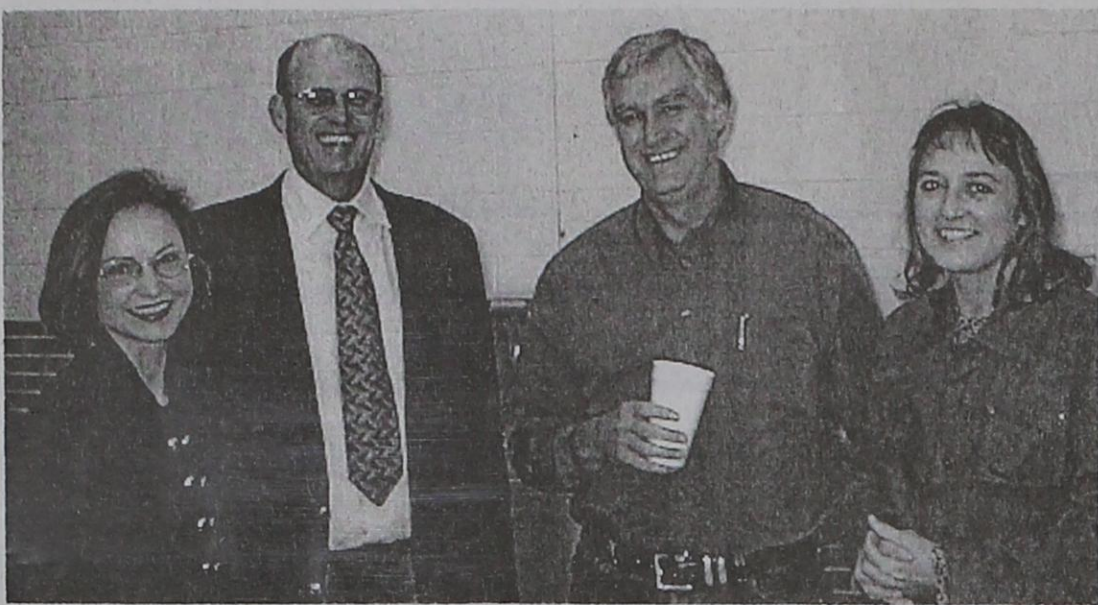
## Basketball schedule changes made

Instead the Farwell Boys will play Tulia there on Thursday with the JV game at 5:30 p.m., followed by the varsity game.

