

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Editorial

They Don't Speak For Us All

Just what IS the role of the clergy in world affairs? The answer to this one becomes fuzzier every day as more and more clergymen leave behind empty pulpits and preacherless congregations in order to participate in everything from "freedom" marches to "peace-at-any-price" demonstrations. Apparently the concept of the old country minister has gone down the tube, being replaced by the modern 20th century protest preacher, complete with hiking boots and a never ending supply of olive branches, which they apparently believe will bring peace to a troubled world, if waved loudly enough and long enough. If one takes this rather boisterous minority of the American clergy at their word, the following conclusions must be reached:

- 1. God is a socialist.
- 2. God is a northerner.
- 3. God is a member of the National Liberation Front.

4. God is against the bombing of North Vietnam. 5. God believes U. S. involvement in the Vietnam war is morally

wrong. 6. God will not support George Wallace for President.

Now I don't know for sure, but I don't think that the preceding conclusions can be drawn from reading the scriptures. I also seriously doubt that God has revealed his personal opinions to these, pardon the expression, clergyniks, in any sort of a vision or other similar occurrance, so one is forced to wonder just how they have arrived at these marvelous, irrefutable facts. From the looks of things, these conclusions are politically based rather than Biblically based, and so must be at best considered far from valid, and hardly the unmistakable word of God.

I, for one, am firmly convinced of the moral justification of any war against forces which if left unchecked would completely destroy the Christian faith and plunge the world into a thousand years of Godless darkness, But, let's pass over this for a moment and examine the question at hand, which is this: To what extent should the clergy take part in matters of foreign policy, political decisions, and the election of candidates for political office?

I realize that there are varying opinions on the matter, but the opinion expressed here will be my own. If any readers have other feelings on the matter, "Letters to the Editor" will be appreciated.









flected for a moment and replied, "Son, I have absolutely no objection to your going to Selma -- the moment you demonstrate to me that there is not a bit of prejudice left in your own congre-

Now preachers are entitled to their opinions, political or not,

just as any other man is. They are also entitled to express their

opinions, but not in their capacity as men of God, not from the

pulpit. Let them express their political opinions outside of

church, where political opinions belong. Most of all, they must

not imply that their own personal opinions are the word of God.

They must not intertwine them with the scriptures so that it

appears that what they say is verified by the Gospel, especially

when their opinions are irresponsible. As an example of ir-

responsibile opinions, let's consider the oft heard moral denunc-

iation of the United States for the civilian casualties which have

inadvertently been incurred because of our bombing of North

Vietnam. To hear some misguided clergyman tell it, the United

States is doomed to the very fires of Hades for this, yet not




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
