

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


Lady Wolverines destroy Jal to grab district tourney title

The Texico Lady Wolverines claimed the district tournament title at home on Saturday with a slaughter of Jal, 62-29.

The Lady Wolverines, 21-3, and Jal, 12-12, both advance to the regional contests this weekend.

Texico hosts the Region B tourney. The Lady Wolverines will take on Menaul, District 4 runnerup, at 8 p.m. mt on Friday. The other game is at 6 p.m. mt, with Santa Rosa playing Cloudcroft.

If Texico loses on Friday (highly unlikely), the Lady Wolverines are out of the state playoffs. But if Texico wins, they play the winner of the Cloudcroft-Santa Rosa game at 3:30 p.m. mt on Saturday. Both teams that play on Saturday advance to state the next weekend.

The Texico-Jal game was a mismatch before the smallest home crowd for Texico this season. The game had been scheduled for 6 p.m., but the day before moved to 3 p.m., then to 1 p.m. so fans from both towns could see both the girls' and boys' games.

Since the Wolverines won on Thursday, they got to play Jal for the boys district tourney title game at Jal on Saturday -- that game was set for 7 p.m.

A goodly number of Texico fans, including several members of the girls team, took the trek to Jal for the Saturday night game, so it was probably good to make the time changes.

About nine Jal fans came here for the girls' game. Jal will go to Region C for play this weekend.

The first two minutes of the girls' game were a classic, as one player -- Elizabeth Richards -- basically defeated the entire Jal team.

Here is how the first 2 minutes and 40 seconds went: Richards scored a layup for Texico to lead 2-0. Richards stole the ball.

Richards put in a rebound basket to make it 4-0. Richards tries a 3-pointer that was in and out of the bucket.

Richards inbounded the ball after a Jal turnover. Richards rebounded a missed Jal shot.

Richards hit a layup as Texico now led 6-0. Richards stole the ball.

Farwell City Council -- Three council posts, held by Ysleta Kittrell, Don Geris and Wayne Gruben, are on the ballot. As of Monday, only Mrs. Kittrell had signed up for re-election.

Farwell School Board -- Two posts, held by David Norton and Mark Schwertner, are on the ballot. So far, only Schwertner has signed up.

Lazbuddie School Board -- Two posts, held by Keith Hicks and Terry Jesko, are on the ballot. As of Monday, Hicks is the only person to have signed up to run so far.

In other business, the council:

-- Received a request from Municipal Judge Pat Howard to change all the city ordinances to increase fees for violations.

Texico city voters go to the polls on March 5 at the Texico Community Center.

There is only one race, between Roy Edwards and Jerry Cunningham for mayor. Incumbent Marie Christian is not seeking re-election.

Dean Henninger was unopposed for city judge. He was appointed to the post last year.

And the councilmen will be Monnie Cunningham and incumbents Sharon Askew and Oran Jay Autrey.

Incumbent councilman Jeff Queener did not seek re-election.

Wolverines move on up to regionals

The Texico Wolverines battled their way through district tournament action last week to gain a spot in the regional tournament this weekend.

Texico first beat Loving, 85-70. Then the Wolverines turned back Dexter, 53-43. In the district tourney title game, Texico lost to Jal, 69-63, but both teams advance to the regionals.

Against Dexter on Feb. 21, the Wolverines opened a 13-0 lead to take command. At the half, Texico's lead expanded to 32-17 on a 3-pointer by Marcos Loera.

The teams traded baskets in the 3rd quarte with both squads scoring 11 points. And Dexter was unable to make much headway in the final period, either.

Scoring for Texico were Marcos Loera, 13; Adrian Loera, 11; Johnny Rivera, 2; Logan Brown, 9; Braden Vaughan, 12; Bryce Bailey, 5, and Kyle Duncan, 1.

On Saturday, Jal and Texico went at it for the district tournament championship. Texico got into severe foul trouble, with the refs calling 34 fouls on Texico and only 17 on Jal.

But Coach Richard Luscombe said the Wolverines didn't play that well and made too many mistakes. They got down in the first half and although they

mounted a strong comeback at the end, getting to within 3 points, couldn't take it all. Texico won the second half by a point.

Marcos Loera was the big gun for Texico with the top scoring effort of his career, with 35 points. Five of those points came in the final quarter. Also scoring were Adrian Loera, 13; Kyle Duncan, 5; Mark Peabody, 2; Braden Vaughan, 1; Johnny Serano, 2, and Bryce Bailey, 5.

