






Ordinances proposed to help regulate loud music, projectiles

On June 18, the Farwell City Council received drafts of two proposed ordinances from Police Chief Robert Achterberg.

The ordinances are expected to be acted upon at a future council meeting. The ordinances need to be checked first with state officials to make sure they don't supercede state regulations.

One ordinance pertains to the abatement of loud noises within the city, and is directed at folks who play any music or have vehicles that are so loud that it causes a disturbance.

The ordinance reads that "the following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing, and unnecessary noises in violation of this section...'

1) The playing of any radio, compact disc player, cassette player, phonograph, or any electrical or mechanical device, which emits sound, of the playing of a musical instrument in the city in such a manner, or with such a volume, as to disturb the peace, quiet, comfort, or repose of persons of ordinary sensibilities. This provision shall not apply to church bells or chimes.

2) The use of any auto, motorcycle, bus, or other vehicle so out of repair, or loaded, or operated in such a manner as to create loud or unnecessary noises such as spinning or squealing tires, grating, grinding, rattling, or other noise.

3) The keeping of any animal or fowl which emits or makes a loud and raucous noise.

The penalties for conviction of one of these offenses

would be a fine up to \$500. The other ordinance deals with weapons or instru-

ments that propel a missile of any type. "Except as otherwise provided herein, it shall be un-

lawful for any person to discharge any firearm, air rifle, BB gun, bow and arrow, pellet gun, sling shot, blow gun, cannon or rifle (this does not include fireworks). But the following will be allowed:

1) Using firearms at a firing range for target practice

by police or certified security guards.

2) A person lawfully defending their person or property or the person or property of another in accordance with the law.

3) Using a firearm by a member of the armed forces or the state engaged in his official duties.

4) Using blank cartridges during a military funeral or

ceremonial event in a safe manner. 5) Using a firearm by a gunsmith for test purposes in

accordance with precautions set by the police chief. 6) Using an air rifle or pellet gun in an enclosed shooting gallery or fair booth in a way where injuries to



Recipe of the Week

SEAFOOD BURRITOS

- 8 8-inch flour tortillas
- 1 10-ounce jar taco sauce 2 teaspoons chili powder 1 pound crab-flavored
- surimi seafood, flake or chopped chunk style 1 large, ripe tomato, diced ½ cup green pepper, finely
- 2 green onions, finely diced ounces shredded Monterey Jack or mild Cheddar cheese shredded lettuce, optional guacamole, optional sour cream, optional

Preheat oven to 35 degrees F. Wrap tortillas in foil and heat 10 minutes to soften. Meanwhile, mix half of taco sauce with

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chili powder; toss with surimi seafood, tomato, green pepper and green onion to make filling. Remove tortillas from oven, spread 1/8 of filling just below center of each tortilla. and sprinkle with a heaping tablespoon of cheese. Fold bottom of tortilla up to partially cover filling; fold in sides to



LIVE CATTLE: Short & long range trends are still pointing higher. A close below \$63.30 would turn short term trends down basis the August contract. Markets are a little "overbought" around this level and a correction is not out of the question. Short term targets are \$64.85-65.20. Long term targets are \$69.00-69.50 basis August. A close below \$60.00 and everything will turn down again.

FEEDER CATTLE: Long term trends are higher, but short term charts are down. Support below lies around \$75.50-76.00. A close back above the \$78.40 level should push prices back up toward the \$80 level. The seasonal tendency is also for higher prices into mid to late July before correcting back lower. Prices should be higher into the Fall, but we'll have to give the market some time.

CORN: Long term trends turned higher in late May and have remained higher. Short term trends are at best sideways. Any significant change in weather could push prices higher from current levels. Odds are that prices will not move much lower than major support levels around \$2.15 basis the December contract until pollination is complete. The risk will be to the upside until August.

SOYBEANS: Short term trends are down and long term trends are topping. The soybeans have seen enough move up that weather may have little effect. A rally in wheat & corn could possibly pull prices higher. A close back about \$5.00 basis the nearby July contract would turn short term trends back higher. Seasonally, prices are generally looking for a top around the 4th of July.

