# New county jail plans presented

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday moved ahead on plans to build a new county jail.

They met with representatives of Archatyle Group, of Leawood, Kan., which they had hired to put together

The architectural firm showed a diagram detailing a 48-bed jail to be built on county-owned property directly north of the current jail. They proposed that the current jail be torn down after the new jail was built. The building also would house the sheriff's department offices.

The firm proposed using stucco as a veneer over the walls which would be constructed of concrete and masonry. That way it would aesthetically complement the county courthouse.

The commissioners asked the firm to put together a projection of operating budget and debt service. In other words, the commissioners want to know how they would pay for the new jail and what its monthly upkeep would cost. The facility is estimated to cost close to \$2 million.

The commissioners also want the plans "fine-tuned" to allow some more space for other county offices. Currently using county courthouse space are the Justice of the Peace for the Farwell area, county probation department and the Texas Highway Department. Thus, these folks might have their offices placed in the new facility since space at the courthouse is considered "tight".

The Kansas folks are expected to return in 3 to 4 weeks with answers to the commissioners' questions.

If all goes well, construction is expected to begin within about a year.

The current jail holds 21 beds. But meeting federal jail standards is a real problem since men and women inmates must be segregated by "sight and sound." Also, it would appear that the county could hold other counties' inmates, for a fee.

- Recovery room operations - firms that claim they will recover investments or money lost in earlier scams.

"Quick and easy."

"Big, Fast Profits." "No Experience Needed."

"No Risk." "Work in the Comfort

of Your Home." "Work in Your Spare

"Learn the Secret the 'Big Boys' Don't Want You to Know."

"Absolutely Guaran-

Watch out for ads that tout seminars promising "no money down", employment ads that offer "the inside track" on govads. I simply tear up the ernment jobs and promise salaries "up to" thoumonth.

> Watch out for comsumer testimonials detailing fabulous success stories. For every success story, how many others lost their life savings?

> Beware of ads that promote "exclusive territories" to distribute namebrand merchandise, and ads for collectibles that promise overnight profits.

> Some of you folks reading this may be shaking your heads, saying nobody would fall for stuff like this. Unfortunately, many do, especially elderly folks.

Remember those scam letters from Nigeria asking for your bank account numbers so they can send you millions of dollars? Well, at least a dozen folks in the Texas Panhandle did just that.

More to watch for:

Despite claims to the contrary, there are no magic bullets or effortless ways to burn off fat. The only way to lose weight is to lower caloric intake and increase physical activity. Claims for diet products or programs that promise weight loss without sacrifice or effort are bogus.

### Linda Sides

Without going into a lengthy description of the inner-workings of the brain, this theory is perhaps best summed up in the words of one of Linda's former clients. This client had been diagnosed as having multiple personalities, but was having trouble in a college mathematics course. This client made the statement that "what confuses me, that division is the opposite of multiplication."

This statement began the process of discovery for Linda and her father, the late Jerry Fisher. Together, they began to see how clients tagged with MPD were actually persons whose minds exhibited a functional and processorial division: a division of identity, a division of labor and distinct divisions of memory.

A "normal minded" person is able to synergize functions and memories. A person with Divided Self Syndrome (DSS) cannot put these together and function normally.

Linda and her father began a journey into researching the brain for how these patients could be effectively treated in their psychotherapy practice. A distinct pattern among these patients began to emerge and the pair began to document their findings.

Linda's father passed away in 1999, leaving her to keep the research going. She made a promise to him and to herself to see their theory through to whatever end it can make it to.

She presented further information and theory at the New York 'Academy of Sciences Conference that was held in Galveston, Texas March 24 - 26, 2002 in a report entitled, "The Amygdala: The Brain's Toxicity Spectrum Analyzer."

The amygdala is a part of the Limbic system within the brain. This is related to the Hippocampus, which is related to memory. The Amygdala and the Hippocampus work in tandem to place a value on memories.

The Amygdala helps a person to react to each situation they encounter in their lifetime and to give it value to their lives. If a person were to go through a PET scan (positive emission tomography), the parts of the brain that light up during the scan are reacting to stimuli that are either chemo-attractive or chemo-repellent; i.e. pain or pleasure, reward or punishment, approach or avoid and so on.

The reports that Linda presented are unique and fascinating. "The Cerebral Cosmos: A Blueprint of Humanness" in a sense provides a human a complete plan for living and reacting to the inevitable changes and stages of living, aging and identity. It also categorizes the right and left hemispheres of the brain into 12 distinct modes. These modes directly correlate to six distinct levels of human personality.

It's a very deep subject, but one that, once Linda enthusiastically explains the core ideas, is truly incredible.

But how, you might be asking, did a farming/ranching wife from Farwell, Texas get so involved in all of this?

Identity is perhaps the biggest key to answering this about Linda.


Linda knows that there are many things for her to consider before she takes the next step too.


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
