In the past several months the emergency units of the Texico and Farwell volunteer fire departments have been called upon frequently by local citizens. We can be glad that we have these emergency vehicles for our use, but this is also beginning to create a problem which the local people need to be aware of.

We may be endangering the ability of the Clovis ambulance service to respond to our calls. Last week the coffee cup gossip had it that the Gold Star Ambulance Service of Clovis was not going to respond to calls to the Twin Cities. This was serious business and we felt that an immediate investigation was well in order.

We contacted Gold Star for their views on serving this area and interviewed Ed Main, manager of the concern, and we can report that they are ready, willing and able to respond to calls from the Twin Cities. However, they did say that lately they have come up against this situation. While they were responding to a local call, their radio reported to the ambulance enroute to the Twin Cities that one of the local emergency vehicles had picked up the person in distress and started to Clovis.

This poses two problems; first it creates expense for the company when they make a dry run and secondly it ties up the equipment when it might be needed elsewhere. As you know accidents and emergencies have a disquieting habit of occurring in bunches and if all their units are out when a call comes in to the office, this delays their response and could lead to an unnecessary tragedy.

We in the Twin Cities must realize that our vehicles are only emergency units and are not meant to take the place of a well-equipped ambulance. Also, unnecessary dependence on local facilities does impose an extra burden on the local volunteer men who donate their time to perform this service. Our locals do not have the advanced training in life saving techniques or latest skills in moving badly injured accident victims that a professional ambulance crew must and does have.

Too, these men are not paid to be here around the clock on a seven-day-a-week basis as are the professionals. We should remember that these are local emergency units and are not fully equipped, professional lifesaving ambulances. We need to be careful that the ability of a professional service to respond to this area is not thoughtlessly jeopardized. If this confusion continues to exist it may be necessary for some form of rules to be arrived at between Gold Star and Texico and Farwell.

We read where our young and coming Lieutenant Governor has decided that the state of Texas could stand some forward thinking political programs and that he will offer himself to the public as a candidate for the job of governor. We suspect he remembers how John Tower clobbered another fair-haired boy of Texas politics -- one Waggoner Carr of Lubbock. Or again, he might figure that Preston Smith would be an easy mark considering the stock market dealings exposed currently in the news. Ben may be in for a surprise, if Smith displays as much concern for the Texas taxpayer in the next 17 months as he has in the past. He is going to be hard to beat anyhow.

Our assessment is that as of this writing Smith has made some money in stocks but we certainly cannot term it illegal or even morally questionable. Time may change our minds. But Preston Smith has fought a good battle against higher taxes and runaway spending and this is more than we can say for Barnes. We are not really put out with how much legitimate money our governor makes as long as he is concerned with how much the tax-wary citizen can keep of what he too might earn. Apparently other politicians are going to make their personal pile and still impoverish Johnnie Q. Texpayer. Unless some more shenanigans are revealed, we say "Ole" for Governor Smith.

John Hanibal Aldridge was born in Illinois in 1905 and passed away in 1968, following many years spent in public service to the residents of Farmer County as county and district judge and in private law practice. He spent almost his entire life in Farmer County, moving to the area and settling at Bovina in 1906. The family moved to Farwell in 1918, where John graduated from high school. He later attended classes at West Texas State Teachers College and Texas University, where he received a law degree in 1925. He was elected to the Farmer County judgeship at the age of 23, making him the youngest judge ever elected in the United

States. He also spent several years as district judge of the 154th judicial district, later returning to private law practice.

Present for the dedication on July 4th will be his widow, Mrs. John H. (Lillian) Aldridge; his daughters, Mrs. Mary Belle Washington and Mrs. Nancy Mehler; and his brother and law partner, Sam Aldridge.

