And, even more importantly, they weren't providing a good enough cut of hay to properly feed the cows.

He knew there had to be a better way to slice hay. Jerry Stover was the key to putting the ideas together when he opened Farwell Manufacturing this past summer.

Stover hired Grumbles as the shop foreman for his new company and the two began to sketch out plans and parts during their free time together. By the end of the summer, the pair had a prototype put together.

The "Leaf Saver" hay slicer was becoming a reality.

The main design aspect of the Leaf Saver is that it consistently cuts hay to the proper 12 inch length and the major portion of the leaves are left intact. This is the length that bovine nutritionists and veterinarians recommend for

proper rumen function in cattle. All bovines have four stomachs and a 12 inch stem of hay can be systematically broken down. The length aids in the digestion and the activation of the cow's rumen system, i.e. "chewing their cud." The leaves that are digested provide nutrients and minerals for the bovine.

The current hay slicers and grinders too often destroy the leaves and cut the hay too short or too long. Many times, the grinders pulverize the hay into such a mulch that it is nothing but "hay powder" that provides nothing in the way of bulk roughage or nutrient value.

The Leaf Saver features adjustable wheels with sharp blades attached that will allow the operator to make changes in the width of hay cut. This is an attractive feature for feeding young stock, ailing stock and many other feeding options for cattle. The bale of hay is conveyered into the cutting wheels and conveyered out of the cutting unit. The entire machine is portable and very easily operated. Grumbles and Stover also had the operator's safety in mind throughout the design process.

"Safety was something that I saw other equipment put as a secondary feature to the operation throughout my years in the business," said Grumbles. "Jerry and I knew there were several ways to make the Leaf Saver as safe to use as it is easy to use."

Once the men had a prototype built they needed to test the unit out. They contacted Dale Turner, of Dale Turner Farms located south of Farwell. He grows quite a bit of hay and agreed to have the unit tested on his farm.

"The Leaf Saver performed very well for being in the prototype stage," commented Grumbles. "We sure appreciated Dale's help and comments. With some of the initial kinks worked out, we were able to improve it along

the way."

The next step was to test the machine out at a feed lot or dairy. The proof to a prospective customer would be in the consistency of the cut, leaf content and digestibility. Mesman Dairy, located in Oklahoma Lane, volunteered for a turn to test the unit.

Berny Mesman ran the unit to cut several days worth of hay to feed the dairy cows and was impressed with the cutting ability of the machine. He was also able to point out some design options and changes that would make the Leaf Saver even more practical and user-friendly.


Stover and Grumbles took the advice and, through consultation with Greer Industrial Co. put some of the changes into the design. Greer Industrial Co. is the manufacturing company that will be building the product. On Monday, Oct. 25, the first production model of the Leaf Saver was started on the assembly line.

Berny Mesman is anxious to get the completed product back to the dairy farm for more testing.

"It's was encouraging to know that someone has finally figured out what slicing hay is all about and what a customer really needs for their cows," Mesman commented. "The fact that it's people from right here in the area makes the product even better!"

Stover and Grumbles have big plans for the Leaf Saver to get the word out to dairy farmers and all other farmers and cattlemen. They are in the process of reserving space at the Tulare Farm Show in Tulare, California in February and will be making the equipment expos and farm show rounds as much as possible throughout the next year. A brochure and video are also being planned for information on the Leaf Saver.

Farwell Manufacturing, Inc. is about to break through the competition with the Leaf Saver. It's the answer to a lot of prayer, perserverance and dedication to their customers needs. Couple this with the performance and value of the Leaf Saver and everyone will end up sitting "high on the hay!"







Steers mangle Morton

The Farwell Steers took an important step toward making the state playoffs by whipping the Morton Indians in a home game last Friday, 46-13.

Morton was coached by former Farwell athletic director and head football coach Rex Cumpton.

Farwell is now 2-1 in district and 6-2 overall. The Steers play at Olton tonight (Friday) at 7:30, then finish district next Friday when they host Bovina.

The game against Morton was never in doubt as the Steers clearly dominated. They had dominated Sundown the previous week but had been unable to get the ball into the end zone. This time, they made sure of hitting paydirt.

The game started with Paul Franse tackling the kick returner. Derek Goettsch had a good tackle and Morton punted -- which was partially blocked by Grant Oppliger and Clint Patterson. So the Steers started at midfield.

Clint Corn ran for 25 yards, and a penalty added on put the ball at the Indians' 20. Tyler Chadwick then raced 20 yards behind a good block by Oppliger for the score at 7:21. The kick was blocked and it was 6-0.

Morton started at its 30 after a good tackly by Joel Barrett. Clint Patterson had a QB sack, then a QB pressure. Goettsch knocked down a pass and Morton punted again.

Corn had rushes for 9 and 6 yards. A pass from Chadwick to Manuel Garcia Jr. gained 15. Chadwick ran for 6 more. The drive culminated in a 28-yard TD pass from Chadwick to



Shane Roberts at 2:37. The pass for extra points failed and it was 12-0 in the Steers' favor.

Michael Hernandez tackled the returner at the Morton 31. Franse, Eulogio Ruiz and Taylor Nichols had good tackles. Goettsch broke up another pass as the first quarter ended. Oppliger and Chadwick had good tackles but Morton convered a 4th and 4 play down to the Farwel 9. Ruiz then caused a fumble recovered by Franse.

Farwell moved quickly, with Chadwick and Jourdan Nichols combining on a 46-yard pass play. Corn ran for 15, then 6. Kolby Kimbrough caught a pass for 22 yards. Finally, Corn plunged over from the 1 at 3:49. The kick missed and it was 18-0.

Oppliger tackled the kick returner. Morton was stymied and Kimbrough returned the punt 28 yards, helped by a block by



Roberts. Corn ran for 6, then caught a 5-yard pass. But Morton intercepted in its end zone as the half ended.

Kimbrought opened the 3rd quarter with an electrifying return of 37 yards to midfield. Again, Corn and Chadwick had good runs for a first down. Chadwick then hit Roberts with a 27-yard TD pass. The Corn kick made it 25-0 at 9:59.

Garcia tackled the kick returner at the Morton 41. Patterson and Cade Christian had good tackles and Morton punted. Farwell was held and Roberts boomed out a huge punt. With 2:30 left, Morton hit a couple of long passes, with the last one good for a 31-yard score. The kick was good and it was 25-7.

Chadwick then returned the kick 75 yards for another Steers' score. The Corn kick made it 32-7.

Casehy Meeks tackled the kick returner at the Morton 27. Barrett had a QB sack for a 4-yard loss as the 3rd quarter ended. Morton scored on a 15-yard pass. The kick for the extra points was blocked by Barrett and it was 32-13.

Morton tried an onside kick that failed. Corn ran for a 41yard TD, then kicked the extra point -- making it 39-13.

On defense, Franse had an outstanding tackle. Morton was stymied and Farwell took over. Farwell was stopped and Roberts punted to the Morton 3. Taylor Nichols had a good tackle, and Morton punted. -- Approved spending \$600 for more trees at the cemetery.


-- Was told that Maritza Autrey has been given 90 days to move her mobile home out of the city because is hasn't met aesthetic review guidelines.


JH Steers split with Morton




