

The Farwell JV Steers defeated Bovina on Sept. 25, 22-8.








> Edwards chased the QB out of the end zone for a safety and a 26-13 Steers lead.



The 4-H program has expanded steadily for the past 25 years, with our numbers totaling up to more than 5 million 4-H'ers throughout the United States.





This project began in 2005 and has grown over the last few years. This is not a political statement, but a chance for students to express their views about peace, harmony, tolerance, and hope for our future.


We "planted" our pinwheels on Sept. 18 in conjunction with Homecoming festivities. The actual International Peace Day was celebrated on Sept. 21.
