

Carver, of Amarillo, is one of 14 co-owners, with most of them living in the Friona area.

Part of the Wesley Barnett property has been purchased. The exact address is 2101 FM 1172.

Carver said the dairy will employ 35 fulltime employees and have an annual payroll of about \$1.1 million. The total annual operating budget is projected to be between \$10 million and \$11 million.

He said the facility will add about \$6.2 million of real property value to the tax roles and about personal \$175,000 of property value.

The general contractor -will be Mason Dairy Contractors, of Amarillo.

Carver estimated that at least 15 new families will move into the area to buy or rent homes so they will be close to their new employment.

The dairy has hired Enviro Ag Engineering, of Amarillo, to help design waste management so as to comply with state rules.

The proposed dairy meets or exceeds all county regulations dealing with tax abatement, so it would appear that it will receive the normal tax abatements given new companies after the process is completed.

No public hearing is needed to grant a tax abatement because the commissioners already have voted to grant it to all qualified companies in the county (outside city limits).

The only controversial point that emerged during the discussion by the commissioners dealt with the need to build a halfmile road to the facility and two homes. The question was whether to have a public road built -- by the county or by the dairy; or whether the dairy would build its own private road. A caliche road would be needed for the semi-

away.

In March, the Parmer County Commissioners approved exempting certain travel trailers from ad valorem taxes. Well, forget that...

At the time, County Judge Bonnie Clayton said the state legislature had inadvertantly put on a new tax, so counties were having to exempt certain trailers from it.

But at Monday's commissioners' meeting, Judge Clayton said she had just received a memo from the Texas Association of Counties that said their earlier advice on exempting the travel trailers was wrong.

A constitutional amendment approved in 2001 authorized the legislature to adopt a general law giving taxing authorities, other than school districts, authority to exempt the trailers.

The legislature adopted a bill to implement the constitutional amendment. But the bill's language did the opposite of what the legislature intended. Rather than allowing taxing units to exempt certain travel trailers, the bill actually prohibits the exemption.

The governor has said this problem will be corrected during the next legislative session. Until the statute is changed, counties and other taxing units may not grant exemptions.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Re-appointed Ronald Byrd to the Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corp. as a director to represent Parmer County's interests.

-- Rescheduled the next meeting to May 29 due to the Memorial Day holiday.

-- Discussed, but took no action, on installing cattle guards on a couple of roads in western Parmer County due to cattle getting loose.

-- Opened bids from the surplus property sales. Winners were: 1977 truck, Lyden Ward, \$710; 1985 Ford pickup, Carl Osborn, \$1,600; 1985 Dodge, Mike Lamb, \$1,510; 1986 Blazer, Charles Aycock, \$1,825; and Crown Victoria, Mike Lamb, \$2,791. All were high bidders. The 1966 Ford tractor was not sold -- bids were too low.

trucks.

If the road is opened to the public, a petition process will be needed.

Carver was asked to meet with county commissioner for that precinct, Kirk Frye, later to discuss the best way to

in. The hole was actually a 5-foot deep underground storage bin that had recently been cleaned out.

The Allen's covered the pit with the cover and lowered food and water down to the bear. Then they contacted the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Amarillo. They would have to wait until Monday to remove the bear.

The wildlife authorities tranquilized the bear to immobilize him and three men lifted it through the hole. Three more men moved it into a stock trailer.

It was determined that this was a male black bear with a cinnamon face. It weighed approximately 200 pounds.

The bear was looked over and then taken to a large private ranch in the Panhandle where it was released. The ranch is home to another black bear and the owners don't mind the bears being on their ranch.

Black bears are rare to the Texas Panhandle, but aren't unheard of due to the drought conditions in New Mexico. The bears are wandering over the state lines in search of food and water. Bears are a protected species in Texas and cannot be legally killed.

A bear was illegally shot last year in Dalhart.



Farwell Centennial will be in 1905

With the announcement that the theme for Border Town Days this year would be Texico's 100th anniversary, the question quickly arose: When will Farwell's Centennial be?

So the Tribune turned to Parmer County Historical Commission Chairman Hugh Moseley for assistance. And he had the answer: 1905. According to Moseley:

The Farwell townsite was surveyed in early September 1905 by W.D. Howren, of Amarillo. Before his surveying party could proceed with its work, it was necessary to burn off the native grass which was about four feet high over the entire area.

Howren stated that there were a number of blue quail and some antelope in the area at that time. The surveying crew camped east of the townsite at a windmill known as "Little Joe."

