

## **Texico police 'clear'** school vandalism, after-school fight

Here is the weekly report from Texico Police Chief Kelley Brophy:

Officer John Mares investigated a fight in the school parking lot just after school on Sept. 4 involving two high school juvenile boys.

One of the boys told Mares that he thought he would be "jumped" by two other students so when he got to his car, he got a knife out. He said one boy attacked him anyway; this boy was cut several times on his arms and taken to Clovis hospital by a private vehicle.

Mares said he believes the fight emanated from another fight that occurred at a dance at the Texico Community Center recently where a boy got bruised. This fight was not reported to police.

Mares said the following charges are pending: the boy with the knife, aggravated 3rd, degree felony and public affray; the boy who was cut, aggravated battery misdemeanor and public affray.

Meanwhile, Mares has filed charges against the three Texico juvenile boys allegedly involved in recent vandalism at the school. One juvenile, age 17, was charged with criminal trespass and criminal damage. The other two juvenile boys, ages 15 and 16, were charged with negligent arson, criminal trespass and damage under \$1,000.

One of the boys involved in the school parking lot fight also was involved in the school vandalism case.

All four boys were suspended for 10 days, said Mares, and expulsion hearings were scheduled for this week.

Also, there was an auto break-in the 200 block of Craig Street. A lap-top computer valued at \$1,400 was stolen. Its serial number is on file at the police department.

## Lawsuit filed against Farwell Schools

A lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court in Amarillo Monday on the against Farwell School District, Supt. Larry Gregory, Board President Gary Patterson and former teacher and coach Bryan Goldsmith.

It was filed by "Jane Doe, a minor, by and through her parents, John and Janet Doe, as next friends."

The lawsuit alleges that "at its core, Jane Doe's story is one of a school intentional, district's flgrant disregard at the presence of a sexual predator on its staff. It is also a story of cronyism arrogance. But and mostly, it is a story of stolen innocence. And it did not have to happen."

Goldsmith has been convicted in Parmer and Curry Counties of sex crimes with a former Farwell School juvenile girl.

He is currently undergoing a diagnostic evaluation at the New Mexico Department of Corrections before he is sentenced in Curry County. In Parmer County, he received a 10-year probated sentence and fine.

According to the suit, inappropriate behavior between Goldsmith, then a teacher and coach at the school, began in April 2001 with a student.

Goldsmith resigned in August 2001 from Farwell School after Gregory received accusations of impropriety.

Gregory told the Tribune this is how the time frame went:

The girl's parents called him one evening at his home. He met with them 25 minutes later at his office and was told the girl had admitted to kissing Goldsmith.

At 7 a.m. the next day, Gregory said he met with District Attorney Johnny Actkinson. At 7:45 a.m., he met with Goldsmith. At 9:15 a.m., he contacted Texas Association of

School Boards. At 9:30 a.m., he called then-board president David Norton.

Gregory said Goldsmith denied the incident. Gregory told Goldsmith he was suspended without pay pending an investigation.

Gregory said Goldsmith came in later that day and asked what his options were, still denying everything.

"He never admitted to any inappropriate behavior with the girl. He said the girl's mother had asked him to act as a father figure," said Gregory.

Goldsmith offered his resignation, which Gregory accepted. Gregory told the board, then dropped the investigation.

"At that time, the parents of the girl were very pleased with the way we had handled the situation," said Gregory.

The lawsuit charges Farwell Schools with: -- failure to have ade-

quate rules regarding student/teacher relationships. -- failure to adequately

supervise and train school employees.

-- failure to take remedial actions to prevent Goldsmith's abuse of the girl and doing so with deliberate indifference and conscious disregard for the girl's constitutional rights.

-- failure to discipline and/or terminate Goldsmith for his acts and unconstitutional behavior which Farwell Schools had knowledge.


