

Texico water conservation rules explained

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed the using in the wastewater plant. As it stands, any water conservation measures after City Clerk Carolyn Johnson said that several folks had called to ask about lawn watering times.

Johnson said that houses with odd addresses are to water their lawns on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, while even addresses can water on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. There is no watering on Sunday or between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on any days.

Johnson also said the city will look for folks who are dumping trash outside of the dumpsters. Especially larger items.

Those items will not be picked up by the trash service, and it is illegal to put those items anywhere except for the city dump.

In other news, the council:

- Heard that Police Chief Doug Bowman spoke to Parmer County Commissioner Ronald Byrd about paving State Line Road from the end of the pavement up to Craig Street.

Bowman is working on getting machinery from Curry County to do the work, and using excess material from Texico. Byrd offered some Parmer County material to help with the project, and asked that they pave as far as possible.

Bowman is also working on signs to put up around town informing truckers that using engine brakes, or "Jake" brakes, is prohibited in town.

- Discussed the city interim budget. Johnson said the city is planning a 50 cent increase in utilities, and has budgeted money for opening the swimming pool next year. They are also including a 5 percent raise for city employees, \$5,000 for the Senior Citizens fund, \$4,500 for EMS training, and a new computer for Johnson.

- Received a report from Councilman Jerry Bradley about a new chemical the city is looking at



LIVE CATTLE: Live cattle prices were basically flat on week with cash trading steady at \$85. Futures prices were able to trade back up into Friday after moving down earlier in the week and closed fairly strong. Supplies are expected to continue to tighten as we move forward and the USDA Cattle on Feed released Friday was termed slightly bullish as cattle on feed remain lower than last year.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices also came under a little pressure early in the week, but were able to recover into Fridayís close while closing close to the high of this week. Cash trade remains fairly strong and demand continues strong as well. Tight supplies of feeders continue to support ideas that higher prices are still possible. This market will eventually need some help from higher Live Cattle prices.


CORN: The July corn tried a couple of times this week to move above last weeks highs around the \$4.34 area and failed both times. Prices are extremely overbought at these levels with seasonal tendencies turning down The collapse seen in the U.S. Dollar over the last several days has helped to support the most recent rally. There will come a time that this relationship changes?

SOYBEANS: Soybeans also made a hard run at last weeks high, but also failed to close above those levels before closing lower on Friday. This market is also very overbought at current levels and has also been supported to a large degree by the falling U.S. Dollar. World stocks continue to grow above year ago levels and prices may be topping at these levels.

WHEAT: Wheat prices were the only grain which was able to close above last weeks highs after several tests during the week. Like the rest of the grain complex prices have been supported primarily by a lower Dollar. This market is also very overbought and could be top ping. World stocks are expected to grow to considerably larger levels than seen last year. This would be negative ong term.

COTTON: Cotton prices remained basically flat last veek with no real direction. The lower Dollar has little support as a lower stock market played a more important role. There are some longer term cycles and seasonal tendencies which may have topped the market. There could be another test of the highs, but odds favor lower prices over the next few months.

The Farwell City Council will discuss an ordinance prohibiting the discharge of firearms or missiles within the city of Farwell at its June 16, 2009, meeting at 5:30 p.m. at Farwell City Hall

If approved, this would say the following would be prohibited, with exceptions:

Section 1. Prohibited

- No person shall discharge firearms, explode Α. explosive devices or launch, propel or otherwise cause a projectile, including rockets, shot from guns using an explosive propellant, firecracker type rockets and projectiles, to be fired or projected within the city limits.
- Β. Exceptions to the prohibition in subsection (a) are: 1. The use of firearms by duly constituted law enforcement officers in the discharge of their duties and while acting within the scope of their authority, including training with firearms at a duly designated practice range facility within the city limits.
 - 2. The use of firearms by any person acting in the lawful defense of his or any other person's life or property.
 - 3. The use of firearms for a gun salute using blank ammunition, at military funerals by duly recognized military groups.
 - 4. The use of firearms for gun safety demonstrations, theatrical presentations, and historical re-enactments, provided however:

(a) Firearms or replicas thereof, used for the purpose of historical re-enactments and may be used only with blank ammunition, subject to inspection and approval by a peace officer.

(b) No participant in a theatrical presentation or historical re-enactment may have in his or her possession any live ammunition.






