


New Mexico High School Competency Examination:







Texico seeks to join Texas water plan

The Texico City Council on Tuesday passed a resolution seeking to join the Texas Llano Estacado Regional Water Supply Plan.

The Llano Estacado plan is being run by the High Plains Underground Conservation District No. 1, and includes Parmer and Bailey counties. It is planning to pipe water down to this area from the northern Texas Panhandle.

Texico Mayor Marie Christian took the lead in seeking to join the Texas group, since the Ute Lake Water Project has run into snags. In fact, councilman Jeff Queener, Texico's representative to the Ute Lake group, said it's "going nowhere...we'll never see a drop of water from it."

In other business, the council:

-- Heard a proposal from Eastern Plains Council of Governments representatives Eva Woods and Pat Garcia about a developer wanting to build 20 apartments along Highway 108 (adjacent to Borderline Cuts on Wheeler Avenue).

It would feature 3 bedroom units of 978 square feet and 4 bedroom units of 1,100 square feet, it was said. EPCOG would manage the low- to moderate-income units.

The council said it would be better to have such apartments off the highway and, perhaps, the developer could look at sites in residential areas.

Notice of Requirements to Report Certain Matters Relating to Property Valuation and for Claiming Exemption from Property Taxation

Margie J. Crooks, Curry County Assessor, hereby publishes notice to property owners, pursuant to Section 7-38-18, N.M.S.A. 1978, as follows:

1) If you or your spouse are 65 years old, or if either of you will become 65 years old in 2001, and if your "modified gross income" was not greater than \$18,000 in 2000, you may be eligible for a limitation on the taxable value of your residence. If you think you are eligible, you must apply to the Assessor no later than 30 days after the Assessor mails the notice of value for your residence. The application must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21.3, N.M.S.A. 1978.

2) If you own real property not valued by the Assessor in 2000 for property taxation purposes, it must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001, unless it is not subject to valuation for property taxation purposes in 2001. The report must contain certain required information and be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8(A)(B), N.M.S.A. 1978.

3) If you have made improvements to real property during 2000 and the improvements cost more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), the improvements must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001. The information required and the form of the report may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8(C), N.M.S.A. 1978.

4) If you believe that you or your real property is entitled to exemption from property taxation, you must apply to the Assessor for exempt status no later than February 28, 2001, in order to be entitled to exemption from taxation in 2001. Exception: If an exemption from taxation was in effect for 2000 and the basis of the exempt status or use is unchanged from that year, application for exemption need not be made for 2001. If required, application for exemption must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978.

5) If you or your real property was exempt from taxation in 2000 but the basis of the exempt status has changed during 2000 so that there is no longer eligibility for exemption, you must report that fact to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978.

6) If you claim "residential" status for your real property, you must declare this status to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001 unless the property was classified as "residential" by the Assessor in 2000. In the event that the predominant use of your real property has changed from "residential" to "nonresidential" during 2000, that fact must be declared to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001. The declaration must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Sections 7-38-17.1 and 7-36-2.1, N.M.S.A. 1978.

7) If you own property that has decreased in value during 2000, and that property is subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report the decrease in value to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-13, N.M.S.A. 1978.

8) If your land was valued in 2000 in accordance with the special method of valuation for land used primarily for agricultural purposes, and the land is still used primarily for agricultural purposes, you need not reapply for that special method of valuation in 2001. If your land was not valued in accordance with that method of valuation in 2000, and it is now used primarily for agricultural purposes, you must make application to the Assessor in order to obtain that valuation method in 2001. If your land was valued in accordance with that special method of valuation in 2000, but it is no longer used primarily for agricultural purposes, you must report that fact to the Assessor. The required applications and reports must be made to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001, and must contain certain required information and be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-20, N.M.S.A. 1978.

9) If you own "livestock" that are subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report such livestock to the Assessor. All such livestock that are present in the county on January 1, 2001, must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2001. If the livestock are transported into the county after January 1, 2001, they must be reported to the Assessor no later than the first day of the month following the first month in which the livestock have been present in the county for twenty (20) days. The required reports must contain certain required information and must be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21, N.M.S.A. 1978.

10) If you own a "manufactured home" and it was present in the county on January 1, 2001, you must report it to the-Assessor by February 28, 2001. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-26, N.M.S.A. 1978.

11) Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the County Assessor or the State Assessed Property Bureau, P.O. Box 25126, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87504-5126, Phone: (505) 827-0893
