Lazbuddie School in good shape to handle budget shortfall

When new Lazbuddie School Supt. Roy Baker took the job last fall, he probably didn't realize he would be walking into a budget crunch.

But first on his agenda when he took over his new post this month was to make decisions regarding the 2003-2004 school budget.

Toward that end, he and his school board held special workshop meeting on June 19 to look at ways to deal with the budget.

First of all, it must be pointed out that Lazbuddie School, despite a small enrollment, is very strong.

Lazbuddie has what you might call a "rainy day" fund (to use the state of Texas jargon) that is around \$900,000.

But the idea is not to dip into that if at all possible. And that is what tightens up on its expenditures in the coming year, that type of surplus won't be necessary.

This means that about \$90,000 still must be cut.

What the school board wants to achieve is keep all its programs intact.

And when you talk about savings in a school situation, personnel (salaries and benefits) comprise most of it.


Currently, there are five teaching posts open:

- -- English.
- -- Home economics.
- -- Math.

-- Football coach/social studies.

-- Boys' basketball coach/ math.

What Baker will attempt to do is to fill as many positions as possible with existing staff. And he will try to find one man to coach football and boys' basketball, instead of having two persons

ing in Washington, D.C., creating a problem for civil service employees. Interestingly, this problem really wasn't solved until the 1970s, with a push into suburbia.

As World War I was close to ending (four months away), a story was headlined "Great Victory" and talked about the success of French and American forces between Soissons and Chateau Thierry against the Germans. This was the beginning of the end for the Kaiser's forces as the Allies pressed forward.

Another Page 1 article talked of the Marne battles in France. An American general in command of the U.S. forces south of the Marne, had to retreat a short distance due to a heavy German attack (the Americans counter-attacked later, regaining the ground). But after the initial retreat, the American general wrote, "We regret being unable on this occasion to follow the counsels of our allies, the French, but the American flag has been forced to retiré. This is unendurable and none of our soldiers would understand their not being asked to do whatever is necessary to remove a situation which is humiliating to us and unacceptable to our country's honor. We are going to counter-attack."

Meanwhile, locally, Southwest Utilities Co. connected up with Texico-Farwell with its Clovis plant. This allowed the Twin Cities to have electricity 24 hours a day. Also, the company had rebuilt its ice plant and would be able to supply this area with that needed commodity.

Page 2 also was dominated by war news. The U.S. expected to have more than 2 million men in the European theater after the first of the year (this wasn't needed because the war ended on Nov. 11).

Another article noted that 17 months earlier Germany had announced its policy of unrestricted submarine warfare, which drew the U.S. into the war, much to Germany's surprise. Anyway, the German sub warfare failed, as the U.S. landed 1 million men in France, with a loss of only 300 soldiers in transit.
