## Agricultural Industry Receives Recognition

Texas is a giant in the agricultural industry, and Texans have much to be proud of and to be thankful for regarding the food and fiber produced in this state, says Mack Heald, Parmer County Agricultural Agent. The state's agricultural products will receive special notice during Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week, November 15-21.

"Special observances are planned to emphasize that the people of Texas have a large stake in the vast amount of food and fiber produced by those in agriculture," explains Charles K. Baker, agricultural economist with the Texas Agri-

cultural Extension Service which is assisting in promoting the week-long event. "Texans benefit both as consumers and as residents of this state due to the tremendous contributions of agriculture to the overall economy."

Agriculture in all its phases adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy, points out the economist. Cash receipts from farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion and are expected to reach the \$3.76 billion mark by 1976. Every dollar produced by agriculture has a multiplier effect of 2.7. This means that \$1

million increase in agricultural income results in an increase of \$2.7 million in the total Texas economy.

Texas is the leading state in the production of cotton, grain sorghum, beef cattle, sheep and wool, and goats and mohair, and is second in rice production and third in peanuts, pecans, and citrus. The state generally ranks third after California and Iowa in total crop and livestock cash receipts.

Baker emphasizes the fact that agriculture is one of the most efficient sectors of the overall economy. In 1970, each farm worker supplied himself

and 46 other persons with food and fiber needs. Output per man-hour of farm work has increased 223 per cent since 1950 to improved technology and management. The benefits are passed on to the consumer who now spends 16.5 percent of his disposable income for food—a drop of 19 percent in the past 10 years. Per capita food consumption increased six percent during that same decade.

The economist urges all Texans to participate in the observance of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week the week prior to Thanksgiving. "This is an excellent opportunity for all of us to reflect on the bountiful harvests that agricultural producers over the state reap each year to provide for us high quality, yet economical food and fiber products," concluded Baker.

Darwin Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Green of Farwell, and Deborah Harding, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hurshel Harding of Farwell, were the recipients of this year's awards. Darwin received a 4-H tie tack and Deborah received a charm bracelet with

the 4-H emblem. Dwain Nance, local manager of Custom Farm Service in Bovina, presented the awards accompanied by certificates. Darwin and Deborah are both members of the Farwell 4-H Club where they have completed six and seven years, respectively, of 4-H work.

Selection for the awards is based on a point system, recipients being in the top one per cent or above achievement ratio. A committee of record book judges, composed of extension agents in surrounding counties, select the two outstanding 4-H'ers in the county according to their leadership,

Lots of water poured from the skies Monday and Tuesday to give area farmers more than their share of moisture. Land south of Texico was deluged with over three inches of rain in the two days.