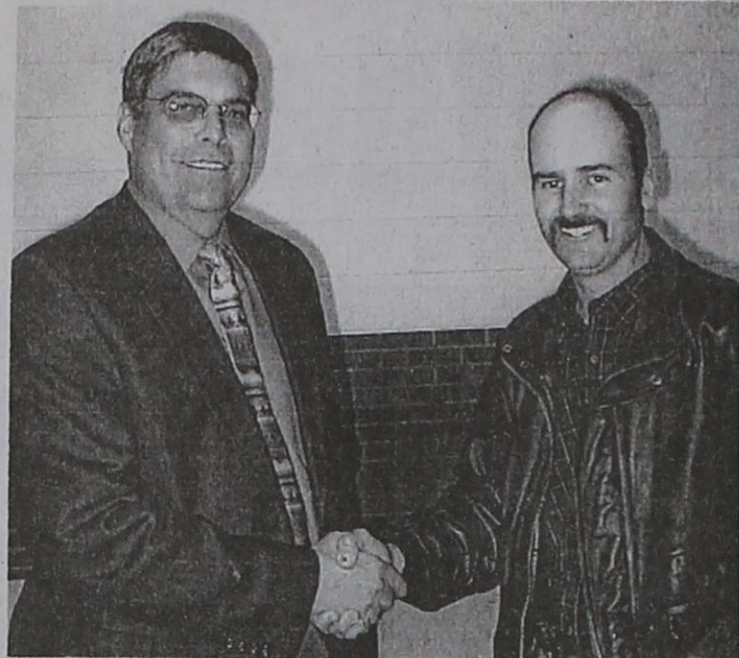

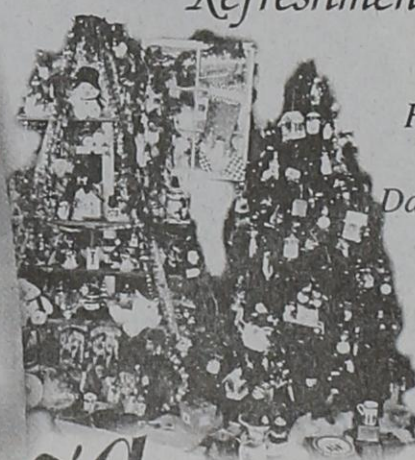

# Wolverines blank Navajo Prep

The Texico Wolverines are 10-0 on the season after winning their state quarter-final game over Navajo Prep last Saturday, 43-0.

Texico will host the state quarter-final game against Springer at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Navajo Prep, 6-4, had moved up from 6-man football to 11-man this year. Their offense basically was running off tackle, with perhaps two exceptions during the game. So Texico clogged up the middle, thus stopping the Eagles cold, although Navajo Prep did get a couple of first downs during the game.

Due to the 35-point rule, the clock "ran" starting in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter.

The Eagles opened with the ball, got a first down, then punted. On Texico's 2<sup>nd</sup> play, Adrian Loera ran 67 yards for a TD at 7:54. The Tony Clements kick made it 7-0.

The Eagles ran six more plays and punted to the Texico 20. Johnny Serrano ran for 11, then Jesse Serrano for 10. On 4<sup>th</sup> and 3, Loera gained 12 as the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter ended.

Less than a minute later, QB Braden Vaughan kept for a 36-yard TD on a misdirection play. The kick was wide and it was 13-0.

On defense, Matt Solis and Johnny Serrano had good tackles. For the most part during the game, it was gang tackling by the Wolverines since the Eagles' runs were up the middle.

Texico got the ball back at its 17. Loera had runs of 8, 12, 8 and 11. Loera scored from the 1 at :48 of the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter. A conversion pass try failed and it was 19-0 at halftime.

Loera started the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter with a kick return 27 yards. He then had runs of 10 and 10; Johnny Serrano for 12, 9 and 10; and Jesse Serrano for 9. Loera scored from the 3 at 8:0. Johnny Serrano ran in the 2-point conversion and Texico led 27-0.

On defense, Jared Curtis had a good tackle. Alex Mendoza recovered a fumble at the Eagles 37. Loera scored on a 39-yard gallop at 5:18. Loera also ran in the 2-point conversion for the 35-0 lead.

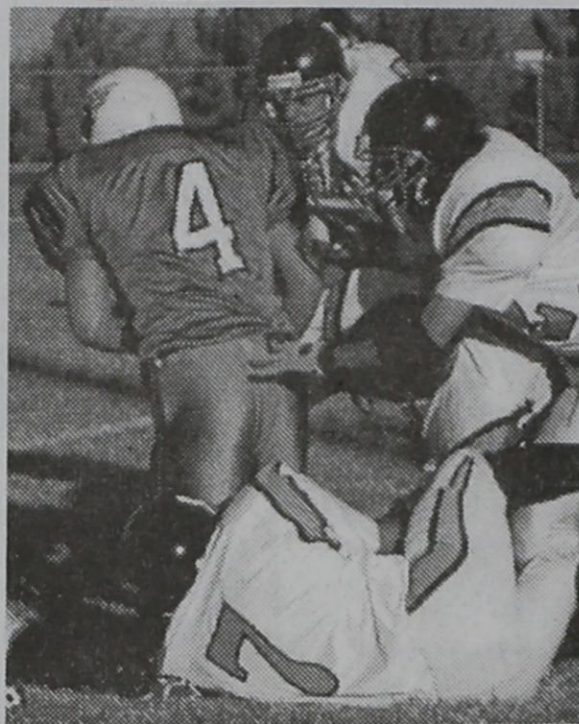
In the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, Mark Peabody gained 10 and coach

## Parmer County caught between jail standard commission and a rock

The Parmer County Commissioners met on Monday with Vince Viaille, of First Southwest Co., Lubbock, to discuss various financial options for a county jail.

