Bill Clayton Receives Numerous Appointments

House speaker Ben Barnes announced today at the beginning of the sessions for the 60th State Legislature that Representative Bill Clayton, Springlake, has been named to serve on five committees.

Representative Clayton will be serving on the Urban Affairs, Conservation and Reclamation, Counties-Chairman, Rules, and State Affairs committees.

In commenting on the appointments, Barnes said that he is confident that "Representative Clayton is familiar with the problems with which the committees will deal and is qualified to do an excellent job for the Legislature and the people of Texas."

The Committee on Counties of which Rep. Clayton is chairman, will be assigned approximately 200 House Bills at this session, and they will be proposed legislation affecting the counties and local governments. It is considered to be one of the major committees.

Committee for State Affairs will be assigned a large portion of the total number of bills that are introduced. The bills considered will be of State wide scope, and will be the major proposed legislation.

Conservation and Reclamation committee will consider all legislation dealing with water and soil problems. This subject is expected to receive much attention at this session.

Committee on Municipal and Private Corporations will be assigned proposed legislation that affects the cities and towns of Texas. There will be a large volume of legislation assigned to this committee at this session.

Rules Committee will have the responsibility of placing bills on the House Calendar after they have had committee approval. This committee is scheduled to meet daily during the entire sessions of the legislature, and its work is quite heavy.

School Census In Progress

Census for the Farwell school is now in progress and must be completed by February 1, 1967, according to W. M. Roberts, school superintendent.

All children in the school district who will be six years of age by Sept. 1, 1967, and who will not be 18 years of age before the same date must be registered in the census. Even though the child is not now in school and may be married, he or she should be listed in the school census, according to the superintendent. Failure to register any student between the ages of six and 18 inclusive, will cost the school money, warns Roberts.

If you have a child who should be counted on the census and you have not been contacted "be sure to call the school office and ask for a registration blank or go by the school office and list them," says the superintendent.

