

# Cheese plant to be built in our area

The largest cheddar cheese plant in North America will soon be built south of Clovis. Construction is due to begin late this year and is proposed to be completed by July 2005.

It will sit on 3,000 acres very close to the Roosevelt/Curry County line off of Hwy. 70. It is a major accomplishment for this area to have attracted and landed the bid for the cheese plant. It has a lot of city and county officials wearing big "cheesy" grins.

Select Dairy Products initiated the joint venture with Dairy Farmers of America and Glanbia International. Glanbia is an Ireland-based company with dairy processing and cheese plants throughout Ireland, the United Kingdom and the United States. They will manage the operation of the new plant.

The new plant will produce 640-pound blocks of cheddar cheese using 6.5 million pounds of milk bought daily from area and state dairy farms.

One area of concern was the water usage, but chalking up another positive mark is the fact that the plant will actually produce more water than it uses. The plant will use approximately 1 million gallons of water a day. From this 750,000 gallons will go directly into a water treatment plant. Another 680,000 gallons of water will be extracted from the milk purchased for the cheesemaking process. The water can be reused for irrigation on area farms.

The plant will also be bringing many new jobs to the area, both temporary and permanent. An estimated 205 permanent jobs with an average salary of \$29,000 will be created and over 700 temporary jobs will be available for building the plant. The plant will also generate an estimated \$450 million in cheese sales.

Other factors within the area will be positively affected as well. House sales, rentals and retail sales will increase. It's being considered a win-win situation for every factor involved.

And, as a person directly involved with an area dairy farm, it's been interesting to read, listen to and watch the furor that's been created over the coming of the plant. It's supposed to be a great thing for we dairy farmers because we'll have a much closer market for our product and that means less cost for transportation and hauling. There are times that our milk is shipped clear across the United States for processing.

However, I must admit, that I'm a bit skeptical of the promises and proposals that are being handed to area dairy farms in lieu of the construction and operation of this plant.

Right now, there are over 90 dairies within an 80-mile radius of the plant. These dairies combined are producing more milk than can be currently processed. The building of the cheese plant will be a good thing if current herds on the larger dairies are not increased. However, if more dairies move into the area the surplus problem is again increased. Glanbia will only be able to buy a certain amount of milk in order to maintain profits and to pay a fair price to producers/coops. More milk being pressed into the area or towards the plant means a lower price in the long run for top quality milk.

The other skepticism that I have is in the history of cheese consumption in the U.S. It would be great if cheese was consumed/purchased in the nation on a consistent basis but it tends to be cyclical. The plant will produce large amounts of cheese. If there is no competitive market for the cheese, it becomes a commodity that the government buys for its' food programs. This translates into the lowest price paid for the product paid to the producer.

I don't mean to be a naysayer. I actually want this plant to prove me wrong on the issues I've written about. I just pray that Dairy Farmers of America and Select Milk will carefully manage the producers affairs in dealing with the cheese plant and other processors that may follow the plant into the area.


I'm proud of Clovis and the area for the plant coming in and in putting this area on the map for solid dairy production and processing. I want positive things to happen for everyone involved and I can see that the wheels of progress are turning in that direction.

I'm going to do all that I can to make this venture work for everyone. So whenever I take pictures for the paper and at family gatherings, instead of telling people to "say cheese," I'm going to tell them to say "Buy Cheese!"




