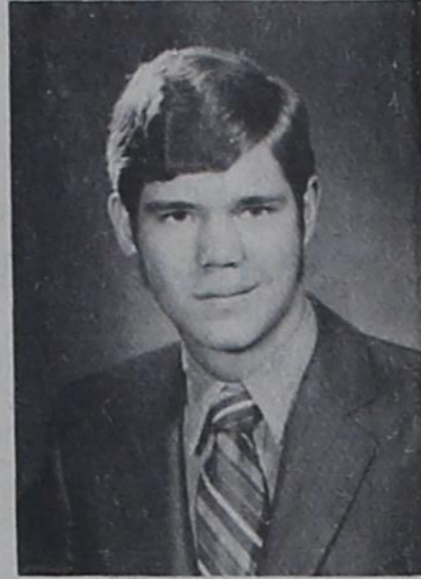
Carolyn Herington, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Herington of Farwell, with a grade average of 91.2352, is the

highest ranking senior girl.

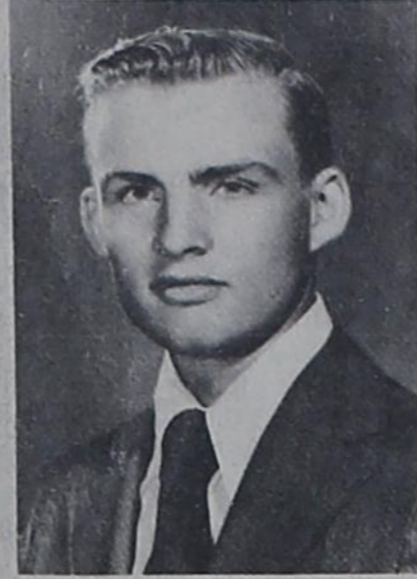

## Council Hears Requests On Re-Zoning, Property

Texico City Council met in regular session Tuesday at City Hall. City trustees and Buster Lunsford of Farwell, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Duncan and Mrs. Marcine Tipton, all of Texico, discussed a request made by Lunsford to change his property north of town from a B to a C zone so he could build a trailer park.

The Duncans and Tiptons are residences of the section of town in which Lunsford holds property he wishes to turn into a trailer park. No action was taken by the trustees, but a rezoning request will be published and a hearing set.

Texico First Baptist Church sent in a request for 100 ft. of land on the front and 120 ft. on the side of the property east across the street from the church. The church plans to

remove the curbing on that land and blacktop it for parking.

The police report for the month of April in the amount of \$422 was approved. The trustees approved City Marshal Willie Ronquillo's request to take his vacation the first of June. The city budget was approved at a recent special meeting of the Council and it will be submitted to Santa Fe for final approval. Bills were approved for payment.

Mrs. Helen Hill has resigned as assistant city clerk. Mrs. Clara Wiehl, Texico City Clerk, said she is taking applications now for the position which includes knowledge of office procedures and operating office equipment.

"The position is part-time and open only to New Mexico residents in the Texico area. Applications can be obtained at Texico City Hall," Mrs. Wiehl said.

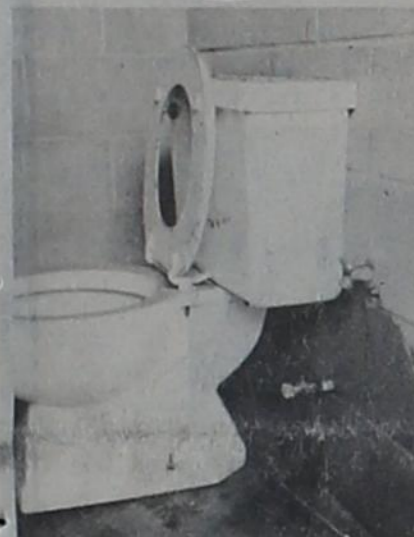

Mom might like a gift of time this Mother's Day -- time for joining family and enjoying life more.

Portable kitchen appliances -- from toaster/ovens to fondue sets -- can cut time spent in the kitchen.

