







the point count by placing 1st through 6th.


Seventh and 8th graders also entered and had their own category. Farwell Junior High finished 3rd for these two grades.

Cemetery board revitalized

The Texico City Council on Nov. 26 was told that five persons have volunteered to serve on the cemetery board.

They are Margie Crooks, Laurie Goforth, Lynn McDaniel, Marcia Leavell and Oran Jay Au-

The group is expected to be confirmed at the next council meeting.

In other business, the council:

-- Agreed to have just one meeting in December, as is the tradition: on the 10th.

-- Allowed Lewis Foster to move in mobile homes at 511 and 521 Florence St.

-- Heard Fire Chief Lewis Cooper report that one bid was received for a new fire truck, from Triple A, of Clovis, for \$251,094. The bid was accepted by the council.

-- Allowed Cooper to buy a chain saw and two reciprocating saws for the fire department, plus tables for the fire station.

-- Heard Cooper say that there was only one entrance to Mesquite Village, the new low-income housing development on the south side of town, although he had understood there would be more entrances.

Because of just one entrance, vehicles such as ambulance and fire trucks have to back out. He said the fence around the property needs to be cut and alleys allowed.

City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter said he would contact the developer about these concerns.

-- Heard Police Chief Kelley Brophy report that he had met with Xcel Energy officials about the need for more lighting along the highway. It will be surveyed.

-- Approved Brophy's request to seek state funds to build a separate police station. This also







LIVE CATTLE: Cash cattle prices traded at \$73.00 early Wednesday morning. Fundamentally, this market has continued to gain ground on good demand. Numbers and weights are both down compared to a year ago levels. Technically, it would be healthy to see a little downward correction into December followed by another move-up into the Spring?

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices have already exceeded earlier estimates of \$83.00 basis the January contract. The spread between feeders and fed cattle prices make some traders nervous, but this market continues to move higher. Cattle feeders may find it difficult to make an \$85 feeder work off the June Live Cattle board at \$72.00? Expect this spread to narrow between now and January.

CORN: Daily trends turned back lower this week and a re-test of the \$2.38 area is likely basis the March contract. At this time, odds favor a push below this level with prices reaching long term projects of \$2.30-2.32 before making a long term bottom? Seasonally, most harvest lows are complete by the end of December into the first week of January?

SOYBEANS: This market has remained the strongest of the grain complex with short and long term trends still pointing higher. Demand has led to strong support and although production levels this year were very good historically, demand seems to be driving prices. Very little news out of South American which would change the current direction of prices.

WHEAT: KC Wheat prices have turned short term trends back higher, but this rally has been weak at best? The seasonal tendency is strong for higher prices into the December/January time frame and demand remains strong. This market has a shot at moving back up to re-test old highs, but export demand will be the driving force. A move below \$4.00 basis the March contract would not be good?

COTTON: March cotton prices have been able to retest last Summer's highs, but have yet to penetrate. The seasonal tendency is for lower prices into late December or early January. Over time, the big picture still looks like the March contract will be able to push above the 52 cent level and possibly test the 55 cent early next year? Production is high, but quality is

RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF REGULAR SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION AND PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2 (herein the "Board" and the "District", respectively), in the County of Curry and State of New Mexico, has determined that a Regular School District Election and Capital Improvements Tax Election, (herein, the "Election") be held on February 4, 2003, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19, NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the term of office of Bruce Mayfield, Position 1; Richard Hadley, Position 2; and Deborah Autrey, Position 3, will expire on February 28, 2003.

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that 3 positions on the Board are to be filled at such election by submitting to the qualified electors of the District the names of candidates qualified to appear on the ballot for election to the positions to be filled; and

WHEREAS, the persons who desire to fill such positions on the Board shall be required to file declarations of candidacy or declarations or intent to be a write in candidate, all in accordance with Sections 1-22-1, et seq, NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 22-25-3, NMSA 1978, the Board has determined, and does hereby determine, that there should be submitted to the electorate at said Election, the question of whether or not a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of property allocated to the District under the Property Tax Code should be imposed for the property tax years of 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2006, for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE TEXICO MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2 CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BODY OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTIES OF CURRY AND ROOSEVELT AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 4th day of February, 2003, there will be held in the Texico Municipal School District No. 2, Curry County, New Mexico, a regular school district election for the purpose of submitting the names of candidates for the 3 positions to be filled on the Board to the respective qualified electors of the District and for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

Section 2. The Voting district for this Election shall be as follows:

Voting Precinct Polling Place

Nos.

Curry County: those portions of Community Center
1, 2, 30, 33 and 35 which are in the School District
Roosevelt County: those portions of
1 and 3 which are in the School District

In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established as described in Section 10 herein.

Section 3. The polls for said Election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the Election.

Section 4. At such Election, the following at large positions on the Board shall be filled by the qualified electors of the District, to-wit:

Position 1: For a four-year term starting March 1, 2003; and Position 2: For a four-year term starting March 1, 2003; and Position 3: For a four-year term starting March 1, 2003.

