Texico Public Works Supt. Smith resigns

The Texico City Council on Tuesday accepted the resignation of Public Works Supt. Clarence Smith, effective May 14.

Smith had worked for the city for nine years. He plans to do a lot of traveling in his bus.

It's likely that his assistant, Darrell Stanton, who has worked for the city close to five years, would be moved up into Smith's post.

But the city ordinance mandates that the city advertise for folks for the position. So the council voted to advertise for a new public works superintendent, plus for summer help.

At Stanton's request, the council voted to buy a push mower from Valley Mower for \$600.

Stanton also is seeking a riding lawn mower. But this was put on hold because councilman Jerry Bradley suggested getting a \$4,000 machine which he estimated would last 4 to 5 years.

Stanton had recommended one for \$1,400.

In other business, the council:

-- Called an executive session at councilwoman Monnie Cunningham's request for personnel reasons.

-- Heard about a problem of vegetation growing in the new city hall parking lot.

-- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say that the lot where the old city hall was needs to be "settled" better to avoid any-

one getting hurt there.

-- Agreed to spend about \$3,000 on repairs for the swimming pool. This includes a new pump, new doors, painting and sealing.

-- Discussed possibly increasing council pay.

Currently, Mayor Jerry Cunningham receives \$20 per meeting and the councilmen receive \$10 per meeting, up to a maximum of four meetings per month.

City Clerk Teresa Harth explained that if the pay is increased, it would not take effect until the next city election and then only for new councilmen elected. Then after the 2<sup>nd</sup> city election, the pay hikes would go into effect for all councilmen.

Autrey opposed raising the pay, instead suggesting giving more money to city employees. Bradley

also didn't favor pay raises.

But Mrs. Cunningham asked that the proposal be carried over to the next meeting because councilwoman Sharon Askew wasn't present. This was agreed to.

-- Heard Mrs. Harth say she is still waiting on Xcel Energy folks to get back to her on another street light for Avenue F; and for county officials to discuss chip sealing the end of Avenue F.

-- Heard Mrs. Harth say she planned to interview three candidates for the court clerk's post on Friday, and asked if the council could hold a special meeting next week to hire someone. This was okay with the council.

Carolyn Johnson had been court clerk, but has moved to the assistant

## From Cody Hill, Parmer County Extension Agent Potential freeze damage in winter wheat

Early morning air temperatures (April 12) throughout the Texas Panhandle ranged from a low of 22 F in Booker to high of 29 F in Tulia based on KVII-TV School Net temperatures. These temperatures were certainly cold enough to potentially damage our winter wheat crop. The extent of the damage will depend on the stage of growth of the wheat, actual air temperature within the wheat canopy, and duration of the cold temperatures.

Wheat is in various growth stages throughout the Panhandle. Most, if not all of the wheat was well into at least the jointing stage of development, ranging anywhere from one visible joint to as many as three visible joints. Some wheat was even further along either in the flag leaf or boot stage. The more mature the wheat the greater the potential for freeze damage.

At jointing, the spike or grain head has formed, and the growing point which is located just below the spike is pushing the spike up through the leaf sheaths. As the spike gets further from the ground and closer to the heading stage it becomes more vulnerable to freezing temperatures. Temperatures in the lower to mid twenties can cause death to the spike and growing point, causing stem elongation to immediately cease, although leaves may remain green for a significant amount of time afterwards. Since tillers vary somewhat in age there is potential for some spikes to be damaged while others remain uninjured. Continued growth of younger tillers may obscure injury to the older main stem or primary tillers. Substantial injury to the leaves can also occur. With this injury, spikes may become trapped in the dead leaf tissue preventing or delaying the spike from emerging. A third type of injury that may occur is damage to the stem or nodes. In some cases this type of damage can be significant and is relatively hard to assess soon after the freeze damage has occurred. When stem damage is present, tissue used to transport water up the stem is damaged which can lead to sudden death of leaf tissue once temperatures rise causing the plant to need more water than can be supplied by the damaged tissue.

