He also suggered some major bruises and swelling to his chest and abdomen. As of Monday, he was listed in stable condition.


Todd Schilling, of Tharp, received a major injury to a leg in an accident that took place Aug. 16 at the Leon Schilling farm south of Bovina.


As of Monday, Schilling had undergone two surgeries and was listed in stable condition.





## 'Boll' change asked

**Plains Cotton Growers** has asked the USDA Risk Management Agency to consider issuing a deviation allowing "boll count"based adjustments on dryland cotton severely impacted by drought conditions in 2001.

PCG's request includes dryland cotton planted in the Texas High Plains as well as cotton planted in the Rolling Plains region.

The deviation would allow growers to immediately receive appraisal on cotton counting only the harvestable bolis on the plant. The deviation also changes the factor applied to the bolls counted to 4.5, or 450 bolls per pound.

## **County redistricting** focuses on Friona

The Parmer County Commissioners held a workshop on Monday to better define the upcoming redistricting.

The county's four precincts need to be redistricted due to the 2000 census and the Voting Rights Act. The census showed Pct. 2 (Tom Ware) gaining 226 persons; Pct. 1 (Kirk Frye) losing 70 persons; Pct. 3 (Ed Corn) losing 22 persons; and Pct. 4 (Raymond McGehee) losing 134 persons.


Since the county's total was 10,016, it meant that each precinct needed to have about 2,500 persons, while maintaining federal guidelines involving minority voters. This means that at least one Parmer County precinct must contain a majority of Hispanic voters. For the past decade this has been Pct. 4 -- the Lazbuddie area precinct; and this will continue.

In earlier discussions, the commissioners had talked about changing some of its road mileage to equalize things (this is how some tax monies are awarded). But Corn said that the road miles are going to stay the same.

Instead, the commissioners are working on making polling places as convenient to voters as possible.

As expected, the proposed redistricting will likely affect only the city of Friona and its environs. An area west of Friona (west side of U.S. 60) is likely to be moved from the Bovina area precinct to the Friona area precinct. Also, the Lazbuddie area precinct likely will pick up parts of Friona to the north and east of that city.

Also, they are looking at putting voters along FM 3333 back in the Oklahoma Lane polling place.