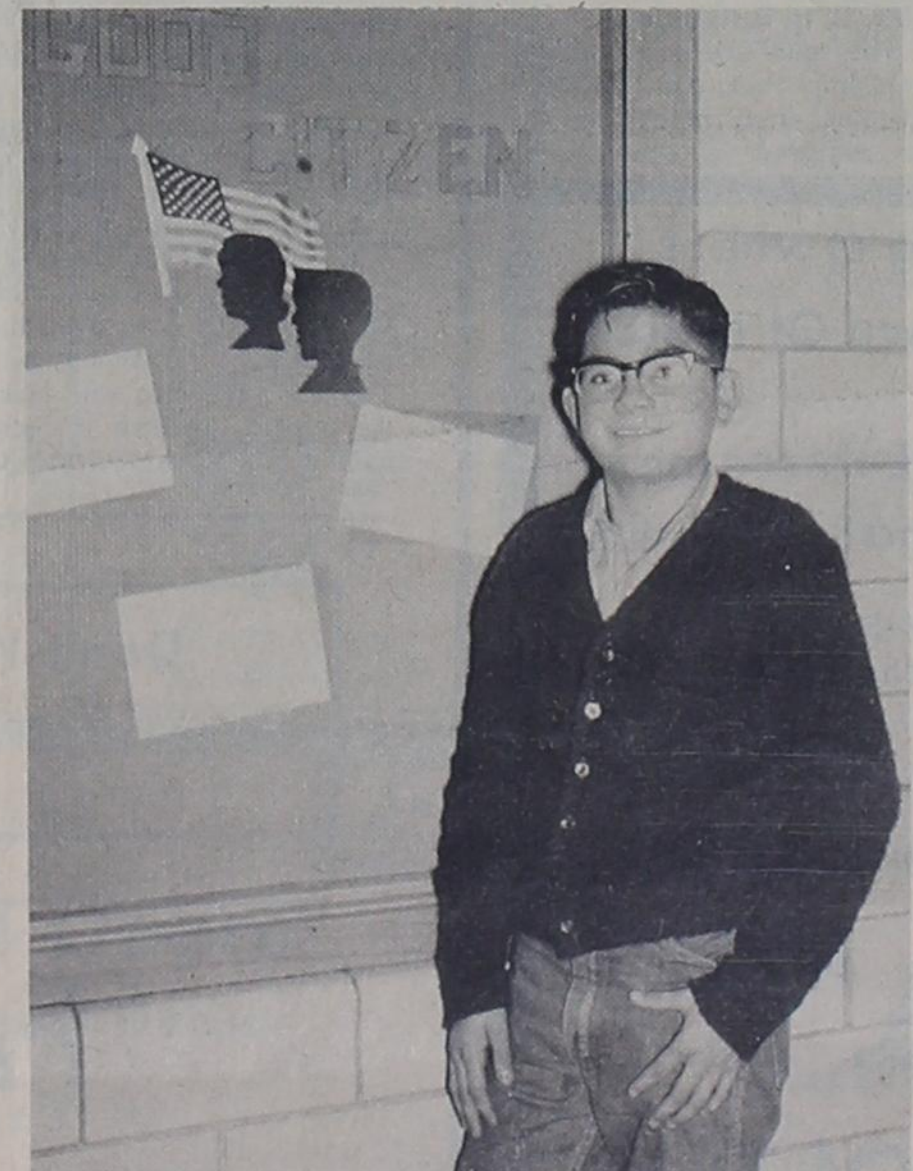
Last Rites Held For Pioneer Resident

Owners Beware

Dog and pet owners in the township of Texico should beware, according to the Town Council who in their regular meeting on Tuesday made plans to enforce ordinance \$151 to the fullest extent.

According to Mrs. Clara Wiehl, town clerk, the ordinance provides for the registration and vaccination of all pets; the taking up and impounding of all stray dogs and other animals; the destruction of dogs under certain circumstances; the restraint of female dogs in season and the restraint of vicious dogs; and a penalty for violation of the ordinance.

A copy of ordinance \$151 may be read in the town hall. Persons disobeying the ordinance will be assessed a penalty of not less than \$100.

down by a margin of one vote.

Only 10 voted on the amendments, all for the admission of the three counties.

TIME TO CONSOLIDATE

The 89th Congress alone passed seventy-one new health programs, seventeen new educational programs, fifteen new economic development programs for the cities, seventeen new resource development programs, and four new manpower training programs. These new programs, added to the hundreds already on the books, help create what James Reston of The New York Times describes as an "administrative monstrosity."

What is really needed is a massive effort to control, consolidate and where appropriate, eliminate existing programs.

According to Senator Edmund S. Muskie of Maine, "There are 170 different Federal aid programs on the books, financed by over 400 separate appropriations, and administered by 150 Washington bureaus and over 400 regional offices empowered to receive applications and disburse funds."

This untrammelled confusion in Uncle Sam's larder, not only encourages waste of the taxpayer's dollars, but the proliferation of these programs creates chaos and a bureaucratic quagmire at all levels of government—federal, state and local.

While the Administration complacently talks about creating a new partnership with the states and municipalities, thoughtful legislators in both parties are showing increased concern on the overlapping of expenditures and the duplication of effort, and are seeking ways to streamline the Federal programs. Any success in this endeavor would result in substantial savings to the American people.

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NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1967 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the School Office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next Sept. 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

