Anyway, they have explained to me that they tried to schedule more Texas teams this year (Texico did play Bovina – and beat them handily), but many were in the midst of two-year contracts.

So Texico folks are seeking to line up more Texas opponents starting next year.

That is great.


Oh, one more thing: I know that some Farwell folks would love to see Texico-Farwell football games.

I had barely hung up the phone when the thought hit: How can he promise that?


How can Mike Pomper promise that if I write something about my recently-published book he'll put it on the front page? Had the euphoria of the Cubs advancing to the National League Championship Series impaired his news judgment? Doesn't Mike, I thought, realize we've got a football contest going on that's consuming the area?

No way was this bumping the results of yet-another hotly contested contest that could hinge on Eastern's game against TAMU-Commerce.

The reason Mike and I were talking was to clear up the rumors. It is true. The long-awaited book has finally been published.

My bilingual book on New York Yankees second baseman Alfonso Soriano, "Alfonso Soriano: The Dominican Dream Come True," is now available at bookstores everywhere and online at Amazon.com, BN.com and Borders.com. Just type in my name on the websites or ask the store attendant. Copies are also available in Texico at my mom's shop, Abby's Gifts, (in the Ruby's Antiques building) where she is more than happy to show and tell. The Spanish version will be out next spring.

The book is a biography of the Yankees superstar, who is one of the most charismatic and dominant players in baseball. It chronicles his journey from the dirt fields of the Dominican Republic, where he used socks for balls and sugar cane for bats, to the Japanese minor leagues, to the legendary Yankee Stadium in The Bronx. The book also goes in depth about the passion Dominicans have for baseball; where that passion comes from and why the game means so much to the island nation. The last chapter is a sociological look at how the game's Latin superstars, like Soriano, Yankees teammates Bernie Williams and Mariano Rivera, the Diamondbacks' Raúl Mondesi and the White Sox's Roberto Alomar, feel such a need and desire to give back to the Latin baseball community and help young players like they were helped when they were coming up to the big leagues. The most entertaining chapter to write was the one about Soriano signing with the Hiroshima Toyo Carp of the Japanese Central League. When he signed, Soriano was 150 pounds in full uniform. He spent three years in Hiroshima, stranded as a stranger in a strange land. The best part about this chapter was visiting the Carp baseball academy in San Pedro de Macoris, Dominican Republic. On a tour of the grounds, I saw 5-6 goats grazing in the outfield. I've been around my share of farm animals. Been around my share of goats. Never seen any being used as outfield grass lawnmowers. And certainly never seen any used, as the academy director told me, as "investments." The Soriano book is the culmination of an arduous process that began right after last baseball season. A person who had done some work for me in the sports marketing company I own called and said he was doing work for an Illinois-based publishing company that was looking to expand internationally. Because I speak Spanish, he wanted me to submit some bilingual proposals. Soriano was one of two I submitted. A couple of meetings later and I had two months to report, write, edit and submit my first hardcover book. In February, I went to Tampa, Fla., to spend time with the Yankees at training camp. It was an absolute zoo, like Yankees camp normally is. This season the zoo added a new animal with the signing of Japanese star Hideki "Godzilla" Matsui and his media throng. Fighting through the maze, I talked with Soriano, Williams, Rivera, Mondesi, Andy Pettite, first base coach Willie





New Mexico has a state law that requires all cities, municipalities and villages to keep 1/12th of their annual budget and expenditures in reserve at all times.

The 2002-2003 fiscal year budget was \$1,066,095 for the city. Expenditures totaled only \$654,813.37 for the year.

"In the five years that I have been with the tity, we've never fallen below the 1/12th mark," said Mrs. Harth.

For some years prior to Mrs. Harth's employment, Texico had been placing \$15,000 a year from the general fund into a building fund. There was also \$5,000 a year taken from the public works budget for the building fund.

The general fund transfer continues, but the public works transfer has been eliminated.

The building fund is a completely separate line item in the city's budget. The money that was budgeted for the building of the new city hall was intended to be spent last year, but it has now been carried over into the new fiscal year.

The new fiscal year budget has not been analyzed or approved by the New Mexico State Department of Financial Administration. Thus, no figures were given to the Tribune for the year 2003-2004 budget.

Texico has recently received a \$25,000 state grant for the building of the new city hall and the Texico Fire Dept. received a \$10,000 grant for the purchase of a new fire truck.

"The citizens of Texico need to know that they are not bearing the entire burden of building the new building or the other city improvements alone," Mrs. Harth explained. "The city is getting a good amount of assistance from the state."







Down there, million dollar views are a dime a dozen.

I met up in the Dominican with my good buddy Enrique Rojas, who is the most popular baseball commentator in the Dominican Republic. We spent the next week all over the island, taking in the Los Angeles Dodgers training facility, the Japanese facility, numerous pickup games at Parque Olímpico in Santo Domingo and spending a whole day with Soriano's mother, Andrea, at her home in San Pedro de Macoris. Soriano's hometown of San Pedro de Macoris is sacred baseball ground. The town is about the size of Santa Fe, yet it has produced over 40 major league players, including Pomper favorite Sammy Sosa of the Cubs.

It is here where Sosa used to roam the streets looking for a pair of shoes to shine. He didn't work because he wanted extra money. Like every Dominican boy in this sugar cane town, he shined shoes because he was trying to scrounge up daily meal money.

