It was the first time I had ever visited that museum, and it had a lot to offer in addition to the Vatican Exhibit.


I recommend a visit; you will enjoy.

"He was as clear as you are standing there," she pointed out to me. As her brother entered the room, the ghost stood up and disappeared, but they could still hear his footsteps as he exited the room. She said her brother saw the ghost, too.

the county. Billy Claunch, of Needmore, then contacted Parmer County Commissioner Tom Ware (Bovina area) about Parmer County passing a similar resolution.

The topic was up for discussion at Monday's meeting.

The Tribune called the HPU district to find out the reason for the cancellation. They said they would get back to us.

The HPU District put out a short news release on Tuesday that stated it "has a long history of listening to its constituents. Criticism emanating from residents of Bailey County and some adjoining counties has alerted us to their concerns regarding the program."



Vidaurri's are Good Samaritans


Maria and Frank Vidaurri, of Farwell, were Good Samaritans recently.





Texico Council discusses how traffic violations are handled

The Texico City Council on Tuesday showed unhappiness with Curry County Sheriff Rodger Hatcher.

Mayor Jerry Cunningham said Hatcher has contacted him about complaints the sheriff has received from motorists who said they were ticketed for traffic violations by Texico police outside the Texico city limits.

Cunningham said Hatcher told him these folks can sue the city if that were the case.

"He's wrong," rebutted Texico city attorney Marion Ty Rutter.

Rutter said Texico has a reciprocal agreement with Clovis and Curry which County allow Texico police to issue citations outside the city limits.

"If someone breaks the law, it's good to give them a ticket regardless of where it is," said Rutter.

Texico Police Officer Wayne Atchley said Police Chief Kelley Brophy (who was not at the meeting) has told his fourman department not to issue citations between the Texico city limits and Clovis.

The question of exactly where the city's west limit is was raised.

"We just go as far as Welcome Center," the said Atchley.

Asked for his comments on Wednesday, Hatcher said there is no current reciprocal agree-Curry ment between County and Texico.

Hatcher said he is the only person who can issue a commission for other officers to enforce laws in the county and no such commission has been issued to Texico.

He said a memo of understanding was sent to Texico, but returned with suggested changes. The changes were not satisfactory to him, so he re-

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jected it.

" Texico doesn't have jurisdiction outside its city limits," he stressed. But Texico police have the right to pursue any traffic violations if the violation occurred within the city limits and the stop is made in the county.

As for his conversation with Mayor Cunningham, Hatcher said he was talking about tickets given outside the city limits, where the case is heard in Texico city court. He said that is illegal, and that the case must be heard in county magistrate court when that occurs.

In other business, the council:

-- Received a letter from Maria Esparza saying she doesn't want Texico police responding to any calls for help, but prefers Clovis or Curry County police.

Rutter said the city must respond if called, otherwise the city could get sued.

Anyone finding sick or dead blue jays or crows is asked to call their local department or health county agent regarding shipping the birds for testing purposes.



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

Richard and Karen Laverty

Sharing the faith in Spain

Recently, Rev. Richard and Karen Laverty had the opportunity to serve on a mission team in Requeña, Spain. Richard is the preacher at the First Baptist Church of Farwell.

The Tribune interviewed Mrs. Laverty on her experiences.

Requeña is a city full of history. The site had seen countless events, including the Moorish invasions and the Spanish Inquisition. Thirty years ago the people discovered caves beneath the entire city.

She said the caves had been used for all sorts of things. When the Moors invaded, the citizen would seek shelter below their homes. The caves also served as a place to bury the dead, much like the catacombs in Rome.

Also found within the caves were sleep areas, a granary, vats for wine, olive oil, water, and bread, and a place used as a chapel.

Above the surface, the old architecture showed the history of the town. In some sections of the city the streets were purposely made crooked to allow more room for shade. Homes and businesses were stacked on top of each other and tightly hugged the shape of the streets.

Christianity is actually frowned upon by the Spanish government. One woman told Karen she feared she would be fired from her job if her employers discovered that she was a Christian. Many people also shunned close friends after discovering their Christian beliefs.

"The purpose of our mission to Requeña was to encourage the church there," said Karen. During their stay, they lived in the home of a Colombian family who worked in the small congregation of about 12.

The language proved to be a barrier, but fortunately the other three people in the Laverty's group were able to translate for them.

Most of the jobs these two English-speaking helpers did were to catch people's attention so that they might gating recent vandalism be drawn in to learn more. Richard made balloon ani- at Texico Schools, which mals while Karen did chalk drawings.

As different people came forward to investigate, they were handed salvation tracts. In spite of their limited grasp of the language, the Laverty's were still able to convey God's message of love through their actions.

They also did "prayer walks" where they simply walked around the city and prayed for the people they came in contact with. One particularly encouraging event occurred when they gained permission to pray in a government building, something that almost never happened in that city.

"The culture was a neat experience," said Richard. "If was rich in relationships and was very family oriented." He was impressed with the long time allotted for meal gatherings and how close the families seemed.