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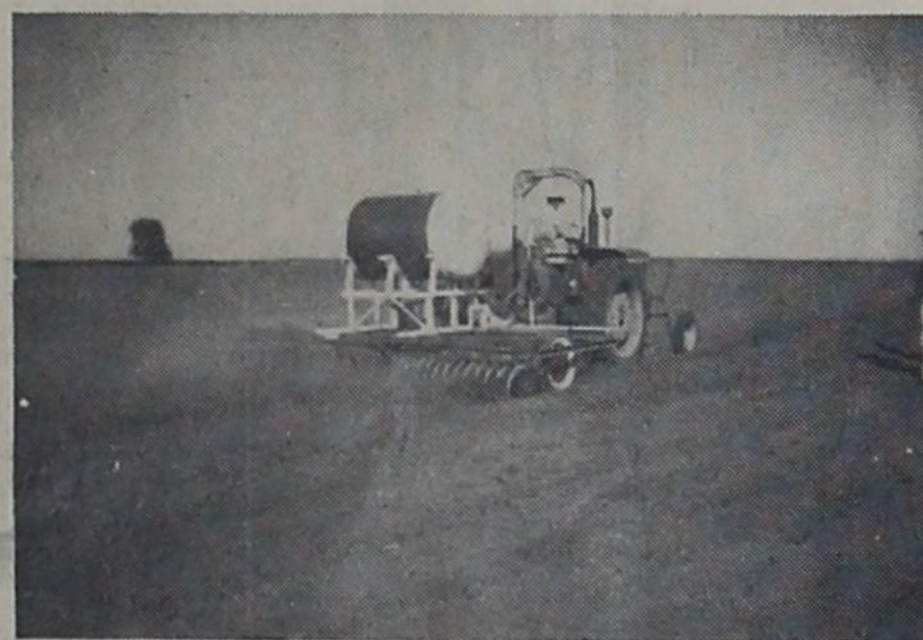

Board Passes Resolution Calling Bond Election

New Rates On Parcel Post

Use of ZIP Code will make it easier to mail packages beginning January 15, Postmaster Smart of Farwell said today.

New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones went into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on Sept. 20, 1966, the Postmaster pointed out.

The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel, and starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. Farwell is a second class office. The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the last coming on July 1, 1971.

Use of ZIP Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the country, Smart said.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the ZIP Code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,800 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs, and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

SOIL SAMPLE INFORMATION

When filling out the soil sample information sheet to be sent in with the soil sample be sure you fill it out as complete as possible.

Complete part "B-Cropping History" as accurately as possible. The soil scientist needs this information in order that he can make the best recommendation for the type crop that will be grown on a certain type soil.

Previous crops grown and amount of fertilizer applied information helps the scientist determine possible fertilizer carryover.

Many samples are sent in without the cropping history information. If you are farming a new piece of ground for the first time and do not know the cropping history make a special effort to get this information for sampling purposes.

REMEMBER SIGNUP PERIOD

According to the ASCS the signup period for the 1967 Wheat, Feed Grain, and Upland Cotton Program will be from February 6 through March 3. If you plan to sign up why not do it early.