Some guidelines concerning selection of such appliances are: Choose a toaster/oven with convenient controls, signal light which indicates the unit is on, automatic shut-off and crumb tray for easy cleaning. This handy appliance toasts, bakes and broils.

An electric skillet, on the other hand, fries, bakes, fondues and just about anything else desired.

Many models feature detachable controls and handles for dishwasher use and tilt legs for simplified draining or basting. A dome lid allows enough room for roasts.

A third kitchen helper is the blender -- which chops, grates, crums and mixes. Although many speeds are available, only a few are actually used. Blender containers should have easy-to-read graduations, easy-pour spout and handle. Other popular features include detachable blades, removable cover insert for adding ingredients and various attachments.

Look for electric knives with off-on switches and safety locks. Used in slicing bread, cake, meat and other foods, many have releasable blades for easy cleaning and storing. Some stainless steel blades feature serrated edges.

Portable mixers should be lightweight with comfortable handles -- they're great for whipping, beating and blending. Fingertip controls, chromplated beaters without center shafts, stable heel rests and permanently lubricated motors also are desirable.

The final group of appliances discussed consists of special-purpose items generally for entertaining -- fondue sets, electric woks and slow cookers.

Choose fondue sets which are safe and stable to prevent tipping -- and possible burns. Select a set with readable

**On The Farm  
In Palmer

One of the most prized possessions of a homeowner is a healthy shade tree. But a tree needs special care if it is to remain beautiful and disease-free.

Trees are subject to various disease-causing organisms such as viruses, bacteria, fungi and nematodes. Furthermore, trees are affected by drought, root system damage, nutrient deficiencies, misuse of pesticides and storm damage.

Any of these factors can injure a tree, often seriously enough to kill it. Drought damage is especially a common problem. And by the time a homeowner can tell that a tree is suffering from water shortage, it's usually too late.

Construction injury is a common ailment around and near new homes, buildings or paved areas. Such injury is first indicated by a dieback of twigs and too early a shedding of leaves in late summer and early fall.

Chlorosis is another common symptom in trees and often is the result of insufficient iron. Light green or yellow leaves signal this condition. Iron chelate or iron sulfate can be applied as a spray on smaller trees or like a fertilizer on larger ones to correct iron deficiency.

Homeowners should be careful with weed killers and other pesticides. Indiscriminate use of such materials in the general area where trees are growing can be costly. Trees have a vast network of feeder roots that can easily absorb such chemicals, killing a part or the entire tree.

During the last half of May, some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician In-Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in

Second low gross was Weldon Killough of Clovis who shot a 77. Vernon Scott of Farwell, last year's winner, was third