AJRA Rodeo Dates Set

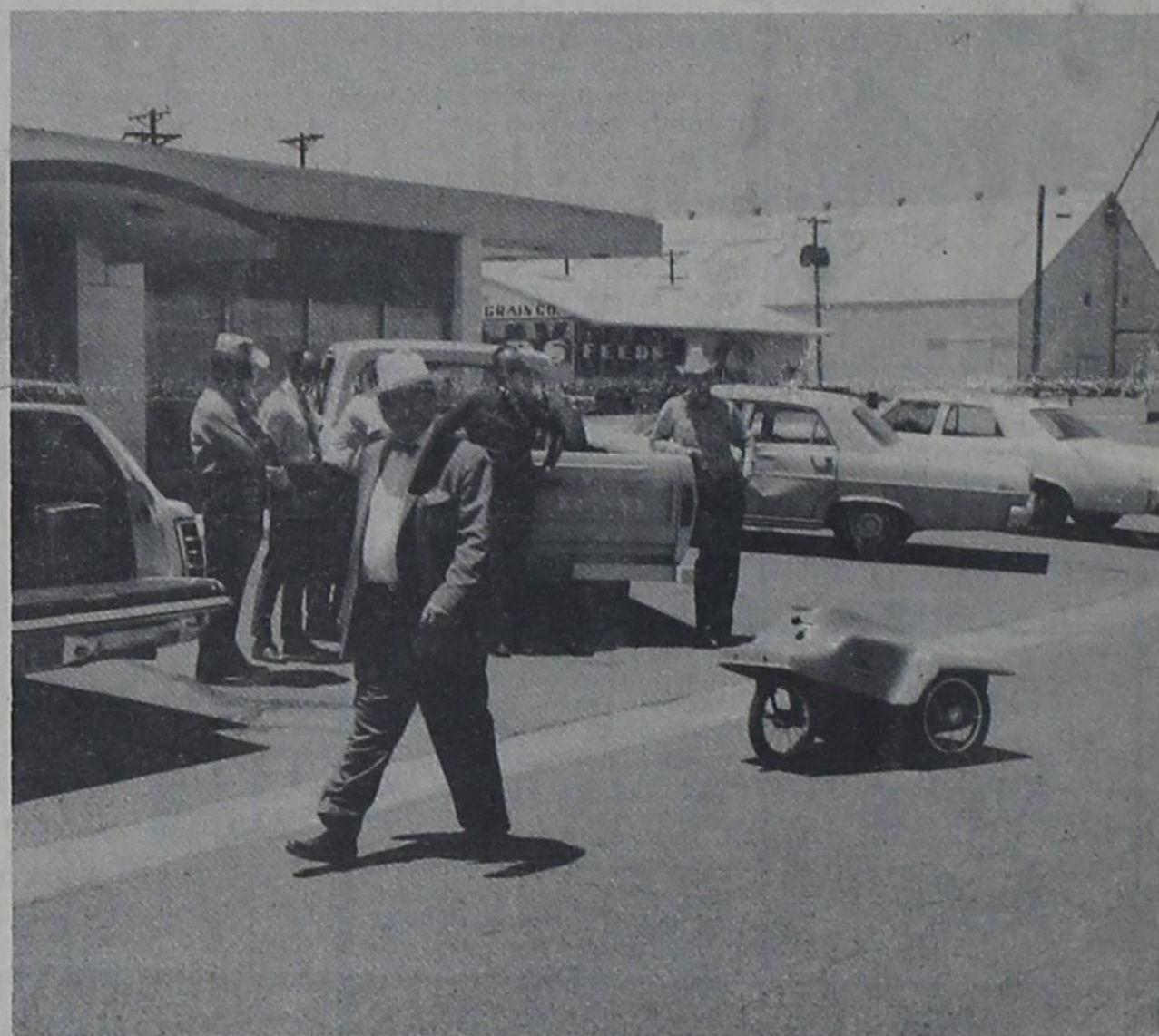

Saturday, following completion of play for the day, all contestants and their wives are invited to a barbecue and re-

