Willis was arrested and charged with involuntary manslaughter and contributing the delinquency of a minor.







Coach Martin said, "We focused on passing, setting and hitting the ball. Whereas, most of the other teams would just pass the ball right back over the net on the first hit.



Clements picked up the loose ball and returned it 23 yards.

In the 2nd quarter, Springer got down to the Texico 5. A field goal try was short. Springer had kept the ball almost 11 straight minutes, except for one play by Texico (a lost fumble) -- but got no points on the board.

Turbines to be built south of Texico

Xcel Energy and Cielo Wind Power, which operated that huge wind turbine south of Texico, have agreed to add two 660kilowatt wind turbines there by the end of april.

The site is New Mexico's only commercialscale wind-generation facility and was set up by Cielo in 1999. Its single turbine generator produces 660 kilowatts of electricity, which is sold to Xcel Energy for resale to the company's New Mexico customers.

Customers in the program choose to pay a


small premium for electric service to help "sponsor" generation of electricity from wind, a renewable, clean resource.

Xcel's program, available only in New Mexico and Colorado, is the largest customer preferencedriven wind energy program in the U.S.

The two new turbines, Vesta V47's, will generate 1.3 megawatts of electricity, enough for the annual electricity needs of 450

Each turbine tower is 213 feet tall, comparable to a 21-story building.

The USDA Cattle on Feed released today was favorable to prices, but much of the positive news had been anticipated. Trends are still working higher, but technically, this market usually corrects down into December? Most cattle are profitable at current levels.

FEEDER CATTLE: Placements were down 13% vs. the average guess of 6%. This should support feeder prices on Monday, but the fact that an \$83 January Feeder projects heavy losses against the June Live Cattle price may generate changes over the next 60 days? Placements had been expected to come in lower because of great wheat pasture conditions and higher feed costs inside.


CORN: Prices finally turned short term trends up last week. This was the first positive sign this market has had since turning down early last September. We don't expect to see an increase in volatility as overhead resistance lies between \$2.47-2.50 basis the December contract. Market could possibly re-test the \$2.30 area between late December and early January?

SOYBEANS: The market has made a short term correction, but has yet to turn trends back higher. Demand has remained strong and close back above the \$5.70 level basis the January contract would turn trends back up as well. The South American crop is still doing well, but has placed very little pressure on domestic prices. Seasonal tendencies are sideways to higher into December.

WHEAT: The volatility has been extreme over thelast couple of weeks. This market was caught inside a tight trading range for almost 2 1/2 months before collapsing about 70 cents in just a few days. There still seems to be a strong world demand and prices have since rebounded about 40 cents. Hedgers should be flooring prices when given the opportunity basis the

July KC Wheat? COTTON: The December contract has made several attempts to test the 50 cent area, but so far prices have fallen short each time? A move above this level would project to the 52-53 level, but fundamentally, there is little to drive prices higher at this time? Strong support lies down at the 46.50 area. 




