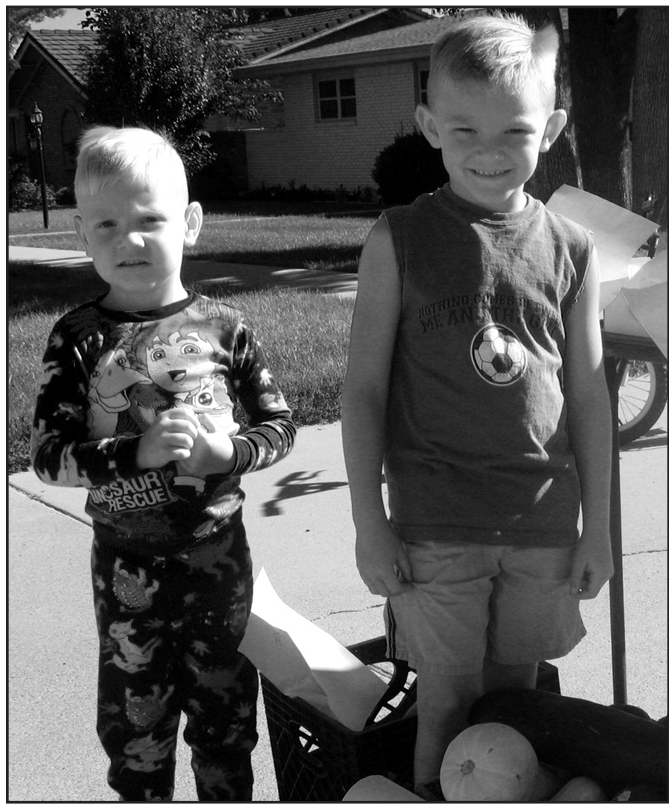

General Permit Authorization No. TXG921070
APPLICATION. Arthur F. Schaap, 650 County Road O, Clovis NM 88101, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) under General Permit No. TXG920000 for authorization to operate a new dairy cattle facility at 8,000 head of which 5,000 head are milking cows in Parmer County, Texas. The notice of intent was received by TCEQ on July 9, 2008. No discharge of pollutants into the waters in the state is authorized by this general permit except under chronic or catastrophic rainfall conditions or events. All waste and wastewater will be beneficially used on agricultural land.

The proposed facility will be located on Farm-to-Market 3333 go 1.2 miles east of intersection with Highway 60, turn right on County Road 5, go 1.5 miles to entrance in Parmer County Texas. The facility will be located in the drainage area of the Double Mountain Fork Brazos River in Segment No. 1241 of the Brazos River Basin.

A copy of the notice of intent, application, the Executive Director's technical summary, and the CAFO general permit are available for viewing and copying at the Parmer County Clerk's Office, 401 3rd Street, Farwell, Texas 79325, Parmer County.

The Executive Director of the TCEQ has made a preliminary decision to approve coverage of this facility under General Permit No. TXG920000.

PUBLIC COMMENT. Written public comments may be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address provided in the information section below, within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. In addition, the public may request a public meeting. If significant interest exists, the Executive Director will direct the applicant to publish a notice of the public meeting and hold the public meeting. The applicant must publish notice of a public meeting at least 30 days prior to the meeting in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the CAFO is proposed to be located. The Executive Director will consider all relevant information pertaining to whether the applicant meets the requirements of the general permit and will issue a written determination as to any final action on the notice of intent for coverage under the general permit.

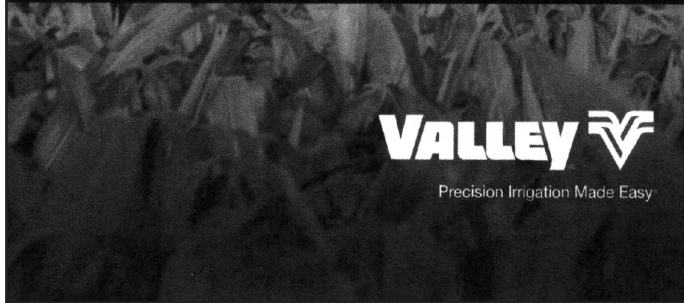

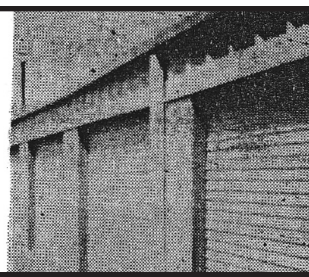

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices made a short term bottom this week and should trade back higher over the near term. The August Breaki may be over and a close above the \$106.60 basis the October contract would confirm this. Cash broke early this week, but bids were back to \$99 by weeks end which may give the market a little more support. A close back below the July low around \$103.80 would turn trends down and drive the market back towards the \$1.00 level.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders are also hold long term support levels this week, but have been reluctant to turn back higher. At this time, it would take a close back above the \$113.35 basis the October contract in order to turn short term trends back up. Corn prices may have some short term impact on prices, but the Live Cattle prices still have a stronger influence on the market.