Viaille gave options including bonds, lease-purchase and certificates of obligation (a method to sell bonds without having to seek a bond election). He pointed out the current low interest rate, at 4.75 percent.

At the last meeting, the commissioners had received cost estimates on the three options facing them:

1. A new jail, estimated between \$3.2 and \$3.5 million.
2. Modify and expand the current jail, between \$2.4 and \$26 million.
3. Build a separate sheriff's office, between \$560,000 and \$630,000.

The problem with Option No. 2 is that the state historical society said it won't approve any outside changes - thus killing this option.

The problem with Option No. 3 is that it doesn't solve the main problem - the current jail doesn't meet state standards and Parmer County has received seven variances from the state over the years to keep it open. As commissioner Ed Corn said, "We're between the jail standards commission and a rock."

Thus, the commissioners are looking at Option No. 1 as most feasible. Now the question is: go ahead with the project now ... or later.

If they go ahead now, they have the low interest rate. But if they only have, say, \$750,000 now, it looks like a long-term debt.

If they wait a few years, they would have more money set aside, but the interest rate is likely to be higher.

Another decision to be made involves the number of beds in a new facility, ranging from 27 to 48. County Attorney Charles Aycock stressed that the number of inmates in county jails is increasing due to state legislative decisions. For example, in 1981, if a man stole \$50 or more, it would be a felony, and he would go to the state pen. But this year, a felony starts at \$1,500. If you steal below that total, you go to the county jail.

Thus, even though the county's population is static, the number of county jail inmates is increasing.

If a 49-bed facility were to be built, the county could house prisoners from adjoining counties, thus earning some money. Corn, though, said he favors a new jail to meet Parmer County's needs only.

More discussion on which route to take is expected at future commissioners' meetings.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to keep the current janitorial service, with David Ancira.