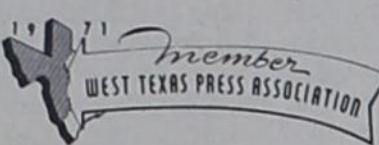
freshments at Farwell Country Club.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Alfalfa has the highest plant nutrient requirement of all forage crops. An eight-ton yield removes 360 pounds of nitrogen, 80 pounds of phosphorus, and 360 pounds of potassium. If inoculated, nitrogen will not be needed. If the crop is not growing off properly and has not been fertilized this year, 80 to 120 pounds of phosphorus should be broadcast after the first cutting, just ahead of water. In sandier areas, have a soil test made to evaluate possible potassium deficiency.

The Swine Outlook is brightening. Recent statistical figures on swine numbers by the USDA indicate decreasing numbers by mid-summer. This should result in a corresponding rise in hog prices at the same time and continuing on into early 1972. Swine producers in the 10 corn belt states report their farrowing intentions during March, April and May, 1971, to be seven per cent less than during the same period in 1970. In the June, July

and August, 1971, period, they are expected to cut farrowing by 15 per cent. If these intentions are realized, there will be less hogs for market starting in August or slightly earlier. So, a price rise for market hogs can be expected by mid-summer.

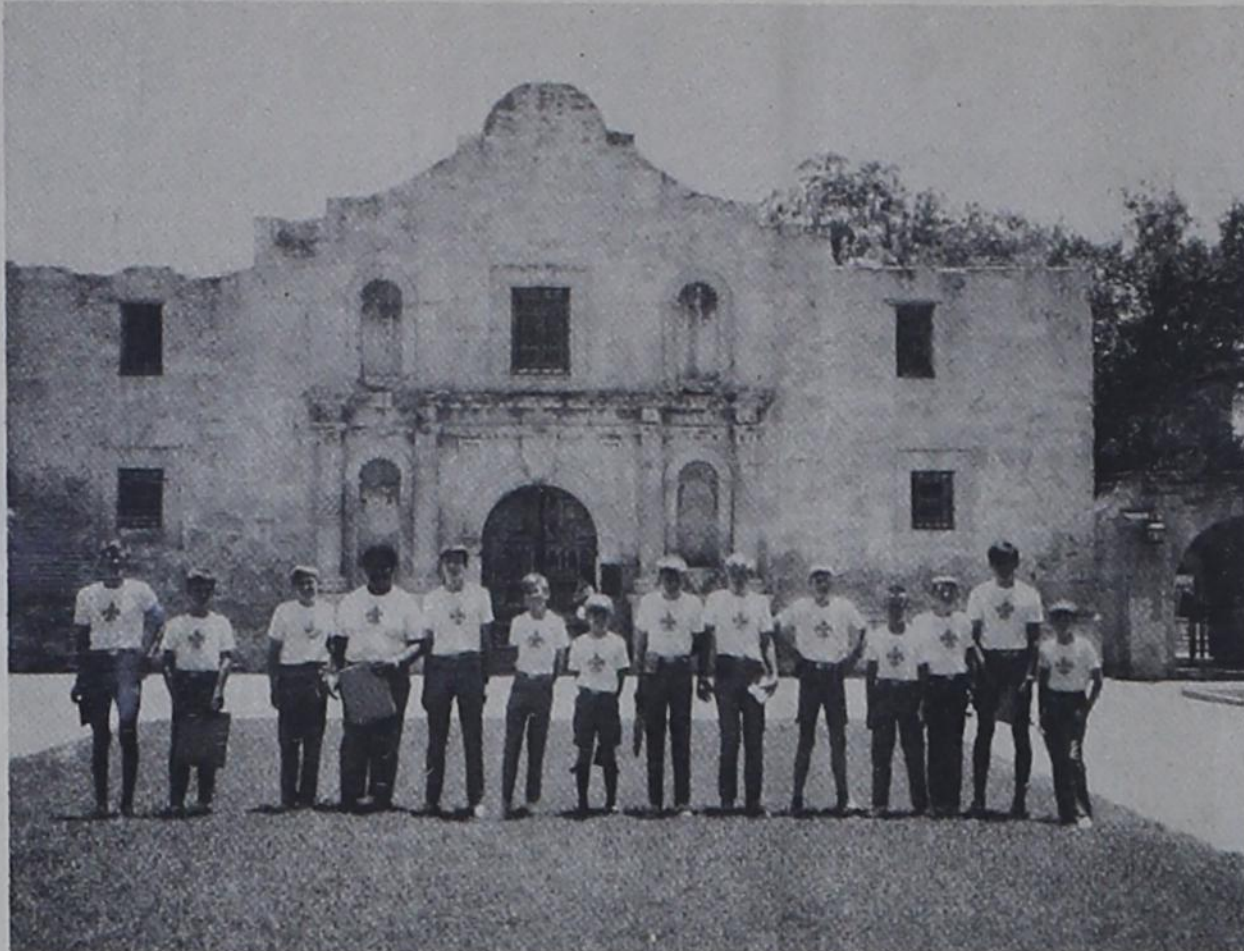
The USDA report also indicates that there was about 22 per cent more hogs to be marketed during May than a year ago. So, don't expect much improvement in hog prices before mid-summer.

