Isn't that something when no one else has a chance?

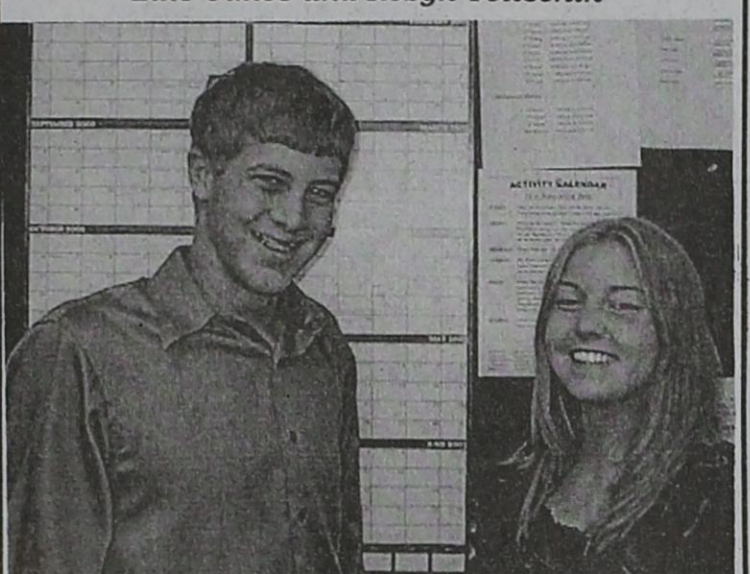
Oh, I know, someone could knock off one of those teams in the playoffs. But the odds are against that.

LIVE CATTLE: Cash cattle traded \$2 higher this week at \$66 and the basis between cash and October Live Cattle narrowed closer. This spread was \$7 a few weeks ago and we still expect to see the basis narrow as we get closer to October. The fact that the October contract was able to take out the \$69 August high was positive, but all short term trends were met this week.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices were able to break above the \$80 level this week which has been like a concrete ceiling since last April. Short term targets were met at \$81 basis the nearby October contract. Prices still project higher into January, but over the near term, prices generally correct down into late November. Lower corn and higher April Live Cattle were also supportive.

CORN: The market has dropped 20 cents over the last week and technically, prices look like next support will come in around \$2.65. A close below this level would set up for another drop to \$2.47 which looks like harvest lows would be complete. The USDA Crop Production report released this week did little to support prices. World stocks will remain tight into next year supporting prices.

SOYBEANS: World stocks increased according to the USDA Crop Production report released this week. Prices dropped about 30 cents in three days. Trends are pointing lower with most of the support coming in between \$5.00-\$5.50 basis the nearby November contract. Again, harvest lows due between October and December should set up for another rally into the Spring.

WHEAT: Although the USDA Crop Production report was positive for wheat, prices reacted downward. Prices dropped over 50 cents over the last few days. The rally which preceded the report had already priced most of the positive news into the market. Tight world and domestic stocks will be supportive at some level, but prices will probably spend the next few weeks finding support.

COTTON: The USDA Crop Production report was viewed as friendly for the prices, but again, the news was already anticipated before the report was released and heavy selling pressure pushed prices down to some of the lowest levels seen since last Spring. Short term targets are around the 41-cent level basis the December contract. Should see a harvest low before prices move back higher.

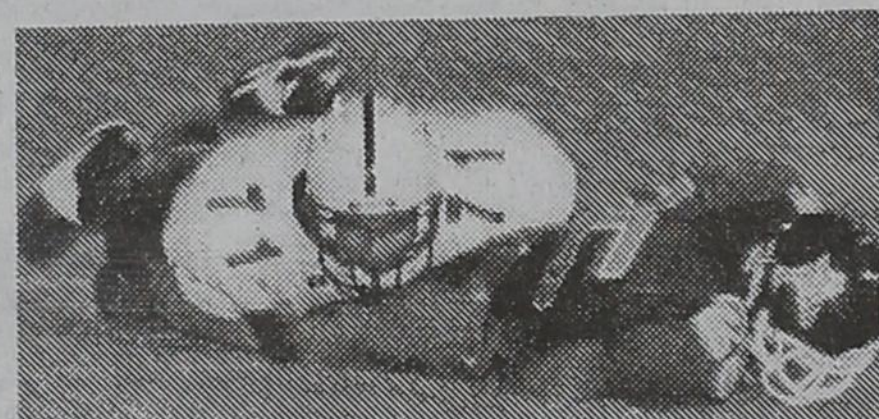

Special Election
NOVEMBER 5, 2002

Explanatory Brief for HJR 2
HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the reinstatement of the office."

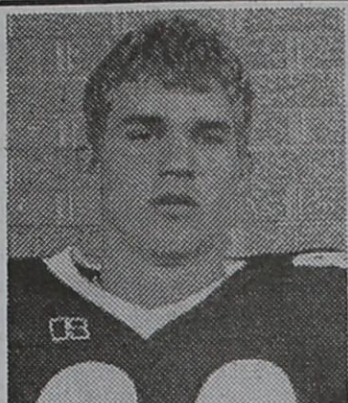
On defense, Teltschik broke through the Smyer defense for a good tackle. Farwell regained possession when Smyer failed on a 4th down play near midfield.

Smyer had a long run for a TD, and the PAT run was denied.

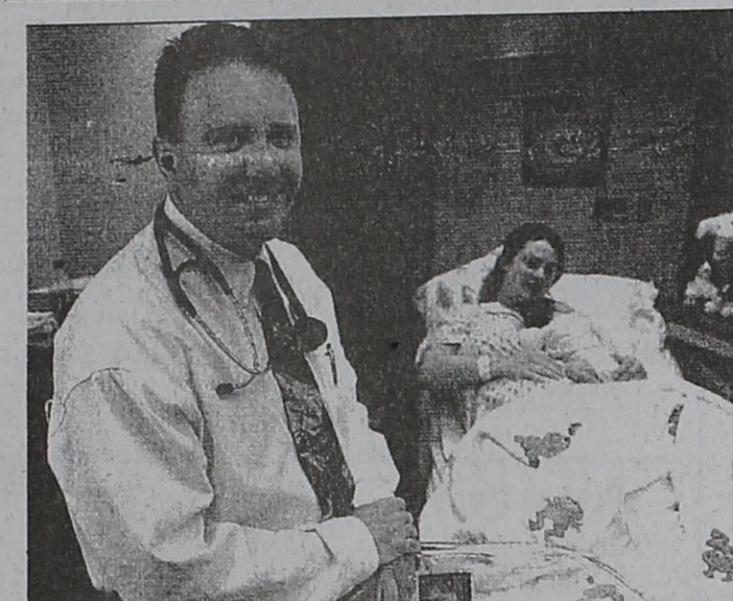
Chandler recovered the next onside kick by Smyer. Schilling made a critical first down to keep the Steers on offense with 2 minutes left in the game.