WHEAT: Short and long term trends are still pointing higher, but the market seems to be struggling up around these levels. If July KC Wheat can close above the \$2.17 resistance level, short term chart will project up into the \$3.20 area. Any further shortfalls in production could possibly move prices even higher toward the \$3.40-3.50 level basis the nearby July con-

COTTON: Prices exploded on Thursday when export numbers were much higher than expected. Buy stops help fuel prices higher. Short and long term trends are still pointing higher, but both are becoming extremely "overbought" which may signal an end to the move over the short term. Prices have a shot at the 48-50 cent level basis the December contract over the next couple of weeks.

Texico okays higher police pay raises

The Texico City Council on Tuesday voted 3-1 to give the police depart- indicating the city would ment the pay raises need to raise its water sought by Chief Kelley Brophy.

Opposed was councilman Oran Jay Autrey, who wanted to wait until all the city department and Kindred. heads presented their pay raise proposals.

Instead, the other department chiefs (city clerk Teresa Harth and city street Supt. Clarence Smith) will make their cases later for better pay raises.

The council had already granted 3 percent pay hikes for all employees.

But Brophy asked for higher pay hikes for his department. At the last council meeting, he had presented a budget with deep cuts in the nonsalary items in order to propose better salary raises.

The new rates are: police officer, \$11.06 an hour; senior patrolman, \$12,24 an hour; and chief, \$15.64 an hour.

cer was hired at the last meeting at a rate of \$10.21 an hour.

Brophy said he only sought \$1,800 more than was in last year's budget for his department in order to achieve the pay hikes he wanted.

He noted that two of his officers don't need city insurance, saving the city about \$10,000.

But Autrey asked what happens if one of them leaves and their replacement doesn't have his own insurance.

After Brophy asked for those hikes, other city employees asked about higher pay hikes, too.

Mrs. Harth noted her new budget is \$12,300 less, for example, too.

And Smith said he can leave out \$25,000 from his budget for a new vehicle.

Councilman Scioli led the push to approve Brophy's request. Autrey also noted he

concerned about costs involving repairs to the city water wells.

Smith presented a report saying repairs are needed now to both wells. The Lions Park well will need heavy repairs.

In other business, the council:

-- Accepted the annual audit by Sandra Rush, for 2000-2001

The audit showed the general fund "in the black" for its expenses vs. income for the year.

But she said the water fund ran a \$6,000 deficit, rates.

-- Approved a variance for Sean Wootton to place an 18'x80' 1999 single wide mobile home at State

-- Was told that Fire Chief Lewis Cooper had given the produce stand across from city hall 10 days to correct its violations (mostly electrical).

-- Discussed the problem of having no one to inspect new businesses. Autrey said the fire department didn't want to do

-- Heard that the new antique shop in the Rip's building will be called "Ruby's."

-- Heard Brophy report that he had gotten a trailer for the Border Town Days parade for the senior citizens club to ride on. This helps celebrate Texico's 100th anniversary.

And Mrs. Harth said the banners have been ordered.

-- Heard Autrey say he The newest police offi- would try and contact the man who applied for the city inspector post.

But there is a question on how much money the city has for this proposed position.

-- Heard Scioli report that he would discuss building plans for a new city hall at the next council meeting.

-- Discussed a request from Charlotte Bomar to place a trailer on Hereford Street behind Master Tech. The trailer (12'x60')

is below the city minimum, so it would need an addition. So it was tabled, pending a final plan to be presented.

-- Okayed Brophy buying a new police vehi-

The city still owes \$19,000 on the last one bought, and this will be paid off in July. This leaves \$4,000 in the police budget, which would be used for a down payment on the new one, with the rest financed.

This is how the last vehicle was bought, too.

-- Allowed Brophy to buy light bars for two vehicles, costing about \$2,100, and body armor, costing about \$4,500. State and federal grants will pay for part of these costs.

-- Heard Brophy report that Clovis has donated its animal control vehicle to Texico, and that deputy Wayne Atchley, a certified animal control officer, will operate it.

Brophy said the vehi-

cle needs minor repairs. The city accepted the donated vehicle.

-- Received three applications for summer employment, from Adam Garcia, Ronnie Autrey and Chase Bradley.



Pay raise turned down


Texico Police Officer John Mares has turned down his pay raise.