Record Keeping is important, even at planting time. Although farmers are busy with field work, now is the time to think about record keeping and the kinds of analysis that will be desired at the end of the crop year. Memories often fall six months hence when the exact fertilizer and herbicide rates or hours of irrigation time are needed to generate enterprise analysis. Each producer should keep a diary handy and should note all pertinent information while it is fresh on his mind. These data can then be transferred to a permanent record at a more convenient time.

Ornamental Insect Pests are beginning to increase in numbers throughout the area. Now is the time for homeowners to control bagworms, euonymus scale and elm leaf beetles. The euonymus scale is a difficult insect to control unless insecticide applications are times properly. The newly-hatched scales are presently in the mobile or crawler stage and are susceptible to insecticides. However, after the insects form the protective scale covering, control becomes difficult. Malathion, diazinon, or dimethoate (Cygon) provide good control of crawler scales. Make two to three applications at weekly intervals for best control results.

Tiny bagworm larvae can now be found feeding on the foliage of cedars and many other trees. Infested trees should be sprayed with malathion, toxaphene, carbaryl (Sevin) and diazinon for good bagworm control.

Malathion, Sevin and toxaphene also give good control of elm leaf beetles. Additional applications of these insecticides in July and August are usually required. Due to the size of most elm trees, high pressure sprayers are usually required for good spray coverage. Disulfoton (Di-Syston) granules (15 per cent) at the rate of two and one-half ounces per inch of tree trunk diameter

Boy Scouts Find Galveston Beach Favorite

"We just stretched our sleeping bags out on the sand about 20 feet from the water, and enjoyed the night breeze blowing in from the sea." That's how Senior Patrol Leader Randy Stovall described Troop 200's sleeping arrangements "under the stars" during their stay recently in the Galveston area. Scouting activities not available here at home included the study of marine

life, becoming acquainted with salt-water, and even building a rather complicated sand castle. There was fishing too, along with numerous rides back and forth between Galveston Island and Pt. Bolivar. This transportation was on the large ferryboats which provide a 13-minute ride across Gulf of Mexico waters.

"Sea-Arama" at Galveston provided the Scouts with "close-up" looks at all types of marine life and three special shows produced with both education and entertainment in mind. One show featured trained dolphins and a giant whale. Another was water-sports oriented with fancy and trick water-skiing. There was also a show featuring alligator wrestling and snake handling. Troop 200 Scouts discovered they could even pet the dolphins who would rise from the water in one special pool, in search of human affection.