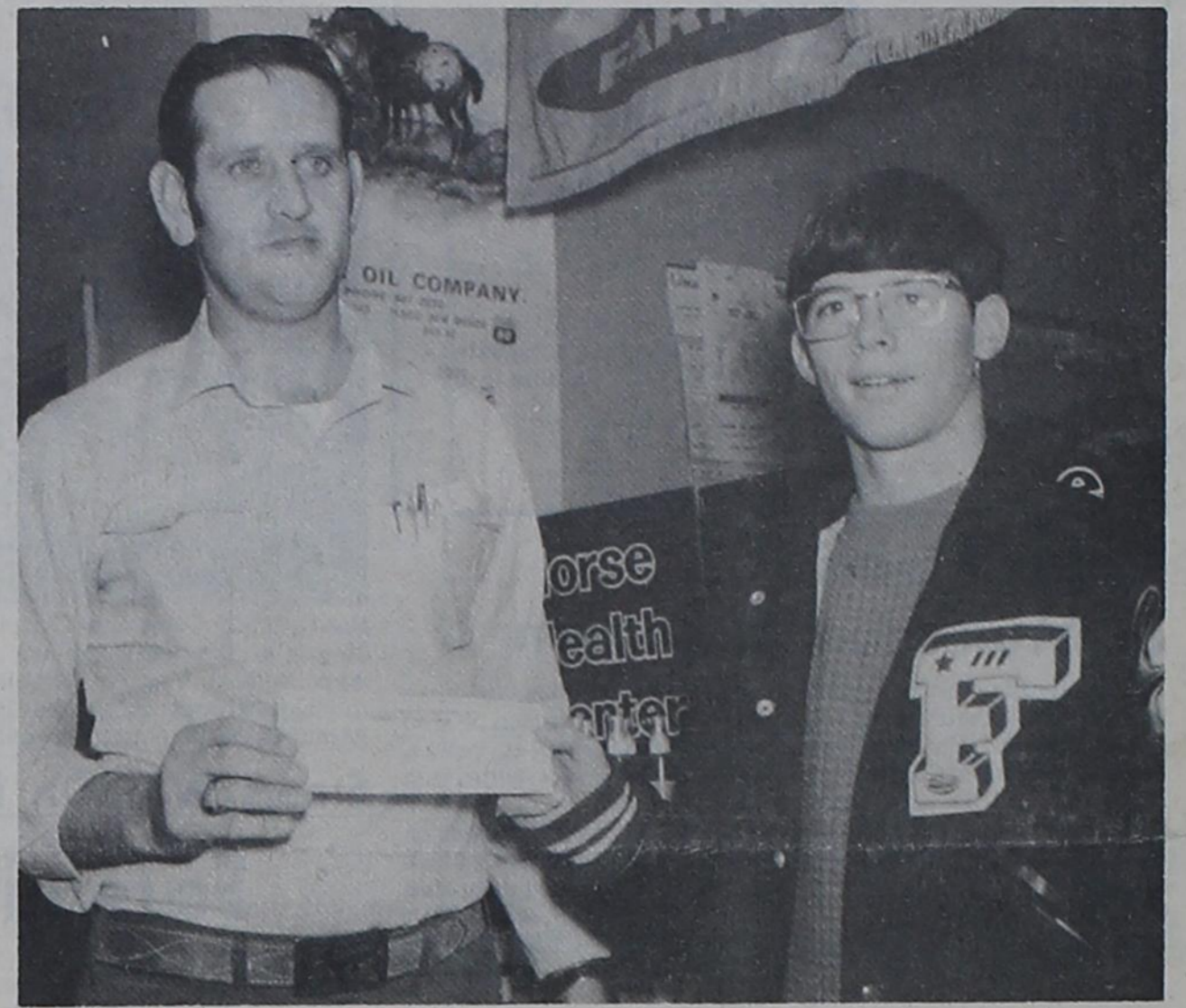

In Texico-Farwell, amounts were recorded of 3/4 inches during Monday night's thunderstorm and 1.1 inch for Tuesday night's storm.

Northeast of Farwell, over an inch of moisture was reported for each night's rain. In

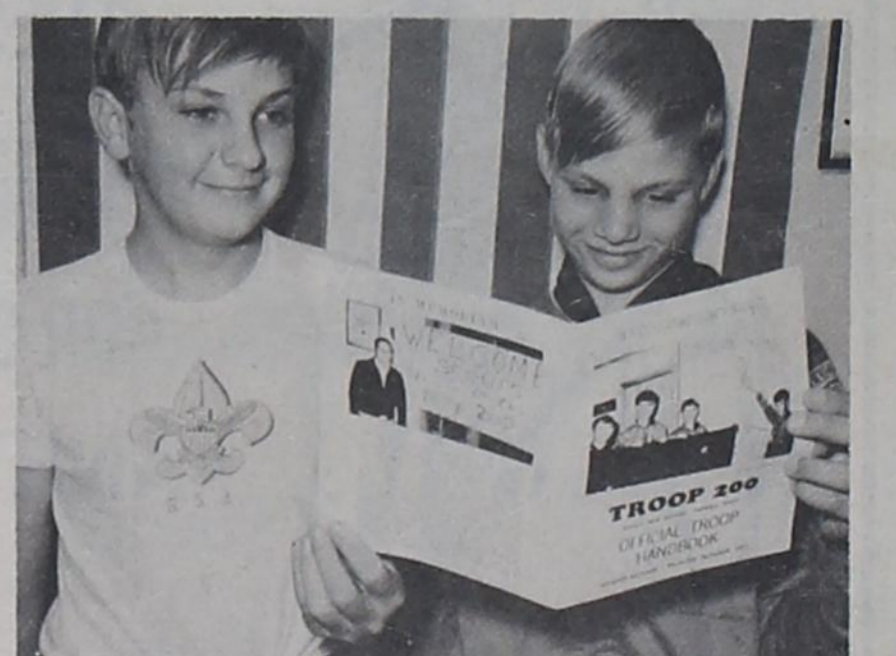

## Coffee Slated For Mahon Wams Against Sewer Tapping

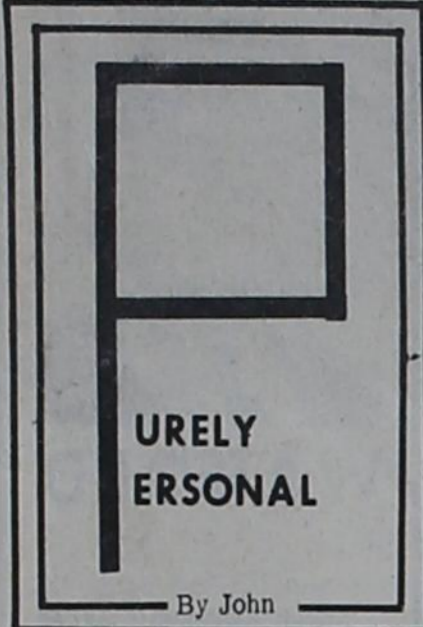
United States Congressman George Mahon of Texas' 19th Congressional District will be honored at a coffee Tuesday, Nov. 23, at 10:30 a.m. in Friona at the Friona State Bank community room. Congressman Mahon is Chairman of the U. S. House Appropriations Committee.

