America, America, how truly great it really is; how proud, how humble, how rich, how compassionate. This country has scaled the heights of

material wealth as no other country has ever dreamed about. This country has poured out compassion and wealth to those less fortunate in greater quantities than any country ever dreamed possible. Yet we are about as universally disliked as any country. Within our borders we have strife, dissention, and some relative poverty. We have far too many of our citizens condemning this country for things which in reality are not nearly as bad as they would make us believe. One of the great fallacies told to the American public is the extent of poverty in the U.S.A.

Probably the most actual "poverty" to be found in this country is the lot of various Indian tribes on some of the remote and desolate reservations. Strange how little we hear of this segment of our population. Strangely we hear so much of poverty from a relative affluent group, the American Negro. Here is where the argument starts. Well, for a starter, let's look at the Negro in Africa. Indescribable ignorance and savagery is the only words to assess the lot of 98 per cent of black Africans. The slums of our big cities are bad, but in the Chad area of the Sudan in Africa almost all of the adults are blind from a disease-bearing fly. Millions never even see, hear, or tell of sanitation, medicine, or any of the attributes of civilization. No matter what anyone says, life in America, even under its most appalling conditions, is infinitely better than in the biggest percentage of this old Earth's area. You don't believe it! Well how many of the Negroes would trade Harlem for the Congo? How many Chinese would trade San Francisco for Peking? How many of most anybody would trade living in the United States for where they came from originally? Very few, that's how many. Poverty can't be whipped by pulling the top down to the bottom. It can be whipped by raising the top, and the whole structure will rise with it. Poverty can't be whipped by destroying initative, or by destroying the incentive to work and accumulate. Poverty can't be whipped by a central decree. Poverty can be whipped by providing each person with the incentive to work and to assure himself the rewards of his labor. Poverty can be whipped by providing this country with a stable business and industrial climate.



### **Big Brother** ---May He Rest In Confusion

This decade, 1960-1970, the years of the New Frontier and the Great Society, will probably go down in history as the decade of decision, for in this short span of ten years the citizenry of America will have decided whether they wish to have some small measure of control over their destiny or whether they wish to pass the buck to a big brother bureaucracy, which in reality doesn't know itself whether it's coming or going.

The 1966 congressional elections saw a slight reversal of the trend towards eventual potty watching on the part of big brother, but unfortunately this is only a finger-in-the-dyke type of deal which certainly can not be considered permanent until LBJ, HHH, the rolicking Kennedy brothers, and others of the same breed are politely dismissed from positions of power. Oh yes, let us not forget that infallible one, gentleman Bob McNamara whose infallibility of judgment is attested to by his part in developing the magnificent Edsel, which according to some observers resembled a Mercury sucking a lemon.

The 90th congress is now in session, and some political "experts" have suggested that perhaps some time should be spent in "analyzation" of the legislation passed by the 89th congress. What is really meant by this statement is that the 89th congress, in its mad rush to find favor with the Great Society, passed such a tangled maze of legislation that the legislators themselves aren't sure just where they left off in legislating our eternal security and they need a pause in regrouping their wits.

Of course the best time to discuss the merits or non-merits of legislation is before it is passed and not after, but trying to impress this fact upon our modern high-powered group of eggheaded representatives is akin to attempting to discuss the works of Shakespeare with a mentally retarded hippopotamus -- they just don't savvy.

The crux of the matter however, is that it is to this type of federal paternalism that we seem content to trust our lives and fortunes to. We seem to feel that bigness is the answer to problems that beseige us, that ever increasing power of government is the only pathway to peace and security. We evidently believe that progress can be measured by some sort of coefficient of complexity -- the more complicated a thing