CORN: Corn prices traded all the way back up into resistance at the \$6.25 level this week before trading back down. Short term trends remain higher and it would take a close above the \$6.25 level basis the December contract in order to turn long term trends back higher. If this were to take place, prices would project a move up into the \$6.90 area at a minimum. Otherwise, prices could easily trade back down into support levels around the \$5.50-5.60 area? Market is extremely volatile.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices traded back up into some long term resistance this week, but has failed to close above \$13.50 basis the November contract. Although short term trends have been up, long term trends remain down. Odds favor lower prices over the near term.

WHEAT: September KC Wheat turned long term trends up over a couple weeks ago and have continued to move higher. There was some strong resistance around the \$9.52 level which halted the advance, but much will depend on the rest of the grain complex? Lower corn and beans seems to keep the pressure on wheat. Should be plenty of wheat acres planted this year.

COTTON: Although cotton prices rallied for a couple of days this week, long term price projections still point towards the \$62-64 level basis the December contract. Planted acres and production is expected to one of the lowest seen in recent memory. This may help to support prices over the long term, but demand will need to improve to make this happen?

The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Amarillo regional office, and the Farwell City Hall, 100 9th Street, Farwell, Parmer County, Texas. The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. In addition to the renewal, this permitting action includes the incorporation of the following authorizations or changes to authorized facilities related to this permit: amendments and permits by rule. The reasons for any changes or incorporations, to the extent they are included in the renewed permit, may include the enhancement of operational control at the plant or enforceability of the permit. For more information about this permit application or the permitting process, please call the Office of Public Assistance, Toll Free, at 1-800-687-4040. **The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

PUBLIC COMMENT You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. **The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published.** After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING

You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. **If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided.** According to the Texas Clean Air Act § 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. first scrimmage," said Anglin.

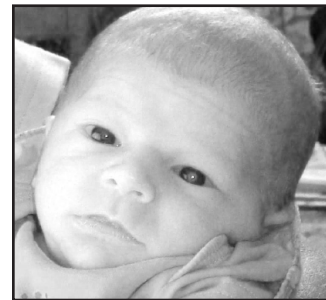
He cited Aaron Warren for good defensive line work.

Thus, three folks are seeking the job – Mrs. Steelman, Donna Mitchell and Sandra Clayton.

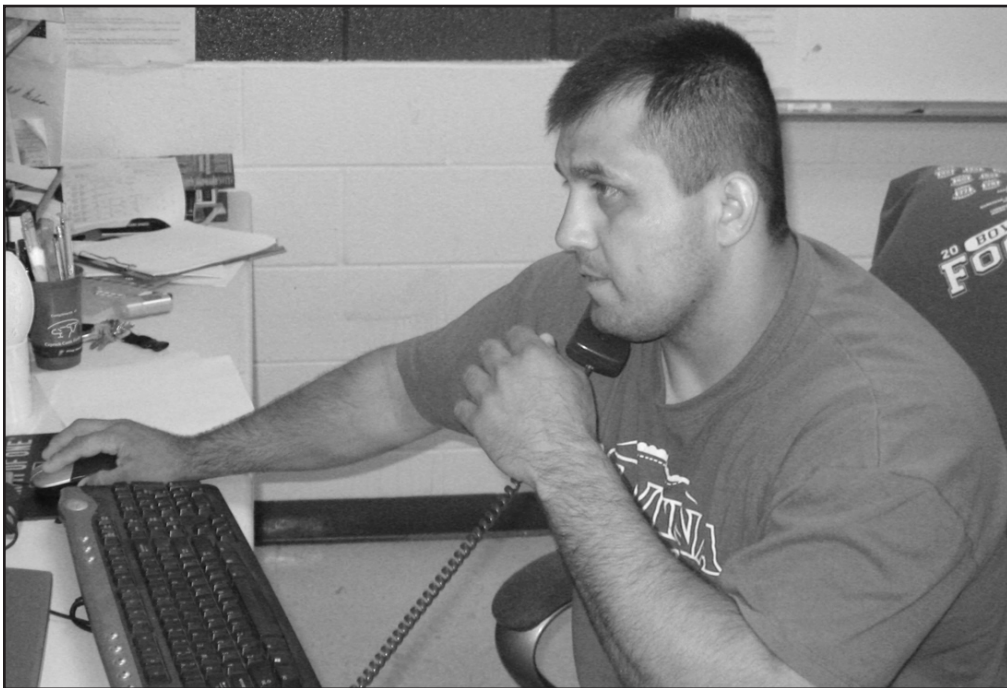
Mrs. Steelman is a homemaker and longtime Bovina resident. Her husband, Joe, is a farmer.

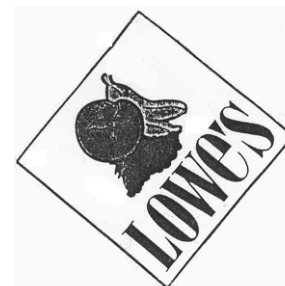
