

We receive news releases right along from the several highway departments, including comments from the federals, about the growing lack of gasoline tax funds. As our national consumption of gasoline decreases the amount of state and federal gasoline tax also decreases. At the federal level we have read of complaints about the efforts of the big city politicians to divert monies from the federal trust fund to urban mass transit projects. This tells us that there is a dearth of money to repair and maintain the present system. The gist of these releases is that funds are lacking for normal maintenance work.