Both teams who play in the district tourney final advance to the regional tournament this weekend. Texico will be in the Albuquerque regional.

The Wolverines will play Hope Christian at 5 p.m. mt on Friday at the Hope Christian gym. Also in the regional are Santa Rosa and Lordsburg. The losers of the two games are out of the tournament. The winners of the two games play again on Saturday, and both advance to the state tournament the next weekend.

Texico will be a big underdog on Friday, since Hope Christian is undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the state.

Richards got an assist on a basket by Melissa Roberts scored to make it 8-0.

And that was the first 2 minutes and 40 seconds.

The only record that Jal was going for dealt with turnovers. Texico put on its patented full court press which devastated Jal. In all, Jal committed 43 turnovers - but Texico stopped its press midway through the fourth quarter.

Twenty-eight of Jal's turnovers came in the first half. That meant they turned over the ball 28 times in 16 minute a rate of almost two a minute.

Meanwhile, Texico was able to score at will as the score climbed steadily. At halftime, Texico led 41-17. Thus, if the Lady Wolverines had wanted, they probably could have defeated Jal by 60 points. Richards, Jennifer Roberts and other starters were pulled out with 2 1/2 minutes left in the game.

Scoring for Texico were Richards, 18; Jennifer Roberts, 14 (including four 3-pointers); Melissa Roberts, 8; Megan Brown, 7; Brette Hadley, 2; Carrie Rucker, 2; Ashley Kidd, 2, and Dru Mayfield, 12.

Texico hit 21 of 43 2-pointers and 6 of 17 3-pointer. The Lady Wolverines hit 5 of 10 free throw attempts.

Rebound leader was Richards with 17. She also had 10 steals to give her a triple double (along with the 18 points). Mayfield had 5 steals. Melissa Roberts led in assists with 6, and Richards had 5.

Although many people took the flu shot, these illnesses are mutant-type flues that are vaccination resistant.

Dr. Sheets wants people to understand that the difference with several

of these illnesses is that they are viral in nature and don't respond to antibiotics.

"We have to warn that one simply must ride the illness out until the virus dies," said Dr. Sheets. "You can treat and lessen the symptoms, but the virus must run its' course before it goes completely away. The good news is that you possibly won't be as susceptible to other virus attacks."

Can you handle the truth?

The brouhaha over the ice skating judging last week at the Winter Olympics brought a smile to my face.

I watched that skating on TV and, like everyone else, thought the Canadian pairs were robbed.

But I just shrugged. That's the way it has been with the Olympics for many, many years.

As a kid, I thought the Olympics were great and rooted like mad for the U.S. entrants.

But in the 1970s, I couldn't believe what I was seeing in U.S. entries, like in boxing, were kayoed by judges who obviously were blind.

That's when I realized that Communist judges and European judges were not very objective. We had many Olympians lose simply because they represented the U.S.

To be blunt, the fix was in.

Remember the U.S. Olympic men's basketball team that took it on the chin? A case in point...

So my interest in the Olympics waned rapidly once I knew it wasn't fair.

And I have followed the Olympics very little since then.

So when the skating controversy jumped up, it was like old times.

It's okay to watch the Olympics and enjoy the athletes. But you can't get hung up on the judging in events where subjectivity comes into play.

Because often the outcomes are fixed. Just like a lot of horse racing in the U.S.

You may disagree with me; you may shake your head at what I just wrote; but it's simply the truth.

Can you handle the truth?

On Sept. 11, the terrorists struck the U.S. and our nation was up in arms.

But as time has drifted by, we seem to have become more complacent, more passive.

While I know that World War III will last our lifetimes, I feel it behooves us to get started on the right foot.

Because, to be blunt, the terrorists, due to their backing by some Mideastern nations, will some day have the capability of inflicting massive harm to our country.

The goal of terrorists is to bring down the U.S., bring down the West, bring down our societies. Toward this end, they will do anything under the sun, including attacking our nuclear facilities, and waging chemical and/or biological warfare.

Right now, these are just words. But I honestly fear that these horrifying events can take place -- unless we take the offensive first.

Here's what our political leaders need to do right now:

- Organize a rebuilding of our armed forces and our clandestine agencies, like the CIA.

- Increase taxes to pay for it.