Parmer County is presently in the 18th Congressional District represented by U. S. Congressman Bob Price. Under Congressional re-districting to take effect in January 1973, the county will be a part of the 19th Congressional District, which is now represented by Congressman Mahon.

Texico City Council members stressed during their last council meeting Tuesday, Nov. 9, that any persons who have been tapping city sewer lines will be fined subject to a city ordinance which prohibits the activity.

At the meeting the state plumbing inspector called attention to the fact that the city's sewer lines have been damaged by unauthorized tapping. Persons wishing to tap either sewer or water lines must get a permit from the city office.

The band played the always thrilling John Philip Sousa marches while the announcer read the American Creed and the flag bearers marched in formation on the field. This is truly an inspiring sight and one that commends the administration at Tech.

We also were most impressed with the marching and music by the Farwell High School Band at last Friday's home game. Each year Band Director Lynn Burton improves his charges, and this year the entire community can take pride in his work. We can say the Farwell band members, to borrow a phrase, "You have come a long, long way baby." Hard work does pay off.

When Tribune football contest fans get it in their minds that a team is a consistent winner, it is hard to shake their confidence. When they make up their minds that a team is a loser, they just won't pick'em.

Examples this year are the Dumas Demons who consistently get the large majority of nods from the local steers in spite of their most dismal year in recent history. By contrast, in the last several weeks, poor ole West Texas can't get a winning pick for anything, except from a die-hard alum. With so many games being played on Turkey Day, it eliminates two good games from the contest; Oklahoma and Nebraska and also the Texas against A&M donnybrook. We did put the Tech at Arkansas game on the schedule this week and "Miracle Jim" may come up with a miracle, but after viewing the Tech offense against Baylor, we decided that the team was about as exciting to watch as watching yachts race. Yacht racing has been favorably compared to watching grass grow.

Texas thinks big, acts big and is just down right big. This week is Texas Food and Fiber Week and the following are a few statistics to back up the claim of being big in Texas:

To operate the Texas agricultural plant, Texas farmers and ranchers spent: \$517 million for feed and seed, \$387 million for machinery and other capital items, \$352 million for petroleum, repairs, etc., \$294 million for livestock, \$250 million for hired labor, \$127 million for farm mortgage debt, \$115 million for fertilizers, \$119 million for farm real estate taxes, and another \$460 million for interest on operating loans, and a wide variety of other farming and ranching necessities.

These farm and ranches fuel a big segment of the state's economy and almost all of the economy in this entire area. On Thanksgiving Day as we enjoy the lavish fruits of this agriculture giant, let's all give thanks for its existence and well being.

Texas legislators are being sent the results of a poll conducted by the National Federation of Independent Businessmen in which 1,075 small businessmen responded. They replied "yes" by 95 per cent to the question, "Do you favor requiring all able bodied persons who receive welfare checks to perform some work for the state in exchange." They also went 85 per cent against paying strikers unemployment compensation or giving them welfare benefits.

This is a straw in the wind for all legislators to heed. The people are sick and tired of ever-mounting welfare costs while jobs go begging. One of these days we may reject all welfare and thereby put the ac-

"I feel like all our boys did a good job in the football program this season. We were really pleased with the boys. The ones who stuck with us are much appreciated. Farwell eighth grade team lost to Vega Thursday night by a score of 40-6. Frankie Vidaurre scored Farwell's lone touchdown on an 80-yard play. The team ended with a 5-5 season.

## Farwell-Vega Tie 36-36 In Last Game

The Farwell Steers pulled off a big surprise on the favored Vega Longhorns in Farwell Friday night when they tied the 'Horns 36-36 in a high-scoring game. Vega, who had already won the District 3-A crown was defeated, however, on penetrations, 7-5. This game, the Steers' last of the 1971 season, ended Vega's hopes of an unbeaten-untied season and gave the Steers a season record of 3-5-2 and a district record of 2-3-2.

