> Husband Michael undergoes successful kidney transplant

Pam Haseloff: God answers prayers

Three years ago, Michael and Pam Haseloff of Farwell Accountability received some of the most terrifying news they could get: Michael's kidneys were failing.

"I was scared to death," recalls Michael. "I wondered for area if I was going to die. It was really scary."

After speaking with a renal doctor, things didn't seem so bad. But, when it rains, it pours. On Oct. 14th of 1999, that same month he became a renal patient, Michael underwent a quadruple by-pass on his heart.

He recovered from his heart surgery, but he still had to be hooked up to a dialysis machine for 8 hours every night to do the functions his kidneys normally would have done.

"I felt like I could have done something to have helped it," said Michael in reference to his kidney failure. "I knew I had diabetes and I could have taken better care of myself."

Unfortunately, it's hard to see the future until it happens. The Haseloffs tried to keep a positive attitude throughout all of this.

"We weren't as bad off as some people," Pam, who is a Parmer County Justice of the Peace, pointed out. Before being able to do dialysis at home, Michael had to go to a clinic where they saw many individuals missing limbs and far worse off than he was. "It makes you thankful," Pam said.

It was finally determined that Michael would need a kidney transplant. A once healthy tan had been reduced to a grayish pallor. Michael was constantly exhausted, frequently just coming home and falling asleep in his chair within seconds. Even traveling was a huge hassle, so he wouldn't.

The Texas Department of Education has announced its annual school accountability ratings.

Exemplary ratings are given to schools with 90 percent of more of the student body in each student group passing all sections of the TAAS test, a 94 percent or higher attendance rate, and a dropout rate of 1 percent or less.

What is your position?

As I write this, terrorism continues throughout our sad world.

As of this moment, August 2002, I would say that Scenario No. 2 is probably correct.

But I fear that down the road, the Scenario No. 3 would look to be real, mainly because of the support that Moslem extremists get from Arab leaders like Saddam Hussein.

Appearing before a congressional committee recently was a former leading Iraqi scientist who told of mad dog Hussein's plans to have atomic weapons available in two to three years.

And Hussein (who we have to remember is nothing more than a thug like Al Capone) has two hatreds: against Israel, and against us.

"That's no way to live," he said. "It's hard."

Then, on June 4th of this summer, just 15 months after being put on the waiting list, the Haseloffs got "the" call.

"It was the first and only call we got. They called at 9:30 that morning and said if we could get to Lubbock by noon they might have a kidney for Michael," Pam recalled. A kidney had been donated that morning, and Michael was selected as the backup, just in case the first patient selected wasn't a compatible choice.

Once they got to the hospital, the medical staff took 14 vials of Michael's blood for testing. Ninety percent of the time the organ will go to the primary choice, leaving

only a 10% chance Michael would get the kidney, but the medical staff didn't want to take any chances.

At 4:30 that afternoon the Haseloffs got some of the best news they'd heard in a while. The kidney was going to Michael

The surgery lasted from about 11 p.m. to 2 a.m. After the transplant Michael's immune system was incredibly low. Few people were allowed to even see him.

After about a day and a half, Michael began to feel the results of his new kidney. He had to spend an additional

21 days in Lubbock for various tests and to be monitored, just in case his body rejected the organ.

It didn't.

After his surgery, the doctors informed Michael that his kidney had come from a 7-year-old girl who had been in a car accident. "It was pretty hard to handle where it came from," said Michael, but he was very thankful for the gift of life her family had given him.

It should take about 6 months for Michael's new kidney to grow to fit his body size. He must also remain on anti-rejection medication for the rest of his life. Even skipping a dose could have serious consequences.

After a year, Michael should be able to go back to work on a regular basis, but as of right now Michael is able to help his family with their farm.

"I think it's kept him from getting bored or depressed, since he isn't sitting around all the time. I know it's kept me sane," laughed his wife.

Michael has recently even been able to go swimming with his grandchildren, something he hasn't been able to do in 5 years.

The Haseloffs have felt like the people of Farwell have been such a blessing throughout this whole ordeal with fundraisers, support, and countless prayers.

"God answers prayers, I know," Pam said as she smiled at her husband well on his way to recovery and a normal life.

<u>LIVE CATTLE</u>: Cash cattle trade for \$63 again this week. There seems to be very little resistance to lower bids each week? This market made new highs for the move up from the April low just last week and prices have traded back down into a sideways range. Seasonals are strong for a move up between August 1 -- 14 over the last 10 years. Look for one more shot up over the next two weeks.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices continue to move within a sideways range as cash prices have remained strong. At this time, future prices are trading discount to cash. Support lies \$75.40 basis the August and October contracts. A move back to \$79 resistance will require a large move up in fed cattle prices or lower corn prices. Look for another shot higher over the next couple of weeks.

<u>CORN</u>: Prices have moved higher on fears of "hot and dry" weather in the Mid West. The weather has been changing about as fast as the prices. Trends are still pointing higher, but any change in weather will be quickly reflected in price. Most estimates have now dropped to an 8.9 billion bushel crop this year. Targets are \$2.72 basis the December contract.

<u>SOYBEANS</u>: Fundamentally, weather has had must less impact on beans than corn prices. Soybeans have failed to break out to new highs this week, but prices have still remained strong. Support lies above the \$5.30 level and resistance above the \$5.60 level basis the November contract. Weather will be the driving force behind prices. Weather in August will have more impact on beans.

<u>WHEAT</u>: Prices followed the rest of the grain complex on Thursday when prices exploded off the open. This market failed to hold and sold off later the same day. Long term charts still have projections close to the \$3.90 level. It will take lots of help from higher beans and corn to get prices there over the next term. Long term, prices may move higher later in the year?

<u>COTTON</u>: Prices are still in a consolidation and have been here since last June. Support is around 45 and resistance is around the 50-cent level. A move above the topside could take prices up to 53 cents while a move below 45 would push prices down toward 40 cents. Out of two major analysts' predictions, one predicts 60-cent cotton, while the other predicts prices down to 40? We'll see...