1971 Texas Boys' State

The week of June 5th to June 12th, 835 of the greatest guys in the world gathered at Austin for the 1971 Boys' State. They were there to learn, from actual experience, the workings of a democratic government.

There was never a dull moment, as every waking hour was spent at some activity. You were up at six a.m. for calisthenics, ran everyplace you went all day, wrote party propaganda most of the night and finally got to bed at about midnight. Two hundred and twenty-five boys reported to the State hospital during the week, about half of these with battle fatigue.

But it wasn't all fun and games. Conservation Applies To Town And Country

"Soil and water conservation applies to town and city people as well as farmers and ranchers," say Soil Conservation Service conservationists, who state that among the more serious conservation problems around the home are surplus water management and disturbed soils.

Land that may never have had soil and water conservation problems when in its native state can well be plagued with them as it is converted to suburban uses.

Rain that once fell on open land now falls on roof tops, driveways and paved streets. Even the best land can be ruined by uncontrolled water runoff. It can quickly rob areas of valuable surface soil, smother green lawns with silt deposits, and flood homes and basements.

"To control runoff," SCS advises, "be sure that the soil is shaped so that water drains away from the house and low areas are filled."

Excess water from adjacent properties can be diverted away from the home by the construction of small diversions and terraces.

Erosion can be prevented by covering the ground as completely as possible with growing vegetation or some substitute such as mulch, or gravel. Areas that must carry concentrated runoff need to be permanently paved or protected by special turfs, riprap, or other means.

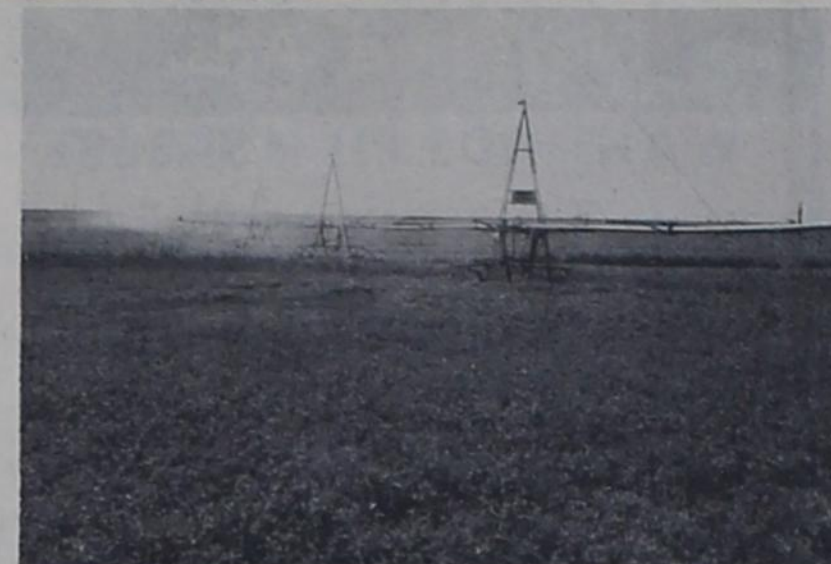
The surface soil in the average new subdivision is usually less than ideal. The original soil may have been scraped off, and tar paper, wood scraps, siding, brick, plaster, and other materials that limit plant growth are often found just under the soil surface.

When locating sites for shrubs or trees, it is a good idea to dig a much larger hole than necessary to check for buried debris. At the same time the soil can be checked for root penetration and permeability.

One game was cancelled Tuesday night and scores for the Bovina games on these nights were not available.