- Put together a long-range game plan to put the forces of terrorism, and the nations supporting them, on the defensive.

- Put a priority on using electric vehicles and not gas-powered cars in the major cities.

- Get the American public to fully comprehend the magnitude of the problem.

Alas, I fear none of these will occur. It always takes a tragedy to get us

off our butts. So sad.

Since the war on terrorism has begun, we have had wonderful successes. We have knocked out Afghanistan as their main staging base, and we have forestalled attacks on the U.S. thanks to great cooperation throughout the world.

That's a start. And the key word her is *start*.

When you fight terrorism, you cannot sit back and wait for them to attack. You must go after them first.

Right now, we are in a lousy position to do just that. We are too limited in our capabilities due to drawdowns in our armed forces and budget cuts to our key governmental agencies over the past decade.

I won't go into the folks who were responsible because I don't want this column to become politicized. What happened, happened. Time to move on.

Suffice it to say we are okay in a limited fight, like in Afghanistan. But large scale warfare? I don't think so.

And World War III calls for large scale warfare.

It's one thing for us to declare an Axis of Evil. It's another to do something about it.

This is a war for our way of life. It needs to be THE priority. We must focus on it, and do what is needed to win it.

That means agreeing to some tough measures. I fear that most politicians, and plain folks, too, think short-term and not long-range. Thus, our problem.

The terrorist fanatics don't care about killing millions of Americans. In their twisted, warped minds, that's a good

thing.

This is what we are dealing with. Yes, they can be stopped, but in order to do so we must be very aggressive.

I pray that our leaders understand the magnitude of the problem and won't be afraid to take the measures necessary.

It's the optimism in me.

As always, congratulations are in order for the Sudan-Dimmitt-Springlake-Earth-Nazar-eth-Lubbock Lady Hornets.



Stratford tops Steers at Area

The Farwell Steers lost to the Stratford Elks, 66-54, in the Area championship game at Amarillo on Saturday.

The Steers finished a successful season with a 26-7 record, a district title and a Bi-District trophy. Stratford was 17-8 after this game.

The game was close until there were six minutes left in the final quarter. Over the next four minutes, Farwell missed all its shots while Stratford went on a 13-point run. And that was all she wrote.

Scoring for Farwell were Grant Gregory, 2; Gage Gregory, 19; Tucker Crawford, 17; Taylor Nichols, 9, and Thomas Ortiz, 7.

Farwell took an early lead at 3-2 on a 3-pointer by Crawford. Both teams were tense and recorded a pair of turnovers apiece. Stratford took a 7-3 lead before Crawford hit a jumper. But Crawford responded with a 7-point run, taking a 14-5 lead as Farwell was missing its outside shots. Gage Gregory hit a couple of free throws and Ortiz had a layup but the Elks took an 18-10 lead into the second quarter.

Farwell got a break early in the 2nd quarter when the Elks' big center Skyler Walden went out with three fouls. And a full court press took its toll, causing four turnovers by Stratford early in the quarter. At 5:12, Farwell regained the lead on a free throw by Ortiz, 19-18. Gage Gregory led the 2nd quarter charge with 8 points, as he worked hard under the basket.

The 3rd quarter started with the Elks up, 25-23: After a rebound bucket by Gage Gregory, Crawford nailed a 3-pointer (he had three for the game) that allowed Farwell to take a 1-point lead. At 5:35, Farwell held its last lead at 30-29 on a rebound bucket by Gage Gregory again.

It was at this time that Walden returned, and his presence was shown immediately as he canned three baskets to give Stratford a 43-35 lead. Walden finished with 22 points. But Farwell battled back in the last minute, shrinking that lead to 44-42 on a driving layup by Gage Gregory, free throws by Crawford and a jumper by Ortiz.

But Walden continued to hit his buckets. After a jumper by Ortiz at 6:15, the Steers were only back by two points, 47-45. Four minutes later, it was 60-45. A layup by Crawford broke Stratford's run but it was too late. Stratford missed five free throw attempts in the last two minutes but Farwell was unable to dent the margin as it missed its shots from the field.

New rules could cause problem

From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.:

New rules announced for the 2002 crop year could pose a significant problem for producers who do not receive sufficient moisture to establish their primary crop and wish to shift their acreage to a secondary crop.

The rule, which doubles the number of days a producer must wait after the final planting date of the crop to receive an appraisal, will essentially have the effect of preventing a growers from establishing a secondary crop on their acreage.

