## 'Leaf Saver' hay slicer become a reality

They say that necessity is the mother of all invention and with this in mind, two local men have invented a product that will put them on the cutting edge of technology.

Literally, the chore of slicing hay will become a whole lot easier thanks to the ingenuity of Bob Grumbles and Jerry Stover of Farwell Manufacturing, Inc.

Bob Grumbles has over twenty years experience in the custom hay business working with area feed lots, dairies and ranchers around the region on custom cutting and processing of hay for bulk feeding. He has observed over the years that the grinding and slicing implements that have been on the market weren't performing safely and easily enough for his clients. And, even more importantly, they weren't providing a good enough cut of hay to properly feed the cows.

He knew there had to be a better way to slice hay. Jerry Stover was the key to putting the ideas together when he opened Farwell Manufacturing this past summer.

Stover hired Grumbles as the shop foreman for his new company and the two began to sketch out plans and parts during their free time together. By the end of the summer, the pair had a prototype put together.

The "Leaf Saver" hay slicer was becoming a reality.

The main design aspect of the Leaf Saver is that it consistently cuts hay to the proper 12 inch length and the major portion of the leaves are left intact. This is the length that bovine nutritionists and veterinarians recommend for

As stated, above, there was no change at the top, as the co-leaders maintained their slight grip.

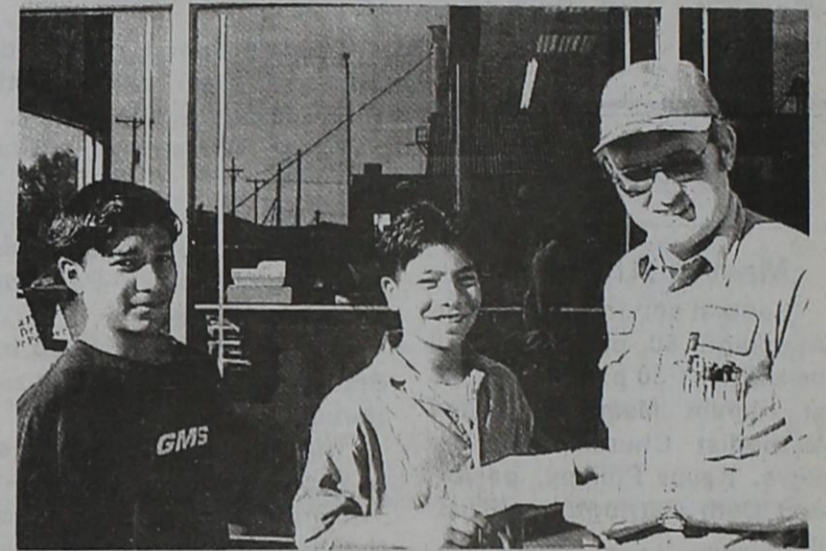

### Farwell council names Achterberg as new city police chief

The Farwell City Council held a special meeting on Monday to appoint Robert Achterberg, 43, of Clovis, as Farwell's new police chief.

He called City Hall Wednesday to accept the post.

Achterberg has been a Clovis city police officer for the past two years. Previously, he was on the Ruidoso, N.M., police force for 17 years.

The council split 2-2 on its vote to appoint Achterberg, and Mayor Jimmie Mace then voted for him.

Also in favor were councilmen Jerry Stover and Don

Geries.

Opposed were R.C. Davis, who favored the other finalist for the post, and John Carlson, who doesn't think that a one-man police force can work and favored having the Texico marshal's office take charge here.

Councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell was absent. She is at home recovering from a hip injury.

In other business, the council nominated Daren Sudderth to the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

proper rumen function in cattle. All bovines have four stomachs and a 12 inch stem of hay can be systematically broken down. The length aids in the digestion and the activation of the cow's rumen system, i.e. "chewing their cud." The leaves that are digested provide nutrients and minerals for the bovine.

The current hay slicers and grinders too often destroy the leaves and cut the hay too short or too long. Many times, the grinders pulverize the hay into such a mulch that it is nothing but "hay powder" that provides nothing in the way of bulk roughage or nutrient value.

The Leaf Saver features adjustable wheels with sharp blades attached that will allow the operator to make changes in the width of hay cut. This is an attractive feature for feeding young stock, ailing stock and many other feeding options for cattle. The bale of hay is conveyed into the cutting wheels and conveyed out of the cutting unit. The entire machine is portable and very easily operated. Grumbles and Stover also had the operator's safety in mind throughout the design process.

"Safety was something that I saw other equipment put as a secondary feature to the operation throughout my years in the business," said Grumbles. "Jerry and I knew there were several ways to make the Leaf Saver as safe to use as it is easy to use."

Once the men had a prototype built they needed to test the unit out. They contacted Dale Turner, of Dale Turner Farms located south of Farwell. He grows quite a bit of hay and agreed to have the unit tested on his farm.

"The Leaf Saver performed very well for being in the prototype stage," commented Grumbles. "We sure appreciated Dale's help and comments. With some of the initial kinks worked out, we were able to improve it along

the way."