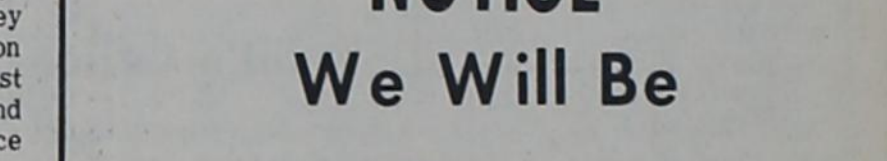

Imported Water Coming

Imported water is coming—maybe! Until then the water we have will have to do, say Soil Conservation Service personnel. It is common knowledge that the Ogallala formation (the water bearing strata) is not being sufficiently recharged to last forever. If water is used unwisely and lost, it is not doing anyone any good not to mention that this exhausts the water supply needlessly. If the water is used carefully, perhaps it will last until water can be imported.

Presently, approximately 40 per cent of the water pumped in Parmer County is lost and never used. This amount can be reduced, but not without effort. It will cost everyone who uses irrigation water time, money and labor. Shorter irrigation runs will mean more rows to set which will take more time and labor, but they will save water. Tailwater return systems will cost money and time, but they reclaim water. Sprinkler systems cost money and labor, but they apply water efficiently. Efficient, water saving irrigation costs everyone, but without water what will this country look like.

THE WAY TO HEAVEN

Perhaps you have heard the story of the man who inquired from a mountaineer the way to a certain destination. The mountaineer stammered and stammered and finally said: "You can't get there from here."

We may smile at this, but the results would be even more amusing—and sad—were we to ask the average person on the street the way to heaven.

What is the way to heaven? It is interesting to read in God's Word what many think about this. In Proverbs 14:12 we read: "There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death."

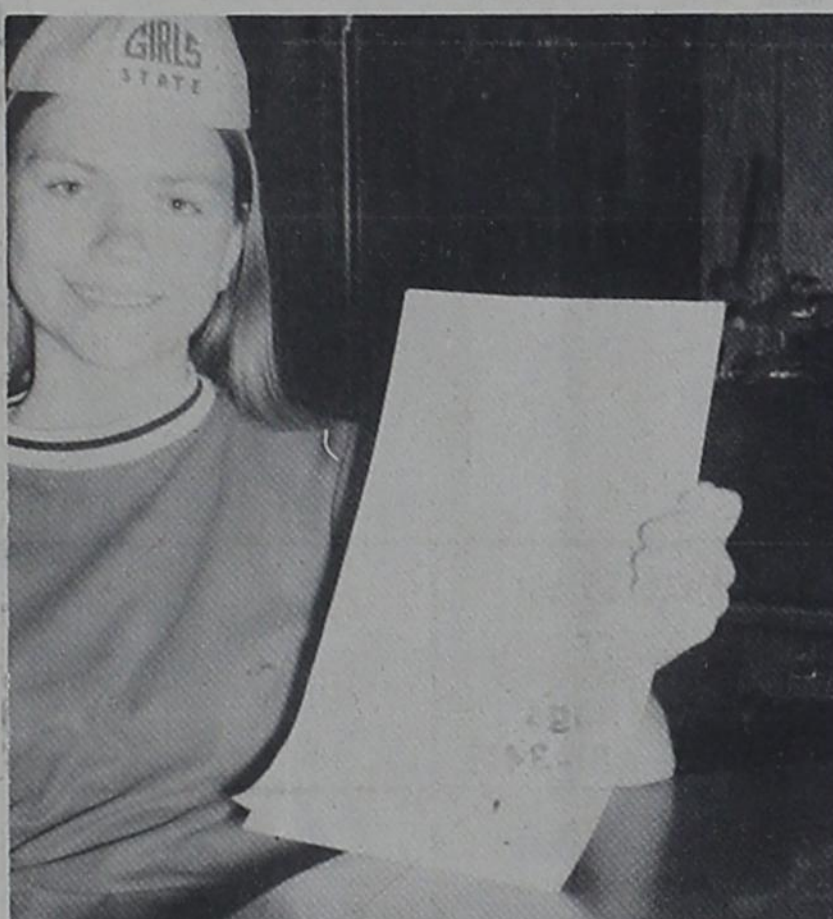