Section 5. A declaration of candidacy for membership on the Board to be filled at the Election shall be filled with the County Clerk of Curry, the proper filing officer, during the period commencing at 9:00 a.m., December 17, 2002, being the third Tuesday in December, and ending at 5:00 p.m. on the same day, pursuant to Section 1-22-7, NMSA 1978.

Section 6. In making a declaration of candidacy, the candidate for membership on the Board shall submit a sworn statement of intent in substantially the form provided in Section 1-22-8, NMSA 1978.

Section 7. A person who desires to be a write-in candidate for membership on the Board at such election shall file with the County Clerk of Curry County, a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate before 5:00 p.m. on December 31, 2002, being the thirty-fifty day preceding the date of the Election.

At such Election, the following question shall also be submitted to all qualified, registered electors of the District:

PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Texico Municipal School District No. 2, County of Curry, State of New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2006, for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e., erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds and purchasing computer software and hardware for student use in public school classrooms; maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District; and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular school activities?"

Section 8. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to the tax contemplated by the bond question and to any tax imposed to pay debt service on the bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e., Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10 NMSA 1978 (being Chapter 5, Laws of the New Mexico, 1975, Special Session, as amended and supplemented).

Section 9. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the Election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Curry County or Roosevelt County. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election should register during regular office

hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on January 7, 2003, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election at the office of the County Clerk of Curry County, Curry County Courthouse, 7th and Main Street, Clovis, New Mexico; or at the office of the County Clerk of Roosevelt County, Roosevelt County Courthouse, Main Street, Portales, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration office appointed by the County Clerk of Curry County or Roosevelt County, (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Curry and Roosevelt Counties) or a motor vehicle deputy registration officer as provided in Section 1-4-47, NMSA 1978.

Section 10. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner, authorized by Sections 1-6-1 et seq., NMSA 1978 and 1-6A-1, et seq.; provided, however, that pursuant to Section 1-22-19, NMSA 1978, qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Curry County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., January 10, 2003, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., January 31, 2003, being the Friday immediately prior to the Election.

Section 11. Voting shall be by voting machine, except for absentee voting which shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting machine shall be used at the polling place for each Voting District.

Commissioners continue work toward a new jail

The Parmer County Commissioners on Nov. 25 continued their deliberations over which way to go in solving their jail situation.

To recap the options:

1. Build a new jail, and the commissioners have received estimates of \$3.2 to \$3.5 million for this cost.

2. Build a separate sheriff's office, between \$560,000 and \$630,000. But this doesn't solve the the fact that the jail doesn't meet state standards and has received seven variances over the years to keep open.

3. Modify and expand the current jail, estimated to cost between \$2.4 and \$2.6 million. But the state historical society has said it won't agree to this, thus basically killing this option.

Thus, common sense

indicates the commissioners will continue to work toward construction of a new jail.

So on Nov. 25, the commissioners agreed to have its architect put together a sketch for a new jail that would cost in the

George's Gold Strike closed by police again

A police raid on Thanksgiving eve closed George's Gold Strike, one of three 8-liner businesses in Farwell.

Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries said four charges have been placed against store manager Tae S. Roper, 40, of Clovis: Keeping a gambling place, possession of gambling devices, possession of gambling paraphernalia, and gambling promotion.

Ms. Roper posted bond and was released.

Sheriff Geries said the store's two owners have charges pending -- John George Kioussis and his father, George John Kioussis, of Post, Texas.

Sheriff Geries said that in addition to seizing the machines and cash, the building was seized, too, under the gambling promotion law. Last time George's Gold Strike was closed, the building was not seized. The building seizure will stand until the courts decide.

As was the case in June, when Farwell's three 8-liner businesses were closed, it's charged that the state law involving payouts was broken. The state says "the wholesale value available from a single play of the game or device is not more than 10 times the amount charged to play the game or device once or \$5, whichever is less."

In simple terms, if you bet one credit, you cannot win more than \$5 or 10 credits. If you bet one credit and win 150 credits, for example, there's a legal issue.

Sheriff Geries used area residents to do undercover work at George's in recent week under the sheriff's department supervision. Originally, he had planned to use Department of Public Safety folks, but the DPS was too busy with other cases.

Sheriff Geries said it's alleged that the payouts at George's involved Wal Mart gift cards (equivalent to cash) and cash exceeding state legal limits.

On Nov. 27, 287th District Court Judge Gordon Green signed the papers to allow the police raid, which occurred that night.

Last summer, police raided George's Gold Strike, Border Games and Winner's Touch. Plea agreements were reached in all three cases. As part of the plea agreement with George's Gold Strike on Sept. 25, John George Kioussis pled guilty to promotion of gambling. Charges against George John Kioussis were dismissed. J.G. Kioussis was sentenced to 3 days in jail, \$500 fine, and court costs. Parmer County confiscated \$15,850 in cash; a checking account with \$18,199 in it, and 27 Wal Mart shopping card gift certificates totaling \$900.

Also as part of the plea pact with George's, 49 of the business's 50 video machines were returned to the owners with the stipulation they could not be used again in Parmer County.

Winner's Touch and Border Games have reopened, said the sheriff. He said neither is under investigation because it is believed both are just offering playbacks, in accordance with state law.