Wheat in or close to the boot stage of development is very susceptible to freeze damage from temperatures in the mid- or even upper twenties. In the upper twenties, stem and leaf tissue may not be damaged whereas the spike may be rendered sterile due to

damaged anthers which produce the pollen necessary for grain development. Sterility of the anthers is detected fairly easily, as their normal color prior to bloom is light green to yellow-green while frozen anthers are shriveled and white. The growing point may not be damaged even though the spike is sterile. If this is the case the tiller will continue to grow and heading will occur. However, in most cases the head will turn a white or straw color soon after emergence, strongly suggesting the spike or head is sterile. It is also possible that only part of the spike will be sterile with the remainder producing normal grain. Head trapping in damaged leaf tissue frequently occurs from a freeze at boot. Trapped heads are not necessarily sterile.

It is very difficult to assess damage immediately after a freeze. Temperatures must warm up enough to allow damaged tissue to degrade to the point that injury symptoms are visible. Usually it is best to wait at least five days after a freeze before trying to assess damage. After five days, split stems and examine the spike. A damaged spike will have a water soaked appearance, will be wilted, and will have begun to turn brown. Sterility in the boot stage can be assessed by looking closely at the anthers in the florets of the spike. The following web site has an excellent publication that discusses how to evaluate freeze damage in wheat. <http://soilcrop.tamu.edu/publications/pubs/scs1999-15.pdf>

At this point it is simply too early to know how much freeze damage may have occurred to the wheat crop. Hopefully, the recent moisture and warm soil temperatures helped insulate the crop from the most severe temperatures. Within the wheat canopy temperatures should have been somewhat warmer than the surrounding air. Very little wind was associated with the freezing temperatures, which should have increased the chances of the canopy temperature remaining warmer than air temperature. At this point, let's remain optimistic until we actually observe significant freeze injury symptoms.

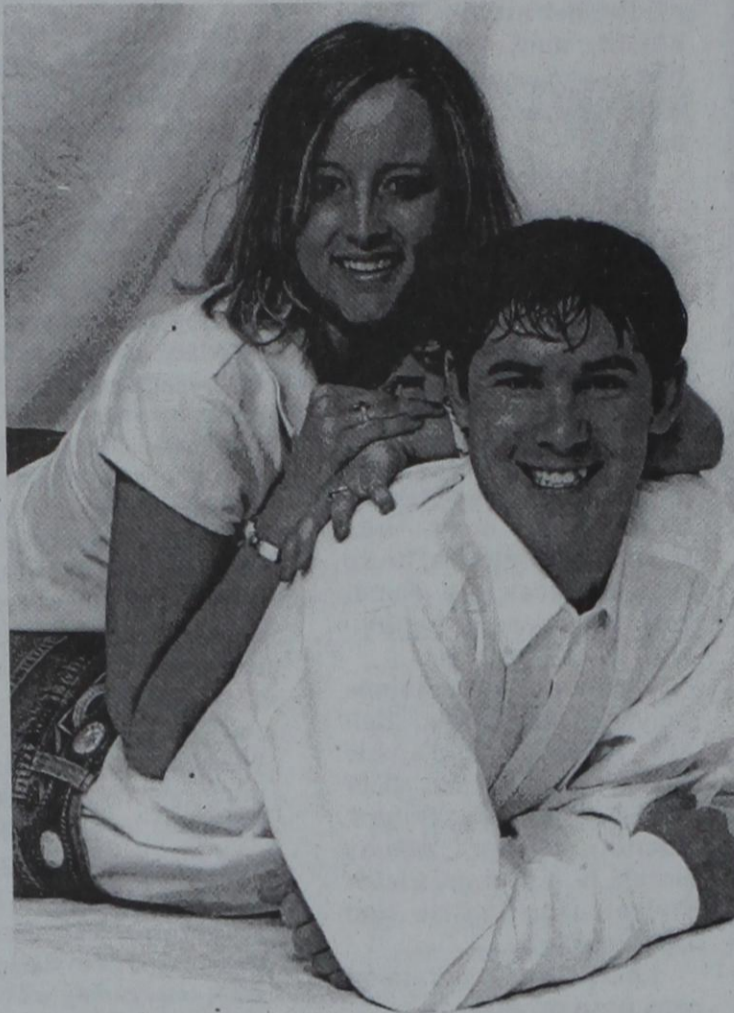
Mrs. Littlejohn was also quick to point out that when they first started, very few of the students wanted to sing in front of the other students.