It was a big night for the offense with Farwell picking up 385 total yards and 19 first downs, and Vega with 399 total yards and 14 first downs. On the ground, Kevin Hardage led the Steers with 85 yards rushing followed by quarterback Brett Hargrove with 84 yards and Larry Erwin with 59 yards. Hargrove also connected on 11 of 18 passes to receivers Kevin Hargrove, Johnny Franse, Larry Erwin and Kirk McFarland for a total of 157 yards.

The Vega offense depended chiefly on the running of Bronc and Brent May and Dickie Robinson as they completed only two of 10 passes for 65 yards. These two passes were important, though, as they set up one touchdown and scored another.

Farwell was plagued by penalties which called back big offensive or defensive plays by the Steers, who suffered nine penalties for 91 yards as compared to five for 35 yards for the 'Horns.

Larry Erwin carried the opening kick-off from the 3 to

the 26 for the Steers. Farwell gained yardage steadily on passes to Erwin, and runs by Brett Hargrove and Kevin Hardage until, eight plays later, they found themselves with a second and goal on the 4-yard line. QB Hargrove bootlegged around left end to make it 6-0 after the extra point went wide.

After three exchanges, Farwell gained possession of the ball on their own 46, and a long pass to Johnny Franse and consistent gains on the ground carried the ball to the 5. A pass to Larry Erwin for the TD, followed by a pass to Kevin Hargrove for the two extra points, made it 14-0 at the start of second quarter.

The Vega offense, which had bested every defense they had met, now began to regain their poise. They drove from their own 45 to a TD in 10 plays against the fearful Steer defense; Bronc May groping the last yard. After PAT was missed, Farwell led 14-6.

The Steers countered this blow when they scored on their next possession from their own 33 in nine plays. They worked downfield to the 11 with the fury of a juggernaut crushing everything in its path where QB Hargrove kept the ball and snaked in for the score.

After the two extra points were stopped, the Steers had widened their lead to 20-6. Not to be outdone, the 'Horns, scored on their next possession in two plays from their own 22. On second down, from 76 yards away, Dickie Robinson went around left end and

kick was missed, the score was tied 28-28.

Vega, who had trailed the whole game, could now see the means to maintain their perfect season record, and fought fiercely for the go-ahead points.

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

Tim Ingram - a 6 ft., 5 in. senior. We hope he will be able to go to the boards for us. He is a fair shooter.

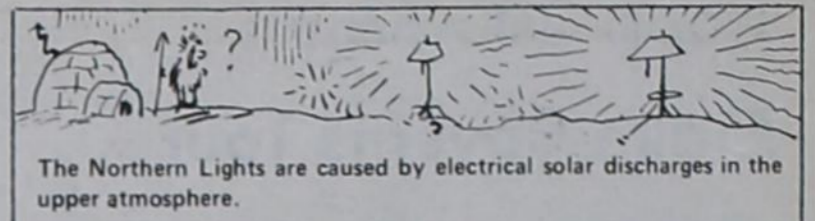
Ricky Ketcherside - a senior, who played some A team games last year. He is a fair shooter. He is injured right now, but we hope to have him back in before the season's over.

**A TALE OF THREE CITIES**

In Thessalonica. Paul reasoned out of the Scriptures for three sabbath days with men who were unwilling to be convinced (Acts 17:1-9). The bigotry of these Thessalonians not only kept them in spiritual darkness, but it moved them to bitter opposition to the truth, so that they persecuted Paul and Silas and even followed them to Berea, stirring people up against them.

Bereans had the same effect today. Let us never close our minds so as to keep error out, for in doing so we will only shut new light out and close old errors in. Moreover, it is but a small step from shutting out new light from God's Word to engaging in bitter opposition to it.

The Athenians went to the other extreme. They lost interest in what was old and clamoured only to hear new things (Acts 17:21). Yet when Paul came to them with the good news of the gospel of grace, some "mocked" while others, more polite, said: "We will hear thee again of this matter," and turned away (Verse 32).

The Athenian spirit too is still rife today. Many are constantly giving up the old and looking for something new, sure that the latest fashions, the latest statistics and the latest advice must be best.

Significantly, the story of the noble Bereans falls between that of the Thessalonians and that of the Athenians in our Bibles. These Bereans possessed the true spiritual greatness to give man's word respectful consideration, whether old or new, and then to subject it to careful examination in the light of the Word of God. They received Paul's word, we read, with open minds, and then "searched the Scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Verse 11). For this God called them "noble" - the spiritual aristocracy of their day.

May God help us to be neither "Thessalonians" nor "Athenians," but true Bereans. If we follow men we drift on a sea of human speculation, for men disagree on the most vital issues. Only as we stand on the infallible, unchangeable Word of God can we be sure.