Stories like this litter the Dominican baseball world. Soriano's was somewhat different, in that his mother made him finish school while he worked his grandfather's cane fields.

The book is a story of perseverance and faith. It was certainly a labor of love and I hope you share in my enjoyment.

I have two more books coming out in the next year. I am writing a bilingual book on the spectacle of the Caribbean World Series, which will be out about this time next year, and a Spanish/English book called "Legends of the Dallas Cowboys," which will be out in September 2004.

My writing career has taken me all over the globe and allowed me to work for some of the most distinguished publications in the world. However, no matter where my writing appears, what TV or radio shows I do talking about this book and Latin baseball, nothing is going to make me prouder than when I come back to Farwell in November to sign books for people who have known me all my life.

There are numerous people around town I would love to thank and I hope everyone comes the signing when I come home. I would, however, like to give two special thank you's. I really hope Marcie Cole still subscribes to the Tribune because no one has had a more dramatic and direct affect on my career as her. She inspired, encouraged and molded my writing at a young age.

Finally, I want to give a special thanks to Eppifanyo Almanza. Eppifanyo worked with me on the farm from the time I was able to grab any sort of farm tool to when I graduated from high school. During that time, he never said a word of English to me. And, for that, I am eternally grateful. Because of him, I naturally picked up a language that has given me access to a completely new world. ¡Eres el mejor de los mejores!

I appreciate all the support I have received from the community, be it directly or through my parents. Farwell is a special place with special people.

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

## Some of Texas' new laws outlined

New laws passed by the Texas 78th Legislature this year include:

-- Domestic dog and coyote owners will be held accountable if their animals attack livestock.

-- A county clerk may set and collect a fee up to \$30 for a returned check.

-- It is lawful for a person to carry a handgun, illegal knife or club in their recreational vehicle. -- In matters of domestic violence, police may take action before a person is seriously injured.

-- A volunteer emergency care attendant need not have a high school diploma.

-- A county may donate salvage and surplus property to a civic or charitable organization.

-- A city may provide streets, sewer, etc., for a landowner in an extraterritorial jurisdiction.

-- A hospital district board may issue certificates of obligation and the county commissioners court must levy taxes on all property subject to hospital district taxation.





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

## Farwell city park sprinkler system OK'd

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday voted to buy a sprinkler system for the Farwell city park.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said he had gotten two bids, from Hamilton, for \$11,200, and Guthals, for \$13,280. Hamilton's bid was accepted.

In other business, the council:

-- Okayed a storage building permit for Gerald Norton, at 906 Fifth St.

-- Discussed a problem due to Police Chief Robert Achterberg closing the community center at midnight on the night of the Homecoming dance.

Achterberg said school officials were upset with that timing, feeling the center should be left open later since the dance didn't start until 10:30 p.m. Achterberg said there was no written rule on when the center was to be closed but he had been told years ago that midnight was the time to be used.

The council voted to allow the center to remain open until 1 a.m. for school events, like the prom and dances after games.

### **Texico OK's funds** for well electricity

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that a Melrose electrician has offered to run electricity to the new cemetery well.

Autrey said the bid was at \$5,475, but if the city sells him the current pump (he will be installing a smaller pump) and some extras, he will only ask about \$4,000 to do the job.

The council voted to accept his proposal.

The new well was installed last year but has not been used yet due to the electrical problem.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard Fire Chief Lewis Cooper request that

a 45' x 8' storage building be built for (1) storage, and (2) for rescue training.

He said he received two bids, from Ronnie Autrey, \$4,500, and Gary Bunger, \$4,820.

The council approved this request. Cooper said he will take Autrey's bid.

-- Plans to further discuss the suggestion by city inspector Terry Martin to restrict heavy trucks on city streets at its next meeting on Oct. 28.

-- Heard Cooper report he will start drug testing for his department, once

reasons, at the request of Doug Scioli.

-- Heard street supt. Clarence Smith say the tower well motor is shorting out and needs to be replaced or repaired.

He was given approval to seek bids to replace the pump and motor, at an estimated cost of \$7,400.

-- Gave city attorney Marion Ty Rutter approval to see if Texico has the easement right-of-way for the sewer at the west end of pavement west of Opal and Hereford streets. The cost is estimated from \$200 to \$300.

In discussing the streets, Mayor Jerry Cunningham noted that the state grant of \$70,000 for street repairs still hasn't been used.

Scioli said, "Our streets are falling apart."

No action was taken.

-- Heard the EMS's Nancy Roberts report that Weldon Kube is a new EMT with the Farwell service. Mrs. Roberts also received permission to advertise for more volunteers.

-- Heard Achterberg report that he has received complaints about loud music. The problem is that most "loud music" is still under the 85 decibel level that the state uses to determine whether it's against the law.

For example, the said Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church's bells, which one resident had complained about, had a decibel level only in the 40's. Achterberg said if you stood right next to a running law mower, that would be about the 85-decibel mark.

Achterberg may purchase a decibel meter so he can judge accurately when complaints are made. But he called the situation "no win" because folks who complain are going to be unhappy when they find out the "loud music" doesn't go above the 85-decibel mark.

-- Discussed possibly moving into the new City Hall next month. City Hall may be closed a day or two for the move. As for what to do with the current City Hall, there are no plans.

-- Discussed the Curry County Office of Emergency Management, which plans an exercise at the Texico-Farwell border in 2005 for dealing with a major hazardous problem.