# Farwell schools to open Sept. 9 ... 1918

(Editor's note: This is part of a continuing series of articles on the historic Texico-Farwell News newspapers from 1916-1920.)

"Farwell Public School Notes" was one of the top stories in the Aug. 23, 1918, issue of the Texico-Farwell News.

It announced that the Farwell teachers would hold their Teacher's Institute from Sept. 2-6, and there would be representatives from other states there. Also, a state rep from the Interstate Scholastic League would be present, plus a representative of the Food Administration.

Farwell High School would open on Sept. 9. Farwell would offer 11 grades, which required 17 units for graduation. "This will be a wonderful help to the children who have to go away to school because it will put them practically another year nearer graduation when entering the State Institutions of Higher Learning," said the article.

The faculty for Farwell was not complete yet, but teachers assigned thus far were C.H. Wirth, E.A. White, of Farwell; Mrs. Fannie Boyle, of Clovis; Mrs. L.E. Canon, of Memphis, Tenn.; Miss Josephine Nichols, of Clarendon; Miss Rosemary Cox, of Brownwood; Mrs. R.J. Lipscomb, of Hereford, and Miss Madge Nixon, of Byers, Texas.

Another Page 1 article said a Texico boy was missing in action in World War I. Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Hill received a telegram saying their son, Charlie Wilson, was missing. The two Wilson boys, Charlie and Dow, had reported to the military in mid-July for training before heading to Europe. Their mother and sister, Rena, lived one mile north of Texico.

One Page 1 story talked of an "Illinois Picnic." It was set at "Twin Mills," about 1 1/2 miles southwest of Texico and was for "the 'Illinois' people of this community."