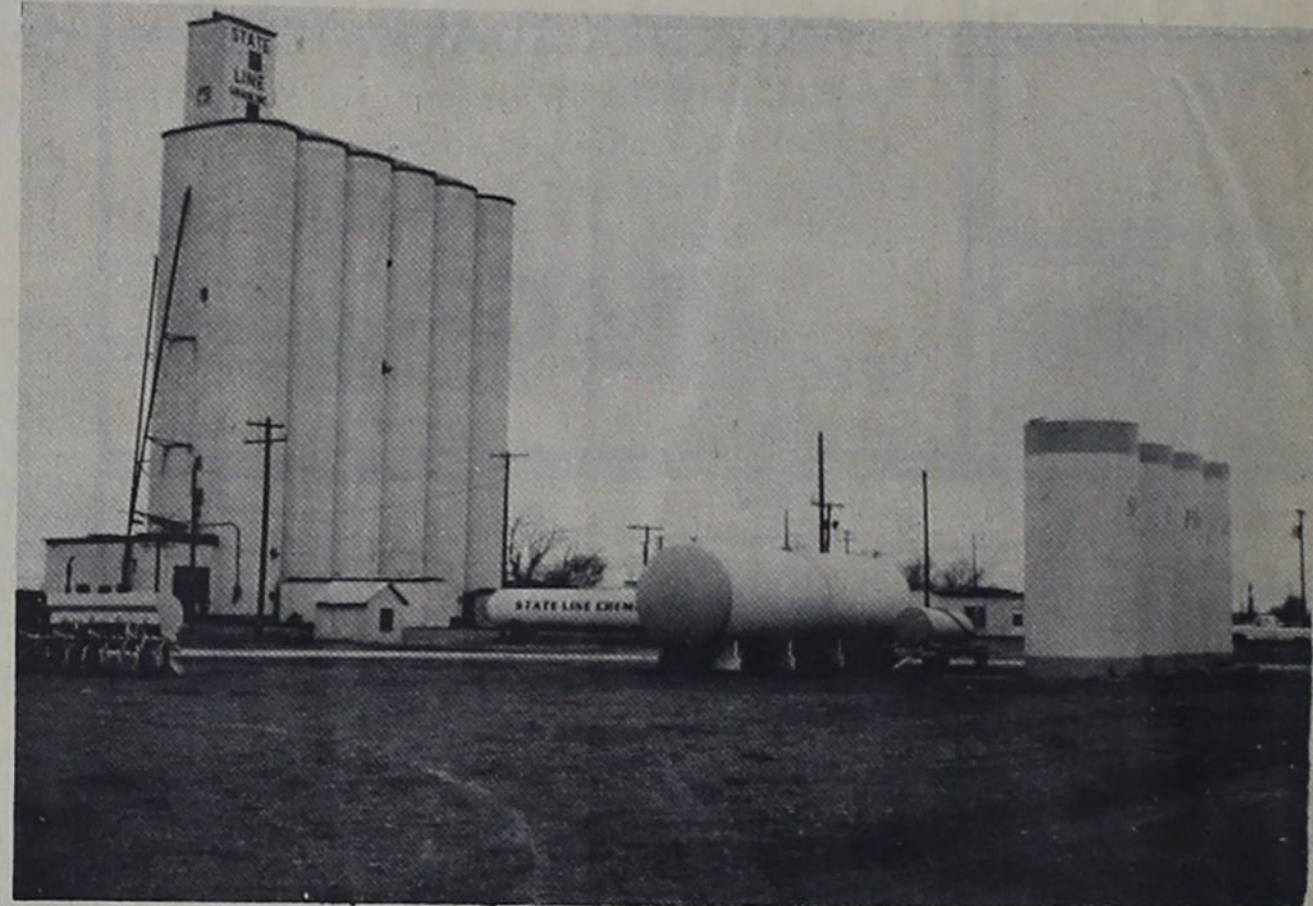
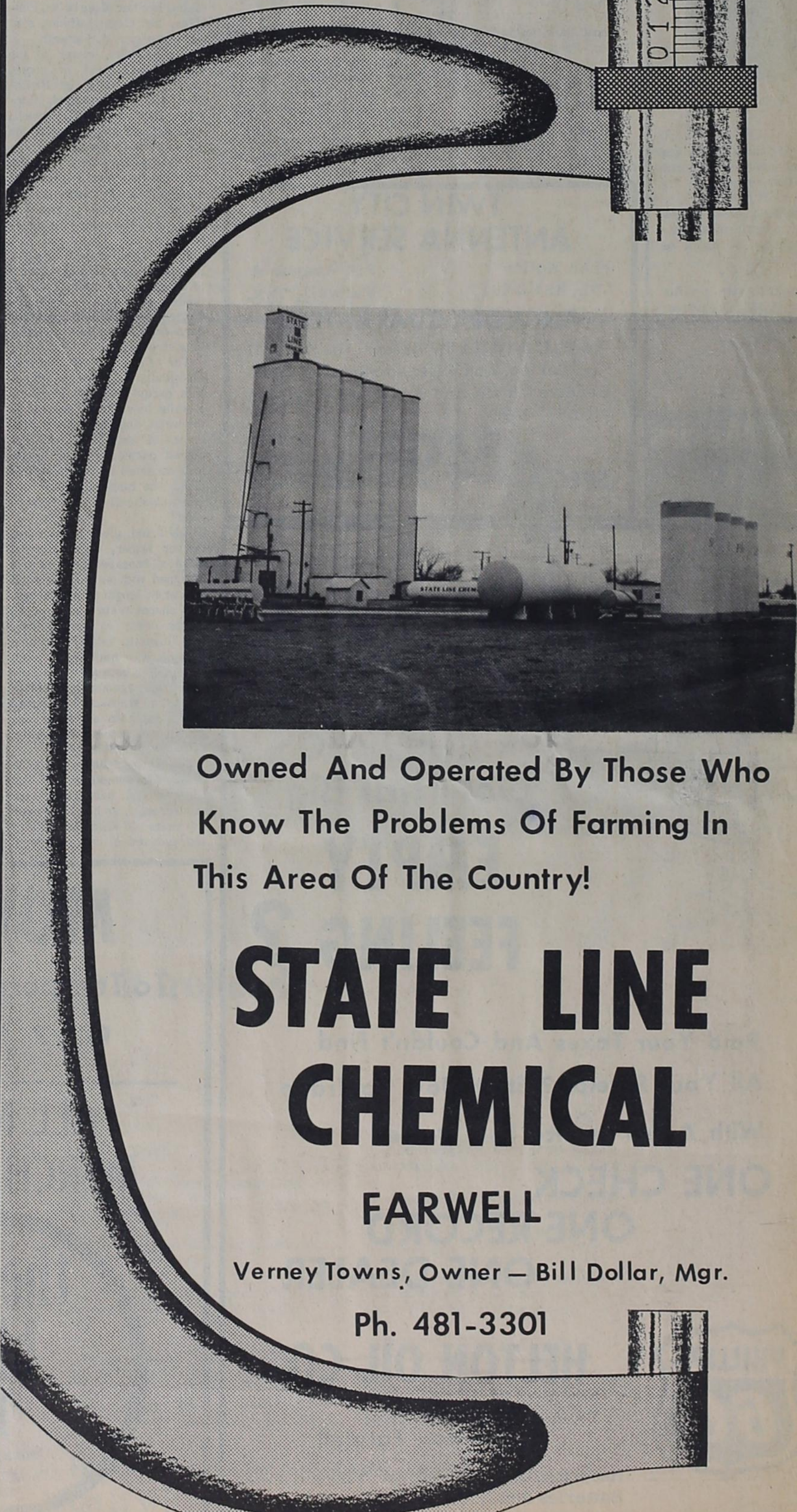
