


When I was still going to the university (I won't discuss the year, but I believe Gerald Ford was in the White House then), I enjoyed a lengthy conversation one hot summer afternoon visiting with Ray Mears, listening to the things he had seen and done in his life. They were remarkable stories, eye-witness accounts of events right out of the history books, told by this man in his characteristically straightforward and humble way.

This was going to be a great story, the flow of history he related to me has never left me, every place I've been since then. But, kids will be kids (I guess that sure applied to me back then.) I don't recall the distractions that retirement in 1996. followed immediately after our conversation, but I foolishly put the story aside to be written,. "when I had more time."

Of course, the result was that the story has remained unwritten. Mr. Mears went to his reward years ago. And in all the intervening years, I have regretted that I had allowed a story of such a great man in our town to be neglected.


He was recognized by the Secretary of State in 1999.




tencing. District Judge Robert Brack gave Goldsmith the maximum sentence.



Ray Mears -

After a period of patrolling the southern border regions of Texas and New Mexico, history swept up the young trooper and his companions when Pancho Villa hit American headlines. This Mexican revolutionary (or bandit, depending on which historian is talking) stopped a train in northern Mexico in 1916 and murdered a dozen Americans he found on board. Later that year, he and his large contingent of gunmen rode across the border and ransacked Columbus, N.M., killing 19 more Americans.

The U.S. Army sent Pershing with an expeditionary force into northern Mexico to confront what many viewed as the first "invasion" of the United States since the war of 1812. The young Ray Mears rode into Mexico as part of this force, pursuing the elusive and deadly collection of sincere revolutionaries, murderers, thieves, and the remnants of Indian tribes long since devastated by government soldiers on both sides of the border.

Mr. Mears related tales of ambushes and small unit cavalry charges and friends he lost out of his unit, of hobbling horses and bivouacking on the Mexican deserts, of peering into the surrounding blackness over the top of his rifle through night after night. They were scenes out of the great Western movies I have seen, and I was hearing from a man who had actually been there, but without the benefit of my notes. I will not attempt to reconstruct them here.

(Pancho Villa and his desperate band were never lured into major combat so they escaped capture or destruction. But the atrocities against American sovereignty by Pancho Villa stopped.)

From that point in the conversation, Mr. Mears said that the Mexican gunmen were deadly but by far, the most deadly he had seen had been the Muslim Moro fighters of the Philippine Islands, where his unit had been posted in the 1920's.

Following the Spanish-American War of 1898, the U.S. had taken control of the Philippines from Spain. Many Filipinos were expecting complete self-rule to follow soon thereafter, and when that did not occur, Emilio Aguinaldo began a fight against the U.S. as fierce as the Filipino revolution against Spain had been.

The Philippine Insurrection was the first war that America had fought outside the Western Hemisphere High School: and it is little remembered today, despite the fact that it lasted from 1899 to 1902 and claimed more than 12,000 pinos.

U.S. Army maintained forts all across that expansive island group, and Filipino insurrectionists continued to against the occupying soldiers.

It was because of combat against the fanatical Muschanged from the .38-caliber revolver to the 1911 Colt Vannatta, Wacey Williams. .45-caliber automatic. The smaller caliber weapon did not have the stopping power needed and there are many stories of soldiers who died at the end of the deadly Moro short-sword (the kris) despite having emptied their

revolver into the suicidal attacker.

Modern newspapers attest to the fact that the Moro continue their Islamic suicide attacks in the Philippines to this day, and it was their forefathers that Mr. Mears confronted in the 1920's.

I recall asking Mr. Mears what had transpired between his time in Mexico and the Philippines. He looked back at me amused and said simply, World War I. Mr. Mears was part of one of the first Army units to go "over there" after America entered that war. He served under the command of Colonel Douglas MacArthur, a man he admired greatly. The German Army, desperate to win the war before America could deploy large numbers of fresh forces to the trenches, launched a massive assault in June 1918, determined to break through to Paris and force an armistice on favorable terms. The savage battles of the Marne and Somme valleys, of the Ypres Salient, of Chateau-Thierry and Belleau Wood belong as much to saga and legend as they do to history. The melee was more a vision of hell than a modern battle according to many contemporary observers, with no firm lines and sudden and pitched firefights

erupting as the scattered forces of both sides encountered each other in the forests and the darkness. The air was filled with poisonous gases, artillery shells, and

machinegun fire. But through all this, the young American soldiers held. In the 18 days of pitched mobile battle, the frontline units freshly arrived from America had more than half of their soldiers killed in action. But the young Americans stopped the assault and five months later, the war that decimated an entire generation finally ended. One of the survivors was Ray Mears.

I remember a poem by Robert Service that Hattie Boling would recite to us sometimes in 1965, when schools still taught poetry. In this poem, the writer looks at a pleasant shopkeeper limping through his daily tasks and tries to envision this same man as the hero he had been in those black days of 1918, manning a gun and refusing to retreat. The poem is called, simply, "Was It You?"

Looking back at Mr. Mears as I departed that afternoon, knowing all the things that he had seen and done before he settled down to agriculture and truck driving in our little corner of the wide world, that same question has come to me time and again.

