A Gordon Greaves at Portales is our favorite "thinking" editor. There are some others around, but precious few talk sense more consistently than Greaves. He is uncommonly intelligent on multifarious subjects, and eminently unprejudiced in his viewpoints. Whether it helps or hurts--whether he laughs or cries--Gordon prints what he believes to be the truth. It would surprise and perhaps disappoint you to find how many editors are not this intellectually honest.

Occasionally when the opportunity presents itself, I stick my head in and say hello to Gordon when in Portales. He is usually busy, but always finds time to stop and chat awhile. A mailing sent out by the High Plains Water District this week reminds me of some comments Gordon made to me not too long ago. They are pertinent for the Texico-Farwell and Parmer County area as well as residents of Portales because fundamentally we're all in the same boat -living off of a predominently agricultural economy which in turn is almost wholly dependent on ground water irrigation for its prosperity.

The thing that makes the Portales valley worth watching is that they are 20 to 40 years farther down the road on their water depletion than we are. You might say that we can see what will eventaully come in our own area by watching our neighbors in that area.

The Portales valley is over a geologically isolated deposit of water-bearing sand that ranges to about 130 feet in depth. The saturated zone is typically 30 to 40 feet in thickness. When they pump the table down to the bottom at 130 feet they have "had it" as Gordon says.

Some of the farms are now passing through that point of diminishing returns when pumping water to irrigate is no longer profitable. The water is down there, according to Greaves, but not in sufficient quantity to assure steady pumping through the growing season.


### **Fined For Possession And** Sale Of Beer

The archer, trying to hit the target in the distance, has set his aim higher than at close range. In order for the arrow to reach the target, it must be aimed high because of the distance and lack of strength behind the arrow; but if proper aim is taken, the target will be reached.

The life of man is the arrow that must seek the target in the distance. Man himself must pull the bow and do the aiming "toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 3:14). For us to reach heaven, we must set our aim high.

First, we must aim above EARTHLY PLEASURES. "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him." ( 1 Jn. 2:15). If we aim at earthly pleasures, we will not reap "everlasting life." (Gal. 6:7-8).

Secondly, heaven cannot be reached by aiming at MAN'S APPROVAL instead of God's approval. Jesus condemned the Pharisees by saying, "But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrine the commandments of MEN.'' (Matt. 15:9) The chief ru-lers, who believed in Christ, refused to confess Him "for they loved the praise of MEN more than the praise of God." (Jn. 12: 42-42). To hit the target of "pleasing men" does not mean we have hit the target of "pleasing God."

Finally, we must aim TOWARD HEAVEN in seeking to do heaven's will in all things. To those in Colosse who had been buried with Christ in baptism and risen with him (Col. 2:12) Paul said "If you then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are ABOVE, not on things on the earth." (Col. 3:1-2). Jesus said, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: but lay up for yourselves treasures in HEAVEN, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through not steal: for where your treasures is, there will your hear be also." # Parmer's Potato Harvest **Off To Good Beginning**

The potato harvest is off to a good start in Parmer County. Both county processing plants, Friona Growers and Shippers in Friona and Gregory Produce Company in Lariat, were picking up steam as the harvest moved into its second week this week.

About 75 acres of the approximately 400 acres near Friona had been harvested as of the first of the week. The potatoes were making about 200 sacks per acre, according to Kenneth Neill, manager of Friona Growers and Shippers.

At Lariat, the yield is about the same. "We're making from 175 to 200 sacks of number one potatoes to the acre", said T. W. (Buck) Gregory, who has about 325 acres of potatoes this year.

Gregory described the market as "not strong, but we're moving some potatoes."

The market is running from around \$2.35 per hundred to \$2.50.

"This is lower than you'd like to see the market at the start of harvest. But some shipments from this area earlier contained some junky potatoes, and this may have hurt the market some," Neill said. He added that such potatoes had not shown up in the Friona area as yet. Harvest operations began near Friona on July 5. Gregory Produce began operations on July 10. "We're still not going full speed. We like to let the potatoes mature completely before starting," Gregory said.

The Lariat producer said he had about 100 additional acres of fall potatoes which would mature some time in October. The vegetable income in Parmer County amounted to close to a million dollars.