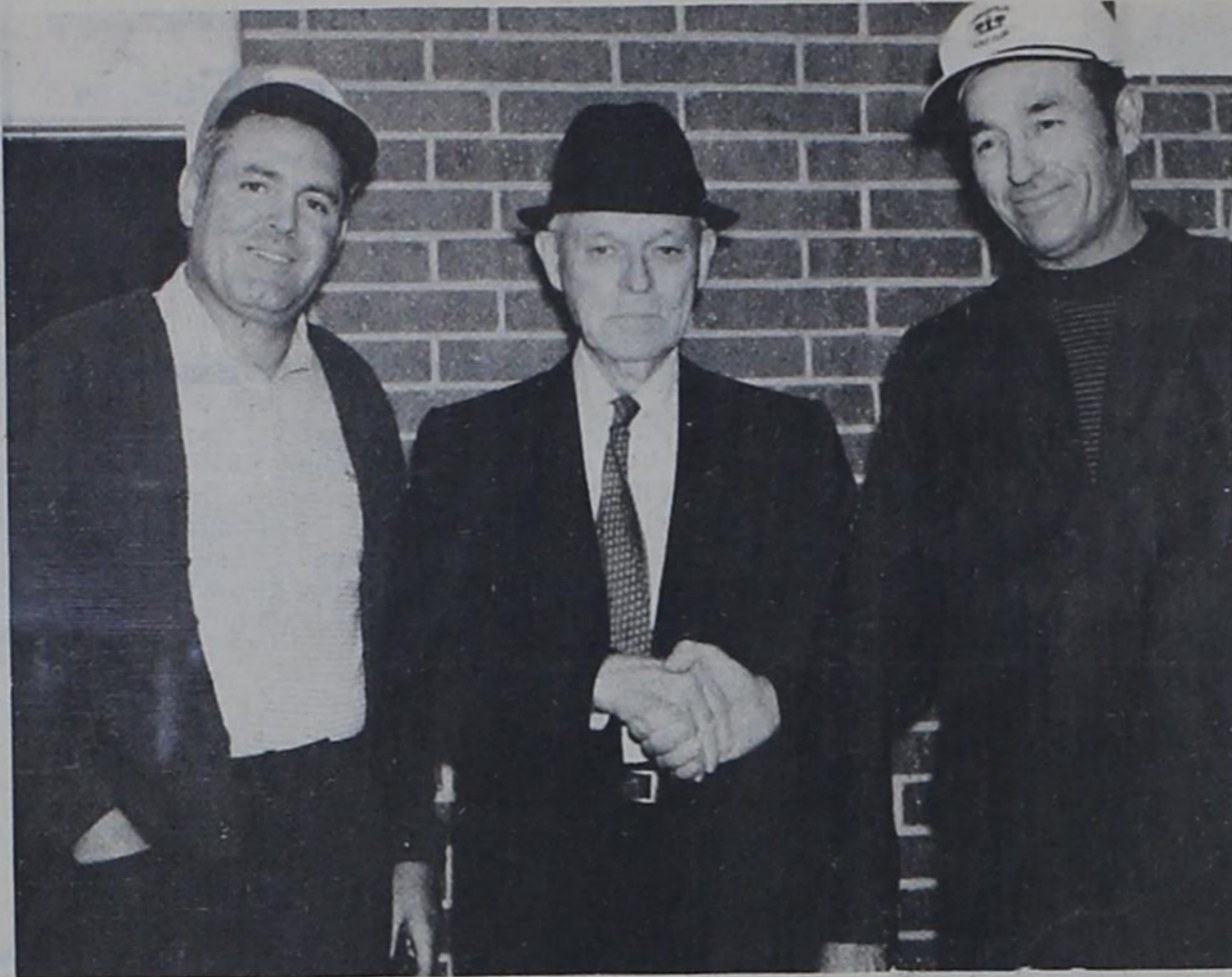
low gross with a 79. Delvin Schutes of Clovis was fourth with an 80.

Throughout the ages, men have offered humble thanks to their Creator for the priceless gifts of air, soil, water and sunshine which make all living things possible.

The custom of setting aside special days -- Rogation Days -- for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in the neighborhood of Vienne, France. Bad weather and earthquakes had brought crop failures and widespread hunger. The Bishop of Vienne called for prayer and penance

on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The people responded and implored God for help in their suffering and privation.

Word of what had happened in Vienne spread throughout France -- and then to other countries. The supplication filled a need in the hearts and minds of the people, and as the years went by, Rogation Days were widely observed as an annual custom. By the end of the eighth century, the Church

formally adopted the custom. Now, the world over, people on Rogation Days beg the mercy of God and ask that He spare His children the evils of soul and body -- and give good increase to the plants of the field, report the SWCD officials.

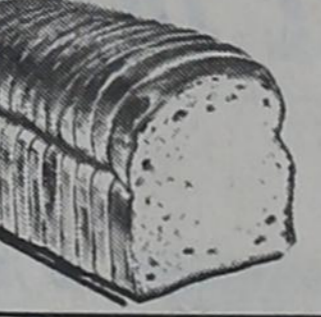

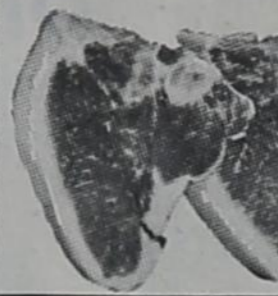