Looking around Farwell today, the generation that fought renegade Indians, Mexican revolutionaries, Kaiser Wilhelm's troops, and the fanatical Moro, are all pretty much gone now. The generation that fought its way through the Dust Bowl, the Great Depression, World War II, and the triumphs and tragedies of the following decades also have a thousand stories to tell. All the opportunities I had as a boy to hear their stories and benefit from their lessons passed without me taking advantage of most of them.

But one hot afternoon, almost 30 years ago, I took the opportunity to talk with a man who walked right out of an American history book. It has been a keepsake for me to this day and it is a privilege to finally share it. I ask one favor in return. Would the next person to visit Mr. Mears' grave tell him that I finally wrote his story.

Minimum wage rates are set out in bidding documents and the rates will be part of the contract. TxDOT ensures that bidders will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, sex or national origin.

NOTICE OF REQUIREMENTS TO REPORT CERTAIN MATTERS RELATING TO PROPERTY VALUATION AND FOR CLAIMING EXEMPTION FROM PROPERTY TAXATION

The County Assessor, Randy J. Williams, hereby publishes notice to property owners, pursuant to Section 7-38-18, N.M.S.A. 1978, as follows:

1) If you or your spouse are 65 years old, or if either of you will become 65 years old in 2003, and if your "modified gross income" was not greater than \$18,800 in 2002, you may be eligible for a limitation on the taxable value of your residence. If you think you are eligible, you must apply to the Assessor no later than 30 days after the Assessor mails the notice of value for your residence. The application must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21.3, N.M.S.A. 1978.

2) If you own real property not valued by the Assessor in 2002 for property taxation purposes, it must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003, unless it is not subject to valuation for property taxation purposes in 2003. The report must contain certain required information and be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8(A)(B), N.M.S.A. 1978.

3) If you have made improvements to real property during 2002 and the improvements cost more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), the improvements must be reported to the Assessor near than February 28, 2003. The information required and the form of the report may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8(C), N.M.S.A. 1978.

4) If you believe that you or your real property is entitled to exemption from property taxation, you must apply to the Assessor for exempt status no later than February 28, 2003, in order to be entitled to exemption from taxation in 2003. Exception: If an exemption from taxation was in effect for 2002 and the basis of the exempt status or use is unchanged from that year, application for exemption need not be made for 2003. If required, application for exemption must contain certain required information and must bo in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978.

5) If you or your real property was exempt from taxation in 2002 but the basis of the exempt status has changed during 2002 so that there is no longer eligibility for exemption, you must report that fact to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978. 6) If you claim "residential" status for your real property, you must declare this status to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003 unless the property was classified as "residential" by the Assessor in 2002. In the event that the predominant use of your real property has changed from "residential" to "nonresidential" during 2002, that fact must be declared to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The declaration must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Sections 7-38-17.1 and 7-36-2.1, N.M.S.A. 1978. 7) If you own property that has decreased in value during 2002, and that property is subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report the decrease in value to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-13, N.M.S.A. 1978. 8) If your land was valued in 2002 in accordance with the special method of valuation for land used primarily for agricultural purposes, and the land is still used primarily for agricultural purposes, you need not reapply for that special method of valuation in 2003. If your land was not valued in accordance with that method of valuation in 2002, and it is now used primarily for agricultural purposes, you must make application to the Assessor in order to obtain that valuation method in 2003. If your land was valued in accordance with that special method of valuation in 2002, but it is no longer used primarily for agricultural purposes, you mus report that fact to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003, and must contain certain required information and be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-20, N.M.S.A. 1978 9) If you own "livestock" that are subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report such livestock to the Assessor. All such livestock that are present in the county on January 1, 2003, must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. If the livestock are transported into the county after January 1, 2003, they must be reported to the Assessor no later than the first day of the month following the first month in which the livestock have been present in the county for twenty (20) days. The required reports must contain certain required information and must be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21, N.M.S.A. 1978. 10) If you own a "manufactured home" and it was present in the county on January 1, 2003, you must report it to the Assessor by February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-26, N.M.S.A. 1978. 11) Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the State of New Mexico, Taxation and Revenue Department - Property Tax Division in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the County Assessor or the State Assessed Property Bureau, P.O. Box 25126, Santa Fe New Mexico 87504-5126, Phone: (505) 827-0895. 

Richards explains why 2-mill levy is needed

Texico School District voters will go to the polls on Feb. 4 for two reasons, to vote for school board candidates and to accept or reject a 2-mill levy.

School Supt. R.L. Richards explained that the levy, if approved, will not raise taxes; it will just renew a levy that is ending.

Funds raised by this levy can only be used for capital expenditures, such as maintenance and upkeep of the buildings. It cannot go toward salaries.

Richards stressed the importance of maintaining this levy because it's a vital part of the criteria used to get extra school funds from the state.

For example, he said, if have provided funding for the new Texico Sports Arena.

Also, the state matches the funds raised by this levy.

Last year, the levy generated \$55,000, and the state gave Texico School \$64,000 as its "match."

Thus, Richards asked Texico voters to support this levy extension.

The "construction manager at risk" method calls for the county to employ a bonded person who would stand the risk and hire the sub-contractors himself.

Currently, the jail is being designed. Bids will be put out, and awarded, April. Construction in would run from May to November.

State inspection, and acceptance of the facility by the commissioners, would take place in November.

It needs to be stressed that the commissioners are not obligated on full costs until they vote to issue the Certificates of Obligation. This may not take place until February

Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary officers were picked at the group's quarterly meeting on Jan. 13:


