





Already the SS "contribuitions" are becoming a distinct burden on all wage earners. Particularly is it a swindle on the young people just coming into their wage earning capacity. If the present law remains unchanged, and this is a very unlikely fact, the maximum "contribution" will be raised to dental groups, medical groups, \$745.80 per year. This burden with its very distant benefits tolerated.

Remember, the politicians now in office were in a large measure elected by our generation by appealing to our desires and promising us goodies that someone else would have to pay for. Now the new generation's politicians will appeal to them by promising them "goodies" such as relieving them of debt we have created. Therefore, as 60% to 70% of the population becomes LESS than age 35, it is only logical to assume that their generation of politicians may pass a law drastically reducing SS benefits or even doing away with it entirely. After all, in ten to 15 years these young folks are going to be asked to raise several hundred billion dollars to pay for what we have already spent. They just may say "to h--- with it" and their goes our Social Security benefits.

Our national politicians have done us a distinct disservice by destroying the sound economic system that originally undergirded the concept of Social Security. Remember, Barry Goldwater was pilloried in the last election for suggesting that a reform was necessary in Social Security. The odds are quite favorable that those who vilified Goldwater for his reforms that might have saved Social Security will eventually, in history, be reviled as the true ones who really destroyed a noble and worthwhile social project.