Texico, Farwell's Twin City, was at that time a thriving village with three stores, a church and five saloons. The population of Texico in 1905 was about 300 hundred.

Immediately after completing his surveying of the town of Farwell, Howren proceeded to survey the remaining lands in Parmer County.

Also, the Farwell Post Office was established Dec. 26, 1906, with Minnie Burton as postmaster.

LIVE CATTLE: Short term trends turned down this week after cash traded \$3 higher at \$68.00. This is basically the first correction we've seen since prices bottomed on April 25th. This is a normal process, but it brings out fears that prices may continue to fall? Cash and demand remain strong, but prices will need to hold this correction and trade back to new highs to confirm a major low.

FEEDER CATTLE: Short term trends are down again as feeders follow the Live Cattle prices. Cash has shown some improvements in some parts of the country while lagging in other parts. The back month Live Cattle prices are going to need to show some significant improvements if feeder prices are to hold their current gains. Look for this pull-back to hold and new highs will be very important.

CORN: Short term trends are higher, but a close above the \$2.07 level basis the July contract is needed to turn long term trends up. Long term trends have remained in a downtrend since turning lower last September. Planting delays in the Eastern Corn Belt has been supportive, but not enough to convincingly break-out to the upside. Weather could begin a move up?

SOYBEANS: Prices have had a sharp rally this week as export business has continued to outpace last year's numbers. Short term trends remain higher and the market has continued to trade inside a wide trading range. A break above \$4.85 basis the July contract still projects a move up towards the \$5.00 level. Weather will be the focus over the next 30-60 days.

WHEAT: Short term trends remain higher and long term indicators are at level which could indicate a continued move up into harvest. Very seldom do wheat prices move higher during this time of the year. Normally, prices move lower into harvest. On those rare occasions that prices have moved up during harvest, the moves up have been huge?

COTTON: Short and long term trends are still down in the cotton. Today's USDA Crop Production report may help to support prices over the short term if exports are stronger than expected? Overall, unless anticipated production numbers are decreased, prices are expected to remain under pressure over the next couple of months. Demand and weather will be the focus.

Do you have moths invading your space? You're not alone.

Moths!

The army cutworm moth is typical of the moths commonly observed. The female lays her eggs directly onto soil. They seem to be attracted to bare areas such as overgrazed pastures, alfalfa stubble, stressed grassy areas, and newly planted or tilled cropland.

The most prominent trait of the army cutworm moth is its migration pattern. Adults emerge in May and early June and feed on a variety of nectar-bearing flowering plants. These moths gradually migrate westward toward the mountains and continue to feed on available nectar sources as they ascend in elevation.

As they move westward, they rest during the day in dense vegetation or seek shelter in garages, attics and living areas of houses, and can become a nuisance pest


During outbreak years, tremendous numbers of these moths can congregated around buildings and in residential areas. Moths may remain in these areas for several days, feeding on local nectar sources. However, when temperatures begin to warm consistently and flowering of major plants in the area has ceased, the moths will move westward to higher elevations offering cooler temperatures and new sources of food.

The moths spend the summer in the Rocky Mountains and in late August and September they return to the plains to mate and deposit eggs.

Control of these moths is difficult. Direct spray contact gives the best results but the treatment must be repeated. It seems if you kill one moth, two take its place. Light management may help. Keep outside lights around doorways and windows to a minimum, draw the curtains, and keep unused lights off.

Warmer temperatures will move them out of the area. I am ready for summer!





State Police said the vehicle was Hollman eastbound in the westbound lane.


Both drivers received serious internal injuries and were taken to Amarillo hospitals.

Farm Bill details given

From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.:

The President's signature on the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 fully sets in motion the already shifting tide of implementation. The U.S. Department of Agriculture officials have been working proactively to develop implementation procedures for those provisions that have long appeared to be destined for final inclusion and the Bill.

Other features of the Bill will require the dusting off and updating of rules governing delivery of direct and counter-cyclical program payments.

Work is also underway to use the additional funding allotted for conservation programs like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program.

Two new provisions that will not see implementation until 2003 are the Conservation Security Program and the Adjusted Gross Income Payment eligibility cap.

One new set of statistics that growers should get used to keeping up with is the Average Price Received by Growers will provide the monthly marketings and average price received for each program commodity.

The resulting 12-month (marketing year) weighted average price will then be used to determine the availability of counter-cyclical payments under the Bill. These numbers will also be used in the calculation of the final CC payment rate.