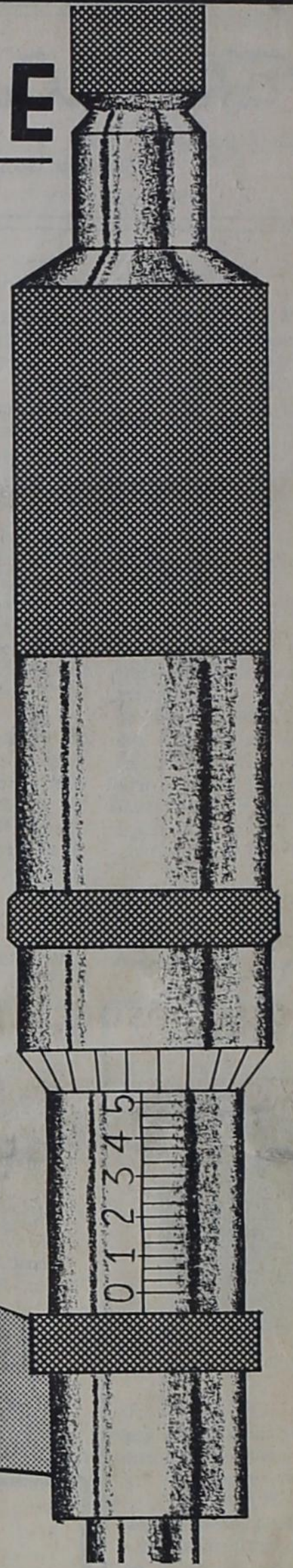
