





State tells local schools what to do

Remember the days when it was stated by all about the importance of local school boards having control over their local schools.

Well, times change.

Earlier this year, the Tribune reported on New Mexico legislative changes which, in effect, removed much of the powers that locally-appointed school boards have.

Now let's take a look at recent Texas decisions and how they will affect all Texas schools, such as Farwell and Lazbuddie.

First off, every Texas school will now have its students recite the Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. and the state of Texas, followed by a minute of silence.

Several changes have been made in the food area by state officials, in an attempt to offer foods with more nutritional value. The state says that increasing comsumption of "junk food" and carbonated beverages by children is being blamed for an alarming increase in obesity and Type II diabetes. So the U.S. Department of Agriculture has launched an aggressive program addressing these concerns.

As of Aug. 1, these policies now include:
-- In junior high schools (6th through 8th grades), candy and soft drink machines are off limits during the times when breakfast, lunch or "snack" are served.

-- No soft drinks or candy can be sold in elementary schools (kindergarten through 5th grade).

-- Middle schools may not serve or provide access for students to prohibited carbonated beverages with volumes in excess of 12 ounces anywhere on school premises during the school day.

In Farwell, it used to be that candy was allowed each Friday afternoon. No more.

Also, this means that candy or soft drinks cannot be

taken on field trips during school days. State policy says: "Such food and beverages ("FMNV's" -- food of minimal nutritional value) may not be sold or given away on school premises by the school, school or non-school organizations, teachers, parents or any other person or group during the school

These policies went into affect by the Texas Department of Agriculture on Aug. 1.

And if you violate the FMNV policies?

"The Texas Department of Agriculture will aggressively enforce and diligently monitor this policy to ensure continued compliance. When violations of this policy are noted, the TDA will disallow all meal reimbursement for the day and require the school to reimburse the food service account for the lost reimbursement. A documented corrective action plan will be required and will be diligently monitored to ensure continued compliance."

And while the state is cracking down hard on candy bars and carbonated beverages, it also is shortchanging teachers and fulltime school staffers (but not administrators) on funds it promised toward health insurance.

As earlier reported, the state said it would give these folks \$500 per year. But it has been learned that the state doesn't have enough money to cover this. So teachers and other fulltime school staffers will get between \$460 and \$480, it is believed.

And nurses, librarians, etc., who earn \$50,000 or more, will get no money toward health insurance costs.

The group stayed at Marymount University in Arlington, Va. They arrived on a Saturday and it was kind of a day to just relax and meet new people, he said.




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

one to set up the 4" computer. Some of the computers are up and running, it was stated.

The council voted to give the company its money if all four units are running properly.

So far, the company has not sent anyone here, waiting its payment.

Thus, the dilemma may continue.

-- Heard a request by Bill Autrey to have the city move a meter from the west side of his alley to the east side. He is planning a new water line.

Rutter said if the city does it, it must do the same for any other resident who requests it.

Autrey said he is willing to do the work himself, but that the city would be responsible for the main.

There is no maintenance problem with the meter at this time. So Autrey was told that if he wanted the meter moved, he would have to pay for it himself.

-- Received one bid for a defibrillator, for \$17,293. Fire Chief Lewis Cooper said this was about \$2,000 higher than expected.

Also, there was a question about the bid. So it was tabled until Cooper clarifies it.

-- Received two bids for bunker gear racks for the fire department. The low bid of Jeff Queener, of Texico, \$2,850, was accepted.

-- Heard Cooper report that the fire department wants to start a drug testing program in its department.

"We don't suspect a problem, but we want a baseline for our members to show we are monitoring the situation," he explained. This is being done to avoid any poten-

tial lawsuit problems. Police Chief Mares said he would like his department to participate.

And councilman Autrey suggested it be fore all city employees.

Funding came into play, and it will depend on what funds Mrs. Harth can find.

Two bids for drug testing were received. The low bidder was Jeff Queener, of Texico, which was accepted, pending funding.

-- At the last meeting, Tharp complained about overloaded semi-trailer trucks using Craig Street to avoid the Port of Entry, and that it was causing severe street problems.

City building inspector Terry Martin suggested that "no truck traffic" signs could be posted on Craig Street, allowing police to issue citations if warranted.

So the topic was put on Tuesday's agenda.

Councilman Autrey said the ones complaining live on State Line Road, where the city doesn't have authority to post such signs since half of it is in Texas.

Cooper, a Craig Street

resident, said he didn't see an excessive amount of truck traffic on his street.