For cotton, the marketing year will begin Aug. 1 of the year the crop is harvested and end July 31 of the following year. For the 2002 crop, the counter-cyclical payment rate will be determined using the Aug. 1, 2002 through July 31, 2003 marketing year. To see how the Average Price Received by Growers has tracked during the 2001-crop marketing year, see the table below:







Texico submits budget with \$200,000 deficit; but carryover funds keep the city "in the black"

The Texico City Council on Tuesday granted pay raises of \$671 for all city employees.

The raises are part of a budget that is being submitted to the state for approval. That budget shows a \$200,00 deficit.

But the council explained that they also submitted last year's budget showing a similar \$200,000 deficit. But because of funds carried over at the end of the fiscal year, Texico remains "in the black."

City Clerk Teresa Harth noted that at the end of April, the city still showed \$650,000 in its budget. Given normal operating expenses of \$200,000 per month, this means that the city will have a carryover of roughly \$250,000 when it enters the new fiscal year on July 1.

And it was also noted that just because the city has projects in its budget doesn't mean it's going to spend the money -- especially if there is a shortfall. For example, the proposed budget has \$25,000 allocated for a new pickup for the street department. It doesn't mean the city will buy the truck.

In other business, the council:

-- Held an executive session to discuss personnel and litigation at the request of City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter.

-- Received two bids for office furniture -- from Holland's Office Supply, Clovis, for \$7,099; and from Source 1, Albuquerque, for \$5,376. Holland's bid was accepted after Mrs. Harth noted that Holland's is helpful with service to City Hall.

-- Told Fire Chief Lewis Cooper to go ahead and spend between \$1,000 and \$1,900 from the fire fund for bunker gear.

-- Heard Cooper ask that internet service be provided at the fire station. The council gave him the goahead to look into this. Funds to do so would come from the fire department.

-- Approved a backyard fence permit for 620 Garwood St. (Ruthie Painter).

-- Received three bids to do the annual audit. At Mrs. Harth's recommendation, the bid of Sandra Rush was accepted. She has done the audit the past two years. City personnel used a state farm to give points to each bidder, and Mrs. Rush scored best.

-- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say that Lydick Engineers will write the specifications for a new water well at the cemetery.

-- Discussed the city's Centennial. Autrey said he has talked with Ann Duncan, of the Senior Citizens, about the group being on a float in the Border Town Days parade. The group would enjoy it.

Also, Mrs. Harth will see if some funds are available so that banners could be made.

-- Received a list of 35 low-hanging trees over streets and other trees branching out onto city right-ofways. Letters will be sent to property owners asking that the problems be taken care of.

-- Was told that the developer of the apartment project being built on South Garwood will use stucco on the buildings as the council has directed -- but will drop the ball courts.

The council is not happy about that since both were promised when plans were first presented, said Autrey. Rutter will send a letter to the developer insisting on both -- stucco siding on the buildings, plus a ball court.

-- Was told that a mobile home that was to be de-

Little will be finishing up his administrator requirements this summer. He replaces David Hutton, who has resigned to take a job in Texas for a year so he qualifies for a Texas educational pension.

Also hired were Shelly Tate as an elementary teacher, filling the spot vacated by Kay Singleterry's retirement; and Sean Wootton, from Santa Rosa, who will teach secondary science and coach. Science teacher John Erwin has a job added to his workload, that of being assistant athletic director.

Two youths were hired to work this summer. Zane Drager will work at the ag farm, since ag teacher Tod Pinnell will be working on his master's degree. And Mark Foust will help Texico Junior High Principal Rick Stanley with computers.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard that PNM Gas has given a \$2,00 grant to upgrade the science lab. Erwin had applied for this grant successfully.

-- Adjusted the school calendar. Originally, there was to be no school on Oct. 7 and 8 for the ENMU State Fair. But the dates sent Texico were wrong. Now, the "no school" days will be Sept. 30 and Oct. 1.

-- Hired Sandra Johnson to do the annual audit.

-- Will have a special meeting next week to finalize the budget. Some federal grant money may be available so this will be checked into before that meeting. As for pay

raises, the board is waiting on the state to set things; the governor plans to call a special session on this.

Supt. R.L. Richards reported a strong growth in the district's tax base, about \$1 million.

-- Reviewed the CTBS test scores. Richards said he was pleased with the results but will analyze them further. A report of the scores will be sent to parents.

The Texico Wolverine basketball team will have a car wash on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Texico Fire Department.