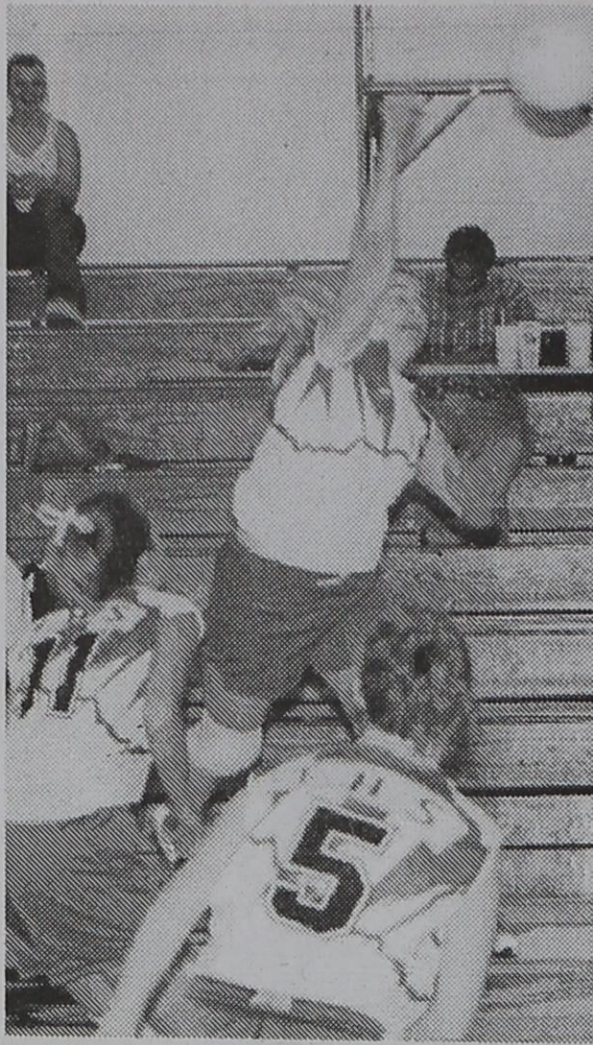

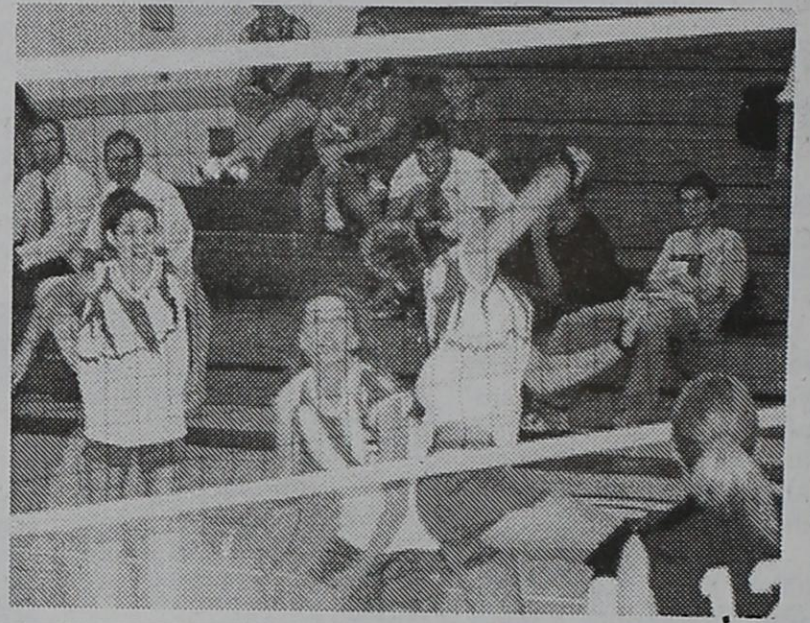

## Texico votes to stay with City Hall site

The Texico City Council on Tuesday voted 3-2 to build the new city hall at the north side of the community center. The other site looked at was on Garwood across from the fire station.

The council had earlier voted 2-1 to do so, with Oran Jay Autrey absent. Autrey, concerned about parking problems, asked to rescind that decision, and was supported by Doug Scioli. Since Monnie Cunningham and Sharon Askew supported the community center site, it was up to Mayor Jerry Cunningham to break the tie. He supported the community center location.

Several folks voiced opposition to the community center site, noting the parking problems that could develop, and the lack of room for growth. Police Chief Kelley Brophy earlier had noted his concerns, including vandalism problems in addition to the parking problem.

Architect Paul Reed will now meet with city department heads and the municipal judge to discuss how to set up the new city hall.

In other business, the council: -- Discussed the problem of cemetery maintenance. Howard Leavell noted the poor appearance and said it was embarrassing to folks at a recent funeral there. Margie Crooks added that the town deserves a decent cemetery and someone needs to take care of it.

Town law says the mayor is to appoint 5 members (including 2 women) to a cemetery association board to handle its maintenance. The current board hasn't met in

several years. So the city council has had city employees taking care of maintenance. And a new well is being built there.

The cemetery association fund has between \$5,000 and \$6,000 in it. Persons who would like to volunteer to serve on the cemetery association board are asked to call city Clerk Teresa Harth, 482-3314.

It also was suggested that the mayor and council each try to find someone to volunteer for this board.