Chief Mares said very few big trucks used Craig.

The topic was tabled to see if there was a need for "no truck traffic" signs.

-- Approved buying a blower to help cool the fire department bays at an estimated \$2,100, at Cooper's urging. He noted some temperaturesensitive equipment is kept in the bays.

-- Okayed Cooper's

suggestion to declare an old Chevrolet car surplus property.

-- Agreed to Cooper's request to seek bids for heating and cooling units for meeting rooms in the fire houses.

-- Approved the 2003-

2004 budget resolution. The city's expenses will be a bit higher due to higher insurance costs. City employees won't be getting pay raises.

-- Was told that the state will give Texico \$75,000 for street repairs.

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Lazbuddie School Board proposes slight tax change

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday adopted a proposed tax rate of \$1.50, the state maximum.

It's up under a cent from last year. Full details are in the ad elsewhere in today's paper, including the time for a hearing.

The board also has joined 46 other Texas districts in appealing the action of the state comptroller to set the appraised values. The state action cost Lazbuddie about \$42,000.

In other business, the board:

-- Named Supt. Roy Baker to the regional advisory council.

 Named Joanna Martinez to act as teacher appraiser when a second appraisal is requested.

-- Approved the faculty/staff and student/parent handbooks.

-- Turned down an offer from a man to buy the school's band uniforms. The board felt the \$500 offer was too low.

- Officially hired Linda Servatius as math teacher and Mark Osmus as coach and social studies teacher.

--Went with a different company to handle student insurance. Premiums will be up.

Farmers face tough decisions

From Monti Vandiver, extension agent-IPM for Parmer County:

There are some situations brewing in the Northwest Plains where some tough decisions must be made. To salvage a crop, some irrigated producers may have to defer their water to a portion of their planted areas.

The added moisture required to sustain a plant in 100+ degree temperatures can cause significant stress as well as excessive water use just for plant survival. The combination of high heat, virtually no rainfall, wind and low humidity make it very difficult to keep up with the evapotranspiration rate.

The long term average rainfall amount for July and August is 4.26 inches compared to .05 inches accumu-

lated July 1 so far this year. While it goes against most producers' grain to abandon a crop, it is sometimes a "best management practice" to defer inputs to a limited number of acres to deal with the abnormal environmental conditions mother nature has dealt. Before a producer abandons a crop or defers inputs in an attempt to salvage a crop, the crop insurance carrier must be notified to keep for jeopardizing crop insurance coverage.

LIVE CATTLE: Cash prices dropped a couple of dollars this week and the October contract slipped as well. Over the long term, the market should hold up fairly well on strong fundamental support, but look for a downward correction in August. Short term trends are down for now and the seasonal tendency is to correct in August and move higher into early October.

FEEDER CATTLE: The market may have seen their highs for the year, but tight supplies and strong demand could possibly give this market another run back up in the September/October time frame? Prices usually correct down in August and then flatten out into the fall. Next big rally should occur in the January/February time frame. Cash remains strong.

<u>CORN</u>: Short term trends are still pointing higher with some help coming from a high pressure system located in the Western Corn Belt. It will take more than "hot and dry" in one area to push prices substantially higher, but the market still has more room to the upside. Targets look to be \$2.25 and \$2.35 at this time. Exports are still slow and China is still selling corn.

SOYBEANS: Short term trends have turned higher this week, but are caught inside a tight trading range with little or no news to move prices in either direction. A close back above \$5.30 basis the November contract should push prices back up towards the \$5.40 area, but this may take some type of strong fundamental news to help? Market is still looking for high production numbers.

WHEAT: December KC Wheat has stalled out around the \$3.64 highs made back in May. Strong export and short crops in Europe, Canada, Russia and Australia have all helped to support this rally. The hot and dry weather in much of the Spring Wheat growing areas has also had buyers moving into the market. Overall, market may correct, but long term outlook is higher.

<u>COTTON</u>: Prices found support around the late June low at 57 cents and the market has stalled. Short term trends are down and overhead resistance lies above at 59 cents basis the December contract. A move above 59 may stimulate a rally while a move back below 57 would set-up a move back towards the June low of \$52.50-53.00. Fundamentals are positive, but prices are negative?

Dustin Bartlett, a Lazbuddie High graduate, has received a \$1,000 scholarship from the National Association of the United States – Texas Chapter 18.


He is the son of Rocky Bartlett and Renee Wright, of Bovina, and San Antonio.