The next step was to test the machine out at a feed lot or dairy. The proof to a prospective customer would be in the consistency of the cut, leaf content and digestibility. Mesman Dairy, located in Oklahoma Lane, volunteered for a turn to test the unit.

Berny Mesman ran the unit to cut several days worth of hay to feed the dairy cows and was impressed with the cutting ability of the machine. He was also able to point out some design options and changes that would make the Leaf Saver even more practical and user-friendly.

Stover and Grumbles took the advice and, through consultation with Greer Industrial Co. put some of the changes into the design. Greer Industrial Co. is the manufacturing company that will be building the product. On Monday, Oct. 25, the first production model of the Leaf Saver was started on the assembly line.

Berny Mesman is anxious to get the completed product back to the dairy farm for more testing.

"It's was encouraging to know that someone has finally figured out what slicing hay is all about and what a customer really needs for their cows," Mesman commented. "The fact that it's people from right here in the area makes the product even better!"

Stover and Grumbles have big plans for the Leaf Saver to get the word out to dairy farmers and all other farmers and cattlemen. They are in the process of reserving space at the Tulare Farm Show in Tulare, California in February and will be making the equipment expos and farm show rounds as much as possible throughout the next year. A brochure and video are also being planned for information on the Leaf Saver.

Farwell Manufacturing, Inc. is about to break through the competition with the Leaf Saver. It's the answer to a lot of prayer, perserverance and dedication to their customers needs. Couple this with the performance and value of the Leaf Saver and everyone will end up sitting "high on the hay!"

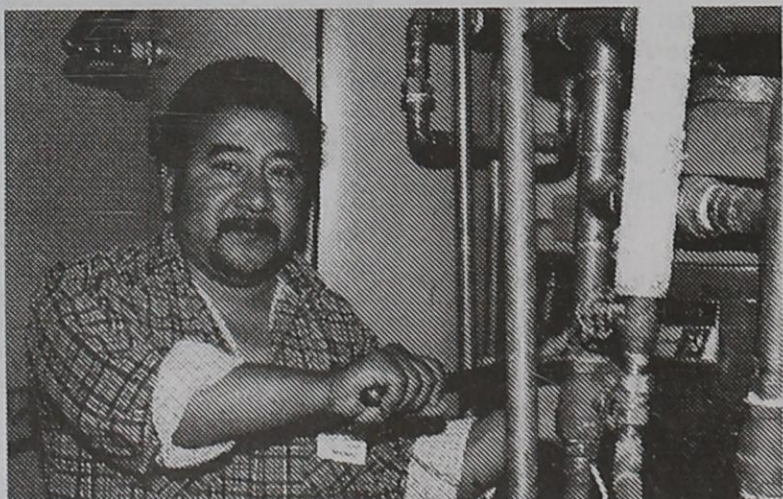

## Football picture clears

As the end of the regular football season approaches, things look pretty good for two of our three area grid squads.

Three Way and Silverton sport 2-1 marks, followed by Lazbuddie and Cotton Center at 1-2. Amherst brings up the rear at 0-3. Thus, Lazbuddie has to win its final two games for a shot at the state playoffs. After Whitharral, Lazbuddie hosts Three Way. The top two teams in six-man districts enter the state playoffs.

Since Farwell is in Class 2A, the top three teams continue into the state playoffs, and the Steers have an excellent chance at being one of them. Sundown leads the district at 3-0 followed by Bovina, Farwell and Hale Center, all at 2-1. Morton and Olton are 0-3. Farwell takes on Olton tonight, and Bovina next week. Farwell already has beaten Hale Center.

Texico is our area's first state playoff participant, having clinched the spot with its win over Springer last Friday. There are four teams in Texico's district and the Wolverines have beaten two of them (Springer and Questa), and face Fort Sumner tonight for the district championship. The top two teams go to state -- Texico and Fort Sumner. The Foxes are 2-0 in district and 6-2 overall going into tonight's battle. Although Fort Sumner is favored, never count out a David Lynn-coached Wolverine squad.

Farwell moved quickly, with Chadwick and Jourdan Nichols combining on a 46-yard pass play. Corn ran for 15, then 6. Kolby Kimbrough caught a pass for 22 yards. Finally, Corn plunged over from the 1 at 3:49. The kick missed and it was 18-0.

Oppliger tackled the kick returner. Morton was stymied and Kimbrough returned the punt 28 yards, helped by a block by

Roberts. Corn ran for 6, then caught a 5-yard pass. But Morton intercepted in its end zone as the half ended.

Kimbrough opened the 3rd quarter with an electrifying return of 37 yards to midfield. Again, Corn and Chadwick had good runs for a first down. Chadwick then hit Roberts with a 27-yard TD pass. The Corn kick made it 25-0 at 9:59.

**Texico takes look at Florence Street sign concerns**

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed a petition presented by Florence Street residents involving stop signs. Since the petition was not approved by the city clerk before it was passed around, it was not accepted. That's the city regulation.

## Mystifying choices