Previous rulings by RMA had set the waiting period for cotton in Texas at 15 days following the final planting date for the crop with the understanding that any rainfall during that period would necessitate a further evaluation period to determine if it was sufficient to germinate the seed.

If no rain fell during the fifteen (15) day period the producer was able to get an appraisal as early as the sixteenth day. This process would allow producers a short window in which to get back in the field and plant an appropriate second crop in a timely manner.

For 2002, however, RMA has changed that procedure in a significant manner. Under the new rule a producer will be unable to schedule an appraisal until 30 days after the primary crops final planting date. The

ultimate effect of the rule would be to deny a grower the opportunity to insure a secondary crop.

The old adage, "If it looks like a duck, quacks like a duck and walks like a duck, then it probably is a duck", seems to hold true in this case.

The new rule appears to be a backdoor attempt to deny secondary coverage on crops planted after the failure of a primary crop because of drought without going through the process of simply putting in a rule that says - "No secondary coverage allowed on crops planted after the loss of a primary crop due to drought".

Implementation of the rule in this manner poses many potential problems for both producers trying to make sound management decisions for their operations as well as for RMA.

Plains Cotton Growers has been in contact with RMA about this situation and is working with them to find a solution to the problem it presents. Contact has also been made with representatives of the House Agriculture Committee in order to further the effort of finding a workable solution to the issue.

Parmer County in 'priority area'

From Earl Behrends, soil conservationist in Farwell: Parmer County is included in a "priority area" involved in a government cost share signup program (EQIP) that is targeted towards producers who are considering installing irrigation practices.

This includes installing underground pipeline, drip irrigation, converting sprinkler packages that would help conserve the underground water.

The signup ends March 29. Program benefits are: cost share up to 75 percent of the cost of the practice possible; maximum cost share for each producer is \$50,000; and contracts range from 5 to 10 years.

5 Area Co-op members hear top-notch financial report

An outstanding financial report was given at the annual membership meeting on Saturday of Five Area Telephone Cooperative.

Total revenue for 2001 was \$3,331,479, as opposed to total expenses of \$2,130,289. The allocable margin for 2001 was \$869,588.

All three incumbent directors up for election were re-elected: District 5, Maple -- John Furgeson over R.R. Kendall Jr.; District 6, Bula -- Wayne Swart over Larry Clawson; and District 7, Lehman, Jon Gandy over Harley Adams.

General Manager Sandy Vandevender announced that in order to help folks within the cooperative area whose children will be leaving Three Way School when it closes in June and attend Sudan School, co-op members in Needmore (District 4), Bula (District 6) and Sudan will be able to call each other without paying long distance charges. This plan will go into effect this spring.

Vandevender also reported that the cooperative board was working on plans to give up to half of the capital credit to spouses of deceased members. Folks need to call the co-op for full details.

The GM also talked about the wireless internet broadband access services expanding throughout the cooperative's service area. And this was begun before the state mandate.

The cooperative paid 2001 property taxes in seven counties, including Parmer -- \$8,939.10.

The cooperative is continuing to grow into a full service telecommunications provider, and it now serves about 1,600 customers. In 1990, Plateau Wireless was begun, and it now has 19,000 customers. Five Area Internet was established in 1996, and now has 1,500 customers. Five Area Paging was started in 1996, too, and now has 100 customers.

After the meeting, door prizes were given away, and a free lunch was catered.

The four teens allegedly assaulted a Farwell youth in his front yard two weeks ago. The Farwell boy required stitches in his head after the attack.

LIVE CATTLE: April Live Cattle turned trends down this week when support at \$75.65 was taken out. Prices should correct downward for another week or so before finding a short term bottom. The most likely support should come in around \$73.00. If this level holds, then look for another move higher from mid March into early April. New highs are possible, but we'll see?

FEDER CATTLE: Although feeder trends have been down for several weeks now, odds are that prices will follow fed cattle prices back higher into early April? The feeders have slowed their declines this week and the possibility of another \$1.00 down from here should catch prices. There are some concerns about the Johnson Amendment, but overall, supplies should remain relatively tight.

CORN: This market just can't decide what it wants to do next? The seasonal tendency should be for steady to higher prices into the April/May time frame, but it may take some adverse weather in the Mid West to perk this market up? If December 2002 prices can reach \$2.50 (about 15 cents from here), then add a fairly good basis and lock up some cash. A Call Option should cover the topside.