The entire culture seemed less mobile than that of the U.S. People traveled more in terms of walking distance rather than driving. In general, they didn't maintain such a tight schedule or place as much emphasis on punctuality.

As far as the food went, the cuisine there was more decorative than American foods and included more food from the sea. It was definitely different, according to Karen. "One meal they gave us this sausage made of blood and didn't tell me what it was until after I had eaten it," she recalled with a cringe.

The people there were very gracious, always encouraging their guests to take seconds. They lived very minimally when compared to many Americans, but they gladly shared what they had with the missionaries.

During an 8-hour layover in a London airport Karen

Farwell's tax base rises, so a lower tax rate is made possible

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday proposed a tax rate of .4485 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, down from the current .4696 -- a drop of .021 cents.

This was made possible because the city's tax base has risen, with \$111,000 worth of new improvements and a reappraisal that has risen values over \$1 million by the Parmer County Appraisal District.

If the city had gone over the .4485 mark, a public hearing would have been needed. The new tax is expected to bring in about \$4,000 more revenue. Last year's tax base was \$26,732,996.

In other business, the council:

-- Head Water Supt. Dee Hammit report that current policy is that no new meters be set up outside city limits.

Recently, a new meter was placed because it was "grandfathered in" and this caused a controversy with one resident.

-- Heard councilman Wayne Gruben report that he and Police Chief Robert Achterberg worked security at . a dance at the Farwell Community Center on Aug. 17.

He said some guests brought alcohol, which is illegal. "So Robert spent the night pouring out beer and writing tickets," he said.

Achterberg gave the guests (about six) a choice: dump the beer in the trash bin or get a citation.

-- Approved health insurance for city employees.

-- Agreed to buy a new police car. Since the cost will be under \$25,000, no bids will be sought. The car will be purchased from McKinney, Texas, where the deal is \$8,000 a year for 3 years with no interest.

-- Discussed raising the water connection fees. Last year, Farwell collected about \$1,800 in turn-on fees; but lost about \$2,885 due to folks leaving without paying their bills. But over the past 10 years the write-offs totaled \$15,578. Thus, if turn-on fees had averaged \$1,500 to \$1,600, this would have been close to even.

City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen gave these fee comparisons: Texico, deposit, \$60; reconnect, \$20; Bovina, deposit, \$50; turn-on, \$10; reconnect, \$25; Friona, deposit, \$75; transfer, \$10; reconnect, \$25; and Farwell, deposit, zero; turn-on, \$30; and reconnect, \$30.

Whether to charge a deposit was tabled until the next meeting.

-- Approved a building permit for Jimmy Meeks to move in a house at 605 3rd St. He plans to sell the home.

-- Approved the annual budget; no residents attended the hearing.

-- Heard Dr. N.B. Chasteen complain that her water bill doubled one month and she couldn't see a reason for it. Her water meter was changed. Hammit said when he has found faulty water meters, it always has shown lower amounts of water used, not higher. The council voted to give Chasteen a \$100 credit -- the difference between that one month and her normal bill.

-- Heard Chasteen note that Monday's rain washed out part of her driveway. The area involved was part of land she donated for the new water well project, so the city will put in caliche to refill the area involved.





LIVE CATTLE: This market has finally reached long term targets at \$69.00 basis the October contract. The difference between futures and cash last week was roughly \$7.00. This means that cash can either rally \$7 over the next 6 weeks or future prices can drop. Either way, look for the spread to narrow. Odds favor a rally into October, but unlikely to make new highs.

FEEDER CATTLE: The market remains "flat" even with higher corn prices. Cash has held strong and feeder prices will usually take their lead from the Live Cattle prices. December, February and April cattle all trading above \$70 has helped to support feeder prices. The market is most likely trading at or near a top at this time. May trade back higher into October, but unlikely to see highs until January.

CORN: The surprise USDA Report released on Monday has gone a long way in supporting higher corn prices. Just about everyone has gone from "lukewarm" to "extremely bullish." This is generally not a good sign for higher prices? Trends are still up, but this market seems very nervous. Weather is no longer an issue, but there are questions concerning USDA numbers?

SOYBEANS: Although beans gave up much of their gains going into Friday, the market was still up good on the week. Again, the USDA numbers are being questioned based upon such a large miss for any of the early estimates? Either way, weather remains favorable in the Mid West at this time which should translate into a fairly good year for production. Demand remains strong.

WHEAT: This is probably the weakest link in the grain complex. Short term trends turned down on Friday and prices basically lost all of this week" gains since Monday. The market is beginning to look very tired at these levels. This market will need some more bullish news soon to keep the trends moving higher? The \$4.00 level basis the December KC Wheat may be too tough to cross?

COTTON: Prices are still trading within a 5 cent trading range with little or no direction. The low end of this range is \$44.50 and the high end is \$50.00 basis the December contract. Best guess is that a move outside this range should move prices in that direction. Prices will usually drop during the June/July time frame and move lower into December. USDA increased world demand?