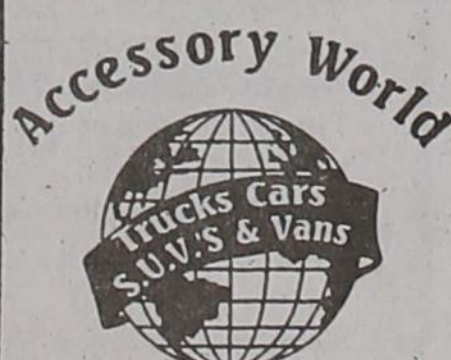

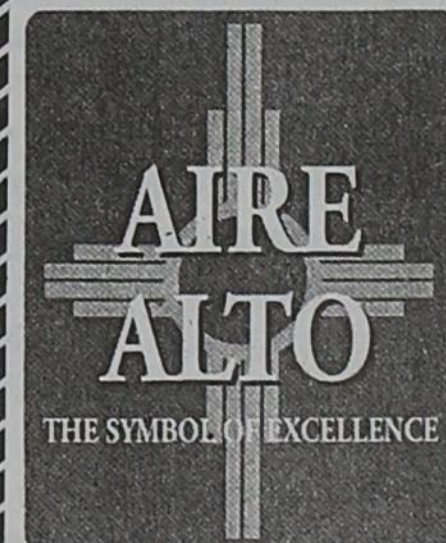

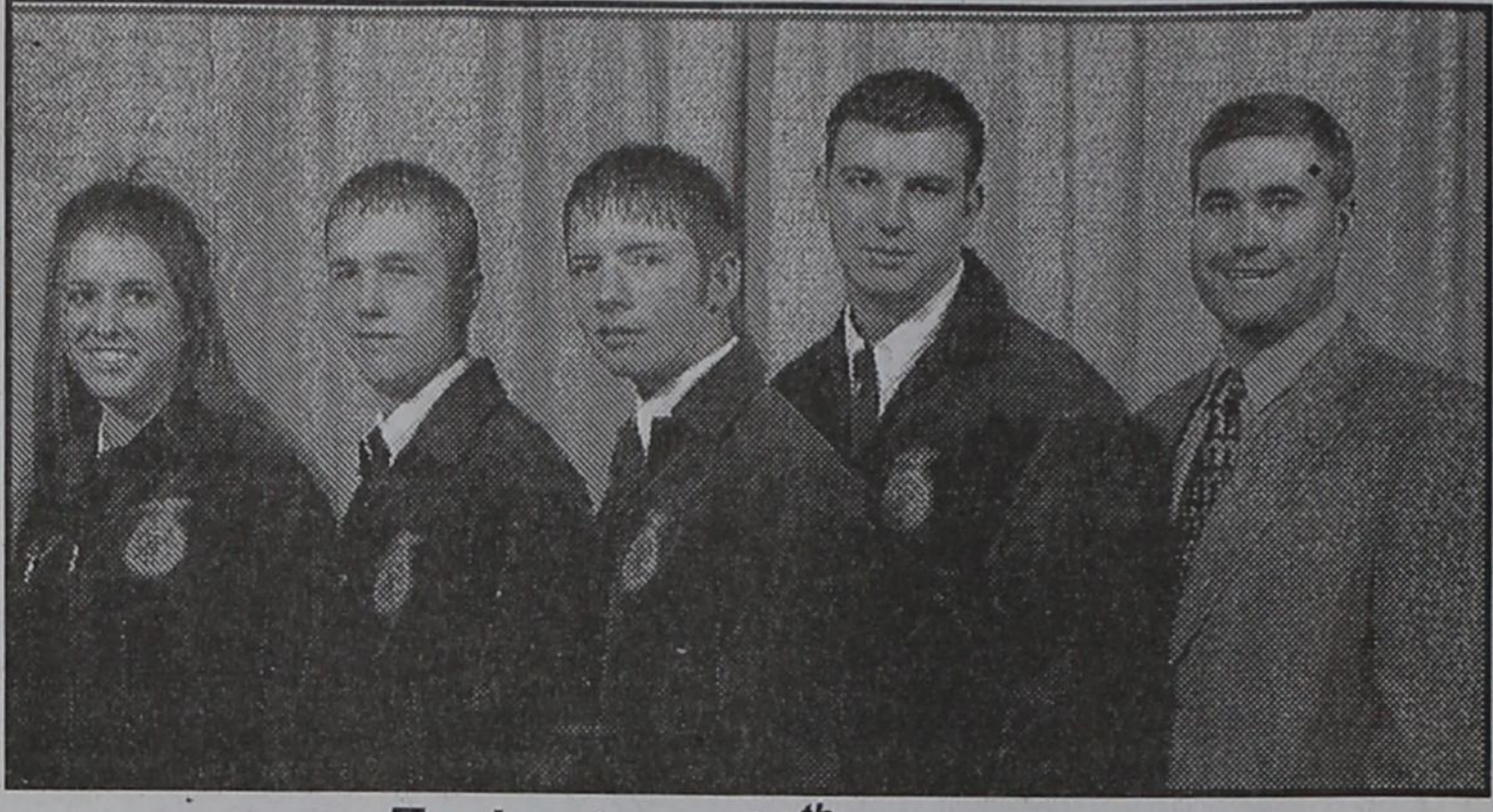
In the 3rd quarter, Matt Barnes caused a fumble, with Robert Williams recovered.