SOYBEANS: March beans are still trading inside a huge sideways trend between the November high and the January low. Until prices move above this range, odds favor a quiet market. There will soon be more focus on weather and planting in the Mid West. For now, prices may pull back down into next week before turning back higher. Trends are still basically higher from here.

WHEAT: The March Chicago Wheat is still attempting to turn back up from support levels, but the Kansas City Wheat has already made the turn back higher on short term charts. There's not much out there in the way of news aside from extremely dry weather in Kansas and Oklahoma. This has done little to support prices, but a winter storm expected next week should help some?

COTTON: Prices broke long term support levels this week which has made the possibility of higher prices slim to none? There may still be some seasonal strength into the March/April time frame, but much will depend on a new Farm Bill and weather. This was a significant blow to the market this week and it will take some very positive fundamental news to turn this market back higher.



Groundbreaking set for housing project; Clovis area annexation rumors put to rest

The recent uproar over unsubstantiated rumors of Clovis annexing areas near Texico made its way to Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

Clovis City Manager Raymond Mondragon and Clovis city attorney David Richards stressed that recent city decisions involving extra-territorial rights were simply aimed at having new subdivisions built within one mile of Clovis meet Clovis standards, such as with fire, curbs and gutters and road right of ways.

Beyond that, subdivisions will continue to meet county regulations, but the city will set right of ways for subdivision streets so they will line up correctly.

Mondragon emphasized that the extra-territorial zoning rules have nothing to do with taking anyone's land, and has nothing to do with animals that people keep.

He explained that the extra-territorial rules don't affect land for grazing or farming, or of land sales to family members. Extra-territorial zoning does not mean taking land, controlling livestock, does not regulate farms and dairies and doesn't cover existing subdivisions.

Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper asked why Clovis is going out five miles with extra-territorial zoning. Richards responded that the state legislature mandated that distance for all cities in New Mexico over 25,000 popula-

tion. Clovis has no say-so on that.

"Nothing really changes for the area near Texico," said Mondragon. "County regulations still govern."

City Councilman Jeff Queener asked how close Clovis can come to Texico. Harris said there are no rules on how much land a municipality can annex as long as city services can be provided. "Clovis has no plans to annex anything," he added.

And Mondragon again said that Clovis is not into annexation or zoning issues...it's about subdivision regulations, especially dealing with street right of ways.

In other business, the council had a lengthy discussion with Jonathon Reed, the developer of the housing project going in on the Burrows property, and representatives of the Eastern Plains Housing Development Corporation (EPHDC), which will be managing the project.

The 20-unit townhouses will be built at the northwest corner of Garwood Street and Avenue F. Groundbreaking is set for April 1, with a completion date of 7 1/2 months later, said Reed.

Reed had planned to use hardy plank, a concrete-type material, but Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said, on behalf of the council, that they wanted stucco used, as had been discussed in earlier plans. Reed said the plank was cheaper to put in, and a better material. But he indicated he would go along with Autrey's request.

Fire Chief Cooper said that the water pressure at the hydrants near the project won't have the gallons per minute pressure needed for adequate fire protection. But he said the city has a pumper truck available. So when the project engineer, Lydick & Associates, puts in the final request for approval, he will note that the truck will help out. The city has agreed to extend the main water line to Avenue F, at which time the developer will build onto it. It is likely that fire insurance costs will be higher.

Engineer Chad Lydick said water runoff will go north, and should not be a problem for anyone. A need to extend the fence around the project was stressed to keep out blowing debris from nearby fields.


The project plans provide for a gym, tot lot, basketball court, computer center, and community building, it was said.

When the project originally was approved, Eastern Plains Council of Governments had agreed to manage it. But EPCOG dropped out so EPHDC took over. The two agencies are separate.

Sandra Hidalgo, EPHDC executive director, said her organization was begun in 1993 and has developed over \$10 million worth of projects in seven counties. Currently, they manage over 200 units.


Folks renting the units will have to sign contracts which includes a zero tolerance policy for drugs ("one strike and they are out"). Also, junked cars and loud music won't be tolerated. And if anyone in a household commits a criminal act, the family is moved out, said EPHDC officials.

The council also discussed city hall building plans -- finances are being looked at; and summer help -- government aid programs are being looked into.