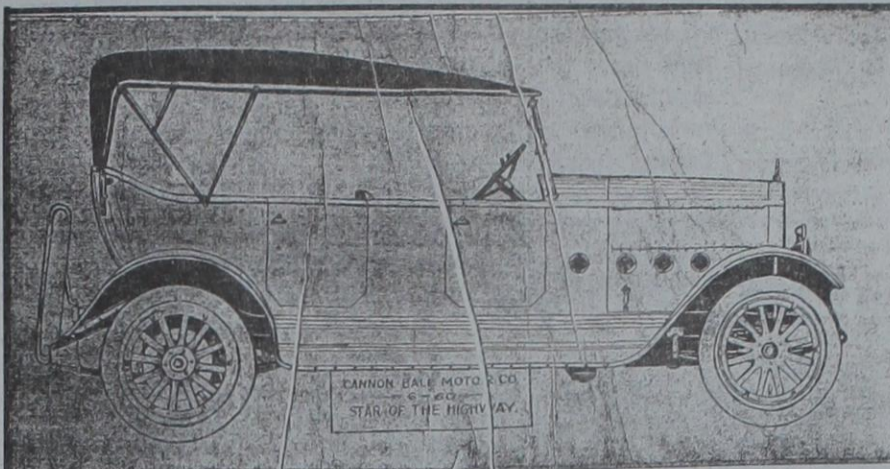

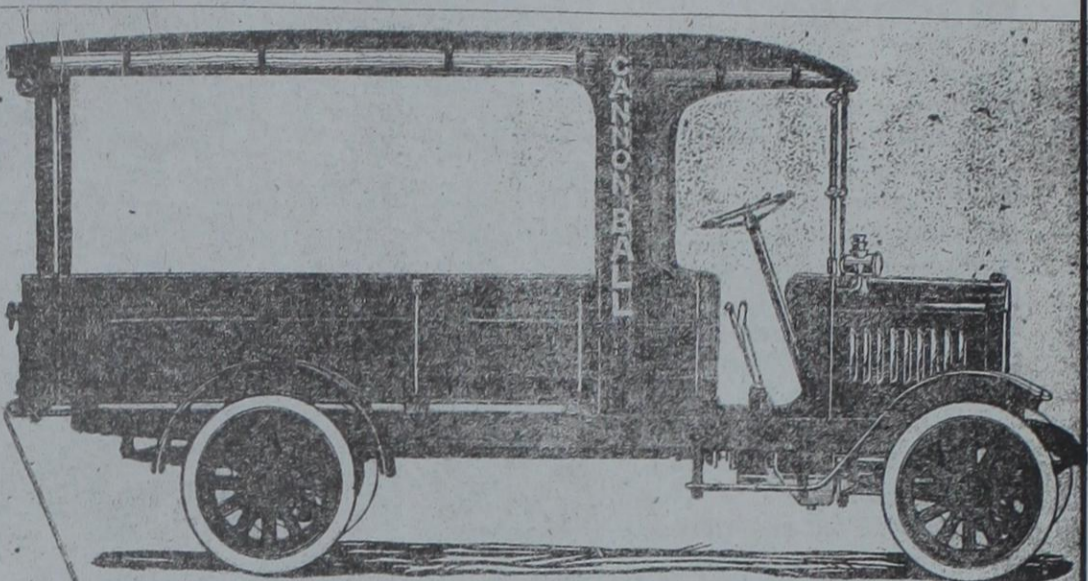

Another article talked about interest in organizing the "State Line Band." This was comprised of hometown talent under the direction of James McDowell. C.A. Roberson headed the list of folks donating money for instruments with \$25. Other donations came from B.F. Fears, Richard Battenfield, Lusk Hiner, Don Hill, Marie Moore, Dorine McDowell, Arthur Jenkins, Pauline Lawrence, Caddie Moore, W.H. Simmons, Lonnie Coltharp, Lawrence Overstreet, Donald Thomas and others.

The band had a snare drum, basses, tenor trombones, altos, cornets and clarinets.

Other Page 1 notes included:  
-- Southwest Utilities Co. had completed the ice plant here and was turning out ice to full capacity. One car of ice was shipped to Amarillo, and one to Ft. Sumner this past week.

-- A letter came from Pvt. J.L. Baldwin, serving with the Marines in France, and who had worked for Kemp Lumber Co., in Farwell. The letter noted, "No doubt you

will be surprised to learn that the wind and sand blows here just like on the plains of Texas. And I often think I am there when a big bunch of sand and brickbats hit me in the face."

Most of the other Page 1 news was of the war. One said "the Germans had just evolved another new and treacherous device by which they operate their machine guns with their feet, while holding up their hands in token of surrender."

And the U.S. government was discussing a proposed tax of 2 cents per gallon on gasoline.

Page 2 carried another heavy dose of war news. But "Pleasant Hill Points" noted that "school starts Sept. 2<sup>nd</sup>. Everyone that likes a good school, come to Pleasant Hill."

Other "Points" noted that Leonard Turnell was home on furlough from a navy training camp, and that Thomas Gallagher, wife and daughters had gone to Colorado for an extended visit.

"Bovina Notes" had this to say:

-- F.L. Spring was in Farwell on business; Mr. and

Mrs. L.E. Eastland were Hereford visitors; Will Berggren was spending several weeks in Nebraska; Robert Lyne had gone to Oklahoma for a few days, "after which he would be in the service of Uncle Sam"; Mr. Fish was the new janitor at Bovina Schools; Ward Thompson had returned from Grayson County, and was now cultivating his crop near Bovina; and J.H. Aldridge, S.T. Lawrence, Norman Wilson, Al Berggren and C.F. Hastings and their families had gone on fishing trips to Hereford.

Other Bovina notes said Mrs. B.Y. Dickerson and

children had returned from an extended stay with relatives in Itasca, and they were accompanied home by Miss Camilla Patton, who will teach the Daniel School near here.

Page 3, as always, was a full page ad for the Cannon Ball Motor Co., which was also owned by the newspaper owner.

The Cannon Ball brick administration building cost more than \$60,000 and its three stories included 23 office rooms and clerical apartments including café, barber shop, demonstration rooms, company garage, etc.

The ad said the company's Six-Sixty, "Star of the Highway" models "are now finished and will be on our demonstration floors in a few days. Designs are complete and truck models as illustrated below are being rushed to completion. Contract had been let for the construction of the first unit of the factory building in Texico and actual work will soon be under way.