With 4:34 left, Trace Stevenson recovered a fumble. But the drive stalled.

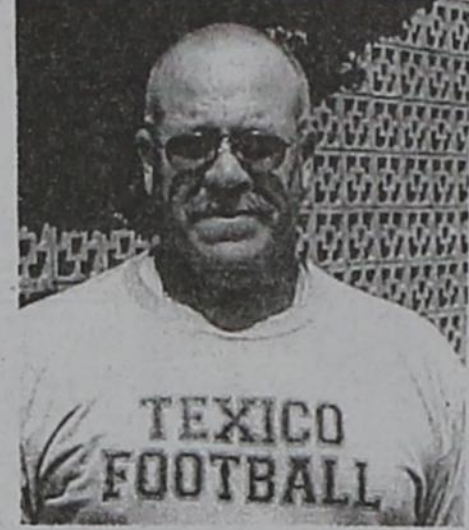
Bovina drove and scored in the final minutes for the win.

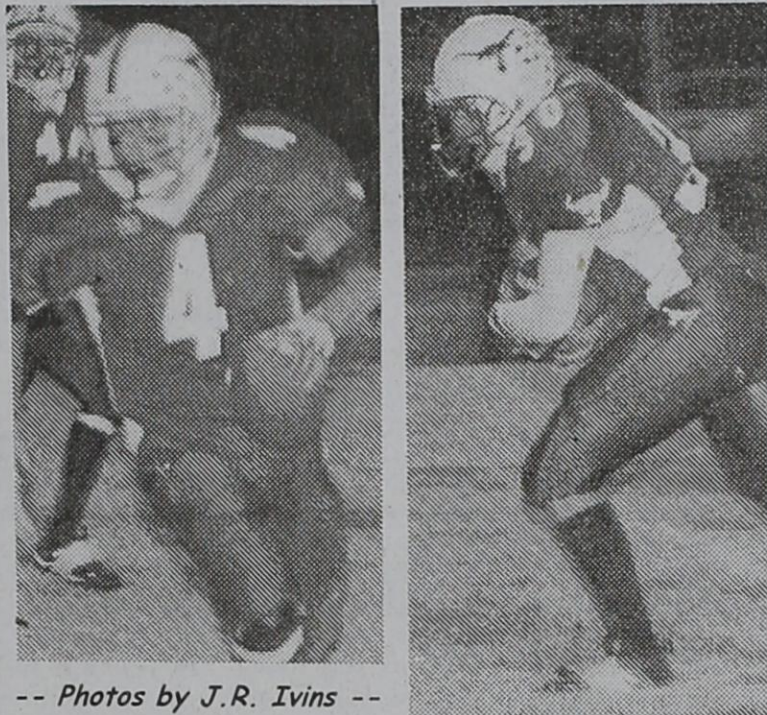
The Steers put it all together - a stout defense and a wide-open offensive machine to salt away the victory.
