## Area experiences a 'thundersnow'

This is the most snow l've seen in years
This is the common statement of area residents when dissussing the weather these days. For Parmer County residents, it is, in fact, the most snow many residents have seen in the last 46 years.
According to statistics kept by the National Climate Data Center, Parmer County had a record setting snowfall in the winter of 1955-56 that covered a large part of Parmer County with 47 to 51 inches of snow. The snow totals for that winter were 55 inches. The following winter of 1956-57 another big snowfall came in December that measured in ranges of 14 to 18 inches and brought that winters' total snowfall depth to 43 inches.
But as for the last 46 years, Parmer County has had only one snowfall that began to take on a record setting appearance back in 1982-83 when in the entire South Plains region...until now.
The winter season came early to Parmer County and Eastern New Mexico on Oct. 8 with the earliest recorded snowfall
in the recorded history of these regions. This was not the only unique thing about the snowfall. Oddly enough, this storm hit only five days after a record setting 100 degree temperature day for many towns across the South Plains. This perature day for many towns across the South Plains. This
This snowfall brought snowdepth ranges of 3 to 6 inches to Parmer County and eastern Curry County.

And this was only the beginning.
Since that first snowfall, snowfall depths and precipitation levels have literally been off the charts, according to Shawn Ellis of the National Weather Service in Lubbock.

Our region records average snowdepth levels of 11.3 inches. The snowdepth levels to this point in January are already at 12.6 inches," Ellis stated. "And coupling this with the fact that December was the third coldest December ever recorded for the region makes me believe that winter is just settling in for us in the Texas Panhandle.
According to further data gathered from the National Climate Data Center, this region has set 17 record highs in the areas of precipitation, temperature and snowdepth

Shawn Ellis of the National Weather Center also feels that the region the Lubbock center records is well on their way to breaking the snowfall records for this winter season. The documented record since $1955-56$ is 41.2 inches of snow for the 1982-83 winter.
"Lubbock alone is already at 15 inches. Parmer County and eastern Curry inches," Ellis stated.
Cam Moore, a meteorologist at KVII-Channel 7 in Amarillo stated on the 10:00 weathercast this past Sunday night that the Amarillo recording region was at almost 43 inches of snow. The record for this region is 48 inches. He too believes that Parmer County is on its way to breaking a snowfall record.

This snowy season is also doing more than just breaking records. It's also breaking up farming schedules, work routines, electricity and causing heating bills to literally break the bank for most area residents.
Area farmers can't keep to their normal field work schedules due to the snow and ice and the muddy fields that are left when the melting takes place.
The electrical outages that took place throughout the Christmas holidays seem to have been handled pretty thoroughly from the reports of the rural customers of Southwest-

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District office supplied a copy of the precipitation log from the years 1963 to 2000 . According to this log, the yearly total for the 1963 to 2000. According to this log, the yearly total yor the sentative of the National Climate Data Center is a bit misleading due to the fact that most precipitation is measured by actual water gathered in rain gauges, NCDC instrumentation at test sites and other gathering devices. The precipitation totals don't always take into account the actual depths of snowfalls before they melt. Evaporation takes a majority of the snowdepth out of the precipitation measurement picture.
This is the exact reason why the NCDC gathers information and snowdepth totals from major weather reporting stations and sites all across the U.S.
Another unique fact about the last snowfall was that many places in Parmer County reported a unique natural phenom ena called "Thundersnow." This is when it actually snows and rains at the same time with thunder booming throughout the downpour.
"This phenomenon usually occurs in the mountains where a storm gets walled into a valley before moving back up into Ellis of the National Weather Center. "The fact that it occurred with the extremely frigid temperatures this weekend is also very interesting.
Texico Schools dismissed classes early on Monday due to 3 - and 4 -foot snow drifts in the outlying areas. Not only did several school buses get stuck, but so did snow plows. Supt. R.L. Richards said a group of farmers in Pleasant Hill got together to help free some of the stranded vehicles and their help was much appreciated. Richards also thanked Texico Police Chief Kelley Brophy for alerting him early about the snow drift problems in the rural areas.

A woman's car stalled on the tracks between Texico and Farwell on Sunday about 5 p.m. Fortunately, she jumped out
of the vehicle before a train smashed into it.