And, as always, Page 4 featured lots of tidbits. And there were three letters from youths fighting in France. "Mike" Hill wrote that "most of the company from Texico and Clovis are in the infantry. We have to drill about 10 hours a day and carry a pack of about 65 pounds, besides our guns. Some day, drilling takes 12 to 14 hours, mostly marching."

J.H. Kays announced a public sale on his farm 10 miles north of Texico and 1/2 mile north of Pleasant Hill School. He was selling "10 good horses, good young percheon mares, 20 good milch cows, 6 good hogs, 150 acres fine row crop, soon ready to harvest, chickens and many other things."

Small items on the page noted:

-- Prof. Bazzill, principal of Pleasant Hill School, was a "pleasant caller at our office on Thursday."

-- Rev. L.L. Thurson was spending the week at Pleasant Hill, "holding a protracted meeting. He reports fine services."

-- Douglass and Donald Thomas, and Lonnie Coltharp are planning to attend A&M College this year.

-- A 3-room bungalow in North Texico was for rent. It included electric lights, telephone and cistern.

-- The home of Mr. and Mrs. G.C. Martin was "visited by the stork and a fine 7-lb. baby boy came to make his home with them. Mr. Martin is foreman for the new Texico School Building now under construction.

-- And Rev. J.F. Nix got a neat surprise from the Texico-Farwell Baptist Church. While he was away at Roseland, Texas, holding a revival, church members and friends decided to do something special for him to show their appreciation of his fine work here. So they gave him a 21-jewel, Waltham movement watch.

tail on this in the past, I won't bother to repeat all the details again.

The last degree I ever got was in 1961 when I graduated South Shore High School in Chicago.

I was not a scholar. I was not the student who excelled. The best I could do was graduate in the top half of my class -- about 800 students.

Every now and then, I write a bit about "the old days." I think I will do that today.

But I have a special request to make:

Since this column will be devoted to education, a subject I'm not very good at, I would appreciate it if some of our readers who are educators pen a note to me to explain the educational expertise involved in the following three short stories.

I'm not an educator. Never did better than that high school diploma. So I hope that one or more educators reading this can help me out by explaining the educational rationale that the teachers used in the following scenarios:

1. The coach's name was Applegan. We called him "Coach Ap."

In his physical education classes, if you could not do the required exercise, you had to say "Can't do, Coach Ap" and were told to sit in the corner away from the other students.

This happened to me a great deal, like every week, semester after semester.

I've always wondered why, instead of sending me and others to the corner, the teacher didn't have someone teach us how to do the required exercises?

Or is sending students to the corner the better way to handle this?

I didn't think so, but what do I know...

2. This teacher's name was Mrs. Tugenburg and she taught math.

She gave tests every two weeks, then handled out the results one by one before the whole class, with the top grade going first, and the worst grade going last. Thus, everyone knew how everyone else scored.

3. My favorite involved Mrs. Kritchevsky, who taught a foreign language class.

She did a very good job in demanding that the students only speak in the foreign language during the class period, as she did. This helped the learning process along.

There was only one minor problem: I couldn't speak the foreign language.

This was especially amusing when she handed out tests.

Do you know how difficult it is to answer the questions on a test when you have absolutely no ideas what the questions are?

I guess there's a rationale there, too?

Anyway, if any educator can help explain why the teachers used the above processes, I sure would like to know.

I've always wondered...

P.S. That last story may seem hard to believe,

but it's true. In that class, the teacher never gave me my test results back.

And my semester grade? A "B".

P.S.S. -- Just so as not to end this column on a down note, we all know that good things can come from bad.

So let's take a look at the lessons I learned from those three scenarios:

-- The 1<sup>st</sup> scenario: I finally taught myself what the other kids could do so that in the middle of the 4<sup>th</sup> semester I didn't have

to say "Can't do, Coach Ap" anymore. This helps increase self confidence.

-- The 2<sup>nd</sup> scenario: When I became a manager, I already had learned the importance of when an employee was having a problem, to discuss it with that person privately -- and not in front of others.

-- The 3<sup>rd</sup> scenario: After five months in a classroom not having a clue to what was going on, I learned patience.

And we all know the importance of patience...
